ONE DAY ONLY FOR BURNING AT DUMP

The City of Santa Anna has been notified that the recently announced schedule for burning refuse at the City Dump Ground has been changed, due to a new ruling of the Air Pollution Board and State Health Commission.

Effective immediately, burning of trash and garbage will be done only on Friday of each week, not Tuesday and Friday as was announced earlier.

An attendant will be at the City Dump Ground from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each Friday to direct garbage disposal and trash dumping. City residents using the area are asked to note the change and haul only on that day.

The change was due to additional restrictions on the City for burning of garbage.

New Highway 84 to Be Built From S-Anna to County Line

Construction is expected to start in a few weeks on a 6.8 mile highway project that will run from the east edge of Santa Anna to the Brown County line. Cooper and Woodruff Inc. Co. Amarillo was low bidder on the project with \$674,170.10 bid.

The highway reconstruction project will include grading structures, flexible base and two course surface treatment. The US 84 project will be a two-lane highway similar to the Santa

Anna-Coleman road that was completed several years ago.

The State Highway and Public Transportation Department contract was announced by District Engineer Lawrence Schulz. Senior resident engineer Wes Heald of Brownwood will supervise the project that will take an estimated 225 work days.

Right-of-way for the new road has been completed quite some time, and construction was delayed until funds were available.

Results Given On Grain Test In Coleman Co.

The results of the 1976 Small Grain Tests conducted in Coleman County on the Hurshel Dunn and Keith Phillips farms are in just in time for producers to evaluate the results.

Hurshel Dunn had thirteen varieties of wheat, listed in order of highest production and bushels per acre, they are: Tam W 101-25.0; Fox-23.5; Sage-21.1; Yukon-19.6; Centruk-19.1; Coker-68-15-18.4; TAM W-103-17.0; Tascosa-16.9; Sturdy-16.4; Agent-16.1; Caddo-16.0; DeKalb Hybrid 581-15.8; Pioneer Hybrid-15.0.

Oat varieties on the Keith Phillips farm were: Ora-108.4; TAMO-312-75.4; TAMO-301-71.5; New Nortex-70.6; Norwin-51.9; Coker 234-51.4.

County Extension Agent Roger Blackmon explains that these were hand harvested yields and much higher than the actual combine value. The relative production characteristics are valid, however, and producers can use these results to make varietal comparisons. Also, last year was not a good small grain year and results could vary in any given year.

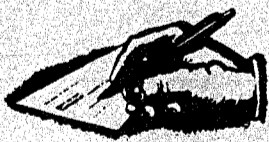
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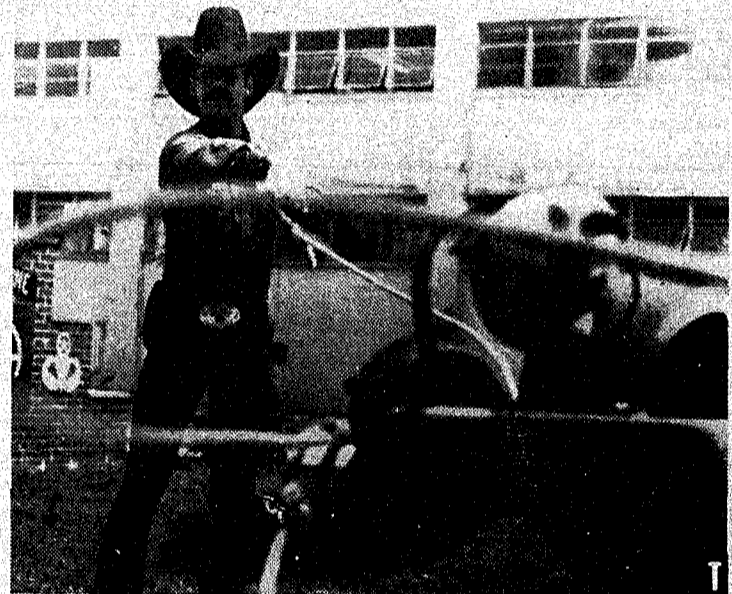

