Weekend Rain Is Welcome; No Water Added To City Lakes

The Santa Anna area received good rainfall Sunday afternoon and night, the largest amounts reported from the Cleveland and Liberty areas where over four inches was reported.

The Trickham community received three inches or more of rainfall during the evening.

R. W. Balke at the official gauge in Santa Anna recorded 1.60 inches that fell from 6 p.m. Sunday to 3:30 a.m. Monday morning.

The weekend rainfall brings the total for Santa Anna to 3.71 inches for the month of May.

The rainfall was lighter in the north of the community, and Mayor Glen Coheland reported very little water was added to the

city lakes or at the Jim Ned Creek pump station near Lake Brownwood.

Santa Anna people are reminded of the one-day-a-week watering schedule in town that is in effect at the present time.

PUMP STATION FLOODED

A broken valve at the City Pump Station caused the station to be out of operation Saturday and Sunday morning. The pumps were put back in operation Sunday afternoon.

City residents were not without water during the shutoff as the storage tank on the mountain was almost filled at the time the pumps stopped, and the supply of water was sufficient to continue usual usage.

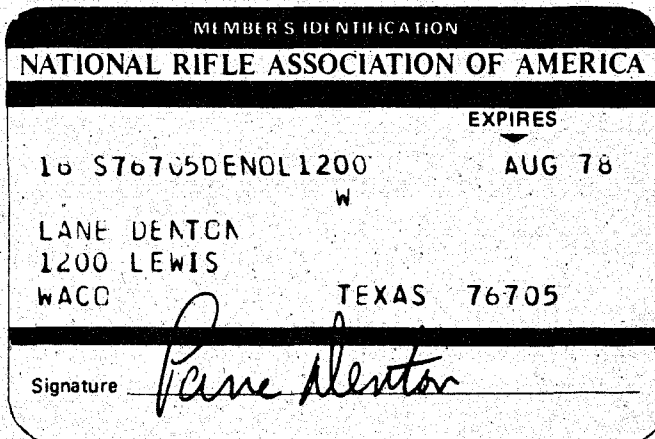

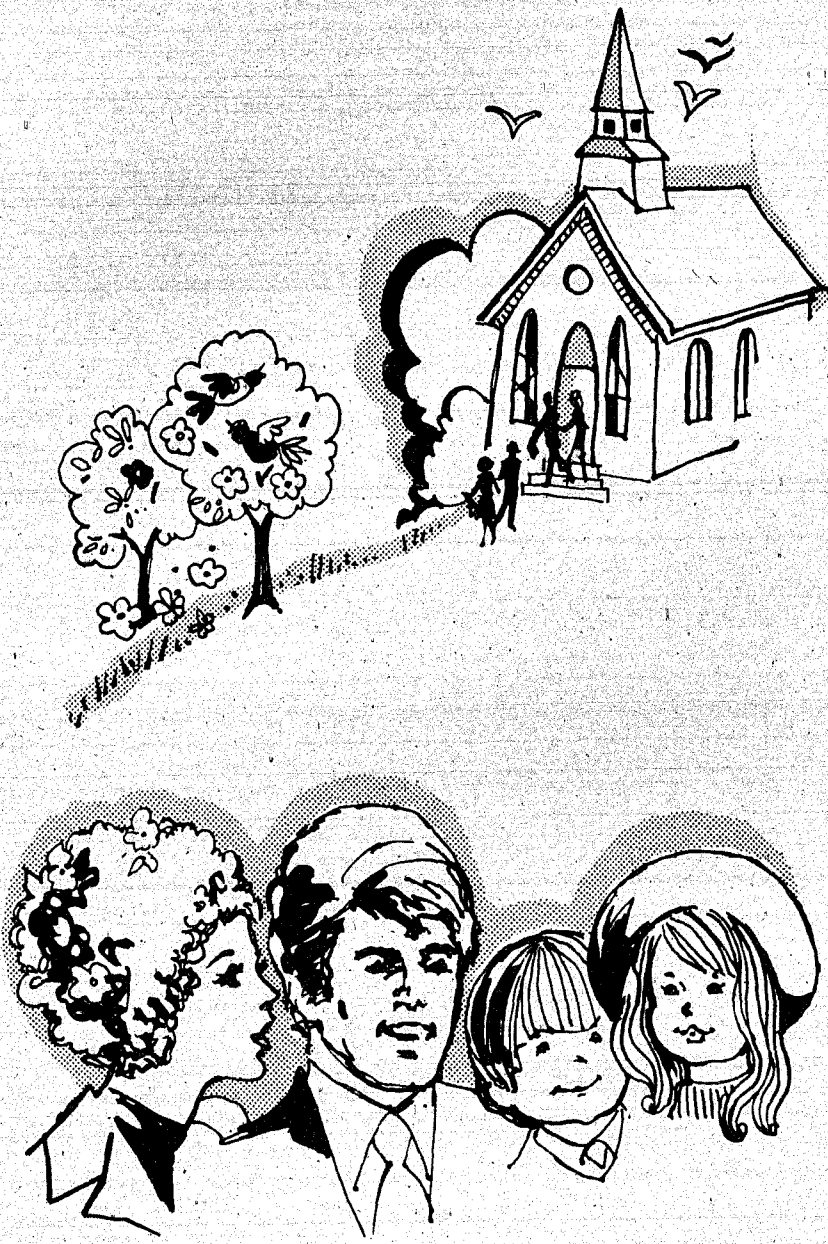

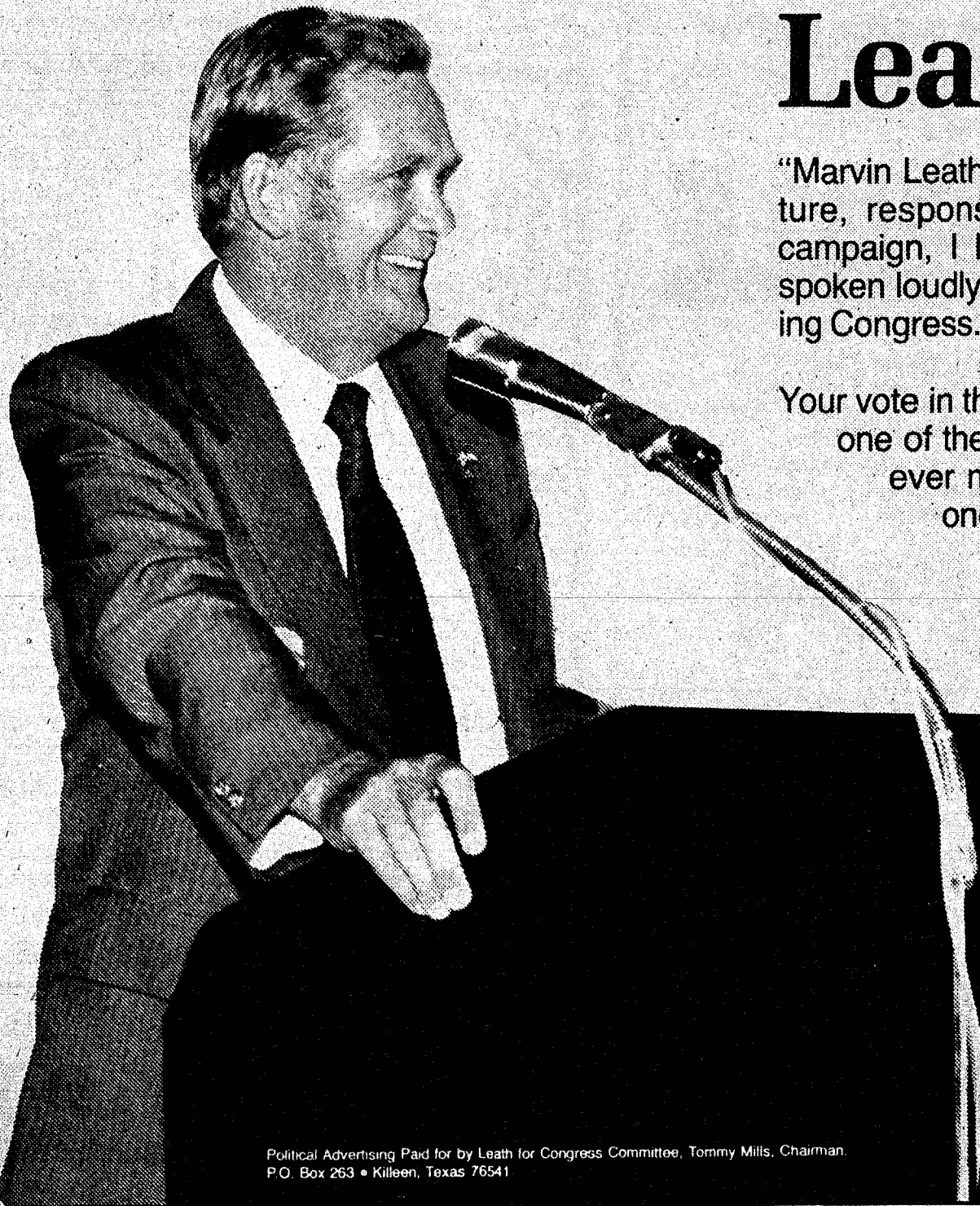
