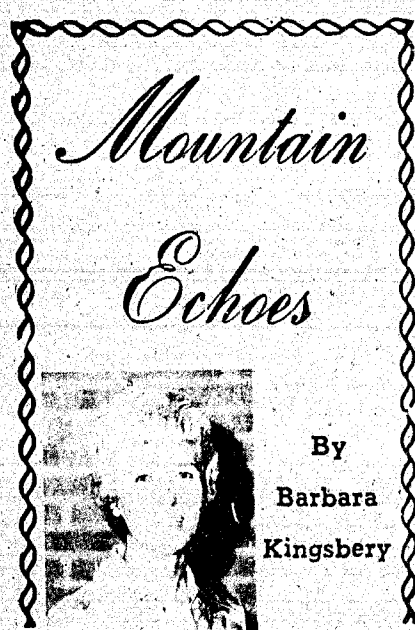

Just last Wednesday when temperatures rose to the 60s, she found -- and killed -- a three-foot-long rattler on her back patio. The large snake had apparently crawled into the sunshine to warm himself, and it put up quite a battle, Mrs. Haynes reported.

## Track Meet Slated Here

### High School Events Friday; JHS Competition Saturday

Track teams, coaches, parents and other track fans from the central Texas area will converge on Santa Anna this weekend for the annual Santa Anna Track Meet slated Friday and Saturday at Mountaineer Stadium. High school teams will compete on Friday, and the junior high events will take place Saturday.

R. C. Smith will serve as meet director, assisted by Coach Anthony Strother. Others working with the events will be Bruce Smith, lanes and heats; Barry Miles, clerk of the course and girls long and triple jump; Montie Guthrie, shot put; Scott Beaver and Ben Hill, pole vault; Becky Martin, boys long jump; Roland Nicholas and Roddy Dean, discus; and Pat Rutherford, high jump.

Floyd Marshall of Melvin will be starter for the meet; Judy Hartman and Janice Cozart will be scorers and bookkeepers. June Malaer is in charge of the concession stand, and Lois Ann Harper is chairman of the

admission committee.

The meet will begin both days at 10 a.m. with the field events. Track preliminaries will start at 11:30 a.m., and finals will be held at 6 p.m. Admission will be \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students for the entire day.

The Santa Anna meet is popular with the area schools and will have this year 20 or more teams in each of the divisions. Schools with boys and girls teams in both the high school and junior high divisions are Talpa-Centennial, Eden, Novice, Early, Abilene Christian, Irion County, Cross Plains, Lohn, Blanket, Rochelle, Water Valley, Miles, Mozelle, Paint Rock and Santa Anna.

High school teams will also be here from Highland, Throckmorton, Woodson and Gorman. JHS teams will also include Rochester, Brookesmith,

Mason and the boys team from San Angelo Boys Ranch.

Local track fans are invited to attend any or all of the local events Friday and Saturday. It will be the first meet and competition for the local track teams.

Mr. Neff is a Santa Anna native and a rancher. He and his wife, Janet, a teacher in the Santa Anna Elementary School, are parents of a daughter, Kyra, aged two. Neff is a graduate of SAHS and Texas A&M University.

Mrs. Early, wife of Allyn Early, is a Santa Anna native and mother of two school students, Joe Dean, a high school student, and Stacy, an elementary student.

Mr. Anderson is a graduate of Santa Anna High School and employed at 3M Co. and has farming and ranching interests. He and his wife are parents of three children, all in elementary school.

The School Board election will be held Saturday, April 1, with the two candidates polling the largest number of votes to be chosen for the Board.

Choir practice will be held at 7 p.m. prior to the Board meeting.

