Retired THD Engineer Ex-Student of the Year

Final plans for the 1977 Santa Anna Ex-Student Homecoming have been announced by Mrs. Derriel Warnock, president. The annual event is planned Friday and Saturday, October 14 and 15. Elmer Pritchard of

Brownwood, a retired District Engineer with Texas Highway Department and a graduate of the Class of 1927, has been named 'Ex-Student of the Year' and will be honored at the homecomina. Doretha Casey Gilmore of Mobile, Alabama, a 1947 graduate of SAHS, is the 'Coming Home Queen'. She will be presented at halftime at the Friday night f otball game.

The schedule includes a parade Friday, October 14, at 2:30 p.m. with R. C. Smith as parade marshall. All clubs and organizations are requested to have entries in the parade, and classes from years ending in '7' are especially urged to take part.

A pep rally will be held at Perry Gymnasium following the parade, and the Homecoming football game with Bronte will begin at 7:30 p.m. that evening.

Saturday activities will begin with registration at high school with Lois Shields Harper in charge, and a coffee at the school cafeteria from 9 to 10:30 with Debbie Horton Dean as chairman.

The 10:30 business meeting will include the election of officers and the presentation of the Ex-Student of the Year. Ashort variety program will conclude the session followed by a buffet dinner at the school cafeteria.

The homecoming dance will start at 9 p.m. with the site to be announced.

Classes of 1927, 1937, 1947, 1952 and the first official high school band are planning reunions Saturday, October 15.

professional steer roper, is in February. bringing the World Champion Steer Roping title to Santa Anna to Pendleton, Oregon where after winning the championship in Laramie, Wyoming last weekend. Guy placed third in the average at the Steer Roping Finals which gave him the most money at the two-day event and the 1977 title. Vying for the championship were the top 15 steer ropers in the Professional Cowboys Association curcuit.

Guy placed first in two of the ten go-arounds, second in two, and fourth is another for the top money of the event. Runner-up for the world title was Charlie Lynn of Oklahoma. Among other top ropers in the finals was Guy's father, James R. Allen, a consistant winner in the steer roping event for several years and a former winner of the finals

In the two-day roping on ten steers, Guy placed third; James Allen was fourth in the average that was won by Olin Young of Peralta, N. M. Only six ropers caught all ten steers to compete for the average money. Guy was the last roper in the contest and won the championship with one and two-tenths seconds to spare.

Going into the finals ranked eighth, Guy had just this month qualified for the 'rope-off' by being a top winner at Lovington, N. M. in mid-August and later winning at Ogallala, Nebraska.

The world championship title brings a trophy saddle and belt buckle given by the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City, plus a plaque and the large share of the finals purse.

Guy is also expected to snare in the Winston Rodeo Awards that are given annually to the professional rodeo champions. The solid silver engraved buckle will be presented at the Rodeo Finals in Oklahoma City in December and the saddle will be





Hunting Free At Corps Lakes With Permits

National Hunting and fishing Day will be celebrated on Corps of Engineers' lakes and throughout the Nation September 24. Hunters and finshermen are welcome to hunt and fish on lake projects in the Fort Worth District the year around. Only Canyon Lake is closed to hunting.

Hunting is still free on Corps lakes but has to be regulated for safety reasons. Rifles, pistols and shotguns with slugs are prohibited on most Corps of Engineers' lakes.

Duck hunters are cautioned that a permit is necessary before they build a duck blind on Corps of Engineers' lakes. Project offices will not accept applications for duck blinds before October 1-3. Proctor Lake will accept applications beginning on October

Dove and quail hunters are free to hunt Corps' lake areas where they are not posted "No Hunting". Some projects require hunters to obtain a free permit before hunting. Hords Creek Lake near Coleman requires free permits for all kinds of hunting.

State regulations hunting seasons, bag limits and species, but there are Corps of Engineers' exceptions for individual projects. One general exception to State regulations is the District wide prohibition agianst trapping, or capturing live animals. Sportsmen are urged to inquire about hunting regulations at the office of projects before hunting. Project offices are open on weekdays between 7:30 and 4:30 but may be closed on weekends.







CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977**

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

(S.J.R.\18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

of three judges."

(S.J.R. 13)

S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

(S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal, to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior felony.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional

amendment permitting

denial of bail to a person. charged with a felony offense who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 5)

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, nondiscriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct. and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, ref moval, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances,"
