



Swine Flu Vaccine Arriving Slowly

Vaccine for the national swine flu immunization program is arriving slowly and in small quantities, but ample amounts are expected by late November, according to the Texas Department of Health Resources.

Lon Gee, health program specialist for the Department of Health Resources Immunization Division said, "As of the eighth of October, the Department has received a million and a quarter doses of vaccine for use across the state. One million doeses may sound like a great deal, but there are more than 12 million people in Texas."

Gee added that deliveries are expected to be slow throughout October; he said, "Everyone is going to have to be patient." However, he said that considerably larger shipments are expected during November, and "We hope that by early December we would have vaccine waiting for us to find someone to give it to."

Two major types of vaccine are involved: a bivalent, or combination vaccine, that protects against both the New Jersey (swine flue and the Victoria strain of Asian flu, and a monovalent vaccine against the New Jersey flu only. The bivalent vaccine is intended only for persons over 65 years old, or individuals of any age who are chronically ill. The monovalent vaccine will be administered to the general public.

Vaccine deliveries to date have favored the bivalent vaccine, Gee said, "because the elderly and chronically ill are a high risk group and we need to reach them first

Diet Therapy To Be Tested

Why do some people live longer than others? Is it a matter of heredity? More physicians are recognizing that lifestyle—the things we eat, drink and smoke, and the exercise we get—plays a major role.


F. C. Cabansag, M. D., who is a member of the Santa Anna Seventh-day Adventist Church. says researchers are finding environmental influences extremely important.

"A study comparing California Adventists with a control group of average California citizens showed that Adventists get cancer only 60 percent as often as the state average," Dr. Cabansag says, "We think the reason for this is that Adventists avoid tobacco, alcohol, strong stimulants, and unclean meats. Many church members are exclusively vegetarians."

The doctor adds that "recent testimony before the U.S. Senate Committee on nutrition, chaired by South Dakota Senator George McGovern indicated that some cancers may thrive on a high-fat diet, Experts from the National Cancer Institute said a new kind of diet therapy is being tested where tumors will be starved with a lowfat diet.

"If this analysis is true, it confirms," he continues, "what Adventists have said for more than 100 years about the importance of diet." Dr. Cabansag also notes that Adventists have lower rates for heart disease and other maladies. In the California study, Adventist men were reported to live an average of 77 years—five years longer than the national average of 72.

"More research needs to be done, and is being done," says Dr. Cabansag. "But I think people who genuinely want to live longer and more meaningfully might well consider what Adventists haveto say on the subject."
