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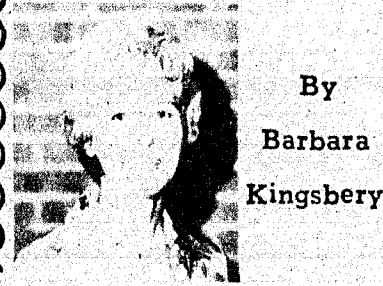

Rural Direction Signs To Be Painted, Repaired

Home Demonstration Club members are working toward replacing name and distance signs throughout the county as their big project for 1977.

The Council Education Committee is presently gathering information which includes the name of each family and the distance from the nearest Farm-to-Market Road to their home or farm. (For example - Maynard Gaines 2 miles). Those owning farms but not living there may also request signs.

Those wishing a sign for their farm may contact the representative in their precinct--Mrs. Fred Garrett, Precinct 1; Mrs. Roland Duus, Precinct 2; Mrs. Bob Turner, Precinct 3; and Mrs. Ivan Hill, Precinct 4.

Mrs. Maynard Gaines is chairman of the Education Committee. Contributions may also be made to anyone on the committee.

The Home Demonstration Club members sponsored the first program in 1958. Those signs were repaired and replaced a second time in 1964. They are in poor condition at this time. It is hoped that metal signs may replace the current wooden ones for a more permanent type. Many

individuals and organizations assisted with painting, lettering and erecting the signs on the first two occasions.

The committee is currently working with a local firm to letter the signs and erect them.

Loans Are Available From FmHA And SBA

Due to the drought of 1976, Coleman County has been recently named a drought disaster area and become eligible for loans from at least two agencies.

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will receive applications until September 30, 1977, under special loan programs to assist farms and improve community water systems affected by prolonged drought in the 1976 crop year. The program was initiated by President Jimmy Carter.

FmHA County Supervisor Thomas E. Hill said the application deadline was designated by a federal interagency Drought Emergency Coordinating Committee in naming areas eligible for benefits of the special programs. Coleman County was among the areas designated.

FmHA farm emergency loans covering losses from drought and providing additional credit to restore production are available to farmers who are unable to provide the necessary funds from their own resources or to obtain sufficient credit from local commercial sources to finance their actual needs at reasonable rates and terms available to other farmers in the area.

Community water systems can receive loans and possibly grants to improve, repair, and create new water systems. A deadline that applies to emergency water system projects is they must be

completed by November 30, 1977. Thomas E. Hill said the FmHA office for Coleman County, in the Rhone Building in Coleman, can supply further information on terms of the special drought emergency programs.

The Small Business Administration has been authorized by the Interagency Drought Emergency Coordinating Committee to declare small businesses in Coleman County, directly affected by drought conditions, eligible for Economic Injury Disaster Loan assistance. Economic injury to the business must be SOLELY attributable to drought conditions to qualify. Coleman County is one of 48 counties in the State of Texas declared eligible for this assistance under this designation. SBA is authorized to begin accepting and processing applications immediately.

ASCS NEWS

In order to provide the Secretary of Agriculture with a full range of options in the event of a 1978 set-aside is deemed necessary, 1977 acreages of wheat, corn, grain sorghum and barley planted for harvest are being obtained. Farm program legislation now under consideration provides that if a set-aside is implemented, the acreage required to be set aside as a condition of eligibility for program benefits may be based on a percentage of the acreage planted for harvest in 1977.

Under either current or proposed legislation, the 1977 reported acreages will not be used for purposes of establishing allotments.

Farm producers who have planted wheat, corn, grain sorghum and barley are required to report their planted acreages. Producers of upland and extra long staple cotton, peanuts and rice are already required to report 1977 planted acreage.

Farmers will have until July 15, 1977 to report acreage for spring seeded crops. Fall seeded crop acreage must be reported prior to harvesting if possible. Farmers who have already begun or completed harvest should contact the county office immediately.

Farmers who fail to report 1977 crop wheat, corn grain sorghum and barley planted acreage will be considered to have no planted acreage and may be ineligible for program benefits in 1978.

ASCS employees will make spot checks of farms to assure that acreage reports are accurate.

