How grateful we are for the rain that fell Friday night. Although we could use more, every bit helps! Santa Anna had an official 1.18 inches, and parts of the community measured up to two inches during the night.

The rain was accompanied by an electrical storm that left a few casualties. Two black-bald-faced cows belonging to Mike Hosch met their fate Friday night when struck by lightning. The two were found near each other under some small oak trees at the Boggus place south of Santa Anna, each with a small burned area that indicated the cause of their death. Just a mile or so away on the Virgil Newman place, an oil storage tank was struck by lightning and the oil burned, lighting the rainy night in our neighborhood. No report of damage was given, but the tank and surrounding equipment were intact when the blaze was extinguished the next morning.

Daylight Savings Time ends early Sunday morning. A few churches have an automatic time change for their evening services during the winter months, but the Santa Anna schools will continue at the same starting time as before.

## Water Hauling Stopped For Industrial Usage

The dwindling supply of water in the Santa Anna City lakes has caused the halt of water hauling for industrial usage from the city supply. The water has been used mainly for oil drilling operations and roadwork, according to City Secretary Mary Lou Jones.

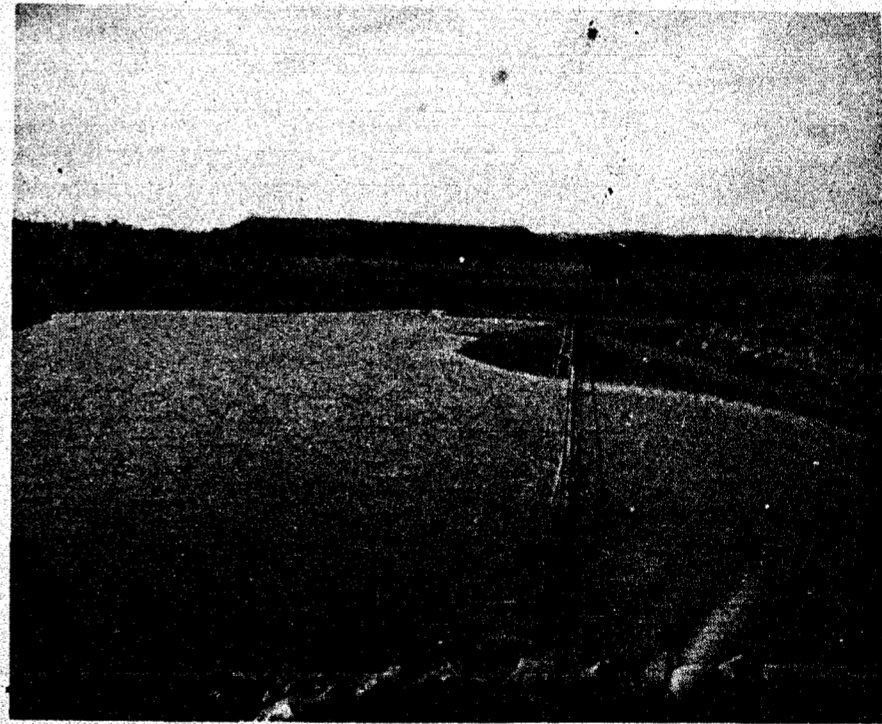
Water for household use in the community is still available and many rural families are having to depend on water hauled from the city supply because of the extended drought.

According to Mrs. Jones, one truck alone hauled 15 loads of

water during one week's time, enough water to supply approximately 15 families with water for one week.

Water in the city lakes is at a dangerously low level and being supplemented by water from the equally-low Jim Ned pump station above Lake Brownwood.

Plans for the major water improvement program for the City of Santa Anna are continuing with applications approved for a grant and loan to finance the nearly-two million dollar project.

## City Requests Extension Of Lake Brownwood Pipeline

Mayor Glen Copeland met Monday, October 10, with Brown County Water Improvement District directors to request an extension of the Santa Anna City pipeline at Lake Brownwood. The extension is part of the plans for the new water system for the town.

Santa Anna officials have asked to extend the city's pipeline from a point on the Jim Ned to a point on the lake east of Flat Rock where the water is deeper. The water district plans to study the request.

The reason for the request is that the quality of water obtainable at the present pump location is not good and the pipe line will not result in any increased use of water by Santa Anna, Levie Old, president of the district, said.

