

The recent rains in the area have wrought their usual miracles -- the countryside is green and pretty, with the change made almost overnight. Many areas have not yet received enough heavy rainfall to fill tanks and lakes, so more precipitation is needed before the long hot

During the extra-dry spring when local yards and gardens looked like a desert, one plant thrived in the arid climate. An ornamental cactus, standing four or five feet high, was in full bloom at the Sy Burden rent house at the corner of South Third and Willis Street.

Several Santa Anna people were among the Coleman County delegation in Austin yesterday for the Texas Water Commission hearing concerning the proposed Stacy Dam on the Colorado River in south Coleman County. The proposed lake would be of great benefit to the central and west Texas area. with several cities seeking permits for water from the lake, if approved.



Rainfall June 2 Very Beneficial

Santa Anna received another rain last weekend, with 1.05 inches being recorded at the official gauge on Houston Street.

The rain Friday, June 2, started the month off well, and was of great benefit following soon after the other rainfall in the community the previous week.

Rationing of water for the City three-month water supply for the

About five feet of water was caught in the Jim Ned Creek pump site at Lake Brownwood during the recent rains, and four water wells are now in production at the same location.

Rainfall at the City Lake area totaled about three inches last week, giving a small supply at the First Baptist VBS two city lakes north of town.

Although the rationing is ended for city residents, there will still be no commercial water hauling and residents are restricted from large_irrigation projects. City officials urge people to continue to conserve the water so that the present supply will be adequate .

The city water improvement project is progressing as expected, with plans underway for the project.

City Council members also

were told that street repair and other maintenance will be resumed which had been set aside while the water shortage and emergency measures were in progress.

At the Thursday, June 1, meeting led by Mayor Glen Copeland, minutes of previous meetings were read and approved and a financial statement given.

The next meeting of the City Council will be Thursday, July 6.

Emergency Medical Technicians Certified After Training Here

will receive certification as Emergency Medical Technicians after completing a course held here in cooperation with Ranger Park Medical Center. Patrick Hosch, a certified instructor, was in charge of the class that was held at the Health Activities Center at the medical center.

The course was held each week for ten weeks and included 120 hours, 80 of classroom study and 40 in the hospital. Major topics respiration and resusitation, cardio pulmonory resusitation, bleeding, wounds and shock, soft tissue injuries, injuries to the skull, brain, neck and spine, injuries to medical and extremities, environmental emergencies. emergency childbirth, handling sick or injured patients, and the ambulance and its emergency care equipment.

Completion of the course gives a two-year certification which can be renewed at that time with a 24-hour refresher course. Besides the initial course as E. M. T., Patrick Hosch has had an instructors' course Hendrick Medical Center at Abilene. An employee of Henderson Funeral Home, Hosch has held certification since 1975. The course and certification is through the Texas Department of Health Resources, Division of **Emergency Medical Services.**

Mission Service The Goal For Couple Known Here

Mr. and Mrs. David Wilson, appointed as Southern Baptist missionary nurses in Fort Worth in April, will be less than 30 years old when they arrive in Colombia, South America.

The destination of foreign mission service is an old one for the young couple from Texas. As the sor of missionaries to Brazil, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Wilson, David began as a boy to learn about missions in South America. He was born in Waxahachie, and returned to the area as a young man to study nursing at Dallas Baptist College.

David met Sue at college, where she was a nursing student. They worked as nursing students and graduates at the same hospitals in Dallas and Fort Worth. Before their marriage in 1970, Sue and David discovered another common interest besides nursing -- missions.

After a foreign missions meeting eight years ago, the couple wrote the Southern Baptist Foreign Missions Board about their commitment to missios

Personal experience prepared Sue and David for missions before they met. David saw the human and spiritual aspects of day-to-day missionary life. As an MK, or 'missionarykid', he understands that missionaries are as capable of mistakes and achievements as other Christians, David elected to continue his lifelong affiliation with the foreign missionary

Sue also appreciates the practical and inspirational nature of missionary work. She was born

'I saw missions first hand, the joys, heartbreaks, and just plain hard work,' Sue recalled.. 'I remember riding with missionary Lousie Nelson, making roads where there weren't any, and loving every minute of it.'

The experience that 'sealed my commitment to missions' for Sue was working in summer missions with emeritus missionary Orvil Reid in Guadalajara, Mexico.
