CSA Grant Awarded Cen-Tex Opportunities, Inc.

Governor Dolph Briscoe announced approval of a \$119,736 Community Services Administration (CSA) grant to Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., in Coleman for ongoing programs.

The grant includes \$58,938 for administration and \$60,798 for General Community Programming. Effective for a 12-month period which begins May 1, 1977, the grant is funded under Title II of the Head Start, Economic Opportunity, and Community Partnership Act of 1974.

Administration funds will be used to increase the participation of the poor in the planning processes, to continue to organize and train neighborhood groups in the five counties of Coleman, Brown, Callahan, McCulloch and Runnels; to mobilize resources, collect data, improve public information, and provide administrative support for non-CSA funded projects.

General Community Programming funds will be used to provide referrals and general counseling to 500 low-income families; offer educational and vocational training; provide social activities in each low-income neighborhood at least every two months; promote neighborhood improvements, and to operate a youth services and housing program. The youth services program will provide employment for 150 youths during the summer; involve 200 youths in Youth Councils; and organize tutoring for students with learning problems. The housing program will assist 40 low-income families in securing housing loans, and provide \$50 grants to five low-income families for emergency house repairs.

Grant processing and program liaison are through the Economic Opportunity Division of the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

City Library Getting Ready For Summer

The Santa Anna City Library is open each Thursday afternoon from 3 to 5 p.m. Mrs. Edwin Hipsher is librarian and on hand each week to assist readers in making their selections from the hundreds of books on the shelves.

Selections not available in the Santa Anna Library may be ordered from the cooperating libraries, with the local reader only paying return postage, usually as little as 13 cents per book. Readers may have three weeks to read their selection or

may renew the book another three-week period.

Children's books will be most popular during the summer month, and parents are urged to encourage their children to use the library. New selections for children and youth will be on the shelves for the summer months.

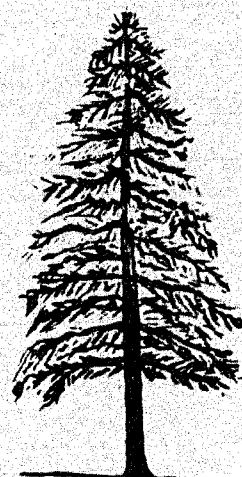
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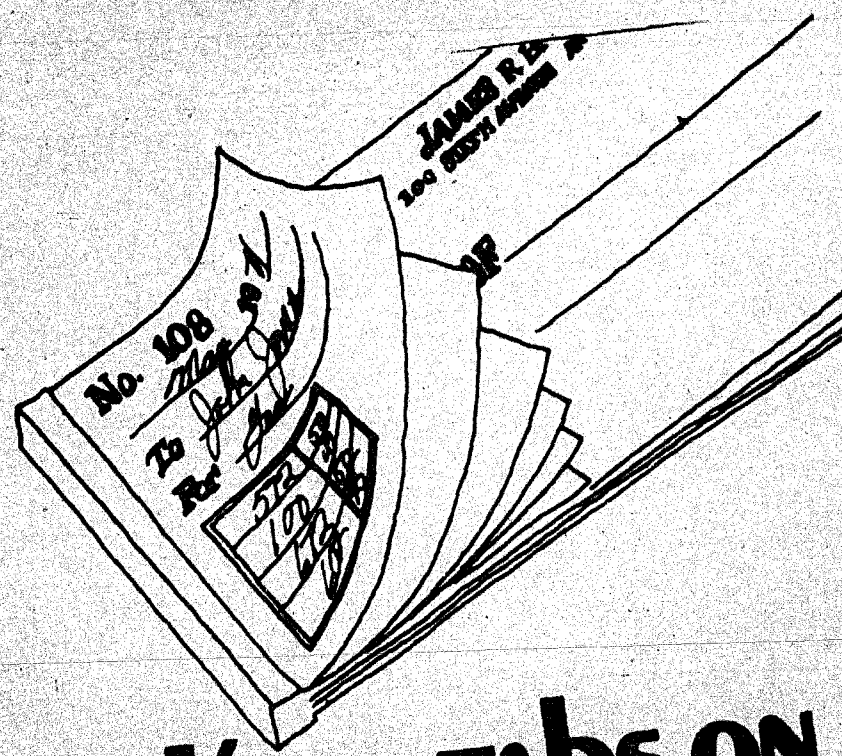
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Whon News

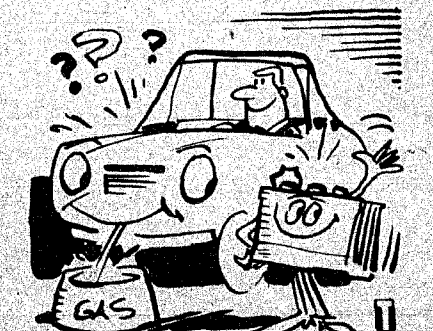
Miss Bray has recently been elected head cheerleader for the coming year after serving on the squad this year. She is active in all athletics and a member of the FHA chapter.