At the present pump location as a result of filtration and the sediment creating sand bars across the Jim Ned, the water supply is not considered dependable at times of low water at Lake Brownwood.

The proposed line would be the same size as the existing line

from the present pump location to Santa Anna and would not give any increased pumping capacity but would probably lower the pumping capacity and flow, for the line to Santa Anna, Old said.

The contract between the water district and Santa Anna provides that the district will sell Santa Anna only surplus water which is not needed in the Brownwood area. Any future agreements will also contain such provisions, the district president said.

Mark Combs, an eighth grade student at Hamlin Middle School, was recently elected class favorite.

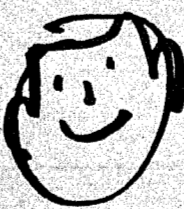

## Computer Audits WTU Production

Computer equipment known as Economic Dispatch Control has been installed by West Texas Utilities Co. and is now being used to automatically manage the company's electric energy production.

Generation units at the company's power plants are connected with the computer, and the desired output from each unit under various conditions is obtained in the most efficient manner.

The equipment is located in the System Operations Office in Abilene, and is operated under the direction of Carl Yancy, manager of system operations, and Jim Hoffman, dispatch supervisor.

The computer performs a variety of functions which previously were done manually.

One of the most important functions from the customer's standpoint is operating the system's generation units at the most economic level. WTU has eight major power plants and a total of 19 generation units.

The computer automatically adjusts generation to minimize total fuel consumption and aids in the interchange of power between WTU and other companies by allowing the dispatcher to evaluate the advisability of purchasing or selling power at any given time under any given set of circumstances.

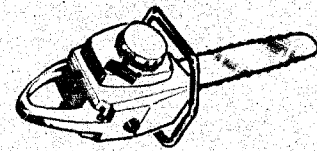

## Given Dr. Burgess Sealy Ft. Worth Medical Award

Dr. W. Burgess Sealy admits there are some big problems facing the medical profession. But, after more than 40 years in it, the surgeon said he would make the same choice for a career.

"When I was watching my father (the late Dr. T. Richard Sealy) I didn't see the problems. All I saw was him enjoying his practice, even though he did work all of the time," said Dr. Sealy.

Dr. Sealy hasn't been any stranger to work as a surgeon. Nor making contributions to his community. And, Wednesday night he was named winner of the Tarrant County Medical Society's Gold Headed Cane in ceremonies at Colonial Country Club.

The honor is given by TCMS members for "contributions to the profession, to his patients and

to the community..."

"This is the greatest thing that ever could happen to a man in my profession. I can't believe it," said Dr. Sealy. "If somebody would have asked me if I thought I had a chance to receive this, I am sure I would have said that I doubted it."

There was never any doubt about Dr. Sealy becoming a doctor. His father practiced in Santa Anna, a small town in Coleman County. Dr. Sealy made the rounds with him from the time he was old enough to walk.

"I remember going out with him at night. Opening the wire gates for him and talking to him. I saw the good he did. I liked my dad and I liked what he was doing. So there was never any doubt about me becoming a doctor," he said in an interview.

Dr. Sealy even helped his father when he began building a hospital

in the town.

"Yeah, I carried the brick and hod for part of the building," he said.

He has a painting of that building in his office. It was a three-storied, white structure, with large veranda porches. A surgical suite was on top so it so it could catch the sunlight.

Dr. Sealy taught anatomy for two years after his graduation from the University of Texas Medical School in Galveston. But one day one of the division heads called him and asked, 'Do you want to be a doctor or a teacher?' Dr. Sealy loved teaching. But he knew he wanted to be a doctor. So he began his internship at Philadelphia General Hospital. It was there he decided to specialize in surgery.

He came to Fort Worth after serving in the Pacific during World War II. It was a conversation with Dr. Charles Harris that convinced him he should move here.

The changes in the profession during the time he has been in it, still amaze him.

'Back then you couldn't open a chest or the patient would die. Abscesses on the lung -- you had to wait until it was walled off and then go in and try to drain it. And, the antibiotics today, they are amazing. If you had told my father about these advancements that were coming, he would have never believed you', said Dr. Sealy.

