Latest Water Well A Good One Water Production, Consumption 'Holding Its Own' Says City Secretary

The City of Santa Anna still has a major problem with the water shortage, but City Secretary Mary Lou Jones stated Tuesday there is some improvement and work is still underway for relief for the shortage.

The third water well drilled at the Lake Brownwood pump station was a good one, producing approximately 75 gallons a minute, almost as much as the two former wells. An additional well is being drilled at the site at the present time.

The three wells are furnishing the water for the town as no water is being taken from the lake or from the city lakes north of Santa Anna. The water production is 'holding its own', according to Mrs. Jones.

Local people have cooperated in conserving the water, and city officials expressed appreciation to everyone for their help with the unfortunate situation.

The wells at the Jim Ned Creek site are within about 40 feet of the pump site and located on property owned by Bangs. Mayor Bob Prince. The depth of the wells is from 32 to 42 feet, according to Mrs. Jones.

Doubles Team Places Second In State Tennis Tournament

The Santa Anna High School tennis duo of Tommy Harris and Terry Day worked their way to the finals in the State University Interscholastic League tennis tournament at Austin last weekend and ended the meet with the second place medals. The local boys were defeated in the final round by the Rocksprings doubles team that were also winners of the 1977 title.

The SAHS team of Dick Smith and Jim Young lost their first match to the State champs in the opening round and were eliminated from the tourney.

Harris and Day met the Rocksprings second team in opening round Friday morning and won 6 - 2, 6 - 4. In the semi-finals that afternoon they defeated the Nazereth High School team 6 - 3, 6 - 3.

The Rocksprings boys won the first set 7 - 6, then Harris and Day won the second set 6 - 2. The showdown was won by Rocksprings 6 - 1.

Tommy and Terry are no strangers to the state meet, having qualified for three consecutive years. R. C. Smith is coach of the tennis team that has had six entries in the state meet in the last four years.

Donnie Neff will be pianist for the program, and music will be directed by Mrs. Tom Kingsbery. Members of the senior class will present special music.

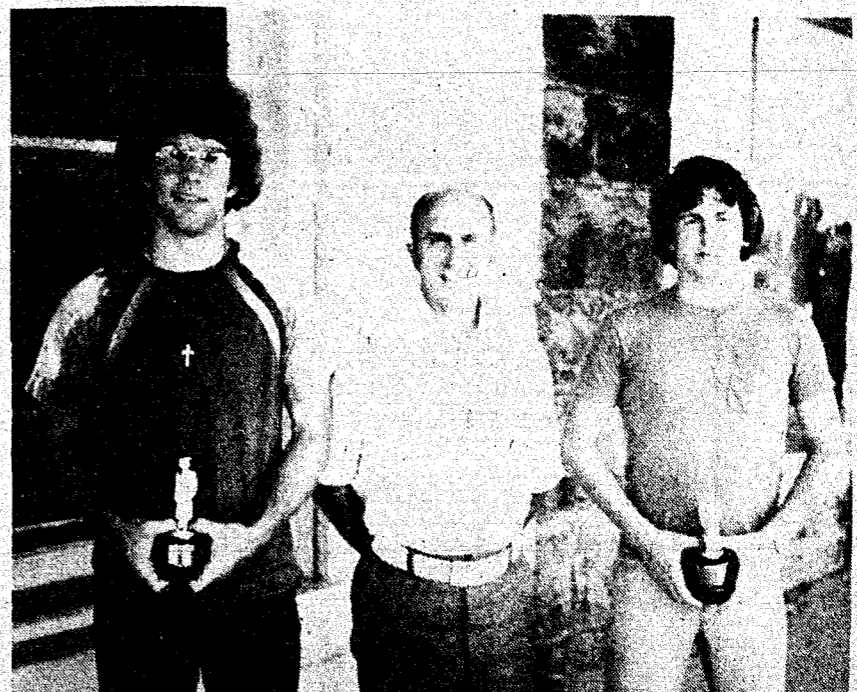
Everyone in the community is invited to attend the service Sunday night. Most local churches will dismiss their evening services so that people may attend the annual event.