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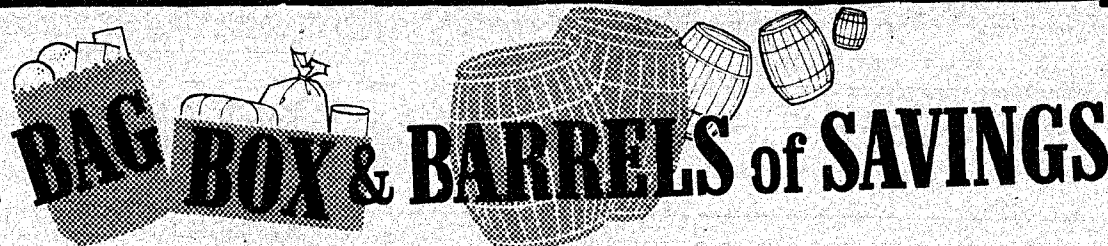
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Trickham News

The Rockwood, Whon and Trickham areas did not receive the heavy rains of the past week.

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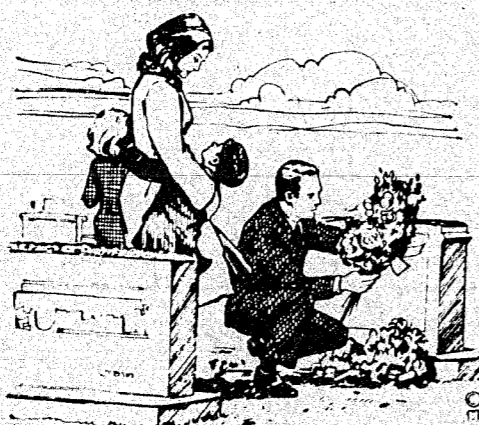
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GOOD NEWS

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HPU Courses To Be Offered For Non-Credit

Howard Payne University's division of continuing education, will offer six non-credit courses this fall, according to Dr. Jose Timmons, director.

A class on estimating property losses will meet 7-9 p.m. Thursdays, Sept. 16 through Nov. 18, in room 102 of the business building. The course will include a study of the calculation of estimates of losses to buildings due to fire, natural disasters and other causes. Designed for building trades people, property insurance salesman, adjusters and fire department personnel, the course will also evaluate new kinds of building materials.

Fee for the 10-week course is \$45. Instructor will be Benjamin Huron.

Col. Russell O. Fudge will conduct a special studies class in leisure time collecting 7-9 p.m. Thursdays in Constitution Hall of the Academy of Freedom. Course of study will include an analysis of the value of using leisure time in the collecting and classifying of objects. An examination will be made of the psychological, historical, social, political, economic, aesthetic, recreational and educational motivations and satisfactions that millions of Americans find in collecting as an avocation and as a hobby. Student and private collections will be demonstrated and analyzed during the class.

Fee for the course is \$45 plus a \$10 lab fee for research materials.

A course in basic genealogy will survey the sources and backgrounds of genealogical data, techniques of collecting and providing these data, and methods of organizing and presenting information in an acceptable, permanent form.

Miss Eula Heskew will teach the class which will meet 6-8:30 p.m. Mondays in room 214 of Guy D. Newman Hall. Fee for the course is \$30.

Martin Gottschalk will teach a course in practical everyday German, a course designed for the tourist or business person who desires everyday conversation skills. The class will meet 7-8 p.m. Tuesdays beginning Aug. 31 in classroom 1 of Language Annex 2. Fee is \$25 for 15 hours of class instruction and optional lab sessions.

A course in pre-natal care will be offered to prepare couples for labor and delivery of the new-born infant. Class will meet 7-9 p.m. Tuesdays, Aug. 31 through Oct. 5, in room 217 of Guy D. Newman Hall. Roberta Stegemoller and Sharon Christopher will be instructors. Fee for the six-week course is \$35 per couple.

A class in period decoration and furniture will be offered 6:30-8:30 p.m. Mondays beginning Aug. 30, in room 225 of Guy D. Newman Hall. The course will include a study of styles of antiquity, the Middle Ages, Italian Renaissance, Hispanic periods, French periods, English periods, American periods and miscellaneous styles and arts.

