Another Rural Fire Truck Ready For Area Service

Two new active members were voted into the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department at the meeting of the group Monday night, February 7 at the Fire Hall. The two new members are Jim Burchfield and Bill Williams. Williams has been listed as an honorary member, but has returned to Santa Anna to make his home and will be on active status.

Two active members were granted honorary status, Dick Chaffin and Steve Valdez.

During the business session a

report was given on the progress of the fund drive and on the renovation of rural fire trucks. Another rural truck will be ready for service by next week.

When repairs are completed, three trucks with a combined capacity of about 3,000 gallons of water will be available for rural fires or grass fires and supplementary control within the city.

The Santa Anna VFD urges rural people to call them when needed; trucks and firefighters are ready to be of service to anyone in the community.

City Seeking Candidates; No New Candidates for ISD

With only three weeks until deadline, only two candidates have filed for places on the school trustee ballot and none have yet chosen to run for places on the City Council or for Mayor. Prospective candidates have until March 3 to apply for a place on either ballot.

Glen Scarborough is seeking re-election for the School Board, and Donald Strickland is also a candidate for one of the three places to be filled. Trustees who have terms expiring and have not

indicated their intention are Eddie Hartman and Sammie Powers.

Terms of Mayor Glen Copeland and Councilmen Roy Joe Harvey, Julian Kelley and Gale Brock expire in April. Copeland and Harvey are serving appointive terms.

Those filing for School Trustee should make application at the school business office, and City candidates sign the application at City Hall.

The Richland Springs and Brookesmith girls each lost only one game during the second half of play to tie for the leader; Santa Anna girls were winners of the first half of play.

Coaches from the two schools were to meet Tuesday night to decide the date and time of the play-off game.

The Talpa boys team were winners of their district division, having an undefeated record.

In games last week, the Santa Anna girls lost to the Brookesmith feds 41-36 despite Rhonda Rhoades 22 points. Gaye Harvey scored ten. At Lohn

Tuesday night of last week Santa Anna won 49-43 with Rhoades scoring 24, Harvey scoring 17 and Ginger Smith scoring 12.

The Mounties won over Lohn 52-47 with Terry Day scoring 17 and Mike Warnock scoring 16. At Brookesmith the local boys were victorious by a 58-50 score with Day and Warnock leading the scoring with 18 and 14 respectively, Joe Dean Early scoring 13 and Guy Allen, 11.

The Santa Anna boys have a 13-11 record for the season and a 8-6 district tally. The season is the best for the Mountaineers in many years, and the impressive record of the Junior Varsity team indicates good varsity teams for several years to come.

Santa Anna Council Members Discuss Dogs, Election, Taxes

Mayor Glen Copeland presided at the Thursday, February 3, meeting of City Council. All members were present except Roy Joe Harvey.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved, and bills and accounts for the month were reviewed for payment. The City Council election was called for Saturday, April 2.

Discussion of continuing problems with stray dogs was held, with City Council voting to hire a dog catcher and enforce the local ordinance. Beginning in early March, all dogs running loose without proper vaccination and license tags will be impounded and disposed of if unclaimed within a specified number of days.

The renewed enforcement is a result of many complaints of stray dogs in town and the danger of a rabies outbreak in the community

from the many unvaccinated animals.

Council members voted to authorize a tax attorney to begin collecting delinquent city taxes. Deadline for payment of taxes without penalty was January 31. All unpaid taxes are now overdue and will be charged a penalty that increases each month until paid.

Approval was given for laboratory equipment required by the City Water Department and approval given for a new roof on the City warehouse on Wallis Avenue.

The resignation of City Secretary Sandra Clifton was accepted. Mrs. Clifton will end her tenure with the City May 15. Applicants for the position are now being taken and a new city Secretary named in time to train for the job.

The next meeting of City Council will be Thursday, March 3. Meetings of the group are open to the public and all interested people are invited to be present.

Vehicle Tags Now On Sale

Vehicle registration tags went on sale Tuesday, February 1, at the office of County Tax Assessor-Collector Billie Baker in the Coleman Courthouse. Registration renewal notices were received in the mail earlier by most vehicle owners.

The 1977 license tags must be picked up in person at the Courthouse or ordered by mail. Instructions for ordering by mail are on the back of the registration notices.

The 1977 stickers will be affixed to a corner of the present license tag. White figures and state name are on a red background. The sticker serial number is in blue numerals. Last year's sticker was white with red and blue numbers.