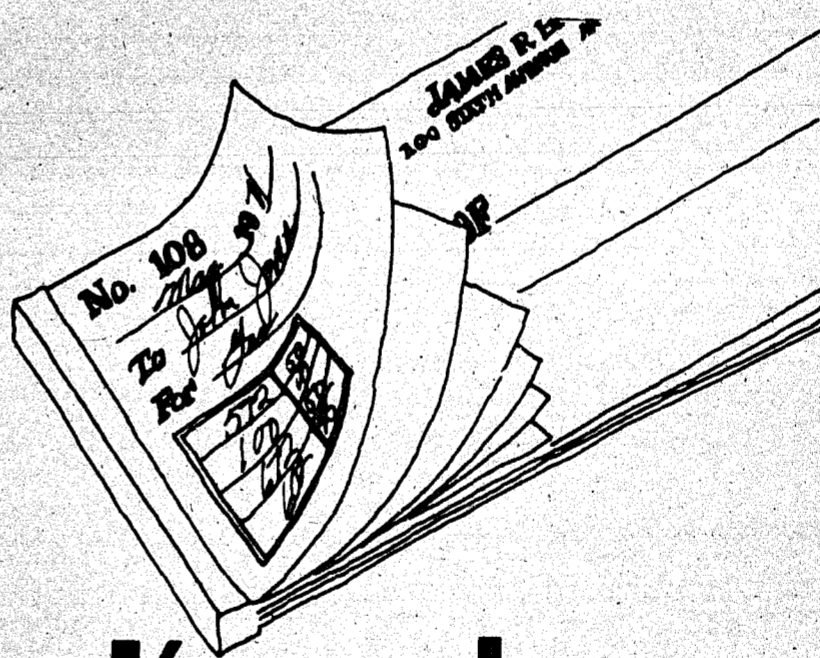

Meeting Slated Here Friday To Discuss Girl Scouting

A public meeting to discuss Girl Scouting in Santa Anna will be held Friday, May 19, beginning at 7 p.m. in the Elementary School cafeteria. The meeting is open to all citizens, with parents of girls aged six through 17 particularly urged to attend.

Miss Donna Fincher, executive director of Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council, will attend the meeting to provide information about Girl Scout program, what it offers to girls and to the community as a whole, how the program is organized, how leadership is selected, and what the program costs individual members of the community as a whole.

The sole purpose of the meeting will be to provide information and to determine the level of community interest in having Girl Scouting available to the girls of Santa Anna. No attempt will be made to organize troops or recruit leadership at this time. Miss Fincher said that the May

19 meeting has been scheduled due to numerous requests from interested parents.

Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council is chartered by Girl Scouts of the U. S. A. to develop and maintain the Girl Scout program in a nineteen County jurisdiction that includes Coleman County. Council headquarters is in Brownwood. The council is governed by a volunteer board of directors elected by members of the area.

There are currently 136 troops organized in the council, with approximately 2,350 members being served.

In organizing a local group, community leadership is elected, then selected for the troops and trained for the program. Girls are at that time placed in troops, and up to this point not a single penny has been spent. When girls join troops, they pay an annual membership fee of \$2, which covers insurance. Girl Scout uniforms are available, but not required. Costs vary widely, depending on the uniform chosen.

Girl Scouting is an agency supported by United Way. In those communities which do not have a United Way, Girl Scouts conduct an annual fund drive. Money earned in the annual drive helps pay for the continuing service of the council to the community.

All persons interested in the Girl Scouting program are invited to attend the meeting May 19.

SCS Seeks Public Views At May 22 Meeting

Public views on the future of the conservation, protection and enhancement of Texas' soil, water and related natural resources will be sought at a meeting to be held in the Courthouse in Coleman at 8 p.m. Monday, May 22, according to Ben Wilson, chairman of the Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District.

The meeting is in response to President Carter's signing of the Resources Conservation Act last November which requires an appraisal and evaluation of the state and nation's soil and water conservation program.

'The RCA act authorizes and directs the Secretary of Agriculture to develop a national soil and water conservation program in cooperation with the public, our local soil and water conservation districts, the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, and the Soil Conservation Service,' said Wilson.

'This program will establish new direction for future soil and water conservation efforts in Texas based on current soil, water and related resource appraisals,' Wilson continued. 'One point made clear is that

districts in their 40-year history have always assisted landowners with voluntary conservation programs on their farms and ranches. We do not advocate any other approach since farm and ranch land is privately owned and that the interests and welfare of the owners must be served and that programs must be acceptable to them,' Wilson added.

Actions required by the RCA act include gathering data to appraise the condition and quality of Texas and the nation's soil and water resources by 1979, and to outline a five-year plan for the USDA's conservation assistance to districts, and to evaluate effectiveness and progress of ongoing programs. Reports will be made to the public and Congress.

The meeting Monday night that is open to the public will primarily deal with discussions of soil and water resources in the district and how to conserve them, and to learn more about the RCA act and the responsibilities of the local district and Soil Conservation Service.

Anyone with an interest in natural resource conservation is urged to attend the meeting.

