Most Any Book Available Through SA City Library

Having trouble finding that special book? Do you feel like you need a real detective to track it down?

See the Sherlock Holmes of Santa Anna City Library, Janice Hipsher, City Librarian. The Santa Anna Public Library is open each Thursday from 3 to 5 p.m. for the selection of your books, or you may call Mrs. Hipsher at her home for information or requests.

No matter what the book, through the Inter-Library Loan system, if the book is anywhere in the Texas State Library System, you may borrow it free of charge and get it at the Santa Anna Library.

To get that special book, Mrs. Hipsher calls the Abilene Public Library, one of the State's 10 resource centers. If they do not have it on hand, it is located in one of the other cooperating libraries in the state.

This service includes copies of magazines, newspaper articles, government documents and subject requests for specific information. The service is one of the newest concepts in library service and available right here in our own town.

Materials or books not available at Abilene are requested by teletype from other places and mailed directly to

Santa Anna by return mail unless it is in circulation, then it will be on an available basis. Requests are most often filled in just a few days.

The system is coordinated through the Texas State Library System and funded by State and Federal funds.

Available now at City Library are 100 new books for adults including fiction, non-fiction, mysteries and other books. Local people are reminded that there is no charge for borrowing books, just go by City Library any Thursday from 3 to 5 p.m. to make your selections or requests.

Obtain Proof of Crop Ownership With Grain Warehouse Receipt

AUSTIN—All Texas grain farmers are urged to obtain official grain warehouse receipts for their stored crop, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

"Farmers who receive nothing more than weight tickets as proof of deposit of their grain should exchange them for official receipts as soon as possible to ensure maximum protection under the law," White said.

In the event of a grain warehouse failure, a weight ticket holder could easily be inviting lengthy legal haggling before taking possession of his grain, since scale tickets in themselves do not necessarily constitute legal proof of ownership.

On the other hand, White stated, warehouse receipts,

obtained upon request from any grain warehouse, provide clearcut proof of ownership as a legal negotiable instrument.

According to the Texas Department of Agriculture officials, warehouse receipts would have priority in any case of forced closure or bankruptcy.

Around \$6 billion in total cash receipts annually means that Texas is the third largest agricultural producer in the nation, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Texas farmers spend more than \$5 and one quarter billion a year in total production expenses. They spend over \$457 million a year on fuel for major crops, with about 2.5 million tons of fertilizer and minerals used annually in the state to produce food and fiber, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

sure all members of your family know exactly what to do in case a fire breaks out. You should have regular drills with escape routes planned in advance, preferably ways that don't involve opening bedroom doors. Fire experts recommend sleeping with closed bedroom doors, because a closed door can hold back heat and poisonous gasses, giving more escape time. If you suspect fire, never open a door to check. Instead, touch the door frame with your hand. If it's hot, leave it closed, and use another way to get out of the room.

Always get out of the house as quickly as possible, never stopping to look for papers or other valuables. Arrange for family members to meet at a certain location in the yard. Call the fire department from a neighbor's, and never go back into a burning home for anything—not even family pets, fire safety officials urge.

It goes without saying that you should guard against three classic examples of carelessness that can multiply your chances of fire losses: smoking in bed, cleaning gasoline or other flammable liquids, and leaving children alone at home.

You can also reduce risks of home fires by installing detection devices that can warn you of fire dangers. There are two types of home detection devices marketed—heat detectors and smoke detectors. Heat detectors alone have been found to be essentially useless for homes.

There are advantages to each type, and it's a good idea to check with your local fire department to find out the pros and cons of the devices. Then shop for smoke detectors as for any other consumer product: get brochures on different brands, then comparison shop for quality, features, price, warranty, installation, and maintenance. Be sure the unit you select can be tested monthly by blowing smoke at it, or by lighting a match nearby. Also, make sure the device won't give false alarms every time you start a fire in the fireplace or broil steaks in the kitchen. And don't buy from a door-to-door salesperson until you have comparison-shopped at local stores. Remember, too, that you can cancel a door-to-door sale for \$25 or more within three business days.

