William Brown was appointed to the Tax Board of Equalization to replace Grady McIver who will be out of town on the meeting date.

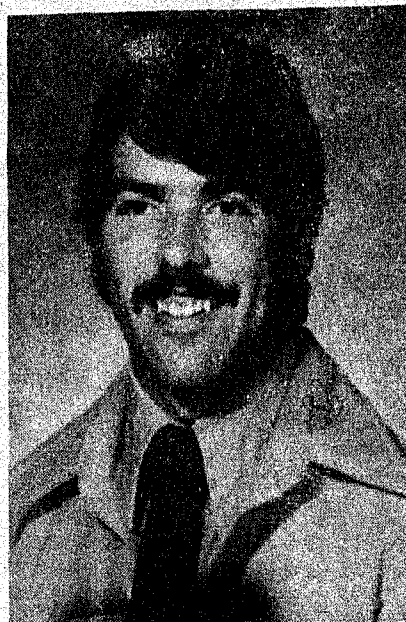
### Local Authors To Be Honored

#### Most For Year

The official rainfall report for Santa Anna for the month of July stands at 4.60 inches, the rain falling from Saturday, July 3 to Friday, July 16.

Measurable rain fell in Santa Anna twelve of the 14 days during that period.

Rainfall in town during the first six months of 1976 totaled only 9.84 inches with the largest monthly measurement being four inches in April.

In the Rockwood area, A. D. Eppler reported about 11 inches of rainfall since July 2. He lives several miles northeast of Rockwood. The Epplers' largest one-day measurement was three inches last Friday.

#### To D.E. Event

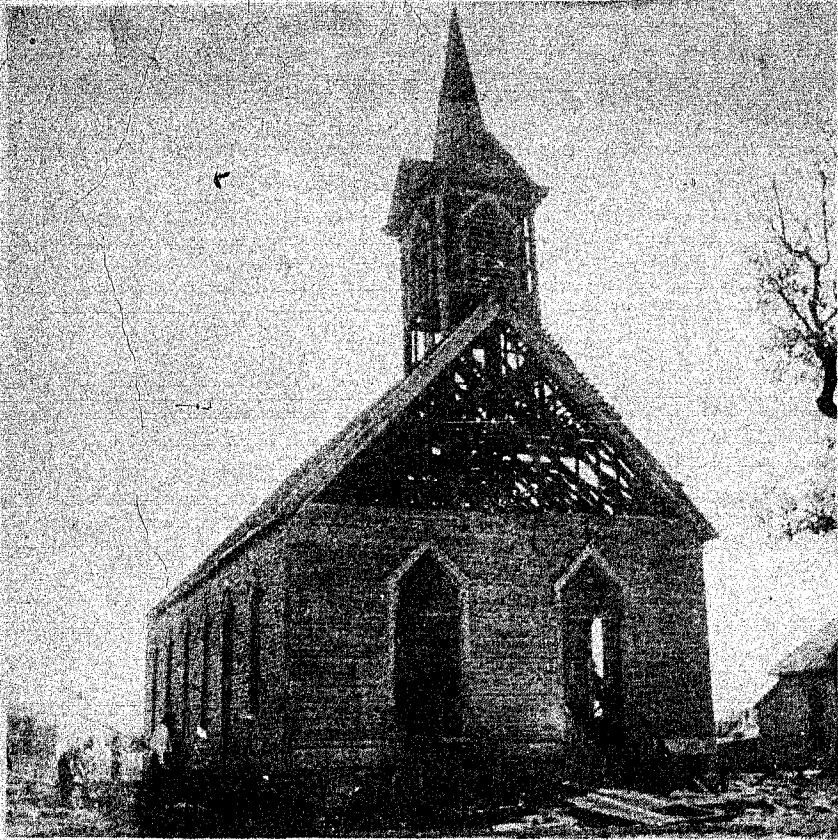
C. T. Livingston, distributive education coordinator at Santa Anna High School, will be in San Antonio next week attending an in-service activity for D. E. teachers and leaders.

