



Glen Scarborough and Eddie Hartman were re-elected to second terms; Orabeth McIver was elected for her first term of office.

Scarborough polled 136 votes to lead the ballot; Hartman received 133 votes. Mrs. McIver received 116 votes for third place.

Donnie Neff, another first term aspirant, was close behind with 109 votes. Other balloting






The Annual Whon Picnic is againpast history. Saturday was such a beautiful day and everything went well. A large crowd. And the men preparing the meat did a wonderful job.