'When I first started, at least ten percent of the patients who had surgery developed pneumonia. It was an accepted procedure. Just part of the risk. And there was a high incidence of pulmonary infarcts (blood clots of the lung). We don't have these problems today,' he said.

But there are other problems.

'The big problem is the suit minded individual. They make you have to practice defensive medicine. You know I told somebody the other day that if a person gets struck by lightning they would sue if they could subpoena Jesus Christ. There is no such thing as an act of God any more,' he said.

He doesn't understand it.

'My father worked day and night like a dog. There was complete trust in him by his patients, and he had complete trust in them,' he said.

But, Dr. Sealy said we are living in a suit-minded environment today. It has taken some of the satisfaction out of the medical practice. But, not all of it. For Dr. Sealy said he still gets a thrill from doing a successful surgery. And, it's gotten harder for him to accept defeat.

'It gets harder and more trying. You've established a record and you don't want to lose any. You get to where you dread it even more. It just tears you up,' he said.

But, because of medical advancements, Dr. Sealy said there are less of those moments. Nurses help that success rate too.

As result of his belief in the importance of nurses, he has spent many hours working with TCU's Harris College of Nursing. Today, he's chairman of the board.

'That goes back to my dad. He often told me, 'You can't practice medicine without nurses.' And that is true. A doctor can't and shouldn't hog all of the glory. The nurses deserve a part of it,' he said.

Dr. Sealy said his medical practice is governed by a creed that hangs on his office

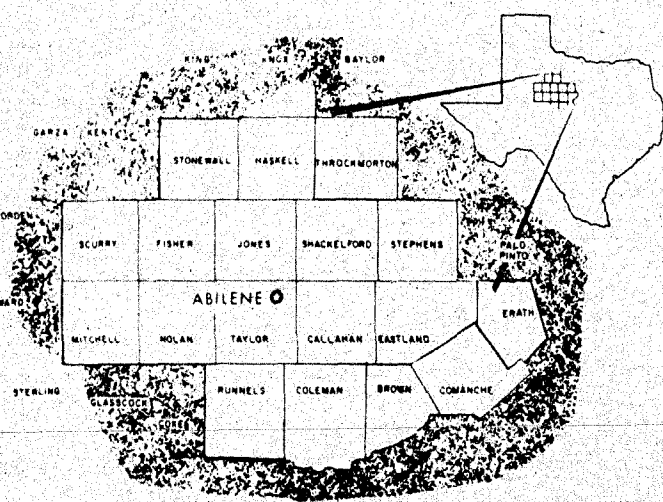

Dr. Sealy and his brother did an unusual thing after their father's death.

'We tore up over \$100,000 in notes of debts to my father for his work. That was the way he wanted it,' he said.

But, for nearly 12 years, Dr. Sealy's mother would receive \$10 or \$20 checks in the mail. They would have small notes attached, saying 'This is on our bill. Dr. Sealy was a marvelous man.'

It is things like that that keep Dr. Sealy in the business.