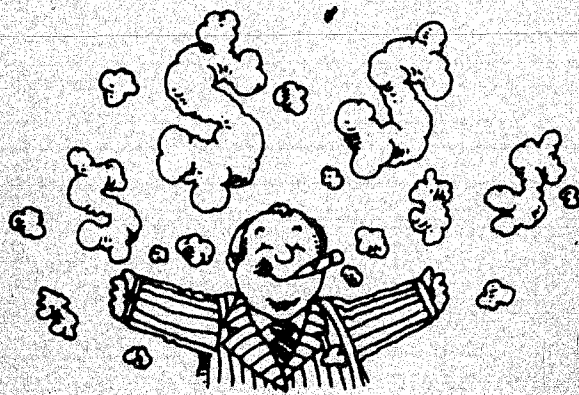

## Years Ago In The NEWS

The following items are from the December 27, 1901 issue of the news and reprinted in the June, 1926 issue:

The clover hunt at the home of Mr. and Mrs. V. L. Grady last night proved to be a grand social event of the holidays, according to statement of participants. At an early hour quite a number of merry young people were seen making their way to the beautiful home of the host and hostess. Soon the several rooms were filled to overflowing with happy young folks.

The most delicious refreshments were served, after which came the long expected "clover hunt." At a given signal each individual began a quiet search for the beautiful green clover leaves. The greatest number were found by H. M. Thomson and Miss Jessie Melton, and least number by Frank Caradine and Miss Sam Moore.

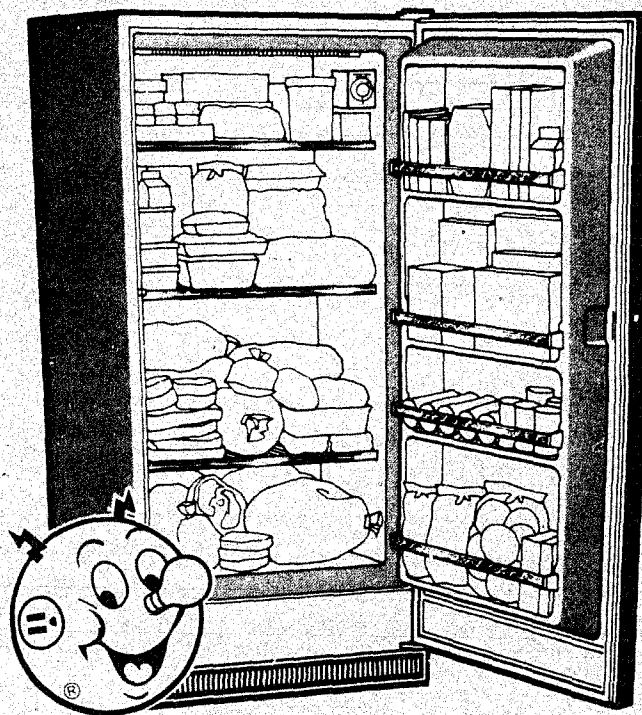

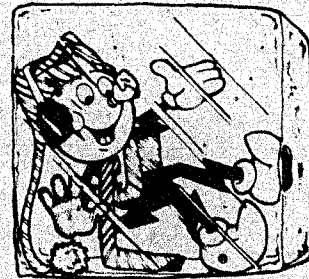

### FB Safety Week To Be Observed

County Judge W. W. Skelton has proclaimed the week of July 25-31 1976 as FARM AND RANCH SAFETY WEEK in Coleman County at the request of Coleman County Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is coordinating activities within the county for the special farm safety campaign.

Using the combined reports of statewide and Farm Bureau member accidental death reports, Judge Skelton said "records show that at least 300 Texas farm and ranch people died during 1975 at the following rate: traffic—123; tractors—35; drownings—28; firearms—21; fires and burns—16; machinery—14; animals—14; falls—11; electric current—10; other vehicles (trailers)—9; suffocation—6; poisoning—6; lightning—3; tornadoes—3; other & specified—3; struck by object—2 and stepped on nail—2. Coleman County recorded 1 farm-ranch death.

Coleman County Farm Bureau President, Victor Cardinas, said, "the theme for FARM SAFETY WEEK is 'EDUCATE FO SAFETY'. Education is one of three 'E's' of safety. The other two are engineering and enforcement.