No tax substitution will be used in Santa Anna again this year, so all vehicle owners must get their registration stickers in Coleman or by mail. Deadline for installing the new stickers is April 1.

Lone Star Gas Seeks City Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas Company's local manager, J. C. Wilkerson, today filed an application for a rate increase to provide the company an 8 percent rate of return.

Wilkerson said Lone Star's distribution system serving Santa Anna earned a 4.37 percent rate of return in 1975 and that \$11,467 is required to correct the utility's revenue deficiency. He explained that Lone Star has experienced the current inflation and the current inflation, and unrecovered costs of purchased gas which substantially eroded utility earnings.

In June of last year, the Railroad Commission authorized Lone Star to recover 85 percent of its increase in the average cost of gas (above a base of .72 cents) from residential and commercial deliveries at the city gate. During the fourteen months ended August, 1976, Lone Star had unrecovered gas costs of \$14.2 million for gas delivered at the city gate for residential and commercial customers.

"These costs result from the rapidly rising gas prices during the last few years. For example, our average cost of gas climbed from 18c per thousand cubic feet in 1971 to \$1.03 in June of this year, a 472 increase. Utility earnings declined from 23.3 million in 1971 to \$13.1 million in 1975, or 44 percent," Wilkerson said.

The company's application would raise the average residential customer's bill about \$1.65 per month, based on 8 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) consumption.

Colorado River To Be Studied For Pollution

The Lower Colorado River Authority, in conjunction with a joint venture of two engineering firms, Espey, Huston and Associates and Turner, Collie and Braden, has begun an 18 month planning study of water pollution control feasibility in the Colorado River Basin.

As the planning agency under a contract with the Texas Water Quality Board, the LCRA is responsible "for gathering information on water pollution in the river basin from the western boundary of Coleman County to the mouth of the Colorado, plus Tres Palacios River in Matagorda County.

Environmental Resources Director John E. Babcock of the LCRA SAYS, "The Authority's Board of Directors feels this is a splendid opportunity to continue the LCRA's on-going program of protecting and improving the waters of the Colorado and its tributaries and at the same time render a service to residents of the river valley."

Residents will have the opportunity to provide input into the plan during a series of public hearings conducted by the LCRA and its consultants scheduled to begin in April. These meetings will be held throughout the river basin.

Financing of the planning study is provided by the federal government in the 1972 Water Pollution Control Act Amendments. Section 208 of the Act is aimed at eventual attainment of water quality suitable for body-contact recreation and for protection of fish, shellfish and wildlife through an initial feasibility study. The study is to determine whether the goal can be obtained by 1983.

Completion of the study is scheduled for June, 1978.

Santa Anna Pioneer Buried In Local Rites Saturday

Funeral services were held Saturday, February 5, for one of Santa Anna's oldest residents, Curtis Collins, aged 93, who died early Friday, February 4, in Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital in Coleman.

Rev. John Gordon, pastor of United Presbyterian Church officiated at services at the church. Burial was in Santa Anna City Cemetery under direction of Henderson Funeral Home.

Born in Ferris, Ellis County, January 22, 1884, he was the son of the late Nathan David and Martha Ashby (Taliaferro) Collins. He came with his family to Santa Anna in a wagon at the age of seven when his parents purchased the farm on which he spent the remainder of his life.

He attended the Live Oak schools and in 1912 married Della Ferguson. She died in 1967.

Mr. Collins was a stockfarmer and served two terms as County Commissioner during the 1930s. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church of Santa Anna.

Mr. Collins maintained his own home and continued raising Polled Hereford cattle until suffering a broken hip in November. He had resided at a Coleman nursing home for the past two months.

Survivors are a sister, Mrs. Pauline Natan Harper of Kerrville; four nephews and seven nieces. A daughter, Mildred, preceded him in death in 1925.

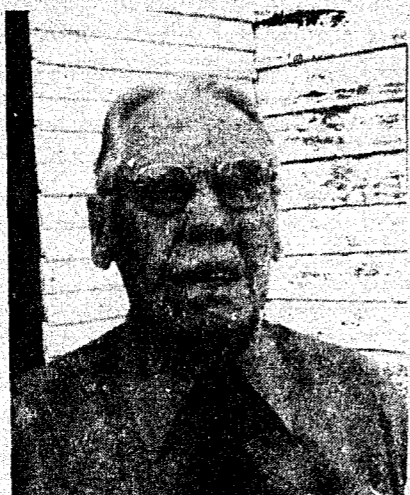
