## Mountaineers Win 27-18 Over Rising Star 'Cats

Santa Anna High School football team pulled off a Class B up. Friday night when they rolled past the Rising Star Wildcats, the seventh-ranked team in the state. The Mountaineers won by a score of 27-18.

Rising Star scored first but the extra point was missed. Santa Anna got on the board in two minutes on a 16-yard run by Mike Warnock, and Freddy Fellers kicked the PAT. Terry Day made the next TD with a 15-yard run and Fellers again brought an extra point. During the second quarter Rising Star got on the board again but failed to make the extra point. Warnock scored his second TD of the game before halftime and Fellers made his third conversion leaving the score 21-12 at halftime.

Mike's little brother Dwayne Warnock joined the scoring ranks in the third quarter on a 19-yard scamper. The extra point failed.

Rising Star took their final touchdown in the fourth quarter to end with the 27-18 score.

Santa Anna had a total of 255 yards rushing to Rising Star's 112. However the Wildcats led in passing yardage 110 to Santa Anna's 30. The Mounties capitalized on the interceptions, taking three from the Wildcats.

Mike Warnock was named 'Player of the Week' by Abilene Reporter News sports writers for his two touchdowns and 165 yards offense. He also had the key block for Day's TD. Dwayne Warnock had one TD and 55 yards offense.

## Water System Loan, Grant Approved

### Bond Election Next Step For Approval

Official confirmation arrived Monday that the Farmers Home Administration loan and grant for Santa Anna's proposed new water system has been approved. The loan is for \$977,000 and the grant is for \$949,000.

The loan commitment is being made under special funding for rural communities eligible for assistance because of emergency drought conditions.

A Friday announcement from Senator Lloyd Benson was a firm commitment for the loan with the grant funds to be made firm

sometime this month.

City Secretary Mary Lou Jones stated Tuesday that the City Attorney is preparing papers for a bond election to be presented voters, and that is the next step in the proposed plans to supply the City of Santa Anna with adequate water.

Elmer Pritchard of Brownwood (Class of 1927) will be honored as Ex-Student of the Year. A short

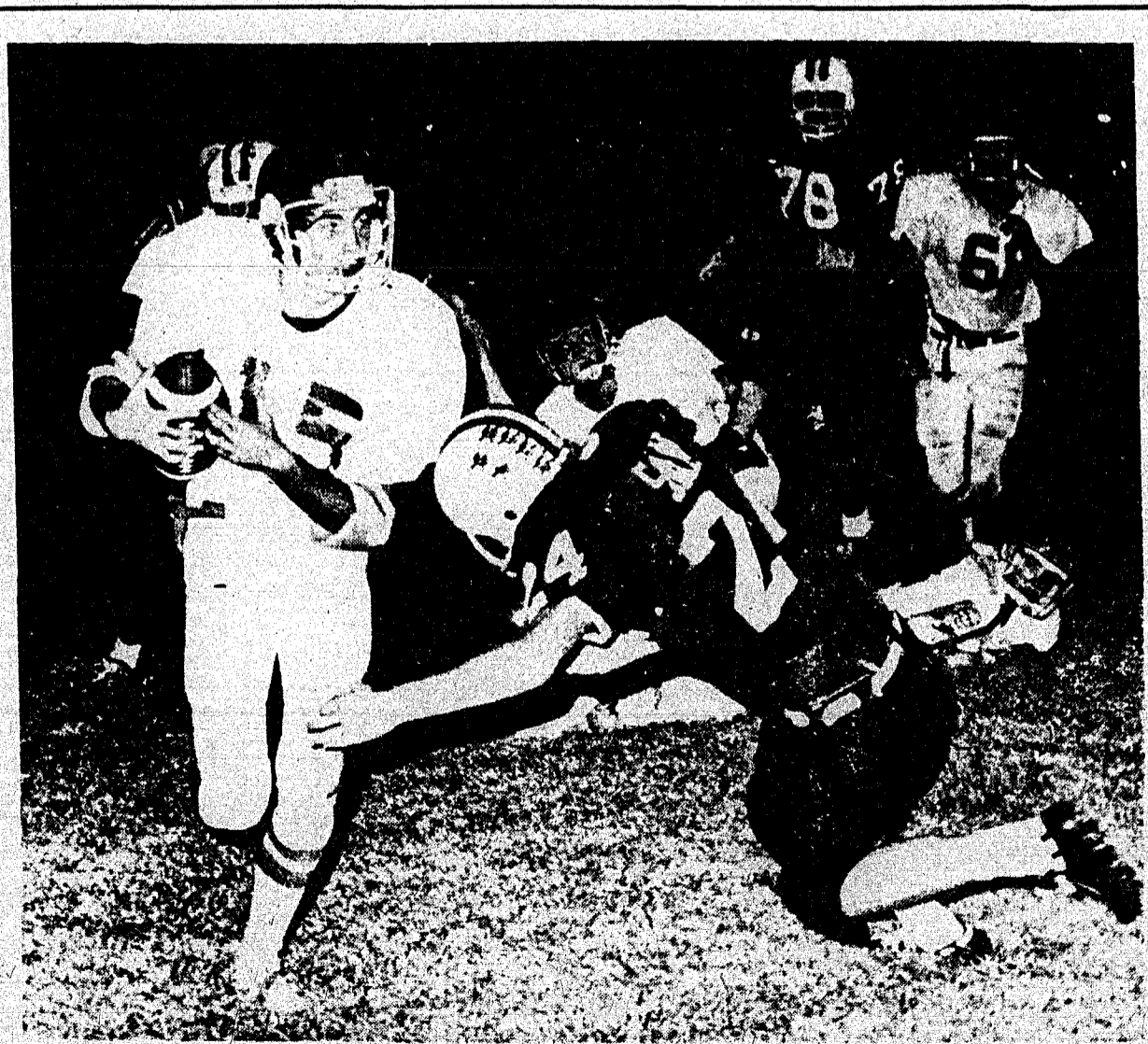
program, business session and memorial service will conclude the meeting. Officers for the next two years will be elected.

