Latest from the kindergarten class: One cute little girl came home from school one day and told her mother, "I failed in love today."

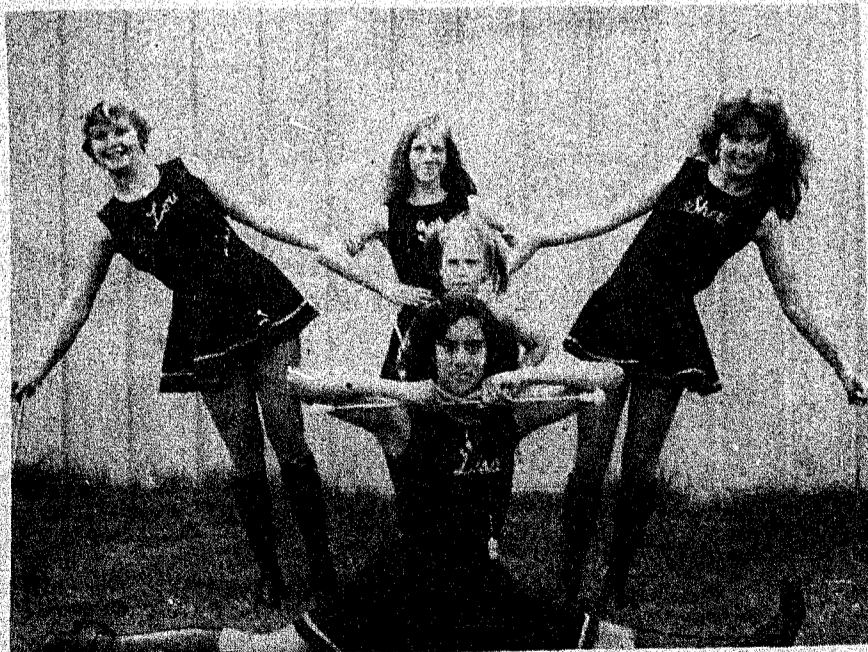
### Robert Barton Freshman Prexy

Following the public hearing on the budget, the regular monthly session of the School Board will be held, also open to the public.

The father of three Santa Anna football players was chosen as "Booster of the Week" by the athletic Booster Club at the Monday night meeting. The honoree, Manuel Salazar, will be seated with the team on the sidelines at the Friday night game and given special recognition.

## MAYOR WRISTEN RESIGNS

In a surprise move Tuesday night at City Council meeting, Thomas Wristen submitted his resignation as Mayor of Santa Anna. The resignation is effective September 30.

Mayor of Santa Anna for the past seven years, Wristen's

present term of office would have expired next April. He was unopposed for the post the last two elections.

Wristen cited increased responsibilities with his position as manager of Coleman County Telephone Cooperative and increasing responsibilities as Mayor as the cause of resignation.

The City Council is expected to appoint a replacement to serve until the April election.

During Mayor Wristen's tenure in office there have been many improvements and projects in Santa Anna. The latest is an extensive street improvement project funded by a federal grant. Other major improvements have been new pumps at City Lake, some new water lines, purchase of a new fire truck, trash truck and other equipment and participation in the Council of Governments program that funds salaries of city workers in a work-training program.

Mayor Wristen has represented Santa Anna at many functions and served the community well.

### EDUCATOR FROM CLASS OF '26 NAMED FOR HOMECOMING HONOR

A long-time educator, administrator, coach and counselor has been named "Ex-Student of the Year" for 1976 and will be honored Saturday, October 9, at the Santa Anna Ex-Student Homecoming. He is Charlie Burris, a graduate of the Class of 1926.

Mr. Burris retired last spring after 46 years in public school work, serving during the recent years at Killeen as counselor.

Following his graduation from Sam Houston State University in 1930, Burris spent the next 19 years coaching. He earned his masters degree from Colorado State College in 1938.

The veteran educator went into school administration in 1949 and into counseling in 1961. His wife, the former Jeanette Patterson, is a school secretary. The couple have two sons, Bert Franklin, 31, a computer programmer at National Aeronautics and Space Agency, and Dan Datson, 28, a safety engineer.

Members of the Class of 1926 are planning special activities during the homecoming in addition to the group program.

### NEW BUSINESS TO OPEN SOON

Another new business will be opening in Santa Anna within a few months. Martin Kemper of Coleman has announced he will open a car wash here in November.

The car wash will be located at the present site of Hale Trailer Sales on the lot purchased from B. A. Parker. The operation will include two stalls for automobiles and one truck stall. Also located with the covered car wash operation will be a vacuum cleaner.

Kemper is owner and operator of a car wash in Coleman and also works with his father-in-law, Joe K. Cervenka, in the electrical business. He and his wife Karen have a little daughter, Kelley, three years of age.