The nine-week class will be taught by Earl Howell. Fee for the course is \$30.

Dr. Timmons said that students may register for continuing education classes on the first night of class. Persons wishing more information may call 646-2502, ext. 359.

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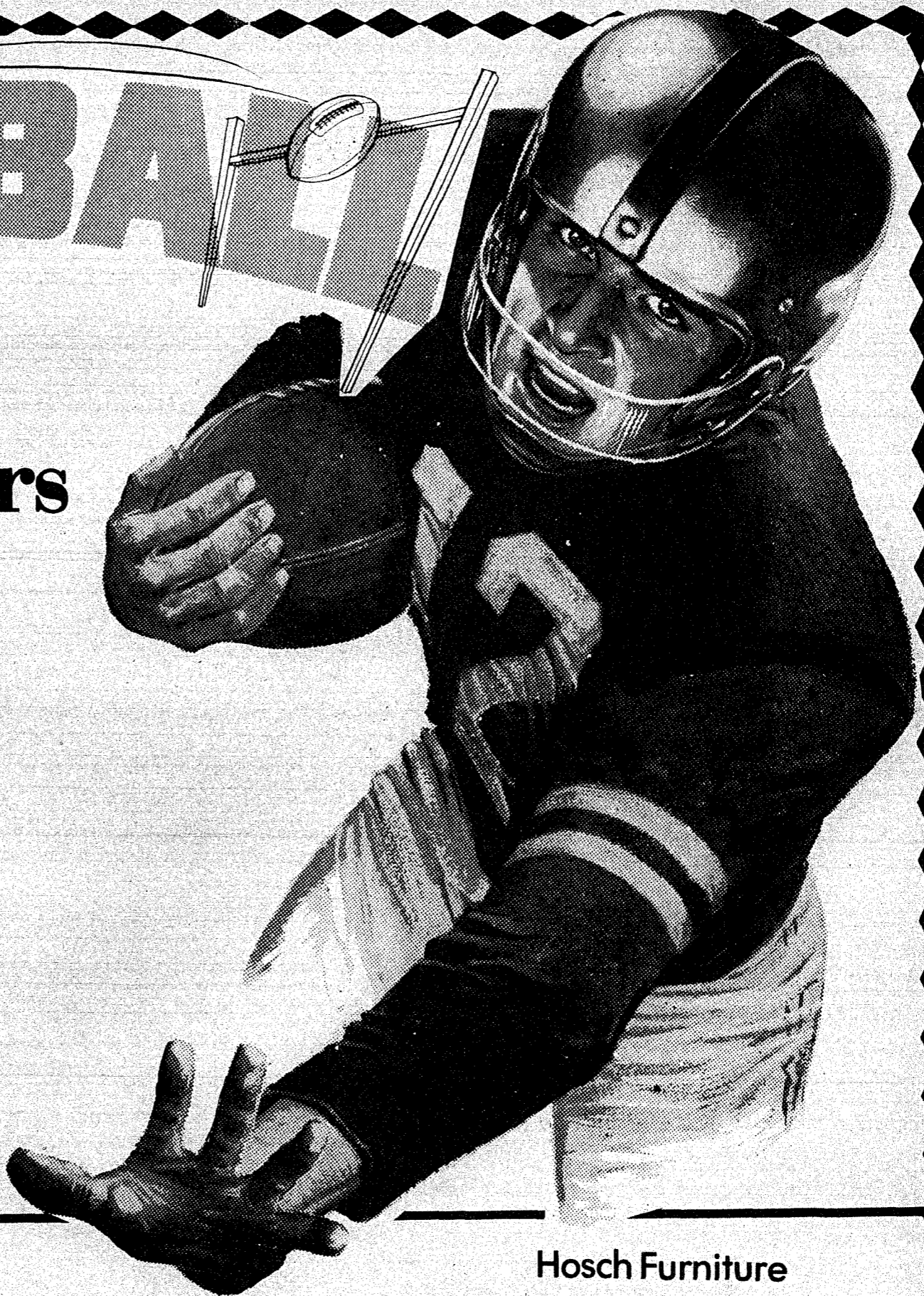