Thomas F. Wallis was director of the band at its organization, having been a teacher in the school system from 1936 through 1939.

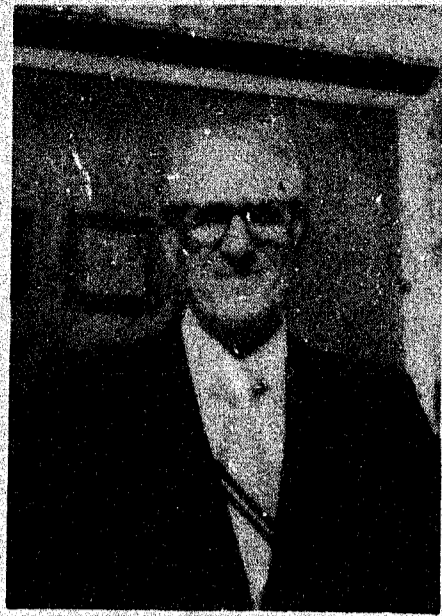
Mr. Wallis, now of Bryan, will be coming to Santa Anna next week for the homecoming and reunion.

## SDA Educator Guest Speaker At S.A. Church

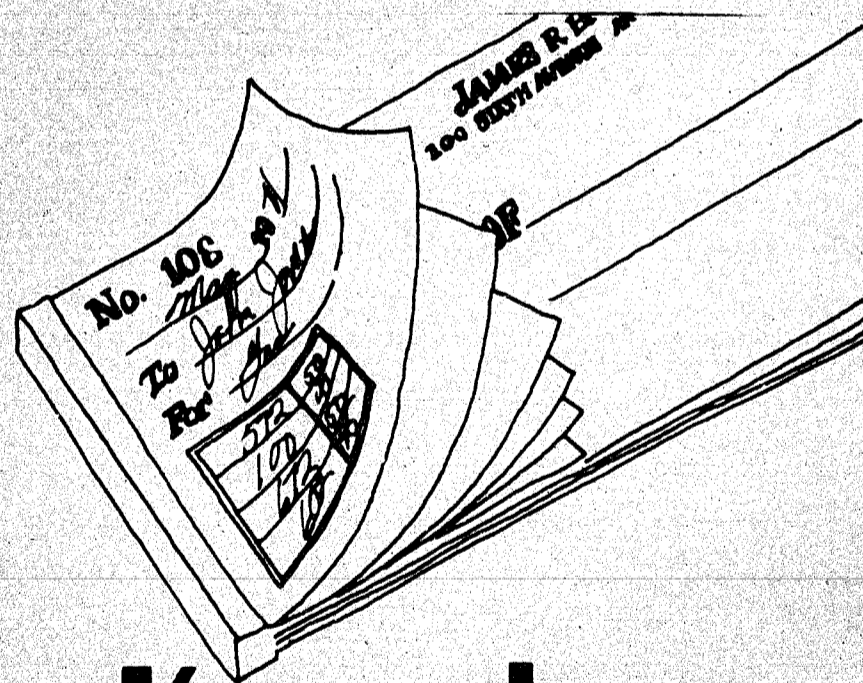

