Bears Bite Mountaineers; Eagle Hunt Set This Week

Santa Anna Mountaineers meet their third Class A opponent this season when they host the Goldthwaite Eagles Friday night at an 8 p.m. game at Mountaineer Stadium. The Mounties will be seeking their first victory after losing last week to the big Baird Bears by a 24-0 score.

A blocked punt and end zone recovery brought the Baird initial score in the first quarter, and the Bears kept control the rest of the game, holding the Mountaineers to four first downs and 48 yards rushing.

The 22-0 halftime score was increased to 25-0 when Baird scored a safety.

Rattler Bites Local Woman

Mrs. Glen (Lowita) Pope is recovering well from a rattlesnake bite she received Friday, September 3, as she walked down the driveway of a neighbors home. After an overnight stay in Brownwood Community Hospital and a week convalescing at home, Mrs. Pope has returned to her job this week with a Coleman real estate firm.

Mrs. Pope was bitten by the small snake late in the afternoon as she carried her granddaughter, Heather Hicks, across the street for a visit with Ruby and E. Lee Harper. She did not see the snake strike, but felt the bite and saw the reptile crawling off the driveway surface.

Patti Hicks and a visitor, Deborah Long of Coleman, were called from across the street but were unable to kill the snake that was about 12 inches long and had only a "button" rattle.

The bite was on Mrs. Pope's toe on her right foot. She was wearing open sandals at the time.

Many people have reported rattlesnakes in the town, but the recent incident is the first injury reported in many years.

CONSTRUCTION STARTING ON NEW HIGHWAY

Work started this week on the new highway to be built from Santa Anna city limits to Brown County line. The new highway will be an extended two-lane structure similar to the highway from Santa Anna to Coleman that was completed a few years ago.

The 6.8 mile project is to be constructed by Cooper and woodruff, Inc. of Amarillo at a cost of over \$674,000. The project is to take an estimated 225 work days.

SDA Publications To Get Emphasis

This magazine is a weekly paper and keeps the members up on the progress of the church activities in the various parts of the world. Each copy contains reports from all the main sections of the world.

The paper was first printed in Rochester, New York, then moved to Battle Creek, Michigan, and later transferred to Washington, D. C., where it is being published now. It has been published as a weekly there since 1903.

The Review circulation is 99,000. A campaign is underway to place the journal in every Adventist home.

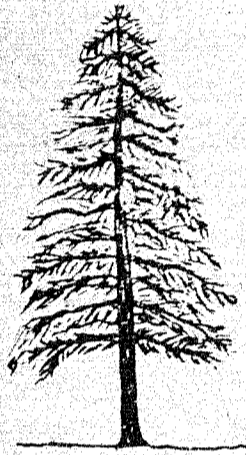

Bless This Mess

Where did the Summer go? The school buses have announced the first hint of Fall, and for a fact when you look across the hills, there it is hanging in the air. Another sure sign is the farmer and his tractor preparing the ground for grain sowing. Sometimes the lady of the house gets to lend a hand, that is if she hasn't got sense enough to keep her mouth shut. All it takes is a few words like, "Looks like I could do that." Before you can tie the strings of your straw hat under your chin, you're astride that pile of nuts and bolts, and he's telling you the gear shift is not to hang your water jug on.

At my house I have one ground rule that covers all those jobs that I'm not very expert at, and tractor driving heads the list. I don't beat around the bush. I just tell them flat out, "You better not laugh or I'll go to the house!"

You can always tell how much confidence they have in you by the first instruction. "If you need to stop in a hurry just pull this switch, and the tractor will go dead." Now, how much trouble can you get into with a dead tractor? They also go through all this jazz about don't try to put it in gear without pushing in the clutch, and don't forget you have two brake pedals, and whatever you do, watch the gauges.

Out in the field you're expected to back up just so-so, and he hooks the tandem on behind. With an, "All you have to do is just go around the block until you get to the center, smooth it out and then move on to the next block," ringing in your ears, you're ready to break up all those clogs that are the size of your head.

Have you ever noticed that the first crisis that comes up is the one thing the boss didn't tell you about? It seems to me that "what to do when the front wheels get crossways" would be at the top of the list. It's just like when you fall down. You look around to see if anybody is looking. You then turn the wheel all the way in the opposite

direction, ease out on the clutch, and buck and pitch until it straightens out. You also make a mental note to not let that happen again.

When you find the center of the block you will have need to speak with the instructor again. That's him in that dust cloud up ahead pulling the oneway. What you do is stop to get a drink at the same time he does, and you just causally mention that he left a gully running down the center of the block and out to each corner. It looks quite like a flattened out sawhorse, and it's a wonder you're tractor didn't turn over in it.

In order to fill in a gully you have to put one of the big tires on the edge of it, plow down one side, turn around and plow down the other side. Sounds easy, but a tractor has a mind of it's own, especially when it knows more than you do. The idea is to throw dirt in the hole until the ground is level. That system is fine if you can plow a straight line. My system works just as well. After you

make the first pass you look and see where you let the plow get out of line and then you just zig-zag at the same places on the way back.