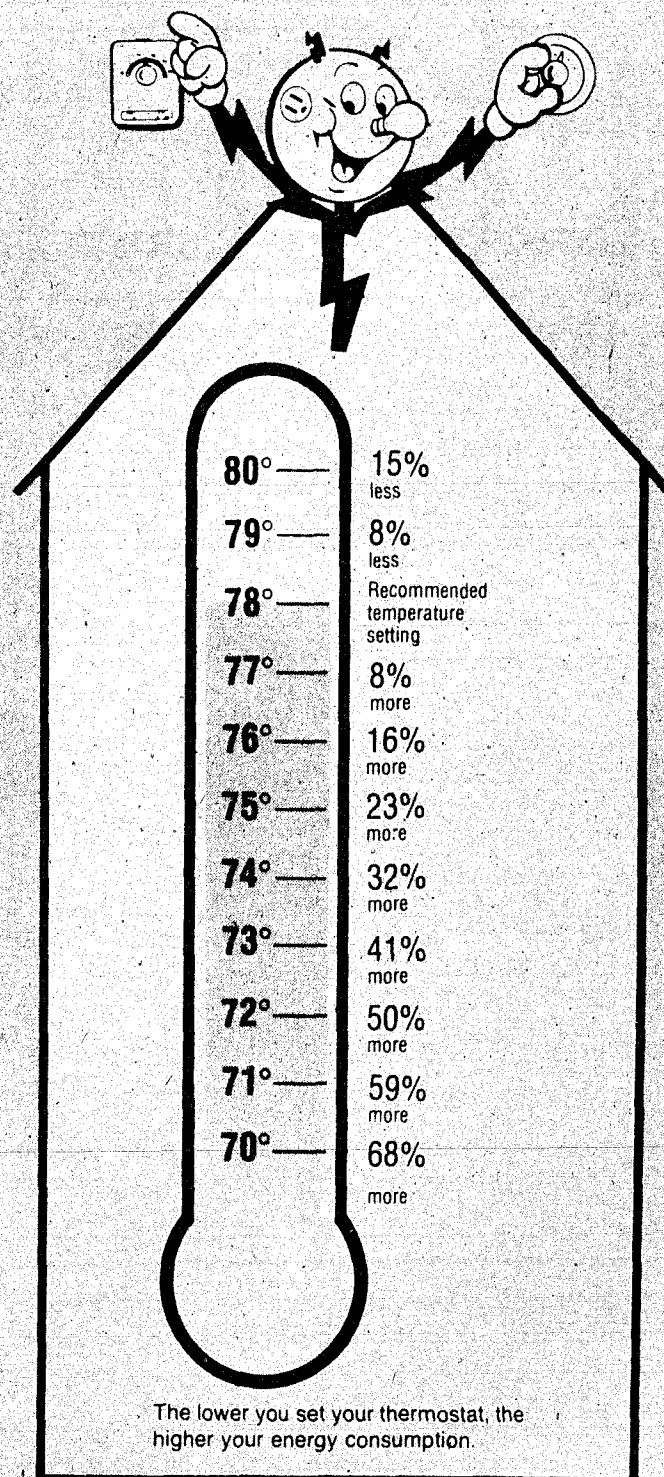

Use Fees Start This Month At Camping Areas

The Fort Worth District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, will start its 1978 Summer Camping Fee Collection Program on Friday, May 26 and will continue through September 4, District Engineer Colonel John F. Wall said today. Collection of fees are required under Public Law 93-303 enacted in June 1974.

Fee Collection is required under the law at all Federal campgrounds providing tent or trailer spaces, drinking water, sanitary facilities, access roads, reasonable visitor protection, and other facilities where economically feasible.

The fees range from \$1.00 to \$3.00 per day for camping at a designated campsite and group use facilities range from \$6.00 to \$20.00 per day. Under the Law, the Corps of Engineers is required to provide at least one free camping area at each Corps lake.

Entrance fees are not charged at any Corps park nor are fees charged for access to the water or use of boat launching ramps.

Fees of fifty cents (50 cents) per day will be collected for use of electrical outlets provided by the Corps in fee areas.

Holders of the "Golden Age" passport issued to Senior Citizens will receive a 50 percent reduction on campground and electric outlet fees at all Corps operated fee recreational areas.

Fees at Coleman's Hords Creek Lake are \$2.00 for basic family camping with an additional 50 cents for electrical hookup, and \$20.00 group fee at Flatrock Park.

Texas Records Second Case Of Screwworms

The year's second lab confirmed Texas screwworm sample was collected in Presidio County May 6 and identified May 8, says Dr. M.E. (Cotton) Meadows, Jr.

The director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture Screwworm Eradication Program says Hayes Mitchell of Mitchell Cattle Co. collected the screwworm larvae. They came from an infested calf navel 20 miles southwest of Marfa.

On April 21 the year's first Texas case was collected about 48 miles east of El Paso in Hudspeth County. It came from a horse.

By the end of May 1977 Texas had recorded 22 screwworm cases; and 1,968 by the same time in 1976.

She attended the Lohn schools and married O. C. Yancy in Santa Anna October 13, 1946. She was a housewife and a Baptist.