### School Kids Should Avoid Box Tampering

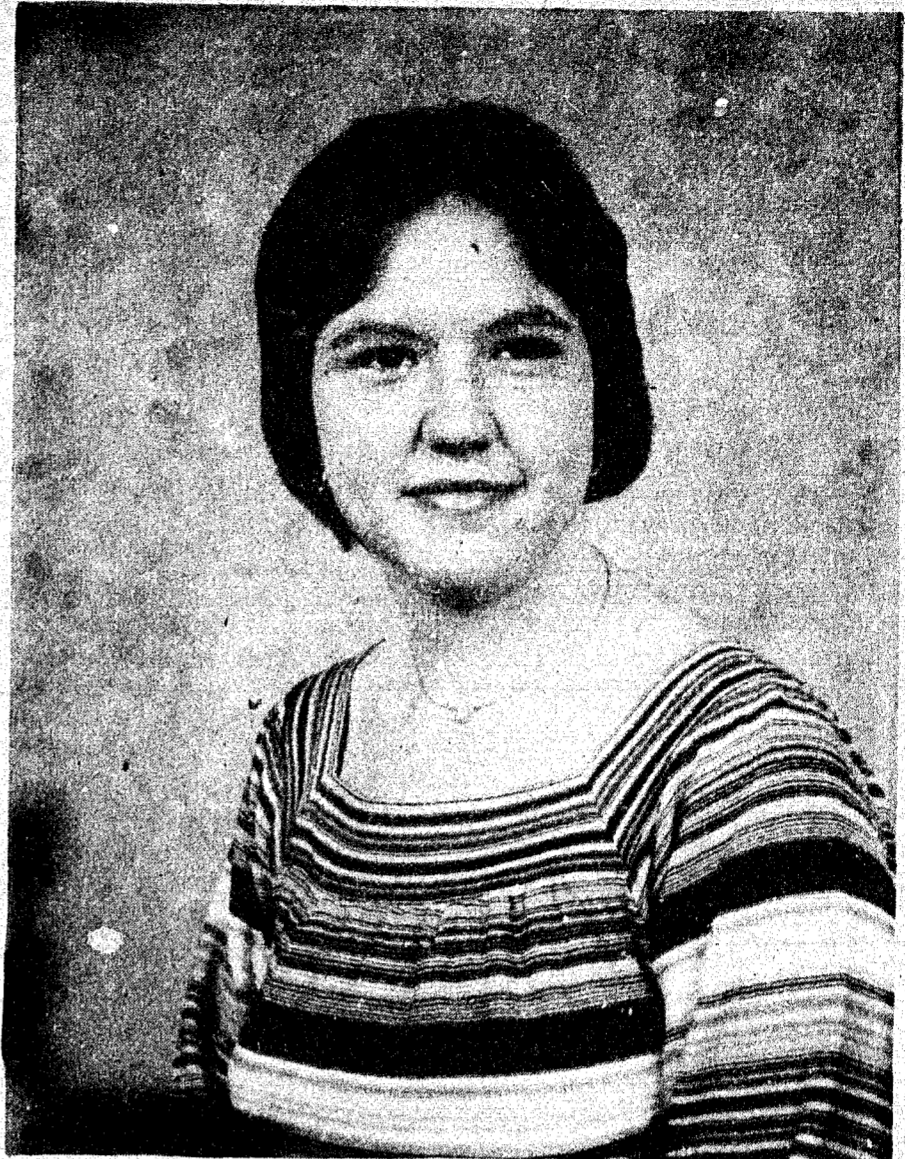

## Seat Belts Save Lives

The results of a comprehensive study by accident investigation teams showed that lap belts are 31 percent effective and lap-shoulder belts are 57 percent effective.