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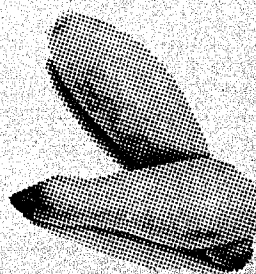

More Locations, Completions In Santa Anna Area Fields

Several more locations have been staked for wells in the Santa Anna area and others have been completed in recent weeks.

Sigmor Corp. of San Antonio completed No. 1 J E. Brewer in Coleman County Regular Field three miles east of Santa Anna. Location is 330 feet from the south and 1,965 feet from the west lines of Absalom Survey 655.

Daily potential was 41 barrels of 28.5 gravity oil, plus 200 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations between 2,367 and 2,440 feet. Total depth is 2,570 feet.

The No. 2 J. E. Brewer has been staked in the same area.

Denton & Denton Oil Co. of Hobbs, N. M. has planned to re-enter the No. 3 A. D. Pettit location on an 80-acre tract three miles north of Whon. The site is a

1,158 foot Regular Field project in the T. Flynn Survey 245.

The No. 7 E. L. Brown Estate location will be drilled five miles south of Santa Anna in the Wharton CSL Survey 486. Republic Mineral Corp. of Houston will drill the proposed 2,700 foot wildcat on the 222 acre lease.

Area Youths To Participate In Stock Show

Youth from this area will be entered in the Junior Show at the 81st annual Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show during its ten-day run Jan. 28 through Feb. 6. Those from Santa Anna FFA chapter will be Tommy Harris, Alex DeLeon, Bruce Pape and Russell Williams who will be exhibiting swine. They will take their animals to Fort Worth next Wednesday and exhibit them on Friday, February 4.

The young people will be competing for premiums totaling almost \$60,000. Entries have been posted in divisions for steers, beef breeding heifers, dairy cattle, breeding sheep, lambs, barrows, and student teams in judging contests for livestock, poultry and eggs and identification of range plants.

"We are encouraged by the increasing numbers of young people who exhibit each year at the Stock Show," said W. R. Watt Jr., general manager. "It gives us a brighter outlook for the future of the agricultural and livestock industry."

In addition to prizes earned in competition, youngsters showing prize-winning livestock receive additional money when their animals are sold in the Sales of Champions of steers, barrows and lambs. Young showmen last year received more than \$123,000 from the three auctions with many using their money for further education and raining.

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Liberty Day Observed Here By SDA Church

A "religious liberty" day Saturday was the order of the day for the Seventh-day Adventist Church. Once a year a day is set aside to especially plan for promoting religious liberty in their church here as well as throughout the world denomination.

The following report was noted here: "The Supreme Court allowed a lower court ruling to stand involving a worker's Sabbath employment rights. Paul Cummins, a member of the World Wide Church of God (not affiliated with Adventists), won his case against an employer who fired him for not working on Saturday nor Friday evening, the Biblical Sabbath.

"The high court made the ruling by a 4-4 split vote, with Justice John Paul Stevens abstaining, allowing the appeals court decision in favor of Cummins to stand. We are still awaiting some other Sabbatarian rights cases to reach the Supreme Court for a more definitive verdict."

Labor union membership and Sunday sales (or "blue" laws) are other areas of concern to Seventh-day Adventists. In November the editors of "Christianity Today" proposed a national law enacting Saturday as a day of rest. W. Melvin Adams, Religious Liberty secretary for the World Wide Adventist church states: "Adventists strongly oppose this idea, even though it would memorialize our sacred day. We feel any legal or compulsory observance of a day of worship is wrong."

An offering was taken in the local Adventist church to support the church's journal, "Liberty." This magazine, with a circulation of nearly half a million, was the one President-elect Carter gave his views on church taxation, abortion, and other church-state issues during the campaign.

