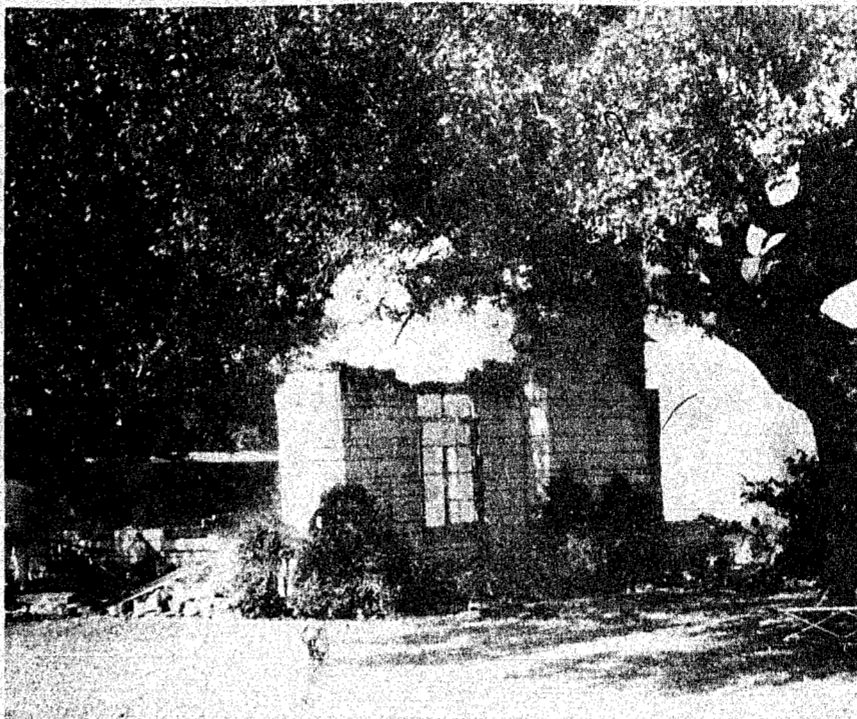

Stewardson Home Destroyed By Fire Monday

The home of Mrs. Tom Stewardson, about 12 miles south of Santa Anna, on Hwy 283, was completely destroyed by fire early Monday morning around 8:30 or 9. The fire apparently started in the bathroom. The Santa Anna Fire Department answered the call, but were hampered by low water pressure. Mrs. Stewardson's daughter, Mrs. Linda Slusher and son, Steve, live with her and they and a visiting niece, were having

breakfast when the fire was discovered.

Everything was a complete loss, furniture and clothing; the women only saved house robes they were wearing.

The Stewardson home, constructed of Austin Stone was a complete loss; at the far north end of the house a corner of the garage is seen left upright. The beautiful ranch home consisted of three bedrooms, two baths, large living room, den, kitchen, dining room, large hall and two-car garage.

The first Austin stone house in this exact location was built in 1948 and as the family were beginning to move in a fire gutted the building and it is said an older house stood nearby and was also destroyed; then this house was rebuilt in 1949, adding up to three homes burned in the same location.

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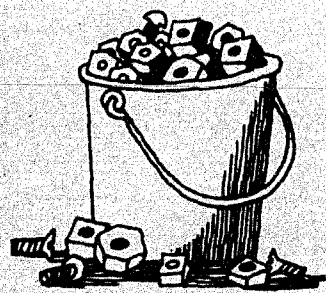

Jess Howards To Be Honored

A golden wedding anniversary reception is planned for Sunday, November 7, honoring Mr. and Mrs. Jess E. Howard. The celebration will be held at the Mountain City Center from 2-5 p.m. Hosting the occasion will be their son and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Don Howard of Coleman, and their grandchildren, Mr. and Mrs. David R. Pearson Jr., Glenn David and Robby of San Antonio, Standley and Ronnie Howard of College Station. The Howards invite all their friends to attend the celebration and request no gifts, please.

One of the traumatic experiences in Mrs. Howards life occurred in her youth sometime around 1912 or 1914, and the memory of this harrowing experience is shared by many residents of this community at this time.

It seems that two telegraph operators in Coleman and Bangs were having a little fun with their communications system, and out of jest telegraphed a message that they had a report that the Mexican Army was approaching Bangs, killing people, and burning everything in its path. The Santa Anna operator intercepted the message and thought it to be a real alert, since at that time the United States and Mexico were having a lot of diplomatic trouble, and the rumors had been flying that we were about to become involved in a war with Mexico at any time.

