Rainfall Here Last Wednesday

Scattered rain showers dropped some rain in Santa Anna Wednesday, July 27, and also rain was recorded at Whon and a few other areas. The Santa Anna official total for the day was .20 inch; up to one inch was reported in the Whon area.

The Wednesday rainfall brings the total for July to one inch, according to R. W. Balke, official reporter. The total for 1977 is 13.65 inches, just less than one inch behind the 1976 rainfall total for the first seven months of last year.

ISD Finances In Good Condition

ISD Tax Office To Be Opened In October

Since the passage of the new school finance bill on July 15, the Boards of Trustees for the Mozelle, Novice, Santa Anna and Talpa-Centennial school districts have voted unanimously for a change in assessing and collecting of taxes for their districts. The decisions were made in called sessions of the different school boards.

The new system includes an amended contract with John Skelton who beginning October 1, 1977 will be assessing and collecting the taxes for the four districts. Heretofore Skelton has been only assessing the school taxes which were collected at the County Tax office.

School officials point out that this action became necessary to comply with the new law which among other things requires certification of school assessors by the State Assessment Practices Board which will establish standards of tax offices, appraisals and procedures in order to receive State funding. School districts must meet these requirements for the funding. Officials also point out that the exact standards will not be known until later, but some of these reports must be filed by January 1, 1978. Training and briefing sessions will be held soon for the assessors to gain certification.

The tax office for the four school districts will be maintained on a co-op basis with each school district paying a proportionate cost of the operation. The office will be located at 108 West Live Oak west of the courthouse in Coleman.

Most school districts have a separate tax collection office, and the local district is establishing one to comply with requirements.

Oil, Gas Taxes, State Funds Boost SA School Income

Santa Anna Independent School District will be in good financial condition this year despite inflation and increased costs in every classification. The increased revenue is a result of the recent State school finance program and additional income from oil and gas valuations within the district.

In meetings in San Angelo and Abilene with TEA financial consultants last week, Supt. R. C. Smith learned that the State will be allotting more funds to the Santa Anna District during the coming year. The Santa Anna Schools have been assigned the same number of teachers as last year, but an additional teacher is being hired from local funds to take care of the increased enrollment in primary level.

The new valuations from area mineral exploration is increased by about three million dollars. If there is an increase in valuations next year, it is probable that

With the expected increase in revenue this year, several needed projects are planned and some improvements will be made to the school plant.

Neighbors and highway department maintenance men went to the scene and kept the blaze from spreading until firemen arrived.

Another hay barn was destroyed by fire the preceding week at the Gustavus place on Home Creek.

Graduation Around The World

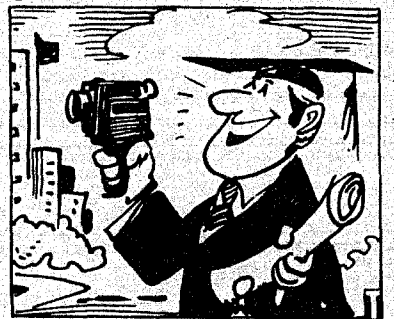
What's the best way to reward a new graduate, now ready for bigger and better things?

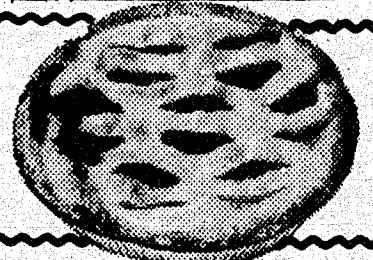

The following stories are from the August 8, 1947 issue of the NEWS:

The City of Santa Anna has completed a water well that will produce 85 gallons of water per minute at the Burke place, 12,800 feet east of the City Treating Plant. This well will produce slightly more water than the average daily consumption through the month of July. Water from this well will be running into the plant within 10 days. A second well is now being drilled northeast of the location.

Due to the very critical supply of water in the lakes, the water from this well will not be run into the lakes. The well will produce enough water to furnish the City with sufficient water to operate on under the present water restrictions. Every citizen in Santa Anna is asked to cooperate with the water commission in the conservation.