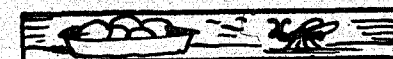

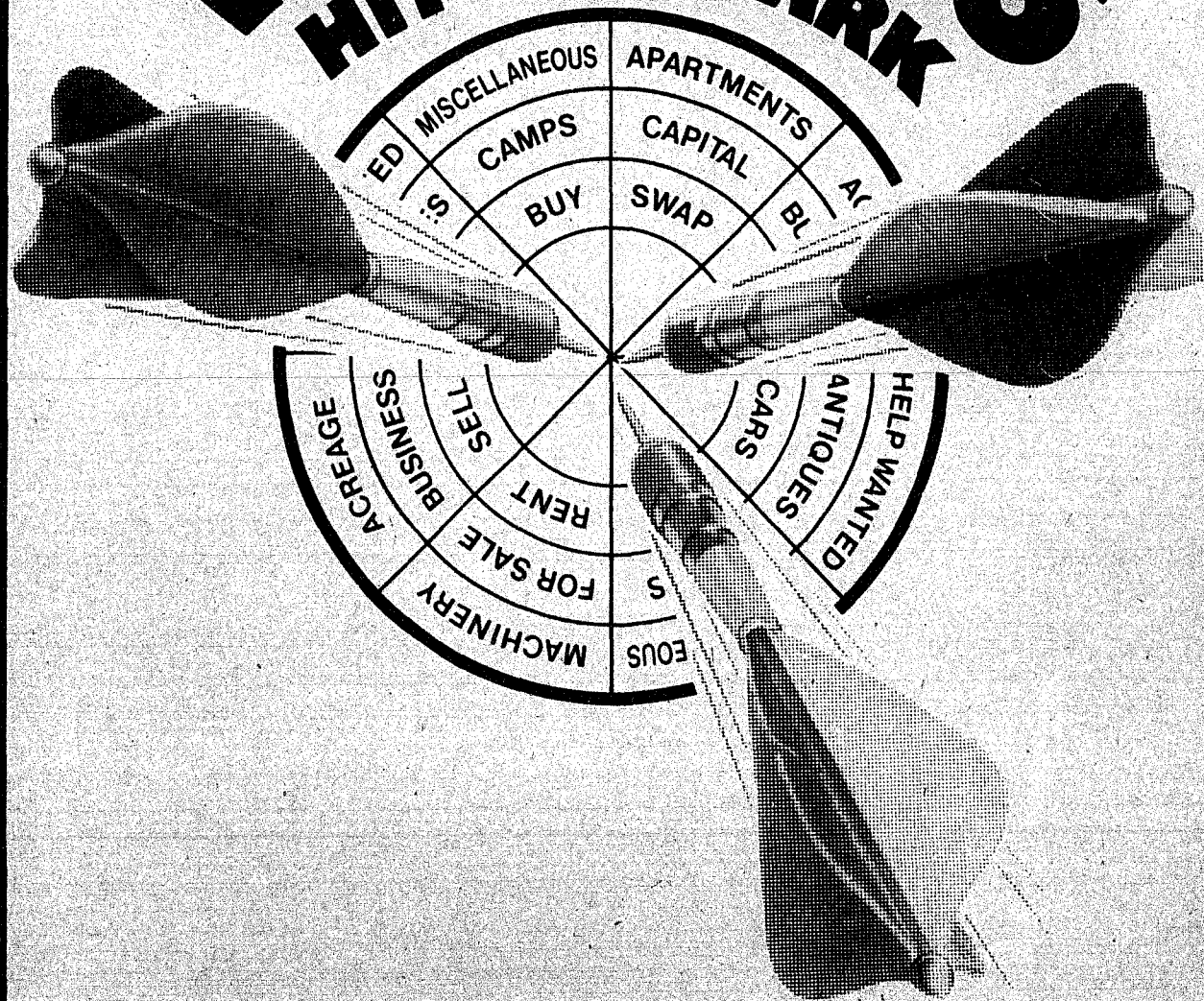

Banister Artifact Collection Given Fort Concho Museum

The Banister Estate has decided on the Fort Concho Museum in San Angelo as the recipient for the Emma Banister Collection of Indian and Pioneer artifacts.