Thinking that he should do something quickly to protect the people in the Liberty Community, who would have been in the purported path of the tragic march, the operator made a phone call to Mr. Duggins, who was Raney Duggins' father, and told him of the report and asked him to warn everyone of the impending danger, since he was the only one who had a telephone in the locality. It was already after night when the frightening phone call came, and promptly Mr. Duggins got all his family out of bed, gathered up coats, quilts and whatever provisions they needed that they could quickly get their hands on, and took his family into the corn field to hide while he went

about warning all the neighbors. Soon many had gathered in the field with their families and the men all armed themselves with whatever they could get together and took their stations to wait for what they felt could be a disastrous night for their families.

Far into the night, it was discovered in Santa Anna that the whole thing was a hoax and someone had to be sent out to tell the people it was an untrue report. Mrs. Howard says she is not positively sure, but she thinks that the two men they sent out to tell them were J. D. Simpson and Sam Collier. Anyway, the men came out honking the horn in their car to get the people out of hiding, which just added to the hysteria, as one gentleman was sure upon hearing the automobile honking that it was the bugles from the hostile Army approaching. Needless to say, when the truth was finally revealed everyone was happy to return to their homes in the wee hours of the morning, happy and relieved that they were unharmed.

Mr. Howard has always enjoyed hobbies of hunting and fishing. He recalls memories of many great fishing trips on the Colorado River or Home Creek with his friends, Neal Oakes, R. W. Balke, Clarence Gilbert, "Boggy" Disrens, the late Dr. R. R.

Lovelady and many others. These fishing trips were usually planned to last only one or two nights, depending on several factors such as how the fish were biting and how long the provisions held out, etc. Jess recalls one such trip on a 4th of July, when he, his son, Donald Ray, and Neal Oakes went to the Colorado River to put out trot lines and stay for awhile. He reports they carried enough groceries to stay a week, although they knew they could only stay a couple of nights, and took only 100 pounds of ice with them, which ordinarily would have been ample.

As soon as the lines went into the water, the fish started biting, and very soon they had a very nice catch already going for them. The first "really big one" they caught weighed 22 pounds, and throughout the night each time the lines were run, they caught many more of "boasting size", some of which were in the ten to eleven pound variety. The next morning when the lines were run at daylight, they took off one that weighed 23 pounds, and they had their work cut out for them, dressing all they had caught up to that point. Needless to say, they had a big fish fry for breakfast, and eliminated a goodly portion of them.

Alas, when the fish were all dressed, they discovered they had

more fish than they had ice to take care of them, so the decision was made to go home rather than take a chance of losing what they had already caught. They packed up and returned to Santa Anna, after only one night on the river with a sizeable catch.

Thirty-five years later, these three men can still hold their own in good competition when it comes to eating fresh golden-fried catfish.

