

City Sales Tax **Up From 1976**

The City Sales Tax for receipts for Santa Anna totaled \$2,356.47 for the period ending May 27. The total is a 28 percent increase over the same period last year.

The Santa Anna city sales tax for the 1977 year has been \$6,712.75.

According to State Comptroller Bob Bullock, the amount rebated to cities in Texas this year has shown a 15 percent increase over the previous year. Houston received the largest amount this period -- \$7.5 million -- while Roanoke received the smallest check of \$15.79.

City Expenditures, Costs Are Listed In '76 Audit

The City of Santa Anna is on a very strict budget, according to the audit report for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1977. Municipalities are caught in the same inflationary spiral in which businesses and individuals find themselves and are squeezing every penny.

City tax payers who have expressed interest in the collecting and spending of the City funds are welcome to study the audit report or attend meetings of City Council to learn where the money is spent. All City records are open to the public.

City taxes have generally increased very little in recent years with the city's total property evaluation listed at just over two million dollars. At the rate of \$1.50 per \$100 evaluation, only \$32,000 in taxes was billed for 1977. Of that amount over \$1,000 is delinquent.

Other income for the City included less than \$2,000 each from Housing Authority, gross receipts taxes, gas collection fees and rent. Revenue Sharing netted the City \$15,891; credited to miscellaneous was \$5,000, and small amounts were collected from dog taxes, backhoe rent, paving and equipment sold. Total combined income from the funds was \$73,608.

The \$55,000 Federal grant received last year was used for street repair (\$38,909) and water system repair (\$16,091).

Other expenditures from the General Fund include salaries, retirement and payroll taxes -\$33,000: legal and accounting fees

- \$1,661; utilities and maintenance -\$22,762; depreciation - \$10,294; Fire Department, City Library and Day Care Center - \$2,139; Payment on Armory - \$1,201. The total is \$72,869.

A look at the financial statement shows why many of the needed repairs and renovation is not done to the City facilities. City leaders should be commended for keeping the operation of the City of Santa Anna' in the black' as long as they have done so.



No Screwworms **During Week**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture Screwworm Eradication Program reached two milestones in the 'Mission 77;

Stamp Out Screwworms' campaign on June 17,

It was the end of the first week since April that no screwworm cases were recorded in Texas. The latest confirmed case, from Brewster County, was identified in the laboratory June 9.

It was also the end of the first June week since June 20, 1964 that Texas was screwworm free. In years before the program started, June was normally the month of most severe screwworm problems.

Novy says 29 cases of the parasite have been recorded in Texas so far this year. By June 17 of last year the total was 3,441.


