



This letter is addressed 'to the editor', but it is really to the rural 🖁 citizens of Santa Anna and the surrounding area. Monday evening I had the opportunity to meet with the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department. This was really an eye-opening, or I. might say a conscience-jabbing experience.

Our fire department needs some money! Last January they sent out about 800 letters asking for associate membership donations. They got a response 🖢 from about 275. So look around 🎖 🎍 your desk. You have a letter that 📍 needs to be answered. Even if you 🗸 🎍 did answer your letter as I did, 🝷 you probably need to answer it 'louder' as I do.

If the fire department bought gas to come to your fire with the donation that you gave them last January, how far out of town would they get? This doesn't even take 🖣 into consideration that they may ruin a tire or have other mechanical problems.

The volunteer firemen donate many hours of hard work each year. The least we can do is support them with our cash donations and support their fundraising projects.

Last week, the fire department made eight calls, and the gas bill alone will be at least \$60. So help them out, if you failed to answer your letter or if you only made a token donation last January, consider how much they would be worth to you if you needed their services.

The rural citizens pay no taxes 💂 to support the fire department. If each person could donate at least 🝷 they operate, it would be a great help. Think about it. Then do something about it. They need more money now!

Oil Industry Aids **Area Economy**

Coleman was one of 200 Texas counties last year which produced crude oil and natural gas with a marketed value of \$100,000 or more, the same number as in 1975.

The county ranked 140th in the total estimated value of petroleum produced, realizing \$5.2 million from the sale of 643,394 barrels of crude oil; \$4 million from the sale of 5.2 million Mcf of natural gas. Payments last year to owners of royalty in the county totaled \$1.2 million

In addition to the payment of local school and county property taxes, producers in the county also contributed to the support of state government.

The search for additional petrolem contimued in Coleman Count in 1976, with oil and gas developers spending an estimated \$9 million in the drilling of 162 wells, including 26 classified as wildcats. Some \$2.9 million of that amount was lost in 75 dry holes. The 87 strikes included 56 oil wells and 31 gas wells.

More Wells Completed, Staked in S-Anna Area

Three wells have been completed in Coleman County recently in the Regular Field.

Tom C. Berry has completed the No. 2-A W. H. Lawrence, one mile south of Santa Anna.

A total depth of 1,851 feet, the well potentialed an absolute open flow of 1,527,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily through perforations at 1,843-47.

Location is in William Doran Survey 666.

Reserve Oil Inc. has completed No. 11 Brewer in the Santa Anna East (Marble Falls) Field five miles northeast of Santa Anna.

The well prorated 35 barrels of 29.8 gravity oil and 33 barrels of water on a 24-hour test. Total depth was 2,538 feet with plugback at 2,488 feet and top of the pay at 2,306 feet.

'77 Licenses Available On September 1

AUSTIN--New hunting and fishing licenses will be mailed to sales deputies August 19.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department license sales officials say 1.7 million licenses will be mailed at that time, about 70 percent of the total to be distributed about the state during the coming year.

Major licenses to be mailed include resident combination hunting and fishing, \$8.75; resident hunting, \$5.25; resident exempt hunting, \$1.25; and resident fishing \$4.50.

The resident fishing license is up 25 cents from last year. It will not go on sale until September 1 at which time it will be valid until Aug. 31, 1978. One change of significance on hunting licenses of all varities this year is in the three tags used for turkeys.

Two will be valid only for turkeys killed during regular fall seasons—October, November, December and January. The third tag is to be used in those counties with a spring turkey season. Reverse side of the spring tag will have only the month of April.

There is currently no license sales station in Santa Anna, but they are available at several locations in Coleman.