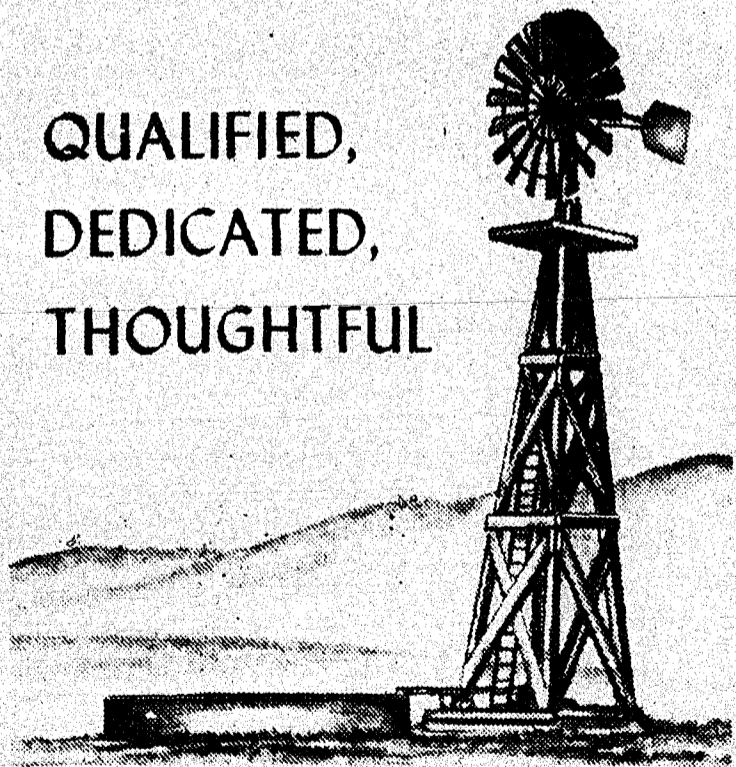

Texas Screwworm Control Status Is Best Ever

Mission: All aspects of the 'Mission '77: Stamp Out Screwworms' campaign seem to be working, commented Dr. M. E. (Cotton) Meadows Jr., as he said only five screwworm cases were recorded in Texas during July.

Meadows, director of the U. S. Department of Agriculture Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service Screwworm Eradication Program, says 35 cases were identified during the first seven months of 1977.

This compares to 6,772 cases through July last year; to 36,428 by the same time of 1972; and 75 by the end of July in 1970, until now the best year in history of the 16-year-old effort.

On July 6 maggots Walter Epperson took from a Edwards County goat near Rocksprings proved to be screwworms. On July 15, 16 and 17 M. Nelson of Brackettville in Kinney County took four screwworm samples for the month.

We're still not out of the woods in this effort to end screwworm infestations in Texas livestock for the final time, warns Meadows. 'The eartick season is just starting and entomologists have checked herds averaging as many as ten ticks per animal.' Wounds created by the Gulf Coast eartick make ready sites for screwworm infestations.

In addition, Meadows says a screwworm case has been found in Mexico only about 50 miles south of McAllen, Texas.

Meadows urges livestock owners to watch their animals carefully; to treat all wounds with an approved insecticide; and to submit samples of any worms found in wounds for laboratory identification.

With prompt sample submission, the APHIS program can make the best use of sterile screwworm flies, Meadows said.

HPU Program Now Open For Students

Howard Payne University will continue its early admissions program for high school juniors and seniors this fall, according to Dr. Roger L. Brooks, president. 'Many students have demonstrated an ability and a desire to perform at the college level before high school graduation', he said. 'In recognition of these students, Howard Payne offers two 'early admissions' programs whereby these students may begin their college program before graduation.'

High school seniors lacking fewer than four credits for graduation may register for two academic courses or seven hours at the university after they complete the necessary forms and provide a high school transcript. Each student must be recommended by his high school principal.

A transcript of college work will not be established until high school graduation is verified by transcript and all admission requirements met. The student then may continue his college work at HPU or have a record of his work transferred to another college.

A high school junior will be accepted in the summer prior to his senior year in high school after completing the necessary forms. He must submit a verification that he has completed his junior year successfully and will be a senior when the regular term begins. Juniors must also be recommended by their high school principal.

A transcript of college work will be established after high school graduation.

Under the early admissions program, students may take many of the introductory freshman level courses offered at the university. A list of the available classes and other information is available from the HPU registrar.

