There is very little oats in the area as dry weather during the winter and early spring took its toll of that crop, and most farmers grazed their fields or baled the grain.

Everyone in the community is invited to attend the musical Sunday evening.

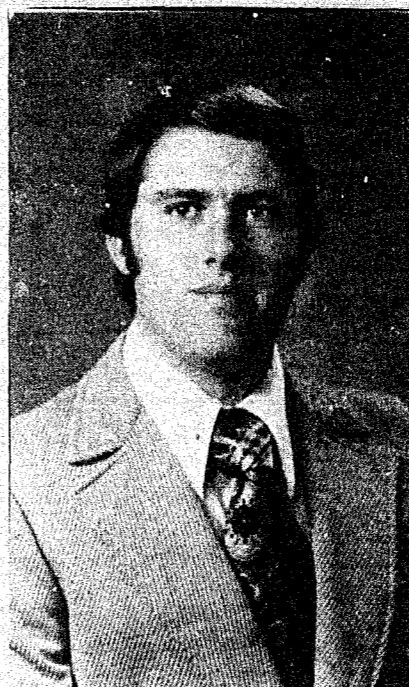
Town's Older Buildings Being Moved to Salado

Freeman Wins County Office

Barbara Freeman was winner of the Democratic nomination for Coleman County Treasurer in the runoff election Saturday. She won over incumbent Everett McKinney 927 to 698.

In the Santa Anna box, Mrs. Freeman polled 107 votes to McKinney's 76; at Rockwood she led 25 to 12.

In other races, Coleman County voters agreed with the statewide results that saw Jon Newton defeat Jerry Sadler for Railroad Commissioner and Phillips win the nomination over Dally for Judge of Court of Criminal Appeals.

In the only other county races, Jack Strickland won over John Skelton for the Precinct One Commissioner post, and incumbent Howard Stephenson won a close victory over Louis Pittard, in Precinct THREE.

The county candidates will appear on the November general election ballot and are unopposed for the offices.

Housing Survey Underway Here

Additional housing units in Santa Anna are being proposed, and the Santa Anna Housing Authority is interested in obtaining new units if there is a need for them.

The proposed eight-unit duplexes would be for people of all income levels in contrast to the present low-income units that are so popular here.

The new two-bedroom apartments would be rented at \$100 per month or more depending on the income, and size of family.

In order to determine interest or need, applications are asked as soon as possible. Anyone interested should contact the Housing Authority office, City Hall Santa Anna National Bank or Telephone Cooperative office.

The Housing Authority now has 62 low-income units and all are filled with a waiting list for vacancies.

Local postal patrons and postal employees are looking forward to using the new building.