Mr. Kemper has been planning the car wash in Santa Anna several months and just recently completed transaction for the main street site on which to locate the business.

Hale Trailer Sales, operated by Lewis Miles Guthrie, will be relocated in Santa Anna in a few weeks.

### Dragons Down Mountaineers; Home Game Here Friday Night

The Santa Anna Mountaineers fell prey to the Bangs Dragons last week when the neighboring teams won in the junior high, junior varsity and high school games. The games were the seasons' openers for the three local teams.

On Thursday night at the local stadium the Junior High team lost to Bangs by 14-6 score. Santa Anna's only score came on a 20-yard reverse play by Duane Warnock with Eddie Dawson making a key block to complete the play.

Mike Salazar, John Gordon and Warnock were cited for their outstanding work on defense. Jim

Clifton recovered two Bangs fumbles.

Tommy Harris, quarterback for the Junior Varsity team, passed to Terry Day for the first score in the Junior Mountaineer game Thursday night which ended a close 20-18 in favor of Bangs.

Joe Guerrero was next to score on a nine-yard run, and Harris made the final score on a quarterback sneak.

Jerry Don Culpepper and Albert Salazar were also given recognition for their work on offense, and Salazar and E. J. Bible were standouts on defense.

Coach Anthony Strother was pleased with the performance of Tommy Harris as quarterback and the good defense that held Bangs within the two-yard line for four downs.

The varsity game Friday night at Bangs gave the large and experienced Dragons a 25-0 victory over the Mountaineers. David Chaffin had two interceptions for the Mountaineers and Bobby Permenter recovered two Bangs fumbles, to highlight the Mountaineer performance.

The Mountaineers will host the Baird Bears Friday night at 8 p.m. Baird is another strong Class A team, losing to Merkel last week 12-0.

In other football activity this week, the Junior High and Junior Varsity teams will travel to Baird Thursday night (tonight) for games at 6 and 7:30 p.m. respectively.

All area football fans are urged to attend the games this week, especially the first home game of the season.

### Reserved Seats Now Available

Season reserved seat tickets for Santa Anna High School home football games are now on sale, and those wanting the season tickets are urged to contact Judy Hartman at the school office this week.

Price for reserved seats for the five home games will be \$2.50. Admission at the gate is \$1.50 and 50 c at each game.

The season tickets will be available at the reserved seat section Friday for the first game and may be purchased and paid for at that time. However, those wanting the same location as previous seasons should call Mrs. Hartman before Friday to insure the proper location.

Approximately 200 reserved seats are available, and following the first game the remainder are available at each game for 50 c each.

## Historic Fort McKavett Is Undergoing Restoration

More restoration is in store for the venerable buildings at Fort McKavett State Historic Site. Contracts have just been awarded by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for Phase III of the parks' restoration development and construction will begin in the near future.

The work, however, will not interfere with visitors, according to Orion Knox, head of the P&WD historic sites and restoration branch. Currently open on a day-use basis, the historic site 17 miles west of Menard in Menard County also will remain open during development. When it is finished there will be even more for the public to enjoy, with greater convenience.

The fort was garrisoned by the U. S. Army from December, 1851 to 1859 to protect settlers along the Texas frontier. In 1868 it was

re-established and occupied until the threat of Indian depredations was over in 1883. After military abandonment, civilians purchased the fort structures and the town of Fort McKavett emerged.

In 1967, two barracks buildings were donated to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department; presently owning a sizeable portion of the old fort complex, the department is continuing its acquisition of the remaining fort structures.

Restoration already completed includes an enlisted men's barracks, which houses an interpretive exhibit. The commanding officer's quarters were stabilized as a ruin, and the building in which the blacksmith and carpenter shops were located also was stabilized.

During the present

construction, the fort hospital will be completed and adapted to serve as a visitor center and administrative offices. Also in the plans are resrotation of the post headquarters, the post bakery building and officers' quarters on the main parade field.

The extra provision of parking places and limited picnic facilities is sure to be appreciated by visitors as well as the expanded opportunity to gain insight into a portion of the states' history.

