Child Killed In Mishap Near Rockwood Tuesday

A one-vehicle auto accident Tuesday morning south of Rockwood took the life of an Abilene child and sent the mother to an Abilene hospital for treatment.

Ben Molina III who would have had his first birthday Friday, August 12, was pronounced dead on arrival at Ranger Park Hospital Tuesday morning by Justice of the Peace Walter C. Holt of Coleman. Mrs. Lydia Molina was given emergency treatment here and transferred to Abilene with minor injuries.

Mrs. Molina, driving a Toyota automobile belonging to Jesus Garcia of Abilene, apparently went to sleep at the wheel south of Rockwood on Highway 283.

According to authorities, the Molina vehicle went out of control, traveled over 500 feet before hitting a culvert, skidded another 200 feet before rolling over several times and landing upright on the highway.

A passing motorist took Mrs. Molina and the child to the hospital in Santa Anna. Highway Patrolman Jay Moses investigated the accident that occurred about 7 a.m.

Sheriff's Deputies reported Mrs. Molina was enroute to San Antonio where she was soon to

join her husband Ben Molina Jr., serving in the U. S. Army in Germany.

at the Thursday meeting that included routine business. It was reported the applications for funding for the city water system have been submitted but there has been no response at this early date.

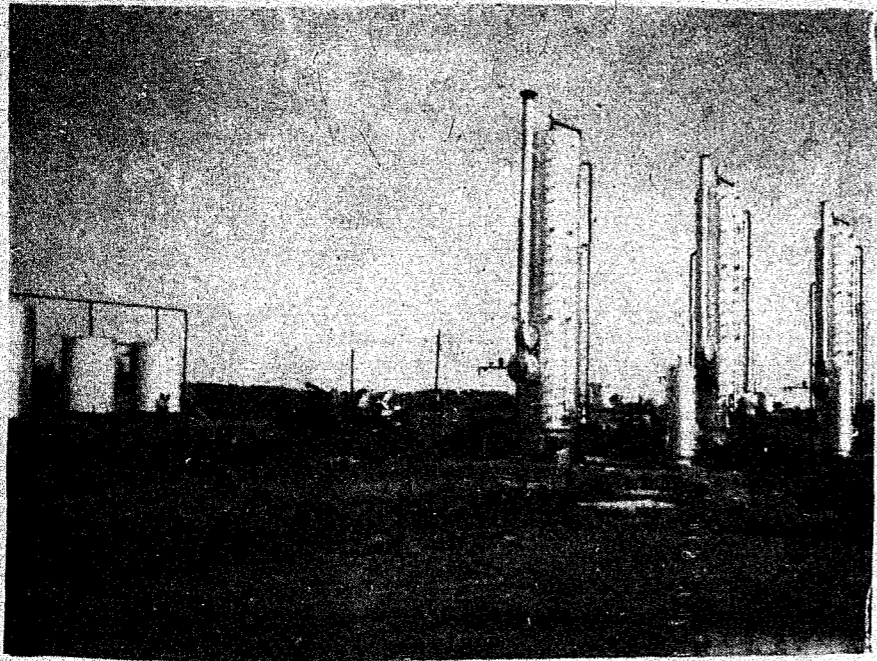
The next regular meeting of the City Council will be held Thursday, September 8, at which time Mr. Bradley will be sworn into office.

Green Thumb workers are paid minimum wage and work 20 to 24 hours per week.