A tornado dipped down upon the town of Rocksprings Tuesday morning about 7:30 and practically wiped the town off the map, according to reports. Sixty-two were known to have lost their lives and 150 were estimated to have been wounded, some of them seriously.

H. G. Griffith, county attorney of Edwards County, whose parents live in Santa Anna, was among those killed and also his daughter.

Aid was rushed from other towns, and according to reports, the scenes are undecipherable.

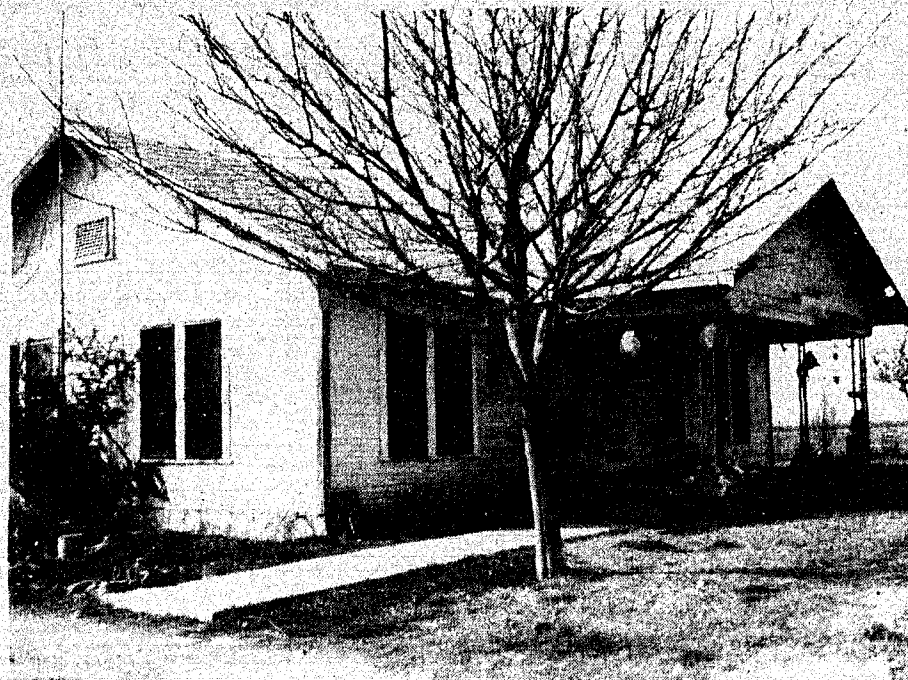

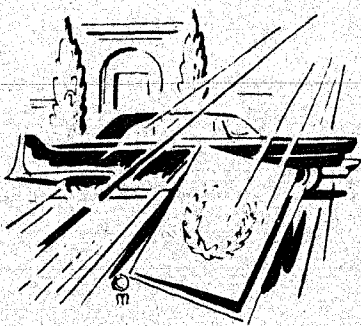

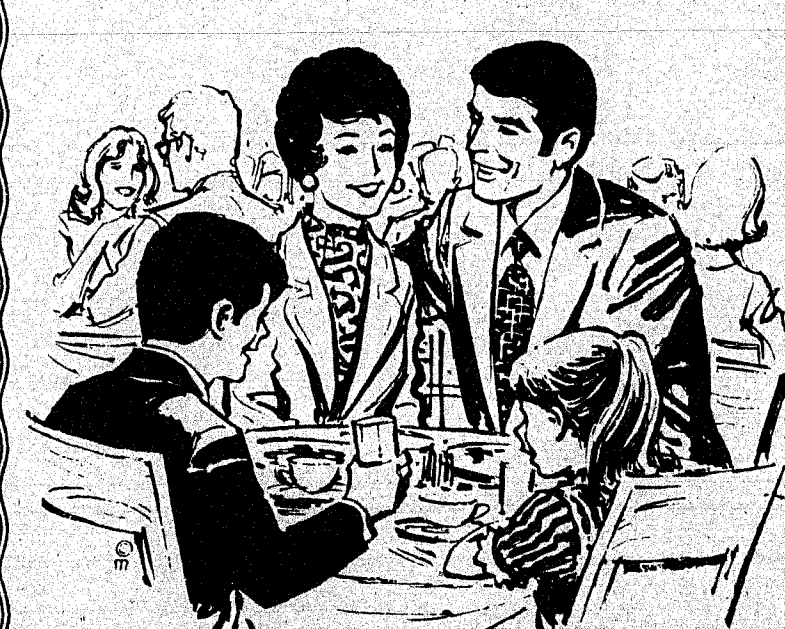

ASCS NEWS

By Jerry May

Time is drawing near when we will be involved in the harvest of small grains planted in the county. I sincerely hope that I will at all times keep you informed of programs which may be available to you through the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) concerning small grains.