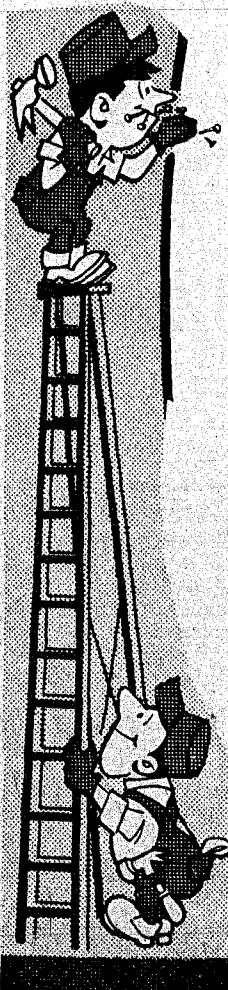

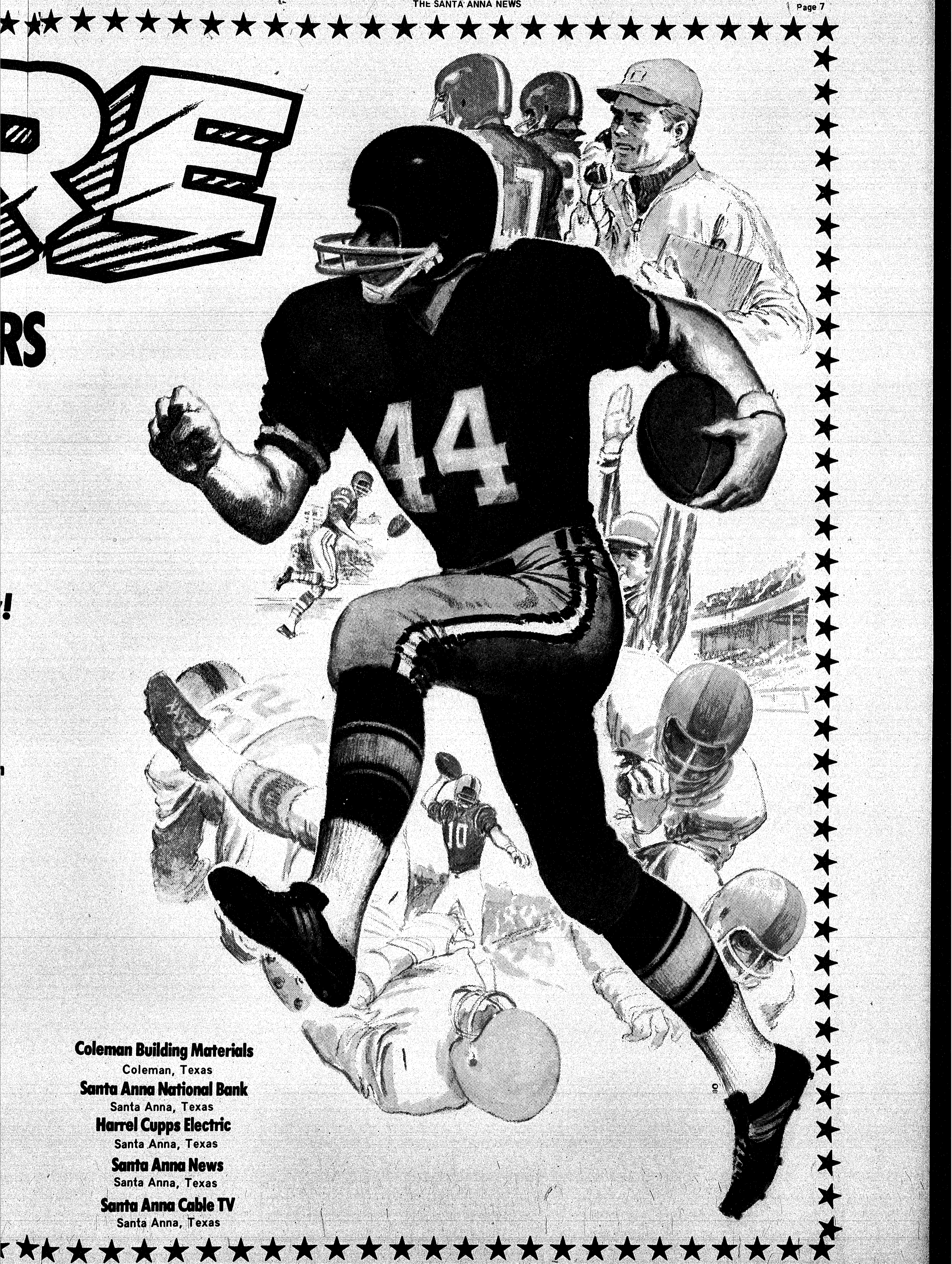

## Doe Permits To Be Issued On Wednesday

Landowners in Coleman County may pick up antlerless deer permits Wednesday, November 2, at the Sheriff's office in Coleman, according to officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Failure to pick up the permits on the designated day will result in the landowner having to apply to the San Angelo office of TP&WD at a subsequent date.

Landowners should pick up the permits in person or may authorize someone in writing to act as their agent. Permits will be issued on a per acre basis, and a landowner must control at least the minimum number of acres, as determined by P&WD surveys, in order to receive a permit.

Less than one-half of Coleman County has been approved for the antlerless deer permits. The area is bounded on the south by Highway 84 (Brown County Line to Coleman -Novice) and a small area that includes the southeast portion of the county from the Brady Highway to Rockwood to Whon and Trickham. Permits range from 89-acre units in far northwest Coleman County to 175-acre units in the Rockwood-Whon-Trickham area.