"Our FARM BUREAU Preamble states in part—'to achieve educational improvement', and to carry out just one phase of this part of the our philosophy, we maintain a full-time Safety Education Department in Texas Farm Bureau," he added. Safety representatives from the Texas Farm Bureau state office in Waco travel the thirteen TFB fieldmen areas of: traffic (auto stopping); fire prevention; tractor and machinery; and a demonstration to prevent electric shock.

Approximately 300 of these programs are presented each year. The programs are presented free as a public service of the TFB and the 210 organized county Farm Bureaus. Schools, civic clubs, youth organizations and other groups planning safety education programs for the year, may schedule one or more of these programs by contacting the Coleman County Farm Bureau.



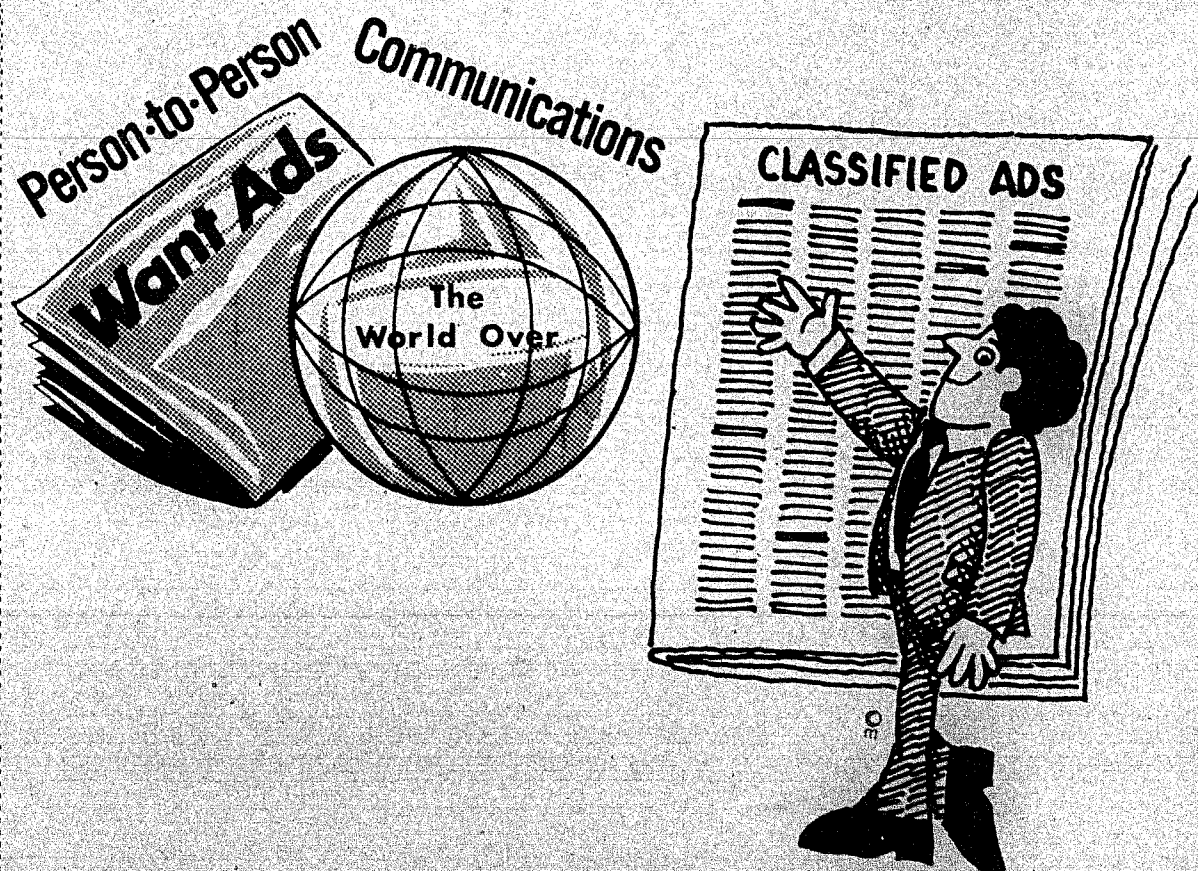