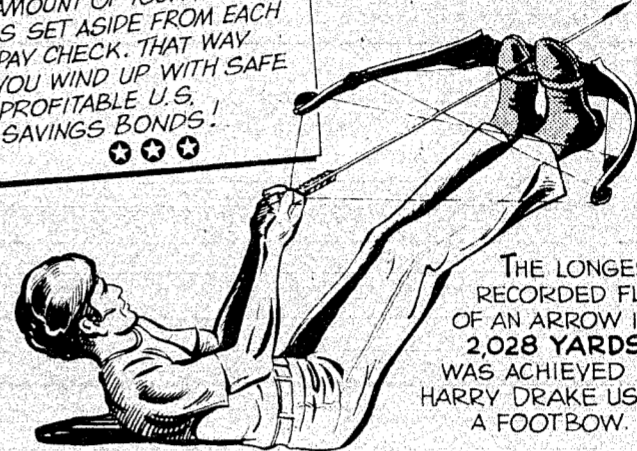

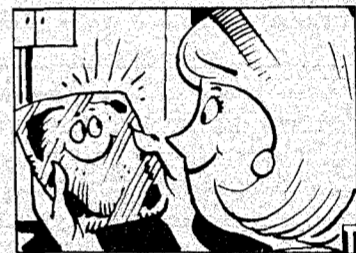

11. Scrub porch with hot soapy water.
12. Turn tubs upside down.
13. Go put on house dress, smooth hair with side combs. Brew cup of tee, and sit and rock a spell and count blessings.

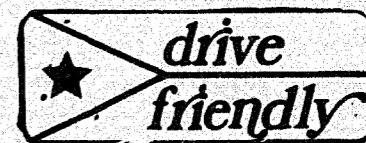

Mr. Sheffield, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert W. Sheffield, and the former Margaret Pasley, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Pasley of Gouldbusk, were married at the Methodist parsonage in Coleman on September 18, 1926 by the Rev. J. H. Baldrige. They lived in Gouldbusk for a while after their marriage then moved to Mount Pleasant. They later lived in Dallas and near Mexia where Rev. Sheffield was head of the Bible Department of Westminster College at Tehuacana.

A 1922 graduate of Santa Anna

High School, Rev. Sheffield attended Howard Payne College, Texas Christian University and Abilene Christian College. ## Texas Parks-Wildlife Dept. Predicts Good Dove Harvest

Based on banding and harvest information, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials estimate some 42 millions mourning doves were available in Texas when the North Zone opened Sept. 1.

It's just a matter of being in the right place at the right time.

Contacts with P&WD wardens, biologists and other field personnel throughout the state indicate generally a good morning dove outlook this season.

Department dove project

leader Jim Dunks said early summer rains forced many Texas Farmers to plant grain fields late, which meant more grain was available for birds on opening day.

West Texas wildlife regional director Jack Parsons at San Angelo said the overall dove picture was good. Many birds are to be found in the eastern part of the region, with fair numbers in the High Plains and Permian Basin.

Wildlife technician John Roberson of Travis County has observed many birds feeding in recently combined milo fields and situation appeared good opening day. He estimates more birds to be available in the area than in 1975.

Doves in the Coleman County area are plentiful where choice forage is located, but generally are not in large numbers in the county.

Brown County game warden Royis Tucker said Comanche and Erath Counties have higher numbers of birds this year and should have better hunts.

Although the South Zone does not open until Sept. 25, Jim Dunks said early concentrations are developing in the southern part of Texas, especially along the upper coast and extreme South Texas.

Hunting hours are noon to sunset in the Sept. 1-Oct. 14 North Zone and Sept. 25-Nov. 7 South Zone fall seasons. All-day hunting will be allowed when both zones reopen for a Jan. 1-16 season.

Bag and possession limits on mourning doves remain at 10 and 20 respectively. Hunters are reminded that shotguns must be plugged permanently to a three-shell capacity.

## James R. Allen At National Steer Roping Finals

James R. Allen, professional steer roper from Santa Anna, is in Laramie, Wyoming this week for the National Finals Steer Roping that will be held Friday through Sunday.

Each of the 15 top-ranked RCA steer ropers will have 10 head of steers to rope during the three days, the top roper being named world champion steer roper.

Going into the finals, Allen is ranked third in the nation based on dollars won in approved steer ropings this year. He has ranked among the top ropers for a number of years and is a former world champion, winner of the finals event.

Standing first in the ranks is Marvin Cantrell of New Mexico, formerly of Brady and Brownwood.

From Laramie, Allen will go to Pendleton, Oregon for the big Pendleton Round-up where he has been a consistent winner. He was an All-Around-winner one year and runner-up for the title last year and winner of the steer roping event.

Special guests at the party were her two sisters, Mrs. Lily Weathersby, aged 90, and May Henderson, aged 92.

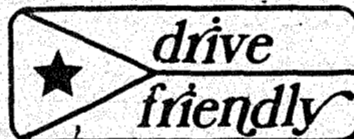

GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."

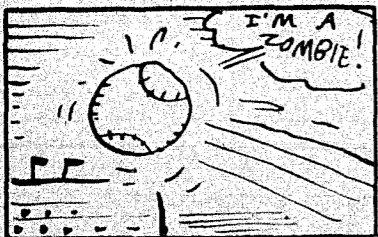
