B-wood Woman Killed July 6 Near Santa Anna

A young Brownwood woman, Cherry Gene Smith Brown, 21, was dead on arrival at Brownwood Community Hospital last Thursday night after being struck by a car on the Brownwood highway about four miles east of Santa Anna.

According to a report from Highway Patrolman Jay Moses who investigated the mishap, Mrs. Brown was out of the car and apparently wandered across the two westbound lanes of the highway and across the center median into the center east bound lane of traffic. Pauline Ferguson of Brownwood, the driver of the 1977 Chevrolet that struck the victim, did not see Mrs. Brown until the accident occurred.

Mrs. Brown was knocked into the ditch beside the highway, and was transported to Brownwood Community Hospital by Henderson ambulance but pronounced dead on arrival. The mishap occurred about 10:30 p.m. Thursday night in the Liberty Community.

Funeral services for Mrs. Brown were held in Brownwood with Holman Funeral Service in charge. Survivors include her husband, Jewell Brown of Brownwood.

Coleman Rodeo Underway

Big Parade Planned In Coleman Friday

The 41st annual Coleman Rodeo got underway Wednesday and will continue through Saturday, July 15. Performances are held at the Coleman Rodeo arena at 8:30 each evening.

Jim Shoulders of Henrietta, Oklahoma is producer for the 1978 rodeo, and Jon White of San Antonio is announcer.

Queen of the Coleman Rodeo this year is Sue Ellen Sneed, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Sneed of Coleman.

Joe Pat Hemphill of Coleman is Rodeo Association president and Ted Taylor, also of Coleman is arena director.

Over 200 PRCA cowboys and GRA cowgirls participated in the four-night rodeo last year, and as many were expected this year. There will be the five major rodeo events plus girls barrel racing. Quail Dobbs and Jim Romer will serve as rodeo clowns, and Allen Bing and his electric organ will provide background music for the shows each night.

Two parades are planned with the final one to be Friday, July 14, at 5:30 p.m. through downtown Coleman. Floats and decorated vehicles will be featured in the parade with the theme to be 'Texas Western History.'

Water Rate Increase Set City Fathers Approve Rate Hike To Cover Increased Costs

Santa Anna City Council voted in regular session Thursday, July 6, to increase water rates for customers in the City of Santa Anna and the outlying rural areas served by the city water system. The rate increase will go into effect in August and be reflected on the September bills.

The rate increase was approved to cover costs of power and materials, maintenance and labor. Also there is an increase of water rates from the Brown County Water Improvement District and expenses of the emergency measures that were

recently necessary.

Mayor Glen Copeland stated that dwindling surplus accounts by the city caused the Council to study the rates and approve the increase. Sewer and water services must be operated on a revenue basis, and costs must be passed on to the customers.

The original system was designed to operate by gravity flow, but the emergency operations have necessitated the

use of auxiliary pumps and motors, thus increasing the cost of water service.

City Secretary Mary Lou Jones prepared a chart showing the new water rates, and stated that customers outside the city limits would be charged one and one-half the new rate.

In other business Thursday evening, the City Council named Gale Allen Brock as Municipal Judge.

He is now engaged in farming and ranching near Whon.

Screwworm Cases Reported All Over State

Twenty four counties in the west-central part of Texas recorded their first 1978 screwworm cases during June, reports Dr. M.E. (Cotton) Meadows, Jr.

The director of the (USDA) Screwworm Eradication Program compares the currently known 121 cases from 35 counties to 30 by June's end last year. By the same date in 1972 the total was 21,097.

Meadows draws some encouragement from the Live Oak County situation. The 15 reported case infestations in that county, and one in adjoining Bee County, have been slowed. No cases were found in the area during a 22-day period.

The west-central Texas infestations are in a region bounded by Crockett and Sutton counties on the south, Coleman County on the east, Crosby and Motley counties on the north, Andrews, Ector and Lynn counties on the west. In addition, Pecos, Brewster, Presidio, Jeff Davis, Culberson, Hudspeth and El Paso counties have all recorded screwworms.

One temporary sterile fly distribution center has been set up at San Angelo; another at Alpine. Earlier established centers are at Alice, Del Rio, and Laredo. The far west Texas screwworm cases are being treated from the permanent distribution center at Douglas, Arizona.

Livestock owners are urged to watch livestock and report any suspected cases of screwworms.

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

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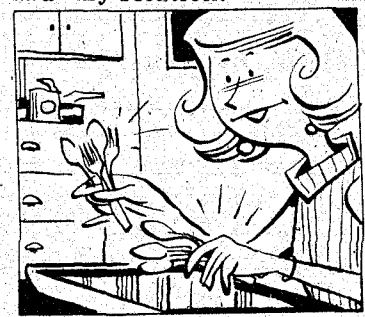

Helpful Household Hints

SILVER SHINING MADE EASY

There's no reason for tarnished silverware to keep you tied to a polishing rag for a day. There's a quick and easy solution.



