

"Anything Goes", a series of athletic contests patterned after the national television show of the same name, will be held Saturday night, June 11, at the Santa Anna athletic field. The action will get



S-Anna School Nurse Retiring After 22 Years

A long-time staff member of Santa Anna Schools is retiring this year, and perhaps she has made a more lasting impression on more students than most former school personnel.

Mrs. Edna Wells, R. N., School Nurse at Santa Anna for the past 22 years, probably has more 'notches' on her syringes than any other nurse in the area as she has administered innoculations to many of the children in the community several times a year from early childhood through high school.

Starting work with five schools in the county in 1954, Mrs. Wells has spent at least two days a week at Santa Anna tending to minor illnesses, giving shots and keeping accurate medical records of the students enrolled. She ended her work this spring as nurse for Santa Anna, Novice, Mozelle and Talpa-Centennial schools.

During her many years at the local school, Mrs. Wells has comforted and tended to hundreds of sick children and counseled with parents and teachers. Her duties have also included providing transportation for children who needed treatment by doctors, dentists or optometrists in neighboring towns. Besides her busy schedule as a school nurse, Mrs. Wells was often called to work as a floor nurse at Overall - Morris Memorial Hospital in Coleman, spending most of her summer 'vacations' on duty there.

Mrs. Wells graduated from Seton School of Nursing in Austin in 1929 where she compiled an

23rd Screwworm Case Discovered In Sanderson

Rancher C. F. Cox of Sanderson collected Brewster County's first 1977 maggot sample which under laboratory examination, to be screwworms.

This is Texas' 23rd case of the year, reports Dr. M. E. (Cotton) Meadows, Jr., director of the U. S. Department of Agriculture Screwworm Eradication Program By June 2 of 1976 Brewster County had tallied three cases and Texas had a total of 2,277.

Cox collected the Brewster County sample from the navel of a new born calf at his ranch headquarters on May 30. It was identified in the lab May 12. The nearest known cases (two) in the region were collected May 13 and 14 along the Pecos River near Sheffield.

The screwworm fighter says one encouraging aspect of the effort this year is that no buildup has been recorded in any area. "The sterile flies seem to be preventing spread from any of the cases reported to date."

The Screwworm Eradication Program, operated by the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), is based on the fact female flies usually mate only once in their lifetimes. Millions of screwworm flies are reared, and sexually sterilized,

in an insectary. They are released from APHIS aircraft in areas where it is thought wild screwworms flies may exist; and in specially heavy numbers in the area of known screwwork cases. When enough sterila to fertile matings occur

eradication is achieved.

Cattle Producers May Call Toll-Free For Information

Taskforce has established a tollfree 'Hotline' to answer questions from cattle producers about the Beef Referendum.

Registration for the longawaited Referendum is taking place June 6 - 17 at nearly 2,000 county ASCS offices across the nation. Cattle producers who wish to vote must register before the June 17 deadline. Actual voting will take place back at the ASCS offices between July 5 - 15.

'Beef producers who have a question about the program can call 1-800-682-4106 weekdays between the hours of 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.', says Texas BDT Chairman J. D. Sartwelle of Sealy.

The Referendum, if approved by two-thirds of the cattle producers voting, would authorize the first nationwide self-help program for the beef industry. Using the value-added

The Texas Beef Development system, each cattle producer would contribute three-tenths of one percent (30 cents per \$100) of the value of each animal sold. This rate would raise \$30 million to \$40 million per year for beef research, education and promotion, Sartwelle said.

Bangladesh Is Important to SDA


Four destructive tornadoes have brought severe damage to a city in Bangladesh, prompting the church in its worldwide disaster organization to send \$19,000 in aid.

The Adventist hospital located there escaped damage, but is overflowing with injured.

100 bales of clothing have been shipped from SAWS east coast warehouse in New York City, and the \$19,000 were sent.


Besides Bangladesh SAWS sent 67 tons of clothing to rural people in Peru, 50 tons to Brazil, and 55 tons are to be sent to Pakistan. Philipines sent an urgent request for help after the destructive fire in Ozamis, Mindanao Island. Clothing to value of more than \$115,000 answered this call.

SS Increase Will Begin **Next Month**

A cost-of-living increase in monthly social security benefits will be included in checks delivered on July 1, according to Don Austin, social security district manager in Brownwood.

The increase will amount to 5.9 percent for most people getting social security payments. The automatic cost-of-living provision was added to the social security law in 1972.

