Postage Rates To Increase Next Monday

Postmaster John C. Gregg reminds all postal patrons that effective Monday, May 29 postage rates will be increased. This also includes increases in other postal services such as box rent, insured mail, certified mail, etc.

The increase for a first class item will be from 13 cents to 15 cents for one ounce. Postal cards will increase from nine to ten cents. Other increases will be proportionate.

The only service or class of mail to remain the same will be foreign air mail at 31 cents per one-half ounce.

Because of the change from the anticipated 16 cent cost for first class mail, the Postal Department will be using an 'A' stamp that will not have the price included on the face. The local post office has a good supply of 13 cent stamps and should have an adequate supply of two cent stamps by the end of the week.

Mr. Gregg also noted that Monday, May 29, is a holiday and there will be no window or rural delivery. Mail will be put up in the local boxes on that day and the regular pick-up will be made that afternoon.

City Water Situation Improved;

Residents Allowed Limited Watering

The Santa Anna City Council voted in called session Tuesday, May 23, to permit limited outside watering in town on a trial basis. Residents on the north side of the railroad will be permitted to water trees and shrubs on Friday; residents on the south side of the railroad may water on Monday.

Also lifted was the rationing of water to the local car wash. Martin Kemper of Coleman, owner of the business, has been hauling water for the operation during the past weeks.

The completion of an additional water well at the Jim Ned pump site has brought the daily production of water to approximately 175 gallons per minute. Another well is being drilled this week to help meet the need of some 230 gallons per minute.

Residents of Santa Anna were praised for cooperating with the Council during the time of water shortage. They were reminded, however, that the outside watering is for trees and shrubs.

The weekend rainfall left about two feet of water at the pump site at upper Lake Brownwood. No

water was added to the city lakes north of town during the rainfall.

The city will continue to use only well water which will offset the cost of drilling the wells. Cost for water purchased from the Brown County Water Improvement District runs approximately \$1,200 per month.

Open Letter To Santa Anna Residents

WATER, WATER, WATER

The water situation has been of great concern for the past four years, numerous suggestions were considered by the City Council. We made application for loan and grant from FHA last summer and voted in December and approved a bond issue that we feel will solve our water problems for years to come.

Why are we so slow? We have wondered the same thing with the present crisis, but we hired Mr. Wendell Sparkman as engineer and we of the City Council feel he knows how and will do the job as soon and efficiently as possible. Mr. Sparkman says he will have the surveying, staking, etc. done in about four months and will be making progress toward advertising for bids. It is believed that from the time bids are let, construction time will be about 12 months. The old saying that haste makes waste is to be avoided, and we want this project to be as good an installation as possible.

We have numerous questions asked about other possibilities to solve the immediate water shortage.

1. Why not lay a temporary line to Lake Brownwood?

We have talked many hours and explored several probable solutions. We talked with engineers about laying line on top of the ground along the route of the permanent line, but we have no easements to cross all this property. Also, the cost of this is very high for labor and freight to get the pipe as well as clearing the right-of-way just for a temporary installation which would cost \$40,000 with no return on investment.

2. Why not get water from Brookesmith?

Brookesmith Water Corp. has been very considerate of our situation and offered to let us tap their line near the Kenneth Day ranch, and supply us a limited amount of water believed to be about 60,000 gallons per day. This is about 20 percent of our daily consumption. We believe this is not good enough to go to the expense and possibly run their customers short of water while we are taking water.

3. Why not get water from Coleman?

We talked with Coleman city officials and they offered to help in two ways: Sell us water at 70 cents per thousand gallons from the tower in south Coleman -- a distance of some nine miles. We would have to lay six-inch line on a temporary basis and remove when the crisis is over. We were offered this pipe by Mr. Ward with State Disaster Services and no charge except picking up all over the state. The closest place being Mineral Wells, some 150 miles. Freight costs on the amount of pipe needed would run approximately \$500 per load, or 24 truck loads for the 1188 joints of pipe, a cost of \$12,000. Estimate for cost of laying the pipe and taking it up was approximately \$12,000, and return freight on pipe an additional \$12,000. A booster pump would cost about \$6,000, making a total cost of some \$42,000, without the water cost. We were not able to spend this much money on a temporary line.

The other alternative offered by Coleman was buying water over the dam to run down Jim Ned Creek to our pump station some 25 miles downstream. The price quoted us was 27 cents per thousand gallons which is about \$90 per acre foot. It was estimated to require from 400 to 800 acre feet of water to get to us, which would cost approximately \$36,000 and up to \$70,000. This in our opinion was out of the question as most of you know very well the city has no such surplus funds.

The above solutions were believed to be too expensive for temporary relief due to the water shortage. The City Council turned to water wells in the vicinity of our Jim Ned pump station and we are happy to announce that we have been successful in securing almost 200 gallons of water per minute from four wells. This will supply the town if we continue to conserve water.