This means that if you are involved in a crash while wearing a lap-shoulder belt, you are 57 percent less likely to be killed or injured than if you are not wearing any safety belt. Seat belts keep you inside the car. Your chances of being killed are 25 times greater if you are thrown out of the car during a crash.

Besides reducing the severity of injuries and the number of deaths, seat belts often keep minor accidents from becoming major accidents and sometimes even prevent accidents. Without a seat belt, a minor collision, a sudden swerve, or a fast turn could cause you to slide across the seat away from the controls. Seat belts hold you in place behind the steering wheel so you can maintain control of the car.

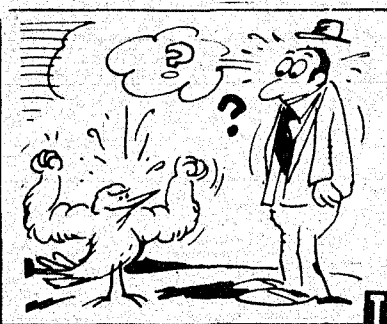
The Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service now has a new phone number-- It is now 625-4639. You should change the number in your phone book accordingly as listed under United States Government Offices for the Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation County Committee. The phone number for the Farmers Home Administration and Soil Conservation Service still remains 625-2108.

I know that many producers in the county are ready to sow wheat - and as of this writing the President has not signed the 1977 Food and Agriculture Act, which will affect the years 1978 thru 1981. The tentative provisions of the program does require a 20 percent set-aside provision on acreage which is planted for harvest in 1978. For example, if 100.0 is planted, then where would be 20.0 acres more required for use as set-aside-- or a total of 120.0 acres being used under the wheat provisions. There are also provisions which will limit total plantings of the "Crop Base" to the total planted in 1977.

At the present time, there is no provision for the set-aside to be used for grazing purposes. I will be getting news to all producers as soon as it is available concerning the new program.

Preparations are being made to make deficiency payments to wheat producers on the 1977 wheat crop. This payment will be made due to the low price paid to producers for 1977 wheat. Cards are being mailed to all producers who had wheat allotments in 1977. Producers who receive the cards should come to the county office as soon as possible. Payments will be made beginning after November 1, 1977.

