Preparations are being completed this week for the annual Cowboy Camp Meeting that will be held Friday, June 16 through Sunday, June 25, at Flying H Acres between Santa Anna and Coleman. Founder and director of the camp meeting, George Havens, has also announced that the dedication of the monument at the camp site will take place Saturday, June 17, prior to the evening service.

Stuart Hamblen, a widely-known songwriter and entertainer, will be on hand for the dedication that is in recognition of the pioneer preachers and evangelists. Hamblen is author of such songs as 'It's No Secret' and 'This Old

House.' He and his wife, Susie, will be in charge of the Saturday night service at the meeting.

The native rock monument has a plaque inscribed 'In Honor of The Pioneer Preacher - whose call, 'It's Cowboy Camp Meeting Time' brought the word of God that won the West.'

Hamblen, a personal friend of Havens for some 40 years, will be here for only the one evening.

She is the recipient of a National Merit Scholarship, Kermit State Bank Scholarship and A&M University, College of Agriculture Scholarship. She is one of six students in the entire Permian Basin to receive a National Merit Scholarship.

Home Health Care Agency Provides Local Services

Clients using home health care services often need skilled nursing service by an LVN or RN, but they are ineligible for home health visits because their skilled nursing needs do not meet the Medicare guidelines for "skilled care."

Seeing this special need, the MBFA Foundation, which has delivered home health care in Texas since 1969, now announces a new service to these special clients.

Now those persons who require less than skilled care under the Medicare guidelines, or those who require the skills of a licensed professional (vocational) or registered nurse, but cannot afford to pay the regular charge and have no insurance covering these services, are eligible through the Texas Homemaker Service, a division of the MBFA Foundation.

An example of this type of service would be the client who needs a B-12 or other type of vitamin injection, as has been ordered by an attending physician, and has no Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans or private insurance of any kind and cannot afford to pay the normal charge. Now this patient can have the visits of an LVN or RN in the home at the beneficial rate based on one's individual financial status.

This service also will benefit the patient who has been on the home health service under Medicare, or some other type of insurance coverage, and has depleted this coverage, but is still in need of skilled nursing service. Now the client can pay a

beneficial rate and remain on the service under this new system through MBFA's Texas Homemaker Service.

The service should not be confused with regular homemaker services. This is still skilled nursing care given by an LVN or RN, but just does not meet the Medicare guidelines. The client must be under the care of a physician who will order this service for the patient.

Local people interested in knowing more about the service should discuss this with their physician or call the West Central Texas Home Health Agency for more information. The phone number in Abilene is 677-2231, or in Santa Anna Cynthia Hill, RN Supervisor, at 348-3882.

Mrs. Hill indicates that this new service will provide another alternative to their clients toward better and more complete medical care available in the clients' homes. About ten area people are now enrolled in the program that provides assistance and health care services.

Screwworm Cases Increase In State

Screwworms made their first appearance in five Texas counties during the first week in June, reports Dr. M. E. (Cotton) Meadows Jr.

The Texas screwworm count reached 38 in 17 counties during the period, said the director of the U. S. Department of Agriculture Screwworm Eradication Program. It is operated for the USDA by the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service.

Counties recording their first confirmed cases of the year were Howard, Bee, Midland, Glasscock, Irion and Tom Green.

Additional cases were detected in Stonewall, Culberson, Live Oak Counties during the week.

Coleman County had two confirmed cases during the month of May, one in the Novice area and one in the Gouldbusk area. Livestock owners are urged to watch their stock carefully and report any suspected cases of screwworms.