Beginning Friday, May 26, the north side of town from the railroad will be permitted to water trees and other necessary plants, and Monday, May 29, all south of the railroad will be permitted to water. This will be allowed each week, and we are hopeful that we can continue to do this, and perhaps be able to increase.

We have a problem pumping enough water from our Jim Ned station without supplementing from our north lake. As we pump 200 gallons per minute from Jim Ned while our pumps to the tank on the mountain will pump 500 gallons per minute. So we are limited on the amount of water we can get to the filtration plant.

The total cost of drilling wells at Jim Ned has been approximately \$5,000, and this is far below the cost of other solutions considered. We will not have to pass any of the cost to the water users. In addition to the one-day-a-week for outside watering, we are also letting the automatic car wash resume usage. We feel that the car wash does not use this much water and we need to support and help our businesses any way we can.

Screwworm Cases In County; Ranchers Urged To Be Alert

Two cases of screwworms have been confirmed in Coleman County the past week, bringing to four the number in the state of Texas this year.

The two cases in this area were of concern to directors of the Screwworm Eradication Program at Mission as they were hundreds of miles from the other reported cases and caused experts to suggest that the infested screwworm flies were transported to the area in a vehicle of some sort.

Sterile flies were dropped in both areas, one case from the Voss area and the other near Novice.

Livestock owners are asked to be especially alert and to collect samples of any suspected cases and send them to the laboratory at

Mission for analysis.

Sample cases are available at Santa Anna National Bank or at the County Agent's office in the courthouse. Suspected samples of screwworms may be collected in an envelope or any container and brought to town and mailed in the postage-free vials that are free to anyone needing them.

The recent rains make a screwworm out-break more likely, and every precaution should be taken to avoid it.

Good Rainfall Last Weekend

Santa Anna and the surrounding area received a good rain last weekend which brought relief from the drought and some respite from the water shortage.

The official report in Santa Anna showed 1.23 inches Saturday May 20, and an additional .20 inch on Sunday. Some people in the community had an unofficial two inches, and greater amounts were reported in the Trickham area.

The rainfall last weekend brought the total for the month of May to 2.11 inches, according to R. W. Balke, rainfall reporter.

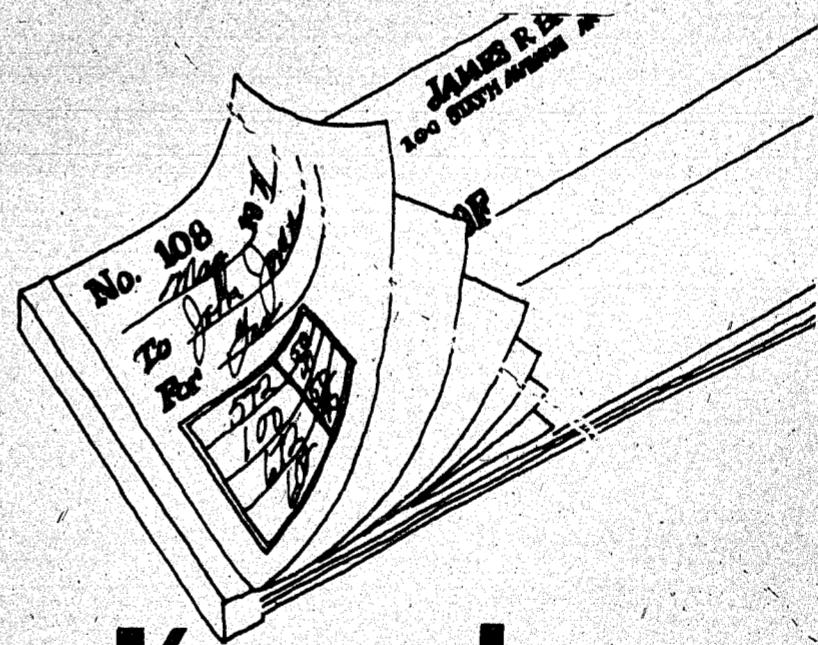

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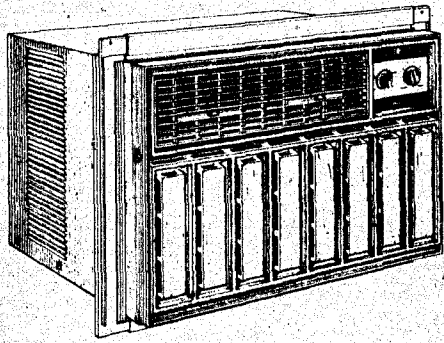
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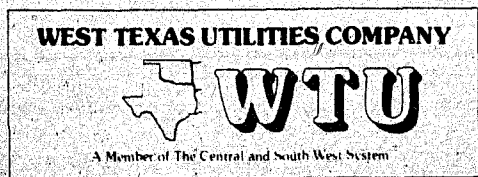


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Senior Autobiographies

Grandsons served as pallbearers for the services.