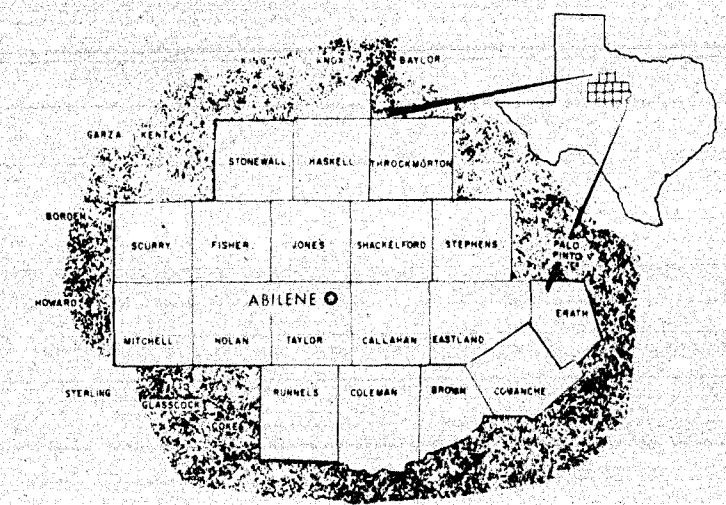

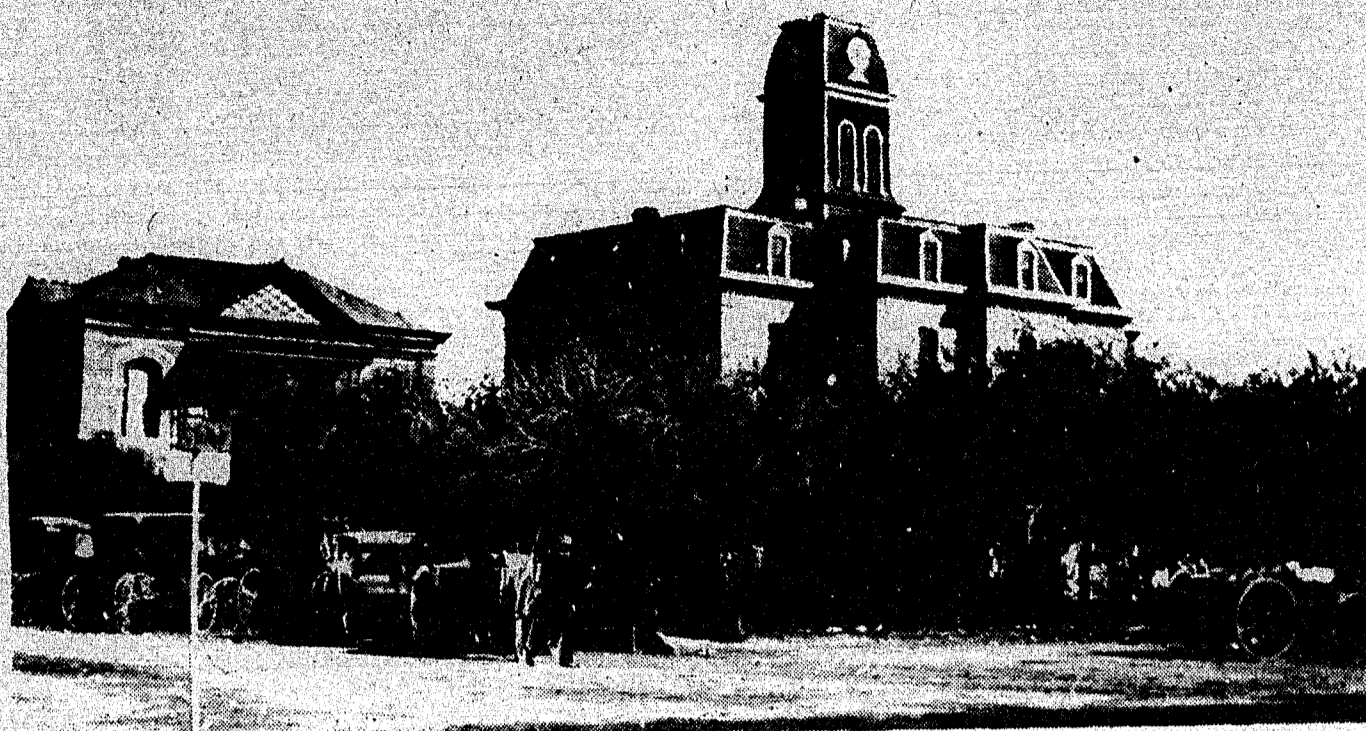

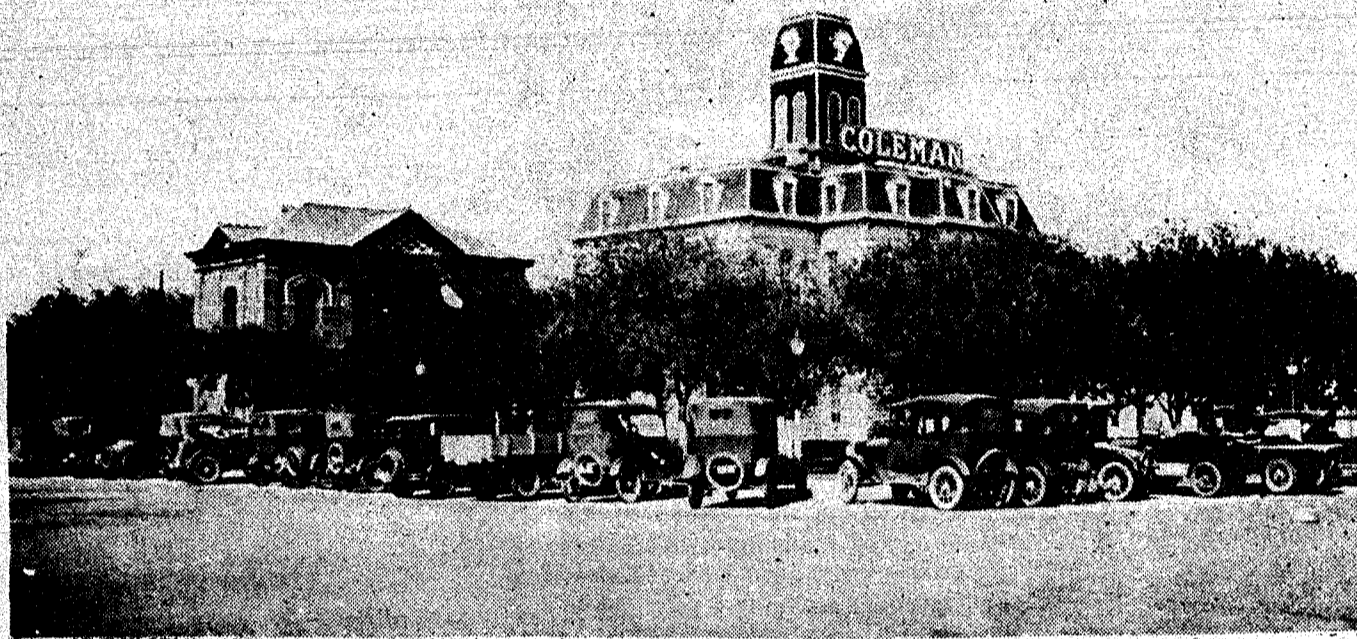

## Marvin Leath Announces Candidacy for Congress

A good crowd welcomed Marvin Leath, a Marlin businessman, who announced his candidacy for Congressman for the 11th district at the Brownwood Coliseum Thursday afternoon.

He seeks the seat held for the past 42 years by W. R. "Bob" Poage who has been representing Brown County in recent years.

"I intend to win this election through hard work and attention to the people," Leath said. "I think the people want a man with mature judgment who will work with all people, all groups, and all economic levels."

## Recruiting Underway For DPS Troopers

Capt. Hugh Shaw, Acting Regional Commander of the Capt. Hugh Shaw, Acting Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety's 49 County West Texas Region, announced today that an intensive effort is being made to recruit men and women for a Law Enforcement Training Class to begin at the Department's Academy in Austin on December 6, 1977.

Capt. Shaw said the Department has been successful in recruiting persons from minority groups to the position of Trooper. Efforts to recruit from these groups are continuing for this school.