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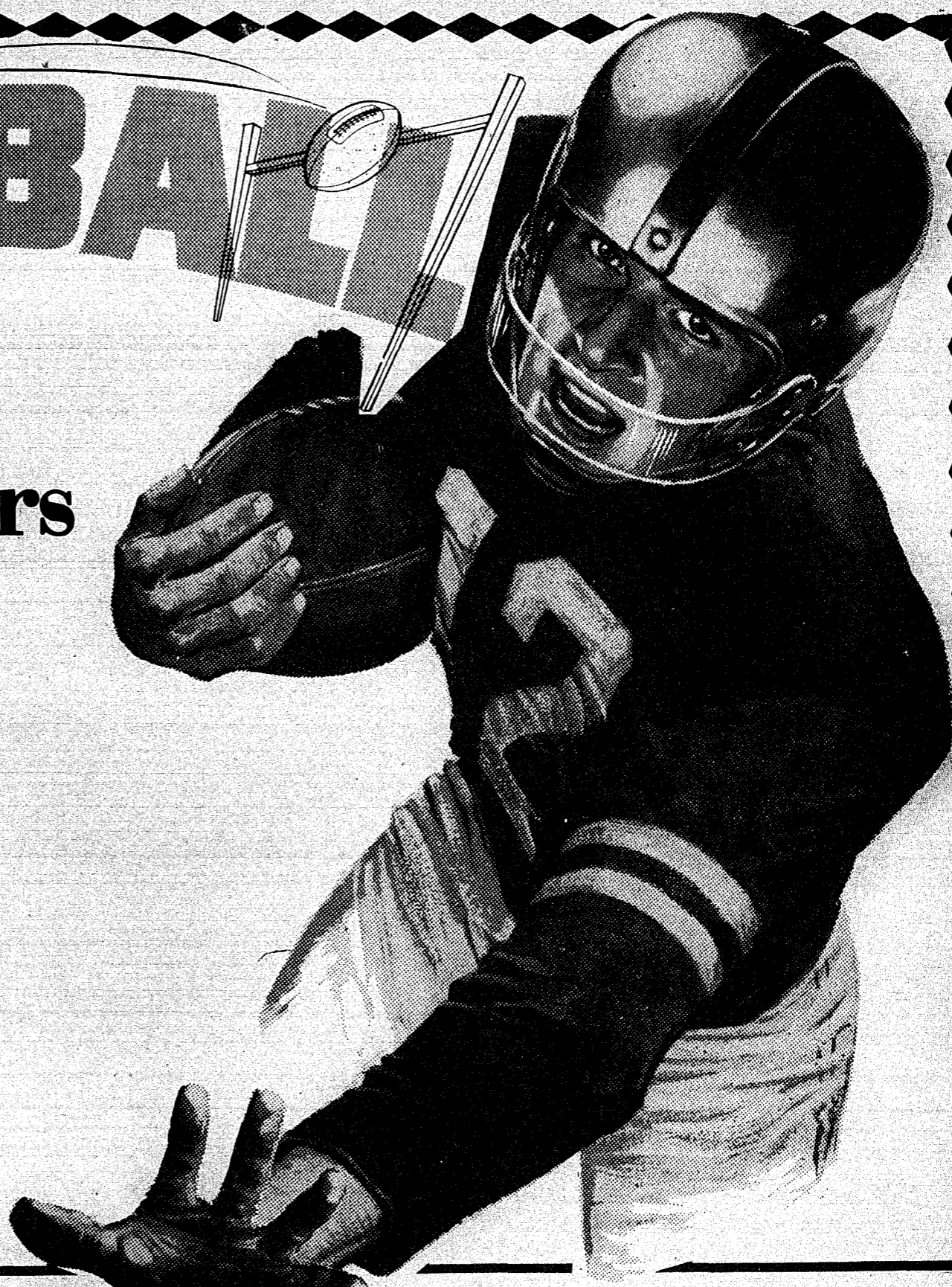

