The cafe has been completely redecorated and furnished and a grand opening is planned later this month.

Mrs. Elder, whose husband is in the auto mechanic business, purchased the building from J. E. Williams. Plans call for surfacing of a parking lot at the rear of the building and adding an entry at the front of the business.

Mrs. Elder stated the restaurant's unusual name comes from her CB "Handle."

Former students and teachers the Santa Anna schools, their families and friends will be meeting in the community this weekend for the annual Ex-Student Homecoming Friday and Saturday, October 8 and 9. Several hundred out-of-town people are expected to attend the annual event that will include reunions for a number of classes.

The first activity on the schedule will be a bonfire and pep rally Thursday evening at 7:30 p.m. at the parking lot of the football stadium. SAHS cheerleaders are sponsoring the event and invite all students, parents and friends to attend.

The NEWS had its last subscription rate increase January 1966 and is perhaps the last item on the budget that has shown no increase for ten years.

"Meals on Wheels" program, co-sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce Committee on Aging and five local churches, is now enlisting people for the program. Very few residents are taking advantage of the service, and the sponsoring organizations want to make the project worthwhile.

The noon meal, prepared by a local restaurant, is delivered each weekday by volunteers to homes of those enrolled in the program. Cost is a maximum of \$1.25 per day, the charge based on ability to pay.

It is emphasized that the program is not a charity project but a service to provide a balanced diet for those unable to prepare for themselves.

It is also noted that people taking part in the project, may be on the schedule for meal delivery as often or seldom as they wish. Schedules of deliveries are worked out each weekday and for the convenience of those taking part. The meals can be delivered to local homes in times of illness or when a person or family is convalescing from a hospital stay.

Anyone knowing of people who might benefit from the service is asked to contact Mrs. Henry Newman at Chamber of Commerce office and representatives of the sponsoring organization will give details of the program and compute the daily cost.

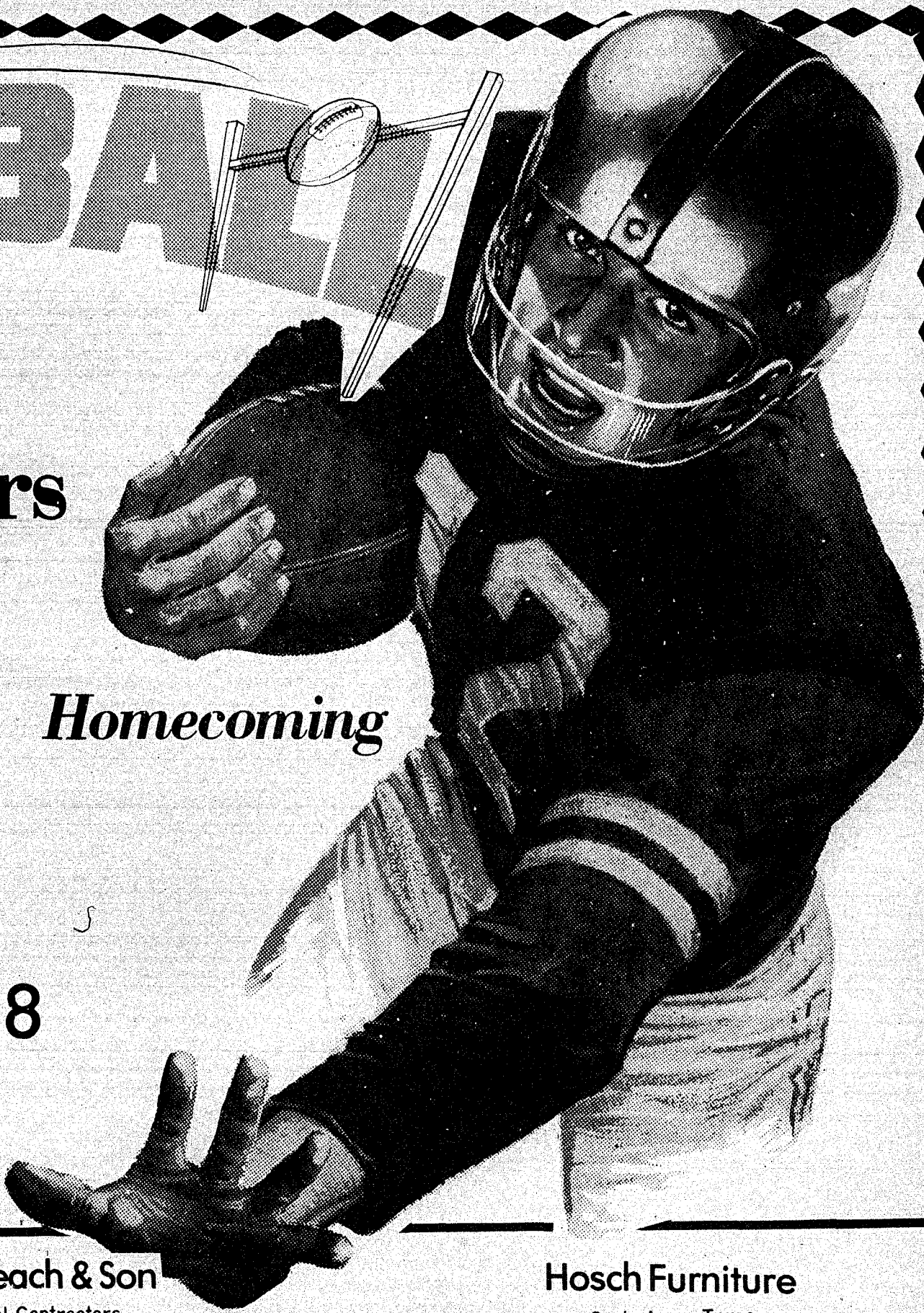

Mrs. Stella later married Henry Sanford and they lived in a number of years in Puerto Rico. She was again widowed in 1953 and returned to Texas in 1955 to care for her ailing father.

A delightfully cheerful and compassionate person and a great lover of people Stella learned

early to work hard on the family farm and ranch. The younger sisters considered Stella as their Mother's helper as she was much better help indoors than outside. However in an emergency she was available to help with the outside work and was often better help than her more impulsive sisters.

Before the control of screwworms, it was the girls duty to come home from school on weekends to work cattle, and one old range cow was more difficult rope for the young women. Stella, in her quiet and patient way, moved quietly toward the frightened cow, talking and reassuring the animal, until she gently placed the rope over the cow's horns!

For many years Mrs. Sanford worked as a nurse aide, giving strength and reassurance to frightened and ill people.

To hear her joking and laughing one would think she was all fun: But the angels laugh too. At all the good she has done.

Disaster Funds Available For Storm Damage

Farmers who received damage to cotton, feed grain, or wheat due to hail storm on Monday evening, September 27, are reminded that disaster applications must be filed with the ASCS office within 15 days of the date of the disaster. If the crop is not worth keeping, the disaster application should be filed by Tuesday, October 12, 1976. An appraisal will then be made on the acreage to determine the loss in production. Producers are reminded to not destroy the crop prior to the appraisal on the acreage (including grazing).

It is very important that farmers meet the above requirement to remain eligible for disaster payments. Anyone who is not sure of what to do should contact the ASCS office in Coleman, Texas.
