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# Homer Goodgion Busy, Productive

(The following story is from the Tuesday, March 14, issue of Abilene Reporter News)

**SANTA ANNA** — Homer Goodgion, 88-year-old owner and sole operator of Goodgion Lumber Co. and one of the most well-known men in Santa Anna, has no plans for retirement.

'I'm not tired, and I'm not going anywhere. I just plan to keep on running my business and taking care of myself. I never have had to ask help from anyone. I wasn't on WPA during the depression, and I don't see any reason to quit working and depend on someone else now,' he said.

He draws a small Social Security check, the only thing he has ever accepted from the government, he said, and he feels he paid for his right to that.

'Everything I've ever made I made in the lumber business,' he said. 'I farmed for a good many years, but I never made anything farming; nobody does.' Goodgion sat in the office of his business, and remembered earlier times, the good and the bad, and talked about when he first started in the lumber business.

While he was talking, Lynn Burnett — who owns a filling station in town — came in just to visit a few minutes and check up on his friend. 'He went home with

his son in Clovis, N. M. a while back, just locked up the lumber yard and his house and left without telling anyone,' Burnett said. 'We had the whole town looking for him, including the police.'

'Yeah, they had the sheriff out looking for me,' Goodgion said with a laugh. 'No one was around when I decided to go home with Floyd, and I didn't bother to go tell anyone I was leaving,' he said. However, he admitted he had promised not to leave town again without notifying his friends.

'If younger men had half the ambition Mr. Goodgion has, this would be a far better town and a better world,' Burnett said. 'Too many men much younger than he is are too lazy to work. He's an inspiration to everyone in town and there's not a soul here that doesn't really care a lot for this man.'

The building and lumber yard are much larger than the one Goodgion built and opened in 1947 after adversity forced him to leave the farm when he was in his fifties. He moved to Santa Anna in 1945 and 'carpentered for a couple of years,' he said. 'And that's what got me interested in the lumber business.'

His father died when he was 10 years old, and Goodgion and his mother and most of the rest of his family moved to Coleman County

in 1907. They farmed near the Trickham community. He is still close to and sees his friends from that area. Trickham is the oldest community in Coleman County, he said. 'It's on the site of the old cattle trail which leads from South Texas to Kansas.'

The day after he arrived at Trickham he began chopping cotton, Goodgion said. 'I went to

school for about a month, but I didn't have respectable clothes to wear to school like the other boys, so I quit and went to grubbing.' He said once he and another boy grubbed stumps for a week and earned \$9 between them.

Life on the farm was hard, but all the children helped to support the family. 'We had plenty to eat because we raised our food,' he said. 'But there was no money for clothes.'

When I was older I went to the Stamps Singing School in Midlothian four winters,' Goodgion said. 'I chopped cotton every year to get the money to go to singing school.' Later he taught singing at Trickham, Lovehill and Crossroads, and he still sings.

Goodgion married Bessie Tarter June 17, 1916. They lived for a time on his mother's farm and later bought a farm of their own about a mile west of Trickham, where they lived until 1945 when they moved to Santa Anna. At Trickham, he and his family were active in the community Union Church, which included Methodists, Presbyterians and Baptists. He was song leader for the church, and all the children sang and his wife taught Sunday School.

All six Goodgion children finished grade school at Trickham and were graduated from Santa Anna High School. All but one attended college and three are college graduates.

His son, Hayden, was superintendent of schools at Denison and is now regional director of the Education Service Center for Region X at Richardson; Floyd has been principal of an elementary school at Clovis, N. M. for 14 years; Violetta Plaskett lives in Vallejo,

Calif. and is a draftsman for the United States Air Force.

His daughter, Doris Shaw, is a housewife and mother and lives at Crowley; Reba Jongema, Corpus Christi housewife and mother, is a twin of Reba Yates, wife of Abilene attorney Jack Yates.

Mrs. Yates is a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University and taught sixth grade in Abilene several years. She is now her husband's secretary.

'The twins were our last children, and when we had them two at a time, we thought it was time to stop,' Goodgion said.

'Most of us live near enough to visit Daddy often,' Mrs. Yates, contacted in Abilene, said. 'Sometimes we are all there at one time, but usually we go one at a time every two or three weeks, or oftener.'

Since his wife's death several years ago, Goodgion has lived alone and taken care of himself. Everyday he closes the lumber yard at 11 a.m., goes home and prepares and eats his lunch and re-opens the business at 1 p.m. 'on the dot.' After supper, he reads his Bible every night.

The house in which he lives is a rambling structure of 14 rooms. It started out about half that size, his daughter said. Two rooms were added later, and since his wife's death he has remodeled and added several bedrooms, doing all the work himself. He added the rooms primarily so he can have all his children visit him at the same time, he said. He is now building a large walk-in closet.

The annual homecoming which he has near Labor Day each year is the highlight of his year, Mrs. Yates said. The homecoming draws both family and old friends from the Trickham days.

Your chances for survival can further be enhanced by having at least one escape alternate. The first impulse children will have is to run to the door — after all, why not, this is the only way they ever enter or leave their home. Unfortunately, the door may be the wrong exit. Will they think of using a window? We hope so.

Should a window exit be necessary, will this window open easily — and quickly? When was the last time you opened and closed every window in your home? Did they operate with ease? Was the window lock too tight for a small child to move? Would you be able to quickly open it in the dark — and — if you were on the verge of panic?

