The Beef Referendum is to determine whether cattlemen wanta national self-help program. It was authorized by the Beef Research and Information Act, passed by Congress in May of ast year.

If approved by two-thirds of the cattlemen voting, there would be a uniform collection of threetenths of one percent of the value
on each animal sold. This rate on each animal sold. This rate willion a year to be invested in beef research be invested in research, promotion, market education and foreign
development. Any cattleman not interested in participating may receive a refund, upon request.
"Every cattleman knows that we have been through the economic wringer the past three years," says Sartwelle, "This is self-help program thatcanhelp
every segment of our industry Therefore l urge every cattleman o attend the informational meetings, to be scheduled in every county during the next 60
days, and to vote "Yes" in the upcoming referendum, expected to be held in May or June.'