All persons making application for the position of Trooper must be between 20 and 35 years of age, weight proportionate to height, and visual acuity no worse than 20-40 correctable to 20-20. A person must be of good moral character, excellent physical condition, and must have a minimum of 60 semester hours of college credit.

Persons selected as recruits will be assigned to Austin for an 18-week training school beginning December 6, 1977. Successful graduates will be assigned to either the Highway Patrol Service, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, or the Driver License Service, according to the needs of the DPS and consideration of personal preference.

The salary during training will be \$848.00 per month. Room and board while at the Academy will be approximately \$60.00 per month.

Recruits must furnish their own uniforms while in training which consist of khaki shirts and pants, black shoes, belt and tie. When commissioned as a Trooper, uniforms, vehicles, weapons, ammunition, and related equipment are furnished, plus other benefits.

Capt. Shaw said interested men and women in this area should contact either the Abilene or San Angelo DPS office for an application. After completing the application, it should be presented to that DPS office for the examinations.

Capt. Shaw urged persons interested in attending the December 6th school to contact the Department immediately.

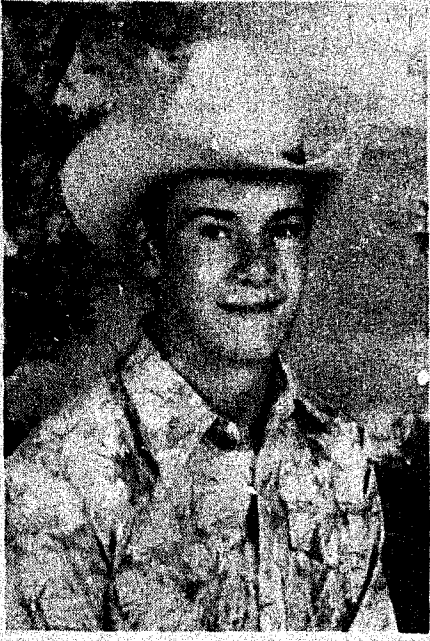