The corners are worked out in the same way only you have to remember that you don't have half an acre to turn in, so you have to pick out a lace to go before you're ready to turn. It doesn't help a bit when that place is already occupied by a big snake who looks like he might decide to ride a few rounds with you. I don't blame him for deciding to run. The gnats were even afraid to ride with me.

Some tractors have a contraption on the steering wheel to absorb all the bumps, and you don't have to hang onto the wheel so tight. Who needs one? The thumb works just as well, and with all the pain there's no danger of going to sleep and falling off. I don't figure that passing under the tandem would improve the appearance any.

In three days of hard tractor driving I learned one thing all by myself. "If you drive tractor all day, you will drive tractor all night too."

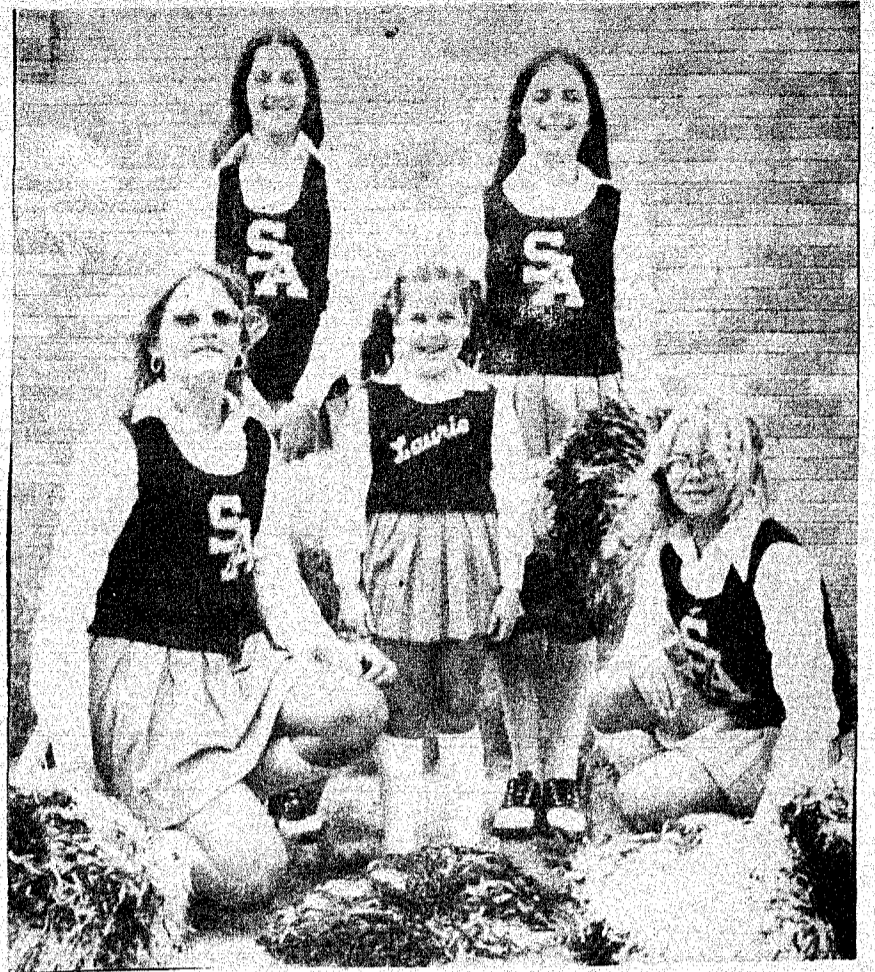
The Quilting Club meets this Tuesday afternoon at the community center. Leona Henderson has up a quilt and Genia McIver will put one up next.

RESUMEN DE LAS ENMIENDAS PROPUESTAS A LA CONSTITUCION ELECCION GENERAL DEL 2 DE NOVIEMBRE DE 1976

NUMERO UNO EN LA BOLETA (S.J.R. 49)

Revocando Secciones 49-d and 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas, S.J.R. 49 enmienda Sección 49-c del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas para disponer y autorizar \$400 millones adicionales de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir a la aprobación de dos terceras partes de los miembros de cada cámara de la Legislatura para tales fines de desarrollo del agua que la Legislatura pueda prescribir.

La enmienda contiene prohibición específica contra el uso de fondos del estado para el desarrollo de recursos acuáticos del Rio Mississippi y también requiere que antes de que pueda encargarse de cualquier proyecto particular para el desarrollo de agua que requiere un gasto de mas de \$35 millones de producto de los bonos, debe de ser aprobado por resolución de la Legislatura.

La enmienda remueva el requerimiento constitucional que ciertas rentas deben de ser usadas para retirar bonos para el desarrollo de agua y el encarecimiento de la calidad de agua y remueva el limite constitucional de la tasa de interés en tales bonos.