Loans will be available for producers on all small grain crops. The actual county loan rates have not been announced for the 1977 crops, but should be available in the near future. I will certainly publicize them as soon as I obtain the rates in the county office.

Last week I discussed provisions concerning farm storage and drying equipment loan program. Along the same line of thought, is some change being made concerning the 1976 crop of wheat which is still in the hands of producers.

Any producers who still have their 1976 wheat crop on hand may obtain a loan on the commodity thru May 31, 1977. This loan availability date was extended from March 31, 1977. The maturity date for wheat loans disbursed during the extended period will be February 28, 1978. The loan level for the 1976 crop wheat in Coleman County is \$2.31 per bushel.

The Secretary of Agriculture has also announced a farmer owned grain reserve program through extended loans for 1976 crop wheat. Such action was initiated by the Secretary to insulate excess wheat stocks from the market place by keeping the wheat stock in the hands of the producers.

The three-year extended loans will be available on the maturity date for the regular loans on the 1976 production of wheat which is stored on-farm and in approved commercial warehouses. The Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) will pay annual storage in advance to the farmers participating in the extended program. Storage payment rates to participating farmers will be 20 cents per bushel per year for wheat. Farmers will be responsible for actual payment of storage to warehousemen during the extended period.

Participating farmers will be permitted to repay the loan, sell commodity, and retain earned storage under the extended loan program when the national average market price reaches 140 percent of the current national loan rate for wheat, or at the expiration of the contract. Farmers will be notified when the 140 percent level is reached.

If the contract is broken by a farmer by disposing of the commodity before the market price reaches 140 percent level, the repayment of the loan will also include all storage payments made, plus interest.

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) will automatically call in all loans when the market price reaches 175 percent of the current national loan rate. If the loan is not repaid within 30 days after the loan is called, all storage payments made, plus interest, will be added to the loan indebtedness.

Any producers having 1976 crop wheat on hand and who are interested in the loan provisions should contact me at the county office prior to May 31, 1977.

