For domestic use, a family of five or less was charged \$12 annually, and a dollar more for each additional person.

Just as surely as if by invitation, you welcome the rat into your home by providing harborage and food—the two necessary ingredients for infestation of any premises. This may come as a surprise to most persons, since Texas and Mrs. Hilary Rutherford the United States have long prided themselves on being highly sanitized.

> But, let's take a look at the problem to determine whether you may be guilty of encouraging rats.

A rat must have food to or other pet and overfeed itleaving scraps around—the rat can survive quite well. Grain is another standard diet of rats and mice. How about the bird feeder? Is it conthat a rat can climb onto it? And how about your garbage can? Is the lid tight, or does it fit loosely? Do you always keep the lid on the can?

The answer to these questions may give you a clue as to why there are rats around. Now, for the harborage reuirement.

Rats take up residence in sewers, in piles of junk and lumber, in heaps of boxes and leaves, in storage sheds, in the attic or under your house. Have you heard strange noises in your walls or attic?





It is written in Scripture "Before thee remove the mote from your neighbor's eye, cast out the beam from thine own."

And it now begins to appear that if Western civilization is to preserve the thousand year old system of Anglo-Saxon justice, it is time for the organized lawyers of the nation to take some stern action.

Many attorneys have been quite active in castigating the practice of journalism, and many have moved quite vocally into what is loosely termed "consumerism."

But the national and state bar associations have been, and are, most lax in maintaining the dignity of their profession.

. It is one thing to fight for a client, but it is another thing to destroy the dignity and decorum of the courtroom, especially when one is an officer dignity of the courtroom.

It is one thing to be vigilant to preserve justice for all men attorneys have so far not lifted . it is another thing to arouse mob passions.

Deciding on guilt or innocence has long plagued the minds of civilized men. There was a time when "trial by fire" "trial by combat" was the preferred method with the theory that God would make the innocent victorious. This was perhaps a hold over from ancient Greek when men believed the gods took an active part in all affairs of humans. would take against a ball player who clobbered an umpire. all affairs of humans.

Then there was an era, still practiced in many parts of the world, when all decisions were reached by a king, a lord, or an African chief. Justice was the way one individual saw it.

This also continued to the oractice of using judges, until here was developed the trial by jury process. Here the accused is judged by a jury of his peers.

The judge is somewhat like the referee in a football game. He is there to maintain an orderly process, to prevent foul play, and to make sure that all facts on hand have a chance to be presented. In addition because jurors are laymen, he is law. Thus, he merits protection.

Yet there are lawyers today who have so little regard for the legal processes that they purposely seek to destroy the




