## Water Wells Are Aiding In Emergency

The City of Santa Anna has drilled a second water well at the Jim Ned Creek pump station and it was just a little better than the first one, each of the two wells producing about 40 gallons of water per minute. Mayor Copeland said Monday that the first well, located about 40 feet from the pump site, has already been connected to the city water system. The wells are located on private property at the pump station.

A sample of the water was taken to San Angelo and approved for municipal use.

Copeland said Monday that no water is coming from the Lake Brownwood location at the present time. All the city water is from the city lakes and from the new well.

The Democratic Precinct convention will be held at 4 o'clock at the CCTC building.

There are no local or county candidates on the Republican ballot, and very few on the Democratic ballot.

Peace, respectively, in Precinct Two. Others unopposed on the ballot are Barbara Freeman, County Treasurer, and Glenn Thomas, County Clerk.

Contests on the Democratic ballot for county offices are W. W. (Pete) Skelton and David Jordan, County Judge, and Louise Thompson and Rondoe Horton, District Clerk.

## Candidates Plentiful In Congressional Races

Hopefully all area voters know in which Congressional District they reside, as the line between the 17th District and the 11th District crosses Coleman County along a route that does not correspond with the School District, County Precincts, or any other better-known boundary than certain roads and highways.

Incumbents in both districts, Omar Burleson (17th) and Bob Poage (11th) are retiring at the end of their terms, and candidates are numerous in both races.

The 11th District, in which most of the Santa Anna community is situated, has five candidates seeking the Democratic nomination. They include Marvin Leath of Marlin and four Wacoans, Perry Ellis, Steve Alexander, Lane Denton and Lyndon Olson. The winner of the nomination will face Republican Jack Burgess of Waco in the November general election.

Leath is a former special assistant to Rep. Poage; Ellis is a former radio evangelist and now a businessman. Alexander, a candidate against Poage in the last election, is a former rodeo cowboy and a farmer and rancher and Air Force veteran. Lane Denton and Lyndon Olson have both served in the Texas House of Representatives. Olson currently representing his district. Olson is an attorney; Denton is a former school administrator and a

stockfarmer. Jack Burgess, a Waco businessman, garnered 43 percent of the vote against Poage in the 1976 general election.

The 17th District also has only one Republican candidate, Bill Fisher, the former Taylor County Republican Chairman. He is an attorney and educator.

Democrats seeking the Burleson seat are Abilene attorney Dusty Rhodes, Jim Baum, a Big Spring radio executive; Charles Stenholm, a Stamford farmer; Crews McCulloch, Weatherford real estate broker; James B. Sharp, a former aide to Burleson from Big Spring; Jim Snowden, a retired U. S. Armyman from Tye; and Fike Godfrey, an Abilene businessman.

## Dickensons Campaign Here

Mrs. Bob Dickenson of Abilene and Mrs. Curtis Dickinson of Sweetwater were in Santa Anna Monday morning campaigning in behalf of their husband and son, Bob Dickinson, a candidate for the 11th Court of Civil Appeals.

Dickinson, an Abilene attorney, is a Santa Anna native, born at Sealy Hospital 45 years ago Monday. His father was with West Texas Utilities Co. in Cross Plains at that time.

Other candidates for the Court of Civil Appeals post are J. Neil Daniel, 104th District Judge; and Joanne Strauss, an Abilene attorney.

The vacancy is the result of the resignation of Associate Justice Esco Walker. The unexpired term is being filled by Abilene attorney Bryan Bradbury who is not seeking election to complete the