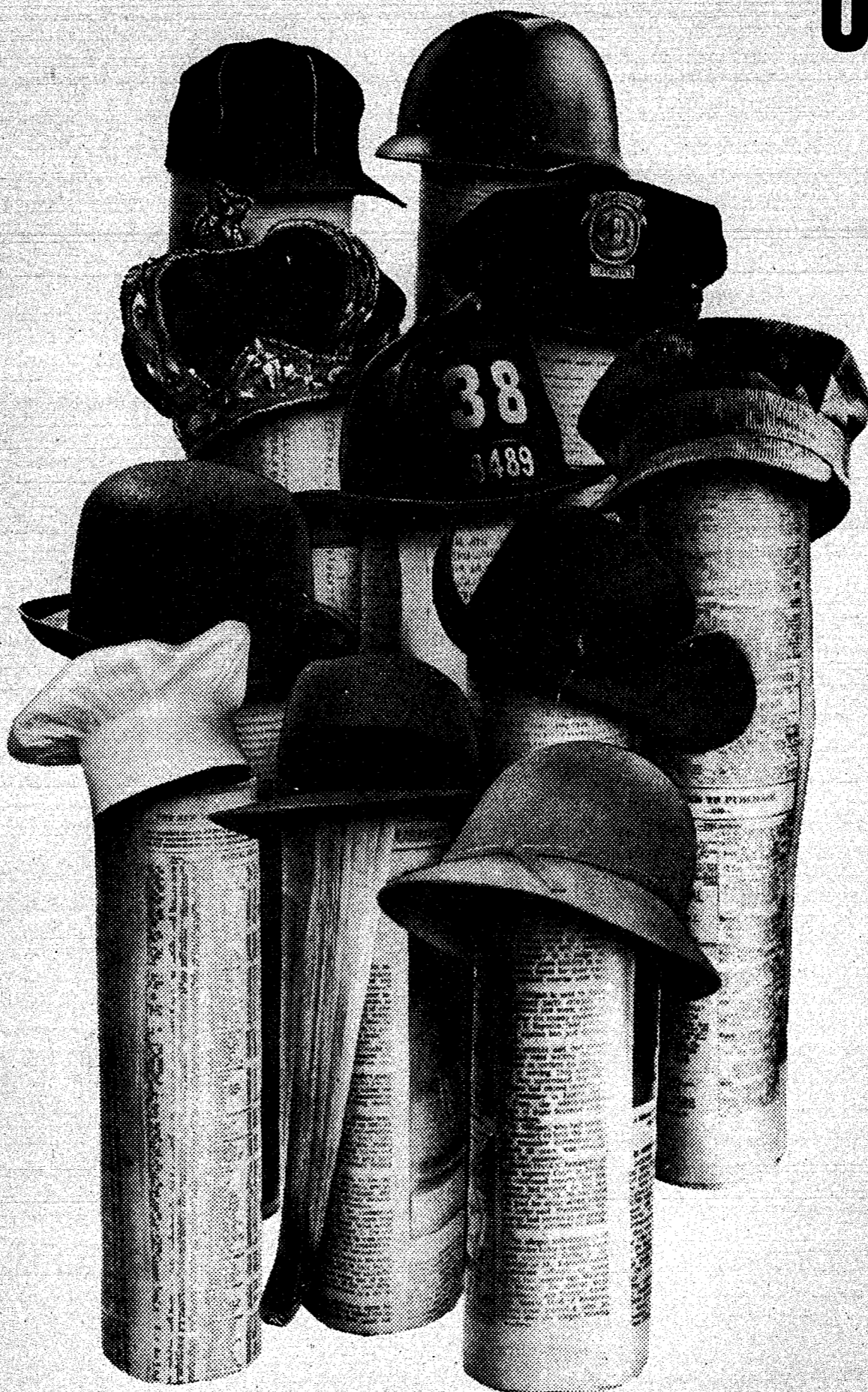

southeast of Santa Anna.

The planned 1,200-foot venture

is located on a 238-acre lease in the R. Perry Survey 95.

Charles Bentley & Associates of Wichita Falls will drill the No. 2 Leroy V. Stockard in the regular field five miles southeast of Santa Anna.

Slated for 1,500 feet, it is in the J. A. H. Cleveland Survey 495.

James D. Rice of Santa Anna will drill No. 14 Ollie Laughlin Estate in the regular field three miles southeast of Trickham.

The planned 1,300-foot venture is located in the S. Perry Survey 143.

The lease is composed of 307 acres.

Tom C Berry of Abilene will drill No. 1-A G. Morgan as a wildcat in Santa Anna in the William Doran Survey 666.

Contract depth is 1,000 feet.

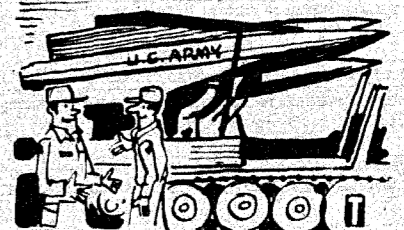

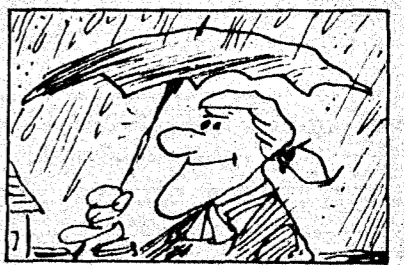

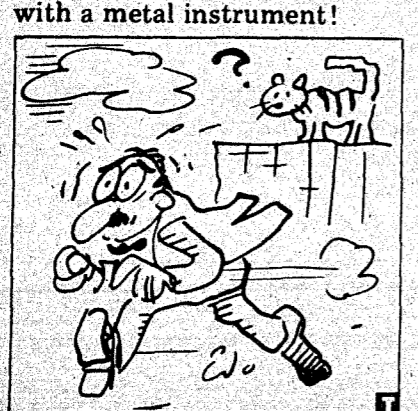