La fraseología de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la

boleta es lo siguiente: "La enmienda constitucional autorizando un incremento de \$400 millones de la cantidad de Bonos del Desarrollo de Agua en Tejas que podrán emitirse al ser aprobada por dos terceras partes de la legislatura; enmendando y consolidando disposiciones de Secciones 49-c, 49-d, y 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas; y revocando Secciones 49-d y 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas."

NUMERO DOS EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 propone una enmienda a la Constitución de Tejas para aumentar de \$100 millones hasta \$200 millones la cantidad principal agregada de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir y que están en circulación por el Texas Water Development Board para proveer donaciones y préstamos para la mejoría de la calidad de agua como establecido por la Legislatura. La fraseología de la enmienda propuesta como aparecerá en la boleta es lo siguiente: "Una enmienda constitucional para incrementar desde \$100 millones hasta \$200 millones la cantidad de Bonos de Desarrollo de Agua en Tejas que podrán ser emitidos con el propósito de mejorar la calidad del agua."

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

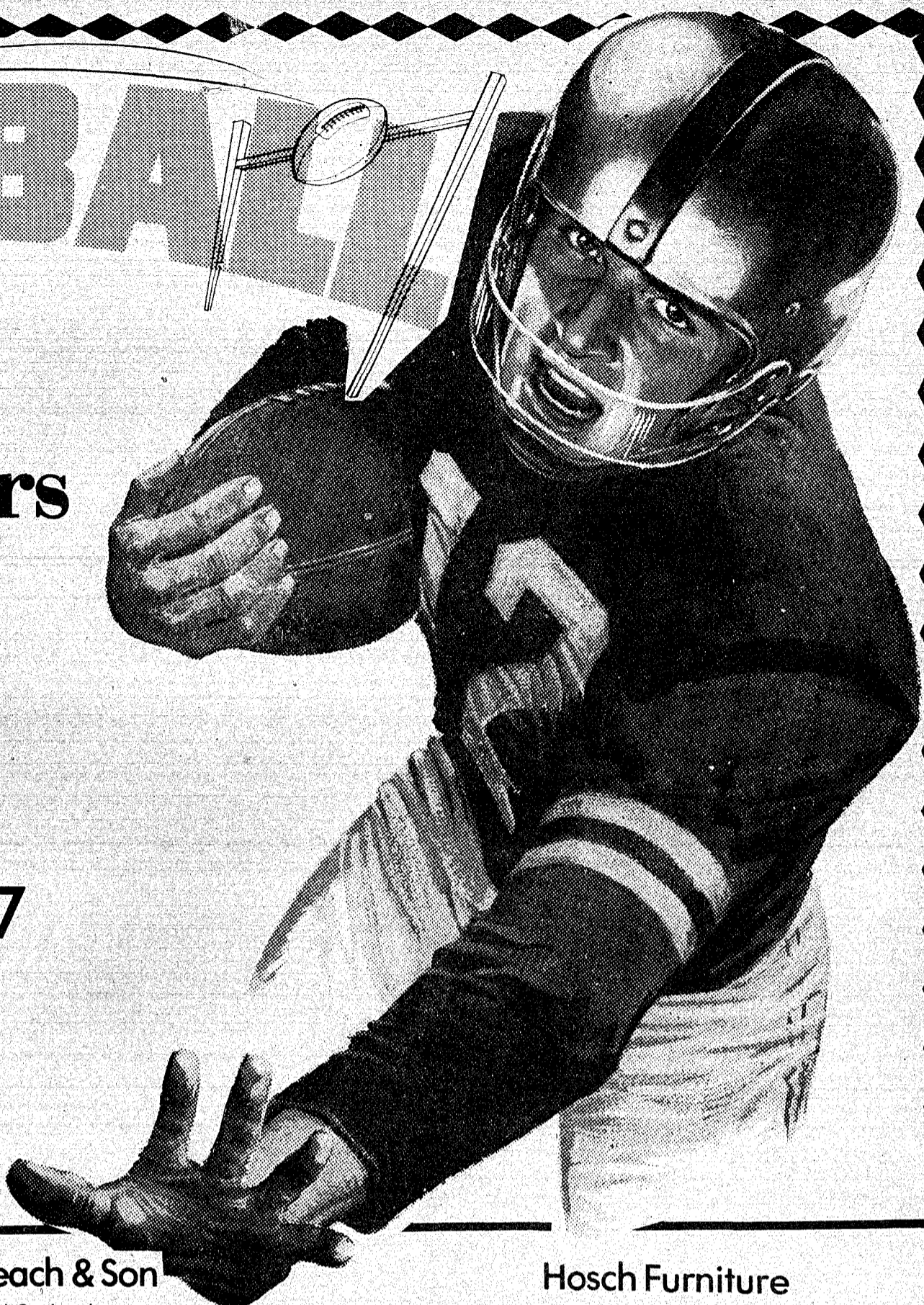