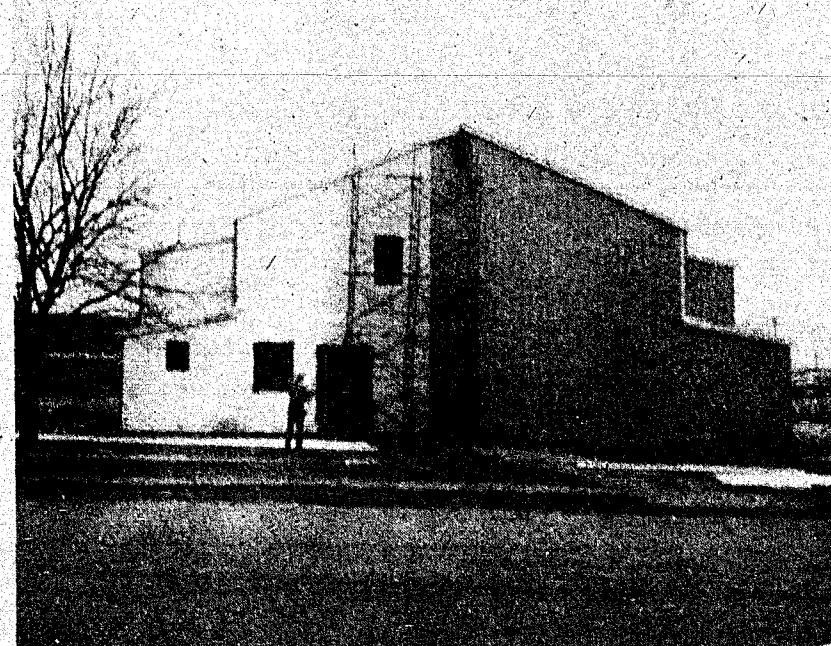
## No More Candidates For City Council

## Funeral Held February 18 For Retired S-Anna Teacher

Funeral services were held Saturday, February 18, at First Baptist Church for Mrs. William Burl (Beulah) Sparkman, 88, of Santa Anna, a retired Santa Anna teacher who died Thursday, February 16, in the Coleman hospital after a long illness.

Rev. W. M. Price, pastor, officiated at the services, with interment in Coleman City Cemetery under direction of Henderson Funeral Home.

Mrs. Sparkman was born in Frosa, Limestone County, the daughter of the late Z. A. and Nancy (Pearce) Parker. She came to Santa Anna with her family in 1896.

She married William Burl Sparkman in the Loss Creek Community in August 1910. He died in 1967.

Mrs. Sparkman was a graduate of Santa Anna High School with the class of 1907. She was a graduate

of Howard Payne College and held a master's degree from North Texas State University. She was a retired teacher, teaching 35 years, with the last 20 years being in the Santa Anna schools. She retired in 1962.

She was a member of First Baptist Church, the Self Culture Club and Brownwood Knife and Fork Club.

Survivors are three sons, Wendell B. Sparkman of Houston, Jesse L. Sparkman of Santa Anna, and John R. Sparkman of Mineral Wells; a sister, Mrs. L. E. (Pearl) Abernathy of Santa Anna; one brother, John Lee Parker of Garden City; nine grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

R. L. (Tucker) Newman, 84, died suddenly Friday, February 24, in the Coleman hospital after a short illness. Funeral services for the Santa Anna native were held at Coleman First Baptist Church Sunday, February 26, with Rev. Bill Merritt, pastor of Denver City First Baptist Church, and Rev. Gary Boyd, Coleman First Baptist Church, officiating.

### BUDGET HEARING ON GENERAL REVENUE SHARING

The City of Santa Anna will hold a public hearing at 10 a.m. Monday, March 13, at City Hall in Santa Anna, Texas for the purpose of hearing written and oral comment from the public concerning the proposed annual budget for fiscal year 1978 and the use of revenue sharing funds as contained in that proposed budget, summarized below.

General revenue sharing (GRS) is a program of general fiscal support from the federal government to state and local governments with only limited federal requirements about how the money should be spent. Decisions on the use of these funds are made at the local level, by the government and people closest to local problems. The revenue sharing regulations require a hearing on the proposed use of these funds in relation to the overall budget before the budget is adopted each year.

All interested citizens, groups, senior citizens and organizations representing the interests of senior citizens are encouraged to attend and to submit comments.

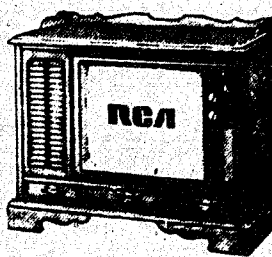
