The new store opened Monday and will be open Sunday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. Both the store and station are closed Saturday.

Mrs. Fiddler will be assisted in the store by her sister, Donna Pannell.

Mr. Fiddler and his family have lived here two years. He formerly worked as a sheetrock finisher. The couple has a three month-old son.

Dove Hunting Season Slated

A split mourning dove hunting season was established by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials at a recent meeting, with the fall season to open in Coleman County Wednesday, September 1.

The North Zone season will run from September 1 to October 14 with hunting from noon to sunset. Bag limit is 10 birds with possession limit of 20.

The winter season has been set January 1-16, with full-day hunting permitted from 30 minutes before sunrise until sunset.

Last year an experimental all-day season was tried in the winter in South Zone without appreciable change in dove harvest. No winter season was held in the local zone. The last year of all-day dove hunting was 1950.

Commissioners of TP&W were told that the 1976 dove population is the third highest in the last 10 years. Adult morning doves have shown a six-percent increase over last year.

Santa Anna School Enrollment Has Increase For Second Year

The Santa Anna schools have shown an increase in enrollment this year over the first week of 1975. Total number of students in kindergarten through high school

is 375, an increase of 24 over the previous year.

Enrollment in high school early this week was 125. Totals in the classes are seniors, 24; juniors, 40; sophomores, 28; and freshmen, 33.

MILO HARVEST NOW UNDERWAY

Central Texas Grain Co., in Santa Anna has started receiving milo as the harvest gets underway. On Tuesday, Dwight Hudson, local manager, reported 14 loads have been brought in to the elevator.

The milo is of good quality and yields will be better than in many years. The first grain was harvested in the south part of the country, with the main harvest to be underway in a week or ten days.

Watering Times Announced Again

City of Santa Anna officials have asked that people in town observe the watering schedule arranged earlier in the summer. Due to low water pressure, local citizens have been asked to water yards and gardens at specified times.

People residing north of the railroad are asked to do outside watering Monday, Wednesday and Friday; those south of the railroad are to water Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. No outside watering is to be done on Sunday.

City Water Department employees feel that the water pressure problem will be lessened if residents observe the schedule.

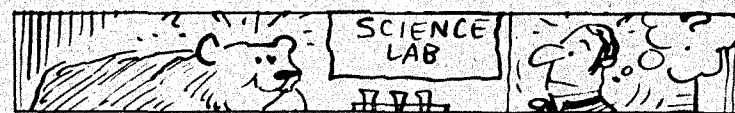

3. Delay is dangerous and often disasterous, "Boast thyself not of tomorrow." Prov. 27:1. "Repent, or Perish." Luke 13:3.

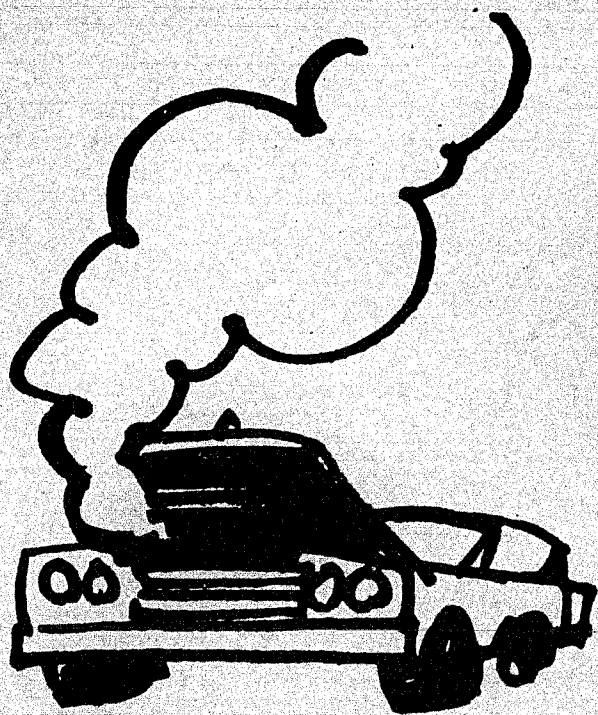