People getting social security checks don't have to do anything to get the higher payments", Austin said. 'The increase will be added automatically."

The increase is based on the rise in consumer prices from the first three months of 1976 to the first three months of 1977.

With the cost-of-living increase, average social security retirement payments to retired workers will go from \$221 to \$234 a month.Average social security disability payments to disabled workers will go from \$248 to \$262 a month. Average social security survivors payments to widowed mothers or fathers with two children in their care will go from \$517 to \$547 a month.

Social security pays monthly benefits to over 33 million people. The payments are funded by social security contributions from employees, employers and self-employed people.

Employees and employers contribute 5.85 percent of the first \$16.500 of yearly earnings from jobs covered by social security.

Self-employed people contribute 7.9 percent. These figures remain unchanged, Austin said.


Social security checks are usually delivered on the third of the month. When the third falls on Saturday or Sunday, the checks are delivered the preceding Friday. July 3 is on a Sunday this year, and the checks will be delivered Friday, July 1.



Dove Harvest Estimate Made

Revised estimates indicate the annual harvest of whitewing and mourning doves during the September whitewing season is substantially higher than previously estimated, but state wildlife biologists feel the overall populations have not been critically affected.

'Although our harvest estimates have been low, population estimates have likewise been found to be on the conservative side', said Dr. Hallrby, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department migratory game

program director. Following the 1976 dove seasons, biologists developed a more accurate method of determining harvests, based on white-winged dove stamp sales. The newer method makes a random sample of hunters from stamp purchases. The sample group was mailed a questionnaire, requesting such data as the number of whitewings and mourning doves bagged during each of the five half-days of the season and the county in which hunt occurred. each Approximately six percent of the 42,000 stamp buyers was included in the survey. A second mailing and a follow-up telephone contact of persons failing to respond was conducted to qualify the responses.

Calorie Cuts Suggested For Older People

COLLEGE STATION.....Often puzzling weight gain for older persons, who eat less than in slimmer days, is usually due to tricky 'hidden' calories.

'Senior citizens need fewer calories each day than the middle-aged,' Karen Kreipke, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, said.

'This is because the changes in body chemistry, as well as a devrease in activity.

'A woman over 55 years of age needs about the same number of calories as a child four to six years old -- about 1700 calories.

'A man over 55 needs about the same number of calories as a boy 10 years old -- about 2400 calories.'

Miss Kreipke noted that calories 'hidden' in everyday food such as cream and sugar for coffee, gravy for bread or potatoes, and butter, margarine or jelly for toast add to the daily calorie total significantly.

She tallied the 'hidden' calories in those foods.

'One cup of black coffee or tea has no calories, while adding a tablespoon of light cream and a teaspoon of sugar gives it 47 calories.

'One cup of skim milk has 90 calories, but one cup whole milk

'A half cup mashed potatoes has 62 calories, but adding milk and butter gives it about 90.

'One slice of bread has 70 calories -- a teaspoon and a half of butter or margarine adds 50 more calories. Count 25 calories for a teaspoon and a half of jelly'.

To solve the dilemma of highcalorie desserts, Miss Krepipke suggested fruits.

OSHA Repeal Is Urged By Farm Bureau

The Coleman County Farm Bureau has asked Congressman Omar Burleson to co-sponsor a bill that would repeal OSHA (Occupational Health and Safety Act).

Victor Cardinas of Coleman, president of the local county Farm Bureau, said Rep. Steven Symms of Idaho introduced H. R. 1348 which would repeal OSHA. County Farm Bureaus throughout the nation are contacting their respective Congressmen to ask that they co-sponsor the measure.

In his letter to Congressman Burleson, the county president said that Farm Bureau's policy on the matter reads:

'The Occupational Safety and Health Act is detrimental to the American farmer and the American public and is a ursurpation by the federal government of state, local and individual rights. The Act does not fall within the responsibilities assigned by our Constitution to the federal government. We therefore favor the complete repeal of this Act. Farm Bureau should take the lead in an all-out effort to achieve this important objective.'

Cardinas said the one-sentence Symms bill was introduced at the request of Farm Bureau 'as the only way to put an end to the everincreasing number of regulations and the arrogant administration by this federal agency.'

The county president said OSHA tactics violate the rights guaranteed under the Fourth Amendment to the U.

S. Constitution against 'unreasonable searches and seizures'. He said that OSHA inspectors now enter private premises without a warrant, without probable cause to secure a warrant, and arbitrarily impose fines administratively without recourse to a trial by jury.