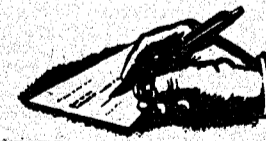

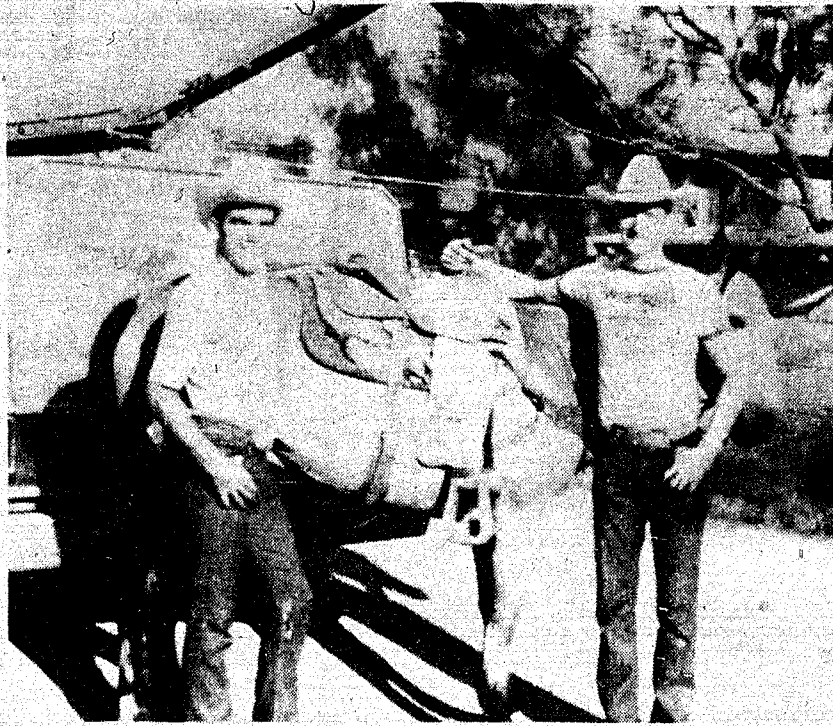
Rites Held For Bennie Parsons

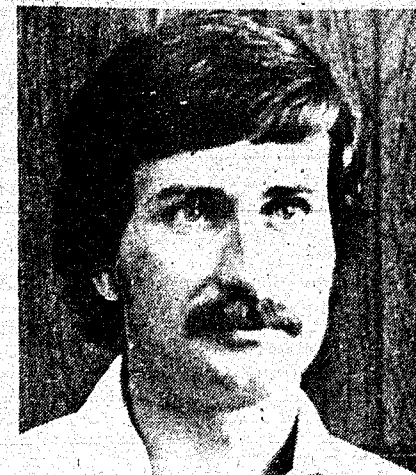
Social Worker Is Employed By Area MHMR Center

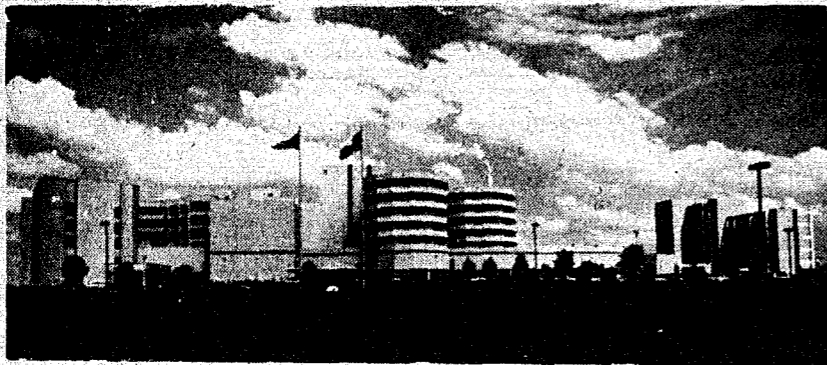

New Diagnostic Center To Have Dedication

Dedication ceremonies will be held June 17 for the new 205,000 square-foot Mabee Diagnostic Center, the Scott and White Clinic's new laboratory, research and patient-care structure named in honor of Mr. and Mrs. John Mabee, who founded the Mabee Foundation of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The Foundation is the biggest single donor to Scott and White Memorial Hospital and the Scott, Sherwood and Brindley Foundation. The Mabee Foundation made a grant of \$1.5 million for the Diagnostic Center, which brought its total gifts to Scott and White to \$3,125,000.

The Mabee Diagnostic Center begins receiving its first patients on June 5.

Many Scott and White Clinic Departments are the beneficiaries of greatly enlarged facilities in this new structure, built at a cost of \$14.5 million.

The Mabee Diagnostic Center initially will provide space for 40 additional physicians, many of whom have come on the Scott and White staff in recent months. Later expansion will provide office space for a total of 200 physicians.

The new building connects to the present Scott and White Clinic on all levels except the sixth floor. It is completely insulated to achieve maximum energy savings. The Center is a six-story building plus a ground floor, constructed to accommodate the addition of four more floors to be added if needed.

Departments which have moved into the Mabee Diagnostic Center include:

—Ground Floor— Laboratories, Medical Records, Endocrinology, Tumor Registry, X-Ray Therapy.

—First Floor—Pediatrics, Dermatology, Infectious Disease, Allergy, Community Internal Medicine.

—Second Floor— Orthopedics and Chiroprady, X-Ray

—Third Floor— Gastroenterology, Endoscopy, Fluoroscopy, Proctosigmoidoscopy.

—Fourth and Fifth Floors— Shelled in.

—Sixth Floor—Doctor's Lounge, Clinic Administration

The new building is equipped with a complete communications system, compatible with that in the existing Hospital and Clinic. Teletype communications vertically and horizontally carry laboratory items, X-rays and medical records. Of course, there is a nurse call system and a public address system throughout.

With many laboratory and medical support departments

moving into the Mabee building, some 35,000 square feet of existing Clinic space in the main building has been renovated for expansion. Office and waiting areas have been redecorated for better patient access and comfort. Radiology and pathology laboratories are expanding into some of the vacated space.

The new diagnostic facility constitutes Phase II of the \$25 million Expansion Fund at Scott and White. Phase I brought the Lucy King Brown Special Treatment Center in 1975. These two structures are the most significant single additions to Scott and White since it moved to its present site in 1963.

In 1977, Scott and White celebrated its 80th anniversary of founding. In observance, a special time capsule containing artifacts and memorabilia from those eventful years was sealed and placed in the lobby of the Mabee Diagnostic Center (adjacent to the picturesque fountain). In 1997, during Scott and White's Centennial ceremonies, the capsule will be taken out and examined. Until then, a chunk of the institution's history can consider the Mabee building as its home.
