The proposed plans to up-grade the city water supply will be studied again by the city leaders when Mr. Sparkman has additional information on available grants and loans. Estimated cost for a complete new water system was just under two million dollars, the figure including a new pump station at Lake Brownwood, two booster stations and treatment plant and all new lines in the city.

Veteran CCTC Employees To Be Feted on Retirement

Three long-time employees of Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. are retiring this summer. The three, Eddie Paul Voss, Fern Hoke and Ellen Richards, will be honored with a reception Friday afternoon from 3 to 5 o'clock at the CCTC office. Family and friends of the honorees are invited to go by during the afternoon for refreshments and visit.

Eddie Paul Voss retired June 30 after working with the local telephone system during a period of 46 years or more. He began part-time work with the former Santa Anna Telephone Company while in high school, then joined the company as a full-time employee upon his graduation in 1931.

A member of the famed 36th Division, Voss was among those in the group when it was mobilized in 1940. He served with the U. S. Army through World War II, reaching the rank of Captain and serving in the North African theatre and Sicily. He was discharged in 1945 and returned to work with the telephone company here.

Following a few years with a power company and in business: for himself, Voss returned to the telephone company in 1954 where he has served as outside plant manager and with the central office. He has worked with almost every phase of the system and has seen the local system change from lines strung along fence posts to the present underground cable installation.

The son of the late Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Voss, Eddie Paul and his wife Henrilee live on their stockfarm four miles southeast of Santa Anna. He plans to 'do as he pleases' upon his retirement and work on his farm.

Ellen Richards, billing clerk and cashier, will retire from CCTC at the end of the summer. She has been an employee of the local telephone system since 1941, serving as an operator with the original company.

A native of Haskell County, Miss Richards is a graduate of O'Brien High School and the daughter of the late Elder and Mrs. C. H. Richards.

During her tenure with the telephone company, the local system has changed from the old 'crank type' telephones in the rural areas to the direct distance dialing; from the multi-party lines to single party.

The changes are so frequent it is almost impossible to keep up with the new changes. Miss Richards said. She plans to enjoy handwork, gardening and resting upon her retirement. Sandra Clifton will assume duties as billing clerk and cashier.

Man Known Here Farm Safety Is Stressed By County FB

County Judge W. W. (Pete) Skelton has proclaimed the week of July 25 - 31 as Farm Safety Week in Coleman County at the request of Coleman County Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is coordinating activities within the county for the special farm safety campaign.

In his proclamation, Judge Skelton said 'Accidents on Texas farms and ranches claim more than 200 lives each year and thousands more are injured. According to recently published reports of statewide and Farm Bureau accidental deaths, Texas farm and ranch peoplle died during the past year of 1976 at the following rates: traffic - 95; firearms - 34; drownings - 25; tractors - 21; falls - 20; fires and burns - 17; plane crashes - 15: suffocation and asphyxiation - 13: electric current - 8; struck by object - 7; machinery - 6; other vehicles and trailers - 6: explosion - 5: animal - 4; poisoning - 3; lightning - 1; and bee sting - 1. Coleman County recorded one farm-ranch death.

Coleman County Farm Bureau president Victor Cardinas has announced the theme for the week is 'Safety is a Good Investment'.' Agricultural producers have substantial investments in land. equipment and facilities, livestock. Too, they invest skill and a full measure of time and energy. Still, dividends are never assured. Cystic Fibrosis, the number one genetic killer of children affects one out of every 1,500 babies born each year and occurs when a child inherits two genes for the disease, one from each

The parents don't have to have cystic fibrosis, but they are among the 10 million carriers of the gene in the United States.