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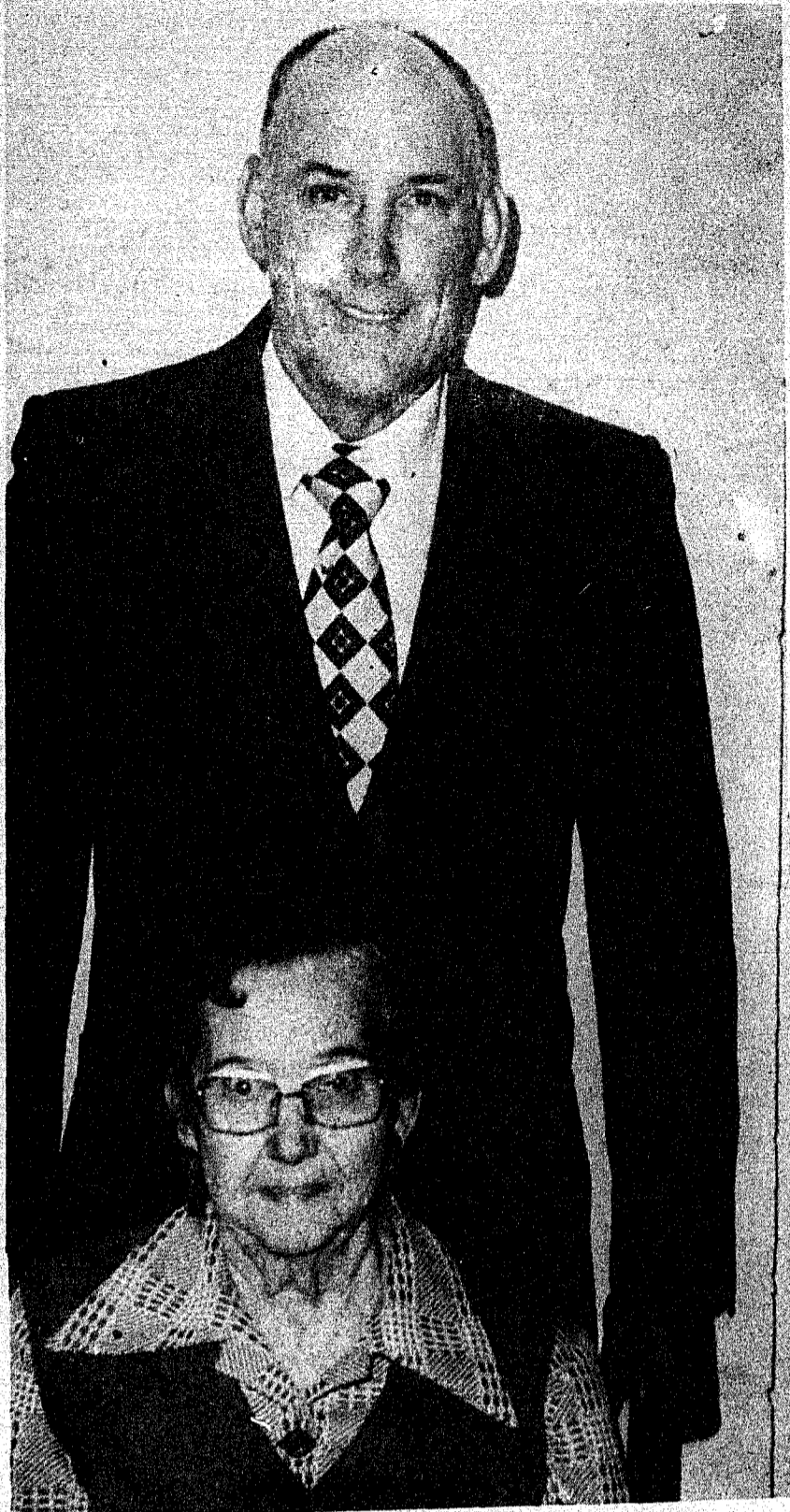

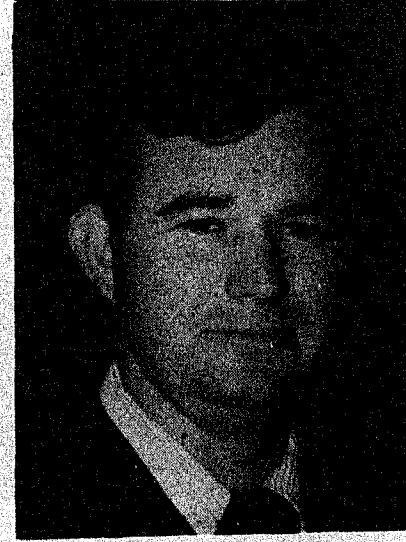

SA GRADUATE NAMED AGENT AT DAWSON CO.

In addition to the matched calf roping on Saturday, November 6, there will be approximately 40 top calf ropers in two calf Jack-Pot roping.

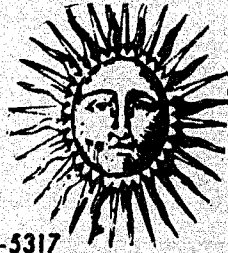

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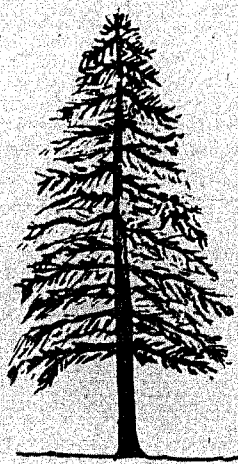

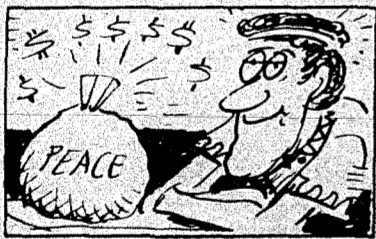

"Radio is the quickest, cheapest way to talk to the world," says H. M. Richards, Sr., now speaker-emeritus of the 46-year old program. His son, H. M. S. Richards, Jr., speaks on the Sunday 30-minute and daily 15-minute programs.