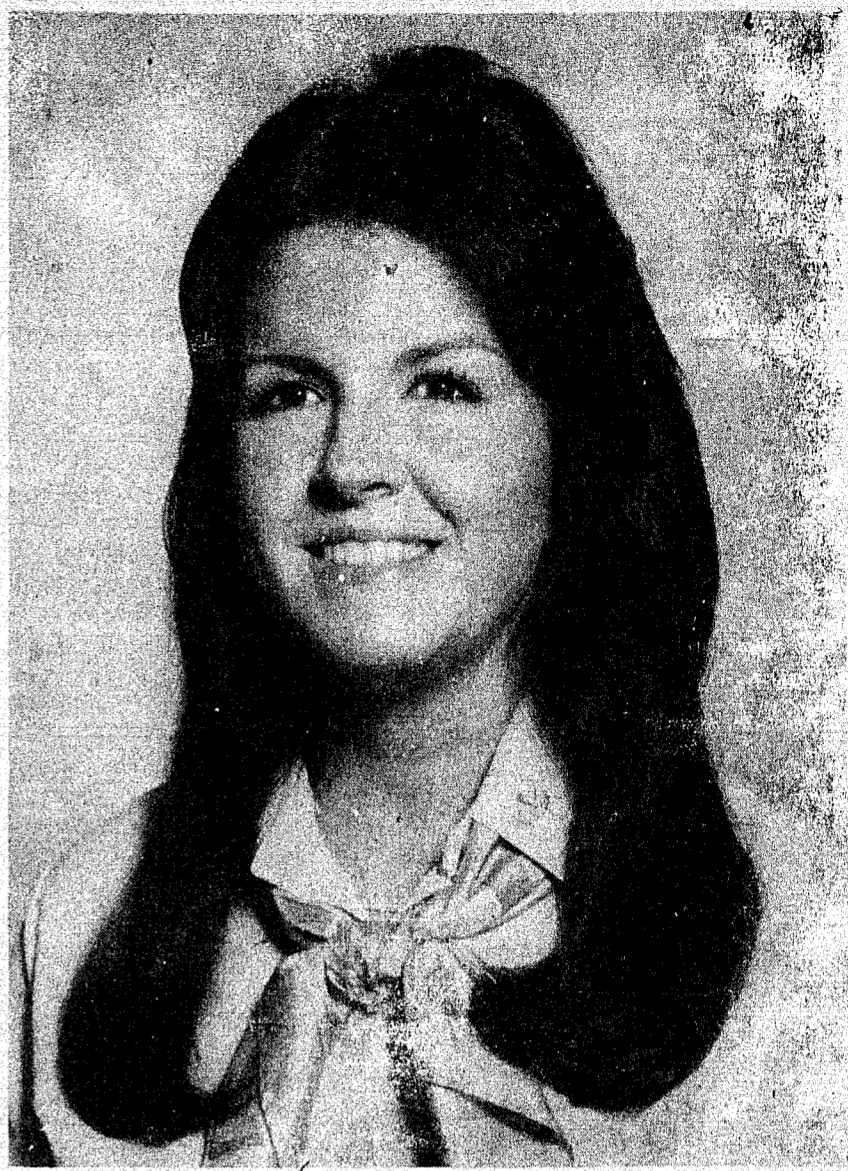
Plans Given For FBC Bible School

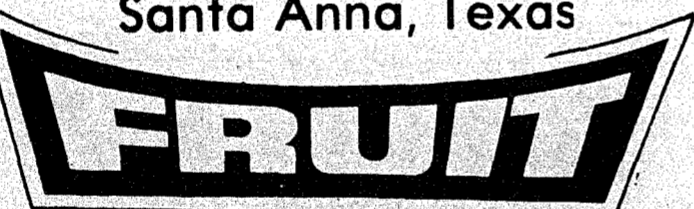

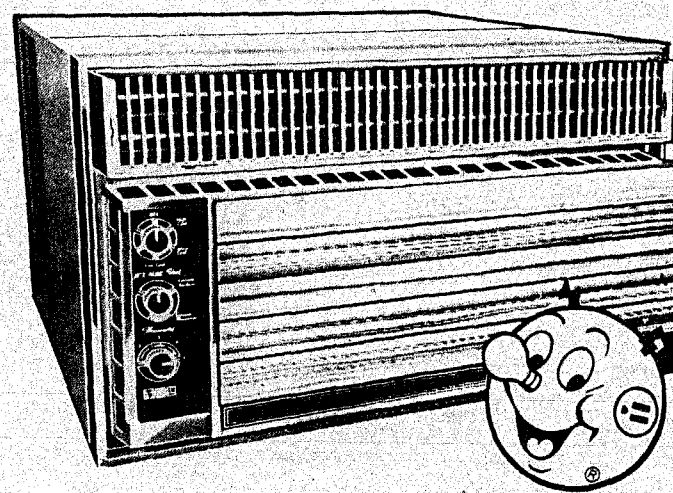

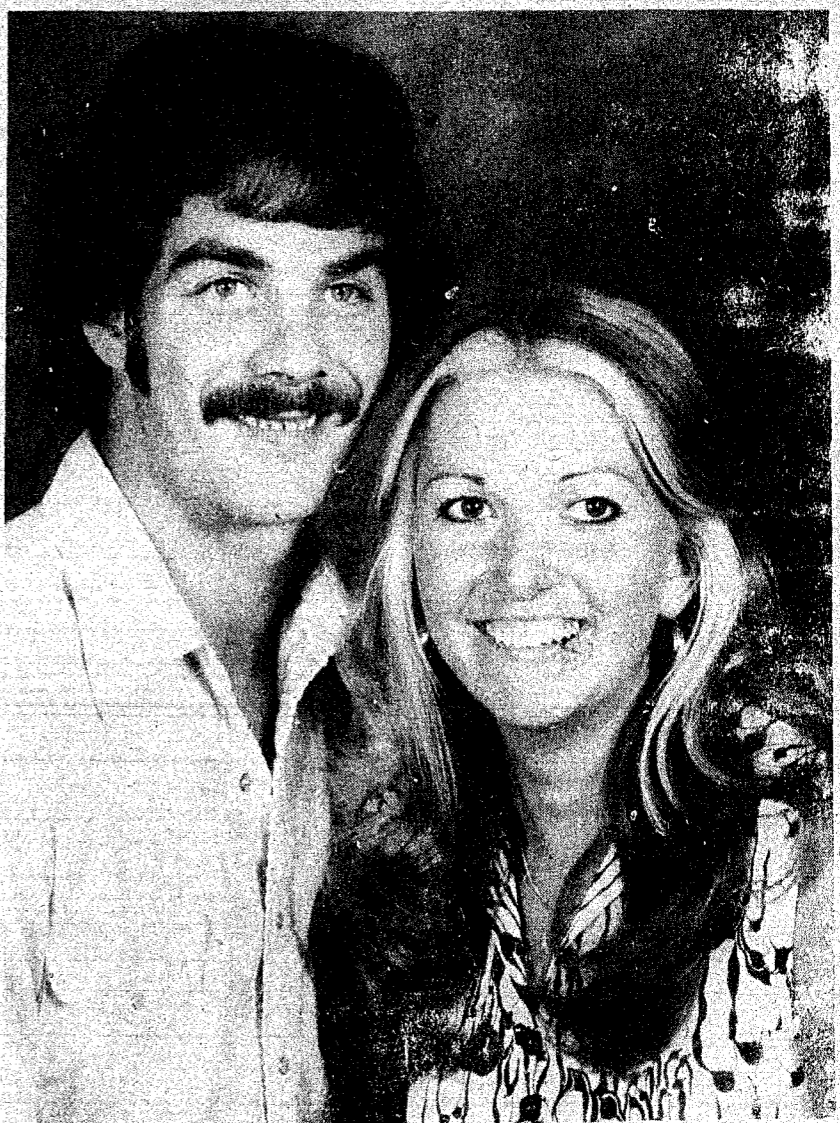
