Three Apply For Ballot Of **City Election**

Three candidates have applied for places on the April 1 City Council ballot.

Bills and accounts for the month totaled \$7,888.00 with major expenditures being utilities, \$1,866; vehicle insurance, \$1,659; and auditorium carpet, \$1,570.

The board approved the purchase of two new school buses, one large vehicle and one small one. Delivery date was not estimated. The group also approved the purchase of a floor scrubber-polisher for the school buildings.

Routine budget amendments were made, and the pay scale for cafeteria employees was -adjusted.

Rose Bass was appointed election judge for the April 1 trustee election with Lillian Herndon and Ellen Richards to serve as clerks.

A professional growth policy for Santa Anna faculty members was adopted. The policy was endorsed by a large majority of the local teachers in a recent poll.

Teachers in the Santa Anna system holding bachelor degrees will be required to obtain an additional six hours college credit every three years . Those with masters degrees will be required to obtain an additional three hours credit every five

The additional work is to be in education or courses related to the present teaching assignment or for possible future teaching assignments. Credit may also be received by attending workshops totaling 45 hours and approved by the administration. Also persons assigned to school committees requiring a great amount of time and study may receive credit.

School board approval was given for improvement of the two tennis courts at high school. The border around the courts will be surfaced and a finish added to the courts.

The closing item on the lengthy agenda included the extending of contracts of coaches Bruce Smith and Barry Miles for an additional year. Head coach Anthony Strother has an additional year on his present contract.

Contracts of High School Principal Ken Bowker and Elementary Principal Ruth Dodson were extended for the 1978-79 year.

Mining Permit Filed For Rockwood Area

The first application for a permit to surface mine bituminous coal in Texas was filed recently with the Railroad Commission in Austin.

The proposed mining area is just southwest of Rockwood in south Coleman County. Plans for the project are posted at the Rockwood Post Office.

Amistad Fuel Company of San Antonio, a subsidiary of Kaiser Cement & Gypsum Corp. of Oakland, Calif., has asked to conduct a mining operation on 1,100 acres in Coleman County, with indication that mining

operations are expected to last from 10 to 20 years.

Amistad advised the commission that the coal would be used as fuel for manufacturing operations of Longhorn Cement Co. of San Antonio, also a subsidiary of Kaiser. The application lists Zeus Corp. of San Saba as the proposed mine operator.

Several weeks ago a notice of public hearing by the Protection Environmental Agency was issued concerning the Rockwood mining operation.

Population In Coleman Co. Shows Increase

After losing population on a steady basis for several decades, the recent estimate released by , the Census Bureau in Washington shows what may be a reverse for Coleman County and the area.

According to the report, Coleman County gained 200 in population from 1975 to 1976 and showed a slight gain of one-half of one percent from 1970 to 1976.

The estimate for 1976 was 10,300; the figure for the previous year was 10,100.

Adjoining counties also showing an increase in population are Runnels, Callahan, Brown and Taylor. McCulloch County had a decrease of 300 during the oneyear period and 3.8 percent for the five-year period.

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

Editorial Tells Of Problems With Animal Bites

(The following editorial is reprinted upon request. It is from a recent issue of a Fredricksburg newspaper).

A family St. Bernard crushes the skull of a 4-year-old boy in New Mexico. A 17-year-old Ohio girl is killed by a usually friendly Great Dane. Every year between 136,000 and 246,000 people in Texas participate in other episodes of this real-life variation of 'Jaws.'

Estimates of bite victims differ so widely because many attacks go unreported. But studies agree that most victims of reported bites are males less than 20 years of age who are attacked by unsupervised dogs, the main villians, an article in a recent issue of TEXAS MEDICINE, the Texas Medical Association monthly journal, says.

The same article also points out that cats are a real problem. Cats account for only 12 percent of the bites reported in Texas but their bites became infected almost three times as often as dog bites.

A study done in Alpine, Marfa and Van Horn shows that almost half the victims bitten were attacked by animals owned by other people. Animals owned by victims or their families account for another 36 percent of the reported bites. An owner could not be identified for only 15 percent of the biting animals.

However, many owned dogs run unsupervised in packs that can attack and kill people and livestock. Packs plague livestock in outlying areas of some cities. But urban residents are not safe either. For instance, a pack of seven neighborhood dogs killed a 5-vear-old Nevada boy.

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Barely half the dogs and cats in the three towns surveyed were confined to the owner's property, reported Evret C. Newman, DVM, the article's author.

Animal bites can be reduced only if progress is made on several fronts, says Dr. Newman, a state health department veterinarian in El Paso. He recommends encouraging owners to continuously confine pets, giving more funds for animal control agencies, and educating people how to behave around animals.

The need for more education does not mean that most victims provoke attacks. In fact most animal attacks are unprovoked, Dr. Newman says.

The state health department has developed several educational programs for groups ranging from adults to about age five. These programs, many designed for use in schools, cover subjects ranging from pet care to rabies. They also should help people spot potentially dangerous animal behavior patterns.

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F-Bureau History Related During Membership Week

County Farm Bureaus across Texas are involved in membership drives to give all farmers and ranchers an opportunity to join this largest of all general farm organizations, according to Charles Greenlee of Rockwood, membership drive chairman of the Coleman County Farm Bureau.

The local Farm Bureau has 1026 members and has shown an increase in members each year for five years. In Texas, there are 211 organized county Farm Bureaus with a total membership of 214,197 member families. Across the nation, in more than 2,800 county units in all states except Alaska, there are now almost 2.9 million families enrolled in Farm Bureau.

The first Farm Bureau began in 1911 in Broome County, New York, as a 'bureau' of the local chamber of Commerce -- hence the name Farm Bureau.

The first Farm Bureaus were organized among farmers primarily to help pay the salaries of the new county agents that were being hired to bring latest information from land-grant colleges.

By the time most states had local county Farm Bureaus, the leaders saw the need for organizing into state units and become more than educational in nature. It was a way of bringing together producers of various commodities and trying to find solutions to their common problems.

Thus, it was that Farm Bureau burst onto the national scene during the time of World Warl not as a protest organization, but as a vehicle for unifying producers of all commodities.

It was in this setting that state Farm Bureaus met in Chicago in 1919 to organize the American Farm Bureau Federation.

The state Farm Bureau founded in Texas in 1920 flourished for several years, and was instrumental in setting up numerous commodity marketing cooperatives. However, as the coops blossomed, the parent organization became less effective because the Farm Bureau began to depend upon fees from the co-ops , not dues from members, for its financing. The first Texas Farm Bureau officially ceased to exist in 1934 when dolegates met and dissolved the organization and re-organized it as the Texas Agricultural Association. Within two years, however, the TAA saw the need for

a voice in national affairs and rejoined the American Farm Bureau Federation. Its name was changed back to Texas Farm Bureau shortly thereafter.

The modern' Texas Farm Bureau did not really begin to grow until shortly after World War II. There were only 7,000 members in 1945. <u>By</u> 1950, membership had jumped to about 50,000 and to more than 100,000 in 1967. The state organization has shown an increase each year since 1952.

Increased legislative activity, particularly on the state level, along with establishment of economic service programs, helped push the membership upward in the years just after World War II. By the early 1950s, county units had been organized in almost all major agricultural counties in Texas. Membership reached 100,000 members by 1966 and almost doubled in the next ten years.