Assume the window itself was no problem. How about the storm window or screen unless they are checked and moved frequently, a combination aluminum storm window release lock may require more strength and time than you have. The only alternative is to break glass and take your chances on the severity of the lacerations you and your family may receive.

**SURVIVAL POINT — PERIODICALLY OPEN AND CLOSE ALL WINDOWS — INCLUDING THE STORM WINDOWS FROM THE OUTSIDE BY MEANS OF A TURN BRACKET. HAVE STICKING WINDOWS AND WINDOW LOCKS AND RELEASES REPAIRED. SOMETIMES A SILICONE BASED SPRAY WILL CORRECT STICKING WINDOWS — BUT SHOULD BE APPLIED REGULARLY.**

SOME BEDROOMS HAVE VERY SMALL "PARTIAL WINDOWS." POSSIBLY ONLY 15" TO 18" in vertical HEIGHT. THEY ARE USUALLY LOCATED AT LEAST 4 1/2' to 5' ABOVE THE FLOOR. IF SUCH BE THE CASE — FORGET IT! YOU'LL NEVER MAKE IT.

As a final survival hint, based upon the use of a bedroom window as an exit, close the bedroom door. The open window will allow oxygen in the house to activate a smoldering fire into roaring flames and will create an immediate draft, pulling still additional smoke and fumes toward this opening.

Naturally, these comments probably are not meant for you because, "IT CAN'T HAPPEN HERE — IT'S ALWAYS THE OTHER PERSON." Why not do the other person a favor and tell him?

## WTU Officials Analyze Winter Utility Bills

February 1978 has proved once again that cold weather and high electric bills go hand-in-hand, according to a spokesman at West Texas Utilities Co.

After analyzing February data, Ray Hartt, a WTU space engineer, said, "Both in degree days and in average temperature, we experienced one heck of a cold month.

Bills currently being issued by WTU are mostly for electricity used during the extreme cold weather, and are producing a flurry of inquiries to WTU local offices.

Hartt said electric usage probably would have been higher if heavy winds had accompanied the cold fronts during the month and if many customers were not practicing conservation.

Fuel costs for February were slightly lower than January, which also helped take some sting out of the bills.

The degree day figures, which are an accepted measure of energy requirements, indicated that West Texas needed 85 percent more energy this February than last February just to keep their homes warm.

The 'heating degree day' is the net difference between the average outside temperature over a 24-hour period and a base temperature of 65 degrees. This past February there were 729 degrees in Abilene, compared to 393 in February 1977.

Hartt said this is about average for WTU's entire service area, which stretches from Shamrock on the north to Presidio on the south and with Abilene about the center.

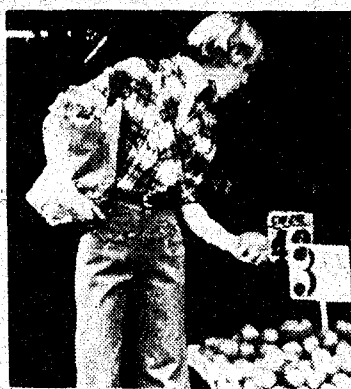

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## M. L. Guthrie Jr. Retires After 28 Years With P.O.

Patrons of Santa Anna Rural Routes One and Two had an extra letter in their boxes last Friday -- personal notes from their carrier, M. L. Guthrie Jr. The notes were just words of thanks from Mr. Guthrie for the friendship and cooperation through the years.

Guthrie retired Friday, March 10, from the U. S. Postal Service after 28 years as a clerk and rural letter carrier.

Starting with the Santa Anna Postoffice September 16, 1950 as a temporary clerk, Mr. Guthrie worked under the late F. C. (Jack) Woodward, a long-time Santa Anna Postmaster. He became substitute clerk in 1952, and in 1960 took the rural route position upon the death of Add T. Walker. He has had the same route since that time, with the number of patrons varying from about 135 to the present 104 along the 80.4-mile route.

Leland Thompson, a substitute carrier, has assumed the route upon Guthrie's retirement. Another rural carrier, Doug Moore, retired December 31 with Janette Strickland taking that Trickham-Whon Route.

Mr. Guthrie was born at Clyde, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Guthrie Sr. He has lived in Santa Anna since an infant and graduated from Santa Anna High School in 1938. He attended Southwest Texas State Teachers College at San Marcos and spent four years in the U. S. Air Force during World War II, serving in England.

Besides the postal work, Guthrie has farming and livestock interests just south of Santa Anna. He is active in United Presbyterian Church and Masonic Lodge, serving as a past master. He is a past president of Santa Anna Lions Club and a member of Santa Anna Livestock Association and other civic groups. He is a former member of the School Board.

Guthrie never failed to complete the mail delivery to his patrons although he occasionally had problems and delays with muddy roads or other difficulties. His faithfulness to the route is evidenced by some 300 days of sick leave accumulated that he did not use.

Driving almost 500,000 miles during the past 18 years, Guthrie never had an accident along the route. He was awarded the annual safe driving award from the Abilene Postal District last year.

Guthrie and his wife, Billie, have no plans for his retirement, but will probably spend more time traveling and enjoying their hobby of antique collecting. Their new home in the south part of town is decorated with family antiques and other articles from their collection.

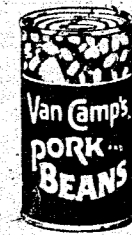