Emma Banister was the widow of the late John R. Banister, Texas Ranger, Indian Fighter, and founder of the field inspection service of the Cattle Raisers Association.

Mr. Banister died in 1918, while in office as Sheriff in Coleman; his wife, Emma, was appointed to serve out the remaining months of his term, thus becoming the first woman sheriff in the United States. Later she began the collection of Indian artifacts, soon attracting the attention of teachers of archaeology; she was invited to accompany Dr. A. T. Hill of Texas University on a field trip with his students to the shelter caves along the Pecos River.

She brought many things of interest from the caves, including woven fiber moccasins, sandals, ropes and other fragments of weaving, besides handfuls of shell and a bead necklace showing the handiwork of the unknown tribes, who made them from 500 to a 1000 years ago. Mrs. Banister also found a fire stick, used for making fires. The highlight of the find was a beautiful pottery pitcher, perfectly preserved, painted black and red on gray.

The collection contains many hundreds of Indian flint pieces; there are arrow heads, drills, hoes, knives, scrapers and axes. A tomahawk that was found about eight miles east of Santa Anna where two pots in good condition and many other Indian artifacts were found.

Also included is a four-foot Indian bow, found in a cave near San Saba by the late Frank Mills who traded it to Mrs. Banister for the mummified leg of an Indian.

The collection also includes Indian articles from Arizona, including an old Kachina doll and two beaded belts from the Yuma tribe.

A Spanish stirrup, found in San Saba county in about 1920 was probably brought to this area over 300 years ago. One other Spanish stirrup of this type is in the Governor's Palace in Santa Fe, N.M., a spear head of metal some seven inches long is shown.

One outstanding item in the collection is a Prince Albert coat, made of fine wool, the style worn by statesmen and ministers about 1800. It is supposed to have been beaded by Indian women in designs of stars, human figures, buffalo skulls, fire birds and human hands.

The coat was found in a cave near Mason, Texas in 1872, a few days after a raid on Mason, when several Indians were killed; with the coat were elaborately beaded moccasins, armlets and medicine bags.

This find was kept in a Mason Bank for many years, and Mrs. Banister bought the whole collection in 1930. Later they were restored and missing beads replaced at the Texas University by an archaeology class. The collection has been loaned to Museums in Austin and San Antonio for many years.

Mrs. Banister visited the site of Fort McKavett in 1930; the post was abandoned by the Army in 1883. She found a number of canteens, drinking cups, curry combs, mule shoes and uniform buttons. It is assumed the troops destroyed the uniforms before leaving.

A large number of pioneer articles are on display, including two flint-lock guns, two powder flasks, three bullet molds, a very old brass scale, three buffalo horns, one antelope horn, a United States Army stirrup, bridle and bit and canteen, an old rusty pair

of pliers lost by fence cutters, an ox shoe and a human skull with a bullet hole in it.

A very interesting shaped piece of wood, about two feet long, was part of the dam put in the San Saba River at Menard by the Spanish in 1756, when the mission near Menard was established. The log had probably been under water over 200 years; Mrs. Banister obtained it about 1935.

Other interesting items are a black satin widow's dress, made before 1890, and a large collection of fans, collected from the South Sea Islands to New York.

Mrs. C. D. (Leona Banister) Bruce of Santa Anna and her brother, Grady Banister of Burnet, are placing this valuable collection with the Fort Concho Museum in San Angelo. Curators Shirley Pettengill and Mavis Peace came Friday, January 21, to receive the gift.
