Gunshot Mishap Takes Life of S-Anna Woman

A gunshot accident Saturday about noon took the life of a rural Santa Anna woman, Mrs. R. V. (Ella) Cupps, 56, at her home four miles southeast of Santa Anna on the Trickham Road. Sheriff's Department officials investigated the mishap and termed it an accidental self-inflicted wound.

Mrs. Cupps was found outside the back door of the home when her husband returned at noon from Brownwood where he had attended a farm auction. A .22 caliber pistol belonging to the family was nearby.

Funeral services for Mrs. Cupps were held Monday, April 4, at Henderson Funeral Chapel with burial in Cleveland Cemetery. Jim Cooke, interim minister of Northside Church of Christ, and Gary Lawrence, pastor of Northside Baptist Church, officiated at the services.

Local Elections Held Saturday Three Are Elected For ISD Board of Trustees

Two incumbents and one new member were elected to the Santa Anna School District Board of Trustees Saturday when 259 voters went to the polls to mark their choices.

Glen Scarborough and Eddie Hartman were re-elected to second terms; Orabeth McIver was elected for her first term of office.

Scarborough polled 136 votes to lead the ballot; Hartman received 133 votes. Mrs. McIver received 116 votes for third place.

Donnie Neff, another first term aspirant, was close behind with 109 votes. Other balloting

included incumbent Sammie J. Powers with 72; Raymond DeLeon, 69; Donald Strickland, 57; and Virgil Lancaster, 48.

In an unopposed election, W. Ford Barnes received 51 votes to return as Coleman County School Trustee. He has served 28 years on the three-man board.

Sixteen absentee votes were cast prior to the election showing the interest in the Santa Anna ISD contest. The board members will be sworn into office at the next meeting at which time officers will be elected. Those with time remaining on their terms are Max Eubank, Joe Riley, Felton Martin and Jay Weathers.

Brock, Riley Winners of City Council Contest

Gale Brock, incumbent, and Billy Riley were elected to Santa Anna City Council Saturday, receiving identical 121 votes. Mayor Glen Copeland was elected for his first term, and Quinton Daniel was elected to a one-year Council term without opposition.

Dale Bradley and J. T. Avants, candidates for two-year terms on the Council, received 42 and 31 votes respectively.

A total of 156 votes were cast in the election, termed only a fair turn-out by city officials.

Copeland has served as Mayor

several months following the resignation of Thomas Wristen Jr. Daniel was elected to the City Council seat formerly held by Copeland. The other incumbent, Julian Kelley, did not seek re-election this year.
