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Elderly Santa Anna Woman Dies in Sunday Night Fire

time Santa Anna resident, died Sunday night of smoke inhalation during a fire at her home on Wallis Avenue, Mrs. Scott, a former telephone operator here, lived alone in her small frame home just west of the Texaco service station at the corner of Wallis and the Rockwood Highway intersection.

According to reports from the Volunteer Fire Department and Deputy Sheriff M. R. Simmons, the fire was discovered about 9:30 p.m. by an Abilene family enroute from Brady to Abilene, Although a light was on in the kitchen of the Scott home, the passerby, G. R. Curtis, could get no response at the home. Mrs. Curtis ran to the home of a neighbor, Mrs. Cliff Herndon, who called Simmons and

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> Funeral services for Mrs. 'Scott were held Tuesday, January 11, at Henderson Funeral Chapel in Coleman. Rev. W. M. Price, pastor of First Baptist Church officiated at the services with burial in Santa Anna Cemetery.

Mrs. Scott was born August 16, 1889 in Ellis County, coming to Santa Anna with her family in 1905. She married Willis Ashley in 1906. He died in 1931.

She married John B. Scott in Santa Anna February 1, 1934. He died in 1952.

She was an operator for Santa Anna Telephone Co., until retiring in 1961 and a member of First Christian Church.

Survivors are a son, Darrel Ashley of Santa Anna; one brother, A. C. Sparks of Fisk; six nieces and three nephews.

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

1977: Last Year For April Tag Deadline

AUSTIN—Texans will begin registering their motor vehicles for fiscal 1977 February 1. Registration renewal notices will be in the mail soon.

Some vehicle registration renewal notices will arrive a little later this year. Usually they are mailed immediately after Christmas to facilitate postal distribution. However, this year, inmates at the State Department of Corrections prison facilities at Huntsville are sorting by zip code all of the approximately 10

million renewal notices.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will save approximately \$50,000 in postage discounts for performing this service, which is contracted by the prison system.

The 1977 stickers will have a solid red background with white year figures and state name. The sticker serial number will be printed in blue in the upper right-hand corner. Fiscal 1976 stickers had a blue background, white figures and red serial numbers in furtherance of the Bicentennial theme which will be continued in 1977.

Beginning in 1978 the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will initiate a year-round licensing system with some registrations expiring each month thereafter. This will mark demise of the half-century-old, 60-day registration periods and one-date deadlines for acquiring and affixing new stickers without penalty.

Tax Payments Near Deadline

Many people who do not have enough taxes withheld are required to pay their final installment of 1976 estimated Federal income tax no later than Monday, January 17. Also due the same day are amended estimates from those whose 1976 income changed substantially during the last quarter.

Many taxpayers first met the requirements for filing a tax declaration during the last three months of 1976, according to the Internal Revenue Service. Taxpayers are generally required to file an estimate if they owe the IRS more than \$100 not covered by withholding. The estimates in this case are due January 17.

There is one exception to this rule, the IRS said, and that's when taxpayers file their returns and pay all taxes due by January 31. In that case the final 1976 installment is not required, the amended declaration is not required nor is an original January 17 declaration required.

IRS Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," provides additional information and may be obtained free from local IRS offices.

Farmers who have not filed their 1976 declaration of estimated Federal Income Tax must file and pay that tax by Monday, January 17. The sole exception to this rule is if they file their income tax return and pay the total tax due by March 1, the Internal Revenue Service said today.

Farmers are defined as those persons who earned at least two-thirds of their 1976 gross income from farming.

IRS Publications 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," and 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," provide additional information and are available free at local IRS offices.

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County, Nation **Approve Plans** To Promote

Producers of Upland Cotton have voted in favor of amending the cotton research and promotion order to provide for a supplemental assessment on each bale of cotton they market, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced.

A preliminary count of returns on a mail referendum which ended Dec. 17 shows that 67.1 percent of the producers voting favored the proposed amendment, with 35,042 infavor and 17,147 voting against the proposal. Approval by twothirds of the producers voting, or by a majority accounting for twothirds of the cotton represented in the referendum, was necessary for the amendment to become effective.

Effective date for the amendment will be determined after the referendum results are officially tabulated and announced, a process which will take about two weeks, according to officials of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

* Beginning with the 1977 crop, the supplemental assessment would be four-tenths of one percent of the value of cotton as determined by the cotton board and the Secretary of Agriculture. This amount, together with the \$1 per bale growers now pay, will be used to strengthen cottons competitive position and to maintain and expand domestic and foreign markets and use for U.S. Cotton. The administration of this program is handled by the Cotton Board, compriesed of producer representatives named by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Another provision of the amendment will allow the Cotton Board, beginning with the 1978 crop, and with the approval of the Secretary, to increase or decrease the assessment rate so long as the total supplemental are heavy ton sook tramssa percent of the value of cotton as determined by the Cotton Board and the Secretary.

