

LINWOOD BISHOP **New Minister Here**

New Minister To Serve In **Local Church**

Linwood E. Bishop has been named minister of Northside Church of Christ and will begin his ministry here Sunday, October 23.

Mr. Bishop replaces Bob Wille who resigned the local church position last summer after a oneyear ministry here.

Bishop is a native of Brown County and attended schools at Golden, Lone Pine, Rising Star and received his degree from Abilene Chrisitan University with the class of 1935. He began preaching in 1931 while a studnent at ACU, and has devoted his life to evangelism and the ministry.

Mr. Bishop has preached and lectured from coast to coast, and served as instructor at The College of World Evangelism in San Francisco, California, a college-level preacher - teacher training school conducted by the Downtown Church of Christ.

Mr. Bishop and his wife, the former Lillie M. Price of Cross Plains, are parents of two sons, Kenneth Bishop of California and Linwood Jr. of Houston, and a daughter, Mrs. Jimmie Hobbs of Chicago. They also have six grandchildren.

The Bishops will move to Santa Anna next Monday, October 17, from Knox City where he has been minister of the Church of Christ.

Retired Highway Engineer To Be Honored Saturday

Elmer M. Pritchard will be honored Saturday, October 15, as Santa Anna 'Ex-Student of the Year.' He will be presented at the 10:30 a.m. business meeting and be recognized as one of the members of the Class of 1926.

Mr. Pritchard was the second son and fourth child of Marion A. and Elizabeth C. Pritchard, born November 18, 1908 at the farm home three miles west of Santa Anna. In later years seven other children (all girls) were born to the family, making a total of nine girls and two boys. Elmer and eight of his sisters now survive.

Elmer Pritchard received his public school education at Santa Anna, Liberty, Plainview and Buffalo, graduating from Santa Anna High School in 1927. He entered John Tarleton Agricultural College (now Tarteton State University) in the fall of 1928 to prepare for a career in civil engineering. He was encouraged to pursue a college education by his high school agriculture teacher, but he admits he was motivated by his dislake for hoeing cotton and Johnson grass and picking cotton!

He completed the two years of civil engineering offered at Tarleton in May 1930, and due to the scarcity of jobs at the time he migrated to Climax, Colorado and began work with the Climax Molydbenum Company as a laborer in July 1930. He remained with the company engaged in hard rock mining as a laborer, skilled laborer and gang boss until April

In the meantime Pritchard had married his Tarleton College sweetheart, Mary Elizabeth Warren of Brownwood.

Elmer and Mary moved from Colorado to Bryan in the spring of 1934, and Elmer resumed his studies at Texas A&M. He graduated from A&M in May 1936 with a B. S. degree in civil engineering, and moved to Brownwood where he began work with the Texas Highway Department.

He began his career with THD as an office assistant and worked his way to the position of District Engineer in 1960. He retired in 1974 from the post. He spent the years in the Central Texas area. working for THD except two years with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers at Camp Bowie during World War II.

During Pritchard's 37 years with the THD, he saw his ninecounty District Highway System grow from a few hundred miles of paved roads to 2491 miles, 1073 miles of U.S. and State numbered highways, and 1418 miles of Farm-to Market roads.

Mr. and Mrs. Pritchard have two children -- one son, Allan N. Pritchard, Resident Engineer for THD at Huntsville, and one daughter, Mrs. R. P. (Marilyn) Wells of Anchorage, Alaska, They also have two grandsons and two granddaughters.

Bronte lost to the Mounties last year 20 - 6.



SDA Leaders To Meet In Washington







This photo was made during the 1906-07 school year and apparently included the entire student body of the four-square-mile Santa Anna School District who were present on that winter day. The original print is of excellent quality and individual students can be readily identified with a magnifying glass. Mrs. Beulah (Parker) Sparkman, a member of the graduating class that year, is shown standing at the apex of the building corner near the center. It is likely many others could be identified by

themselves or their friends or relatives still in the area. Who is the young scamp, first row, lower left, who thumbed his nose at the photographer?

The building shown was remodeled and expanded to continue in use as the elementary school until the late 1940s. The hip-roofed house, right background, is still in use. Branches of a live oak tree on right edge of photo are on a tree still thriving at the present site of the Community Civic Center.