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

SYDNEY LEA CUPPS

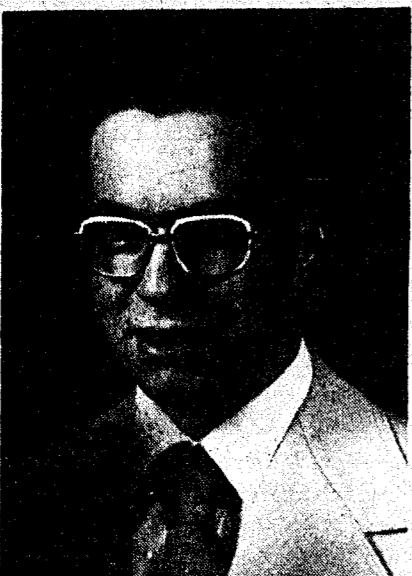

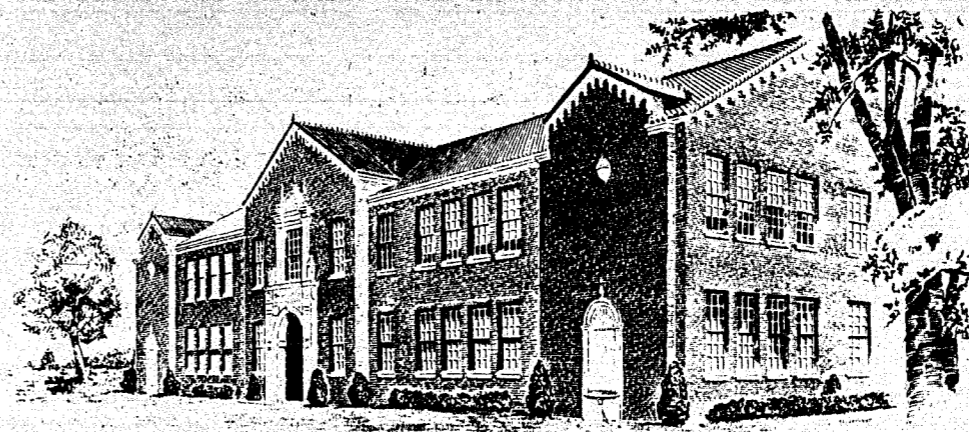

I plan to further my education by going to Abilene Christian University.

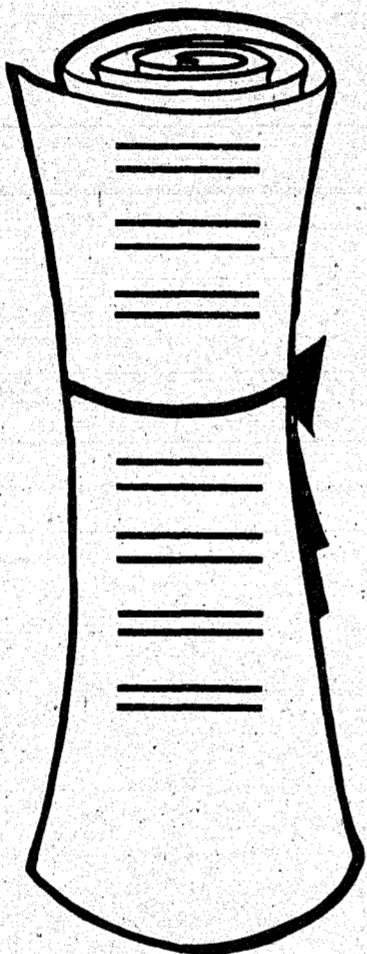

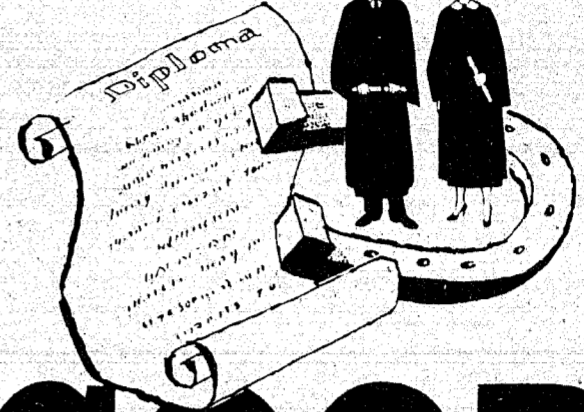
Among students who seek admission to the University of Pennsylvania, a university official has acknowledged that some are given "a measure of preference."