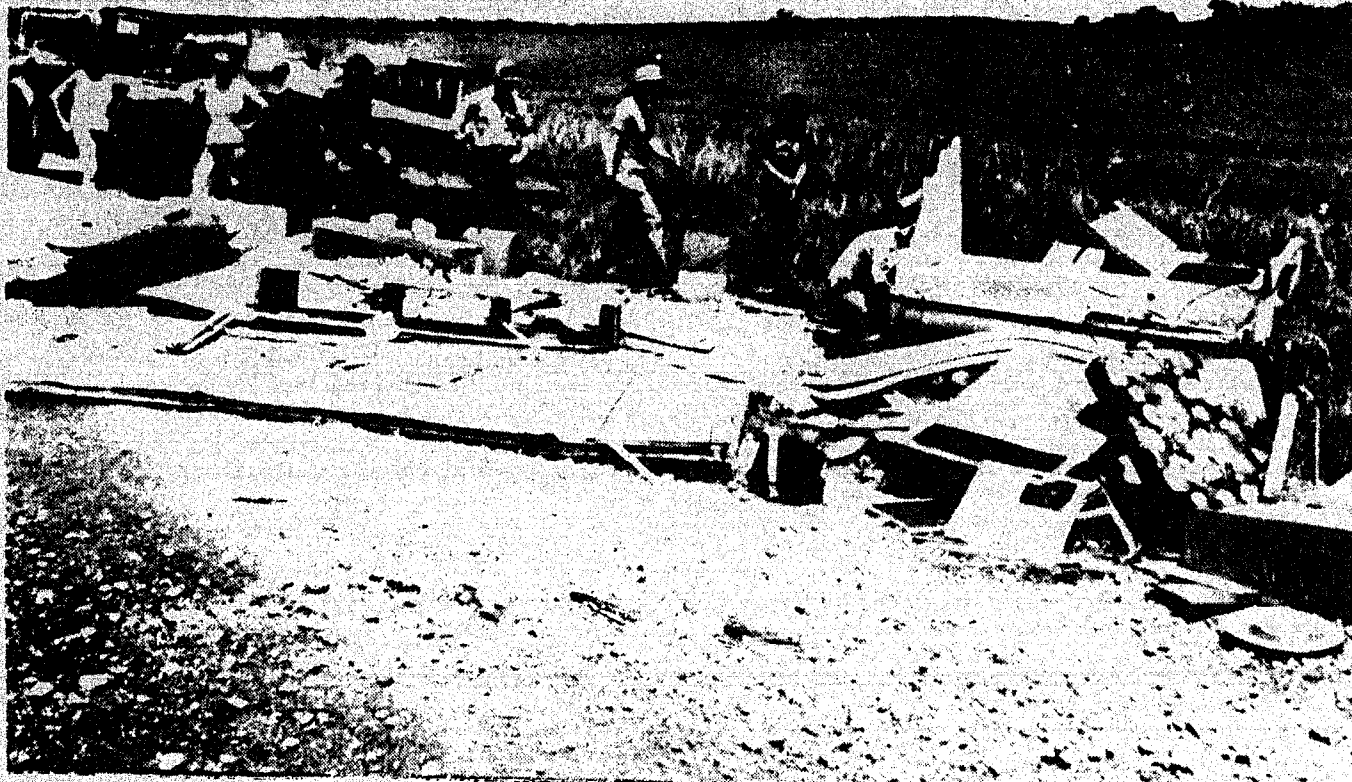

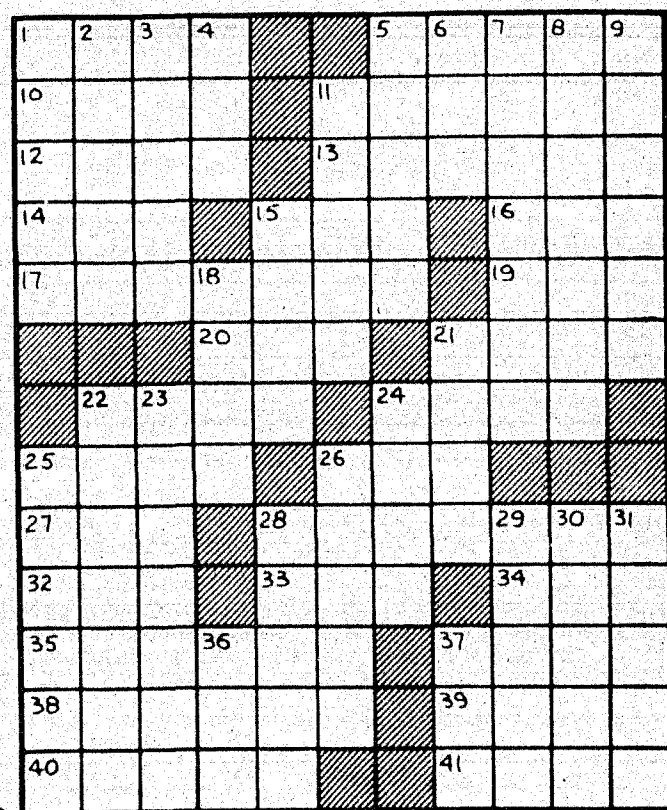
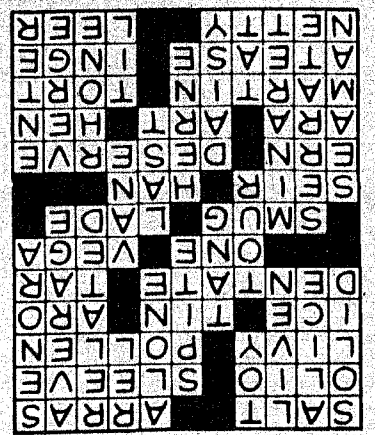
Three or more inches of rain was reported in the Shields Community, and two or more inches was received in most of the community.

The Friday rainfall brought the total for April to 5.70 inches and to 9.45 for the year. The April rainfall in 1976 totaled four inches.

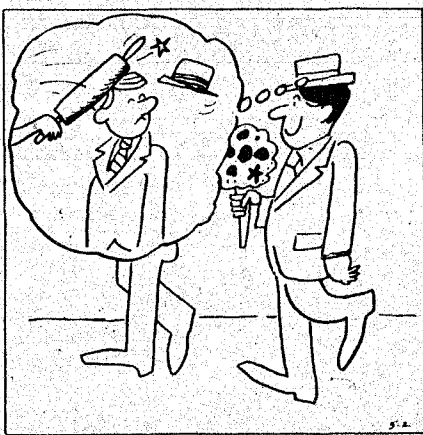
