

#### Famed Pitcarin More Isolated Following Fire

Pitcairn Island, famed home of descendents of mutineers from the HMS Bounty, narrowly escaped annihilation this week when fire broke out less than hundred feet from a shed full of dynamite.

The fire started in the electrical plant for the island, and when the islanders arrived on the scene flames were shooting 20 to 30 feet high.

Tom Christian, reporting by short wave from Pitcairn, said that the first warning of anything wrong was a blackout about an hour after the generator began operation at 5:30 p.m. Before the men could do anything, sparks had ignited the brush all around the building. Two days before, ten 55gallon barrels of diesel fuel had been moved near the generator. Two of these exploded before they

could be moved, causing fiery

Christian reported that the men shoveled a trench around the generator building, extinguished the burning brush, and contained the fire, but they were unable to save the equipment that provided the island with electricity.

The greatest fear was that the stored dynamite might be set off, so intense was the heat. Christian said the dynamite had been stored by the British, to use in blasting the reef for explansion of the Bounty Bay Jetty. At the present ships must anchor far out from shore and small boats must cross the reef on the crest of waves in order to reach the island.

The island's only remaining source of electrical power is a wind generator and five private 3kilowatt generators donated by the Voice of Prophecy international radio broadcast, operated by Seventh-day Adventists of Glendale, California. The islanders on Pitcairn have been Adventists for more than half a century.

Sigmor Corp, of San Antonio has completed two wells near Santa Anna recently, they are the No. 3 and No. 4 Day, located in the Mary Ann Fisk Survey three miles east of Santa Anna.

The No. 3 well produced 31.75 barrels of 29.8 gravity oil and 15 barrels of water ona 24 hour test with a gas-oil ratio of 1,376 - 1. Total depth is 2,503 feet.

The No. 4 Day showed a 24-hour test of 37.5 barrels of 39-gravity oil and 35 barrels of water. Total depth is 2,543 feet.



#### MY HOME TOWN



OLD T. T. PERRY HOME Surrounded by huge oak trees

One of the most interesting older houses is the one family home now owned byMrs. lone Caton at 1203 Mahoney St.

When Mr. and Mrs. T. T. Perry of Kinney County, Texas, came to Santa Anna in 1890 with their two young daughters, Ida Perry Jones and Sadie Perry Taylor, they lived in a cove at the foot of the West Mountain and Mrs. Perry was disturbed about all the wild varmints—snakes, skunks. wolves and what-have-you, on account of her children, and would look toward the south, with very little town between. One Sunday afternoon they visited the place of the majestic oaks and Mrs. Perry remarked, "I'd like to build a house under this tree."

The next morning Mr. Perry contacted George W. Mahoney, president of the Santa Anna Livestock and Land Company, and a Warranty Deed was made to T. T. Perry, June 18, 1891, signed byMr. Mahoney, president, Chapman Bradford, secretary, Ben H. Pittman, clerk of District of Coleman County, Texas, recorded by H. D. Walker, County clerk Squire Boone, Deputy—filed for record 18, June 1891 at 5 o'clock and 50 minutes, p.m.

Building of the new home was started in 1892. The original house had four rooms and a large back porch; a second story of five rooms was added in 1908. The house was constructed of beaded ceiling and walls, and square nails were used. It isn't remembered where the lumber was bought.

Later Floss Perry Davis and Anzo Perry McHorse and Ione Perry Caton joined the family.

Mr. Perry was a stone mason, working most of the rocks in the local buildings still standing—Limestone from a quarry in Santa Anna Mountain was used for the unusual decorations around his home—one is a large stone

encircled with a grape vine with huge clustersof grapes at each end that is dated 1905. He probably carved many grave stones in nearby cemeteries.

Mr. Perry died June 17, 1943, and Mrs. Perry died September 20, 1955, Mrs. Perry the surviving parents, deeded the home to a daughter, lone Caton, July 25, 1955.

Mrs. Caton has her home filled with treasures, one is an oil painting, by Mrs. Sylvia Herring of the old rock building on wallis Ave. now being razed. The house has most of the original furniture. Other treasures include a Hume China vase, made in Germany, for S. H. Phillips Drug Store, It is decorated witha picture of the first Santa Anna Public School building, another is a heavy, clear glass small medicine bottle with "S. H. Phillips, Registered Druggist,"in raised letters. There is also an ashtray of heavy clear glass, made of Santa Anna Sand, which had been shipped to Mexico. The tray shows a diamond shape at any angle. There is a glass walking stick made by R. W. Stemmel who later moved to Long Beach, Calif.

Another favorite is a lifelike, large doll, given by her parents, Christmas 1912, named "Mary Tom" for her parents. It was made in Germany and bought from S. H. Phillips Drug Store.

There is an interesting lawn swing bought in 1910 not to mention all of the needlepoint and other handicraft Mrs. Caton has made for her treasured one family home, located among the giant Oak Trees—In Our Home Town.