The amendment also authorizes reimbursement of USDA up to \$200,000 for referendum expenses and for administrative and supervisory costs up to five employee years annually,


The State of Texas recorded 26,120 votes, with 17,365 votes "Yes" and 8,755 votes "No". The "Yes" votes accounted for 66.5 percent of the total vote.

Coleman County cotton producers voted in favor of the assessment by a 79 percent "Yes" to 21 percent "No" margin. Total votes cast in Coleman County was 75, with 59 "Yes" votes and 16 "No" votes.

City Fathers **Set Increase** For Sanitation

The Santa Anna City Council met Thursday, January 6, at City Hall with Mayor Glen Copeland presiding. All Council members were present for the monthly session.

Minutes of the December meeting were read and approved, and current accounts, were reviewed for payment.

Due to dissatisfaction of local people over the \$3.50 charges per load for extra hauling of garbage, members of the Council voted to have an "across-the-board" increase of garbage disposal fee for all city residents. The sanitation fee for local homes will be raised fifty cents per month, effective February 1. The increase in charges has been made necessary due to additional regulations from the Environmental Agency and Air Pollution Board, There will be no additional charge for extra hauling from local homes, but the schedule will continue with onceweekly pickup.

Due to low water level at the City Lake, water for the City of Santa Anna will be pumped from Lake Brownwood. It was also voted to purchase and install a lime machine at the pump station absence of the pastor, Rev. "to prevent or correct the rust problem in the city water system.

The City's contribution toward expenses of Chief Deputy M. R. Simmons was discussed. The City assists with the cost of salary and expenses in order to have a fulltime law enforcement person in Santa Anna.

The next regular meeting of City Council will be Thursday, February 10.



While the group was at the University they realized the dire needs there and made up a purse from individual funds of over \$500 which was presented to the school president. The school was very grateful for the gesture.



Rum: Drink With A History

Millions of Americans have since discovered the difference with the result that the light, white Puerto Rican brands outsell all others three-to-one in the United States.

The origin of rum can be traced back to about 800 B.C. when a Chinese warlord discovered that a pleasing beverage could be made from sugar cane. But it was Columbus who brought sugar cane to the Caribbean.

Rum makers grind sugar cane to produce a juice called black strap molasses. A yeast culture is used to start the fermentation process and give rum its flavor characteristics.

The best-selling rum in Puerto Rico and one of the most popular Puerto Rican brands is Serralles Don Q. named after the legendary Don Quixote and the excellence he sought. Don Q rums are initially distilled at extraordinarily high proofs which make them lighter and drier and also produces a clearer distillate. Distilled water is added afterward to bring the proof level to a palatable 80. 1 pound sausage meat 1/4 cup snipped parsley



The Speaker Reports

AUSTIN—The Texas constitution requires that the Legislature shall convene every other year at the Capitol in Austin. That date is the

January II of this year, that constitutional obligation will once again be discharged. For 140 days, the House of Representatives and Senate will be sitting in their chambers with the direction of the State's future being determined by their decisions.

In the House, each member is the spokesman for approximately 75,000 people back home in his or her district.

These elected representatives will spend many hours during sessions in committee meetings, hearings, and taking part in debate in the chamber. Each member serves on several committees, and this is where much of the work is done between the introduction of a bill and final passage into law.

There will be plenty of activity for every member. In addition to the particular legislation in which every legislator is personally involved, the lawmaker will be called on to have a voting knowledge of a great number of other bills which could have impact on the state or a particular area.

The growth of legislation introduced has increased dramatically in the past 10 years. In 1967 there were

less than 1,000 bills and resolutions introduced in the House or Senate. This session I anticipate more than 4,000 measures will be introduced.

Some of these proposals will fall by the wayside before reaching the voting stage. However, many others will wind through the legislative process and the elected lawmakers must then make the decisions as to the benefit of a particular item for the state and for his or her individual district.

The House will begin the 65th session with 112 of the same members as the 64th session. There are 36 members who will be with us for the first time and two former members who are returning after being re-elected.

I know there is going to be a heavy workload, but it is evident that the caliber of representatives coming to Austin is very high and I expect a hard-working session.

These men and women are coming to the Legislature to carry out the instructions of the people who elected them. I firmly believe that if the will of the people is carried out in our deliberations that the resulting laws will be the laws of the people.
