SANTA ANNA - Homer Goodgion, 88 -year-old owner and umber $C o$. and one of the most well-known men in Santa Anna has no plans for retiremen I'm not tired, and I'm not going anywhere. I just plan to keep on running my business and taking care of my self. I never have had to ask help from anyone. I wasn't on