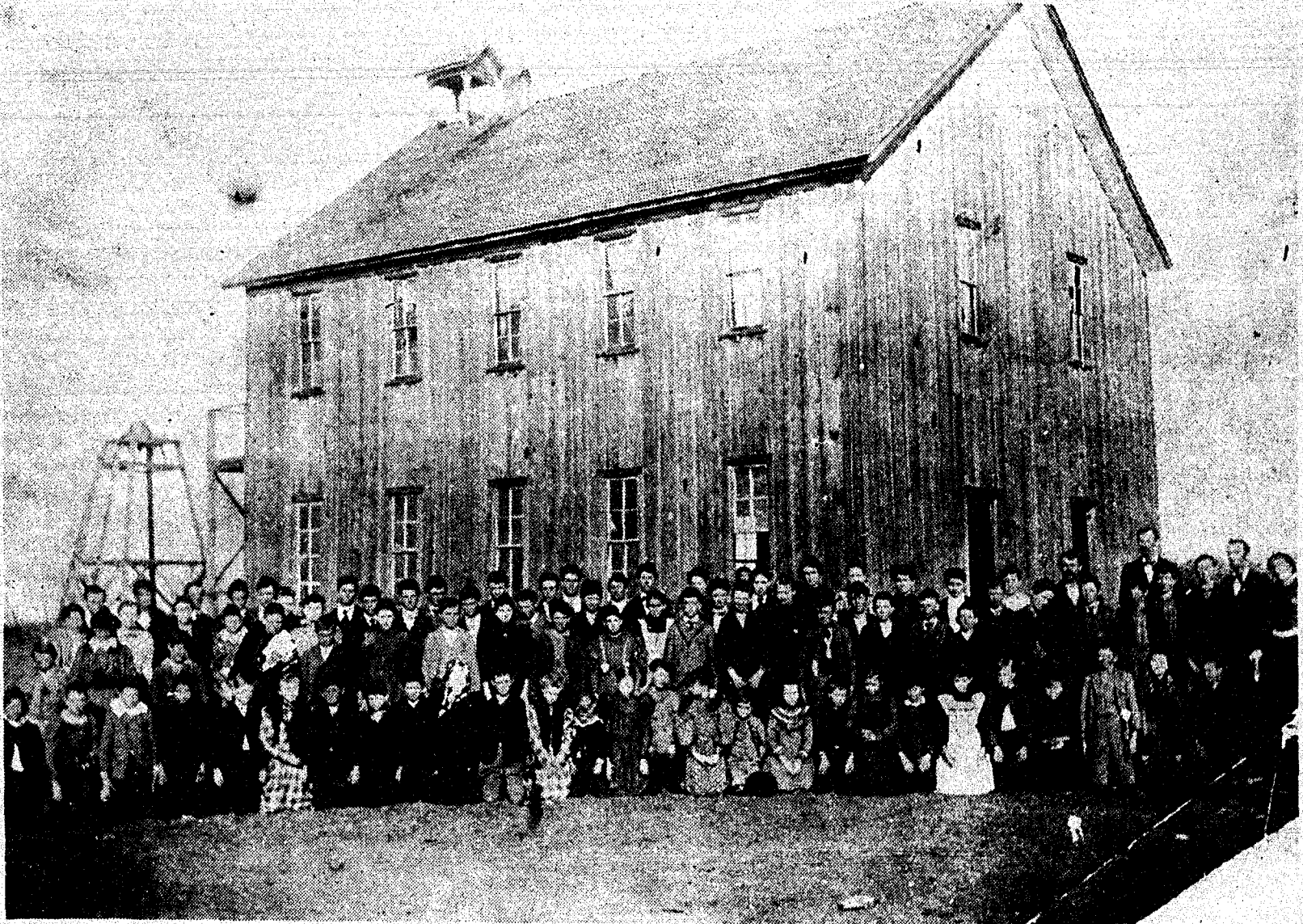

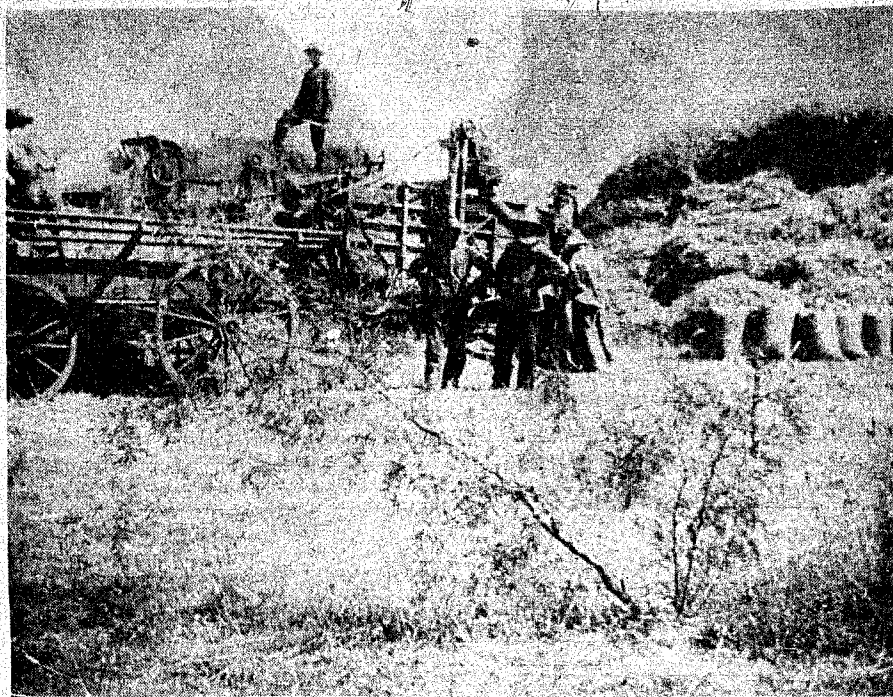

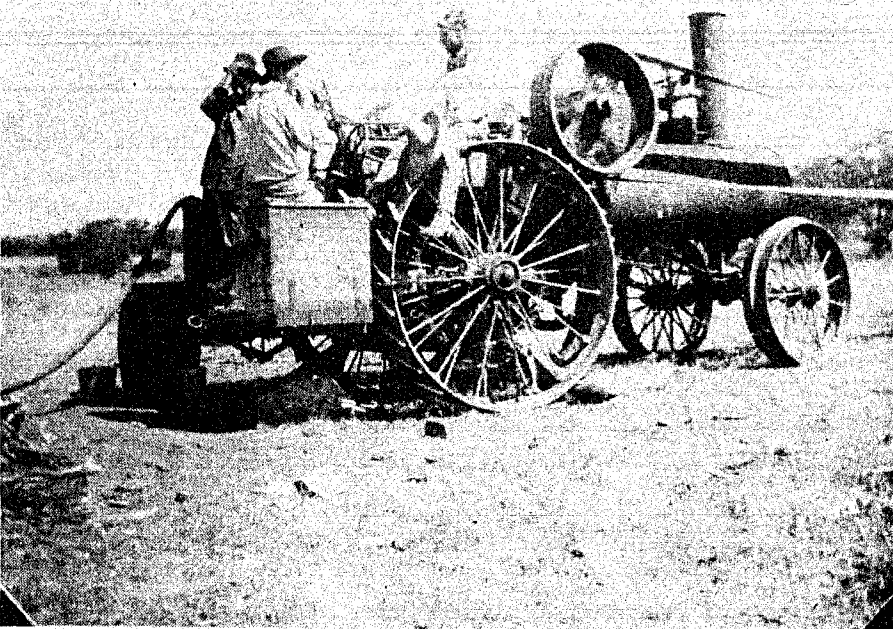

Low Tuition For Sr. Citizens

Howard Payne University has instituted a senior citizen's program to enable persons 55 or older to receive a discount on courses, Dr. Joe Timmons, HPU director of continuing education, has announced.

'Persons 55 years or older may now enroll in classes at the university for \$15 per semester hour, as opposed to the regular \$42 semester hour,' said Dr. Timmons. 'A typical 3-hour class will now cost a senior citizen \$45 to take.'

'Audit fees have also been reduced to \$15 for senior citizens,' Dr. Timmons said. 'And non-credit or continuing education classes may be now taken for half the regularly charged fee. For example, a continuing education class regularly costing \$30 may be taken for \$15 by senior citizens.'

Dr. Timmons emphasized that senior citizens must register through the office of admissions and records prior to the set registration day for each school term. After registering and furnishing proof of age through a social security card or drivers's license, a senior citizen will be issued a university identification card. The card must be presented at time of registration for the senior citizen to be eligible for the discount fees.

Anyone who wishes to take classes for personal enrichment only and not towards credit for a degree may also have the initial \$15 registration application fee waived.

Dr. Timmons said senior citizens may register now to attend the second summer term, set July 7 - August 12, or fall classes to begin August 22, by calling him at 646-2502, extension 359.
