Born in Ozona September 18, 1929, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joe Weaver, and an attorney.

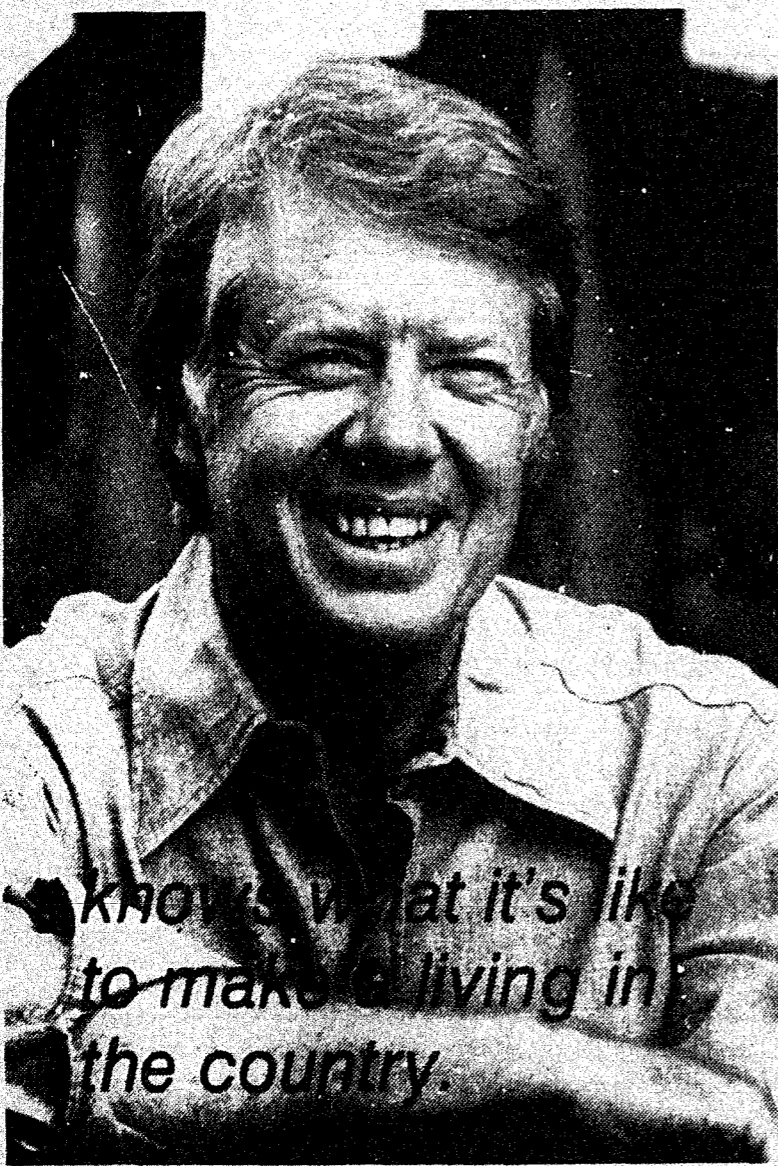

## Bessie Parker Receives Award

A home economist who has reached more than half of Coleman County's total population with foods and nutrition information will receive a national award this month for her work in education.

Mrs. Bessie T. Parker of Coleman, Coleman County Extension agent, will receive the Distinguished Service Award for 1976—the highest honor given by the National Association of Extension Home Economists.

One of seven Texas county Extension agents (home economics) chosen for the honor, Mrs. Parker will receive the award during the national association's annual meeting Oct. 25-29 in Portland, Ore.

According to Mrs. Judy Edwards of Dallas, 1976 awards committee chairman for the Texas Association of Extension Home Economists which nominated Mrs. Parker, the award recognizes an agent's "proven ability to lead, organize and educate—in 4-H, youth and adult Extension home economics programs."

More than 6,000 Coleman County residents participated in Extension programs aimed at improving family health as a result of Mrs. Parker's leadership of a three-year in-depth educational effort in health, Mrs. Edwards said.

The agent attributes much of her success to the people she serves.

"The people of Coleman County and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service have all been very good to me," she says.

In addition to providing leadership to the county in-depth program in home economics, Mrs. Parker also served as a trainer agent for 12 assistant county Extension agents.

In recommending the agents for the national award, Dr. Jennie C.

Kitching, assistant director for home economics with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, described Mrs. Parker as "efficient, effective and unassuming."

"Her continuous work on behalf of improving the quality of family living merits attention," Kitching added.

A 21-year Extension educator, Mrs. Parker holds a B. S. from Texas Woman's University. She has completed additional studies at Texas Woman's University, Colorado State University and Texas A&M University.

She is a member of the Texas and National Associations of Extension Home Economists and the Texas and American Home Economics Associations.

She is the daughter of Mrs. Minnie Mae Turney and the late Mr. L. M. Turney formerly of Cherokee County.

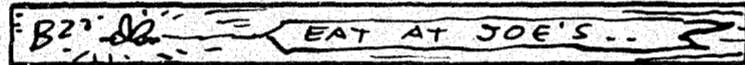

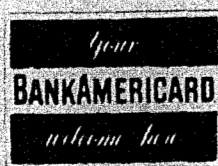