Take an oblong cake or roasting pan and line it with Reynolds Wrap aluminum foil. Measure sufficient water to permit immersing flat silverware articles and stir in two tablespoons of baking soda for each quart of water. Heat the water to a simmering point; do not allow to boil. Place the tarnished silverware in the pan so it touches the foil. After several minutes, the tarnish should vanish on lightly stained articles. Badly tarnished silver may take longer. To add luster, simply give the pieces a once-over with regular silver polish.

cleaning your silverware, just pour the solution into your sink and throw away the darkened foil. Neither the solution nor the foil will harm your hands. This method is also harmless for the silver.

This soak 'n shine approach can be used on silver or silverplate that you want to have a mirrorlike finish. Do not use it if you want to retain the appearance of



antique silver, because this cleaning method will remove all tarnish—even that in recessed areas. Also, with antique silver, tarnish or dirt may be masking corrosion which may then appear as pits or surface blemishes after cleaning.

With a method as easy as this, giving silver a shimmering luster is no longer an all-day chore!

Facts from a pro on driving to survive.

Q. On the highway I usually drive at the speed limit. What should I do if someone wants to pass?—L. J., Pasadena

A. Move to the right even if you are driving at the speed limit. It's safer to be passed on your left. Trying to block another driver could also lead to an accident. Many drivers have adopted the European signal of flashing their lights at the car ahead to remind the driver to move over. It's safer for both of you and easy on the nerves.

Q. How can I tell if something minor is wrong with my car before it gets worse?— P. H., Carthage

A. Keep a tally on your fuel mileage. Start by writing down the odometer reading when you fill up. At the next fill-up, check the odometer reading again and record the new reading. Then divide the number of miles you've driven since the last fill-up by the number of gallons it takes to fill the tank again. The result will be your total mileage for that tankful.

A car will get better mileage on the highway than it will in town, and one driver may get better mileage than another. But any drastic change in your car's normal mileage is an indication that something is wrong, even though it may mean just a tune-up. An out-of-tune engine will use about 15 per cent more fuel than a well-tuned one.

Q. Is it true that steel-belted radial tires can't be used for high speed driving?—S. R., Quitman

A. No. There were some problems with domestically produced steel radials that led to bad publicity. But those were problems with particular brands, not with steel radials in general. Good, high-quality steel radials will last longer and provide better traction than any other tire. With proper inflation, they also will increase fuel mileage.

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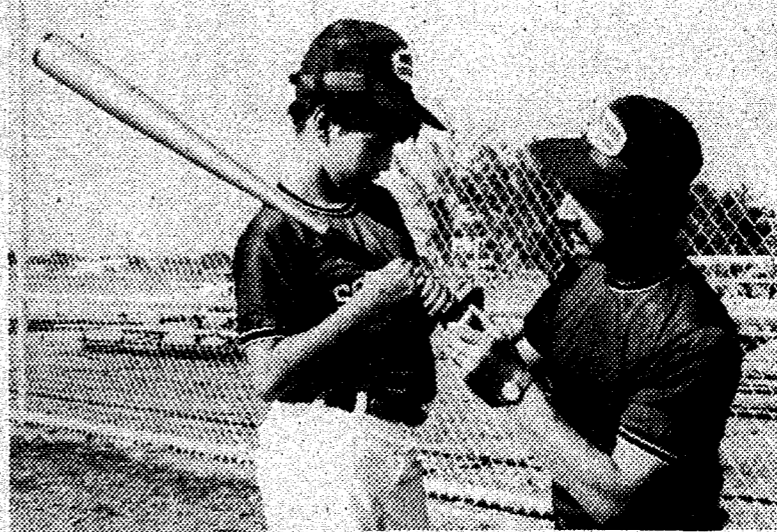

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Cowboy Camp Meeting Was Successful Event

Christian Corral Ranch located near New Braunfels, had several boys present and the boys quartet presented selections both Friday and Saturday night. Bro. Bobby told of his work at the boys ranch. He and his wife, Margie, and two daughters, have been with Bro. George every year since the beginning of the Camp Meeting, leading the singing and accompanying the music.

Four states besides Texas were represented this year. Also a young man from Saltillo, Mexico was there for the entire meeting and joined in with Lucy a few times to sing a song in Spanish.

Vernon Booth and his wife from Odessa were there for the entire meeting. He is a retired Army chef and prepared the barbecue for the chuckwagon suppers both Saturdays.

It is fitting to mention Charlie Rogers of Dallas, who for all these years has been the 'Tent Man.' He comes and sets up the big tent each year and returns at the end of the meeting to take the tent down and was going this year to Waco to set it up again. In his testimony Sunday night, he quoted the 53rd chapter of Isaiah.

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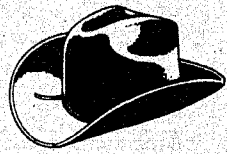

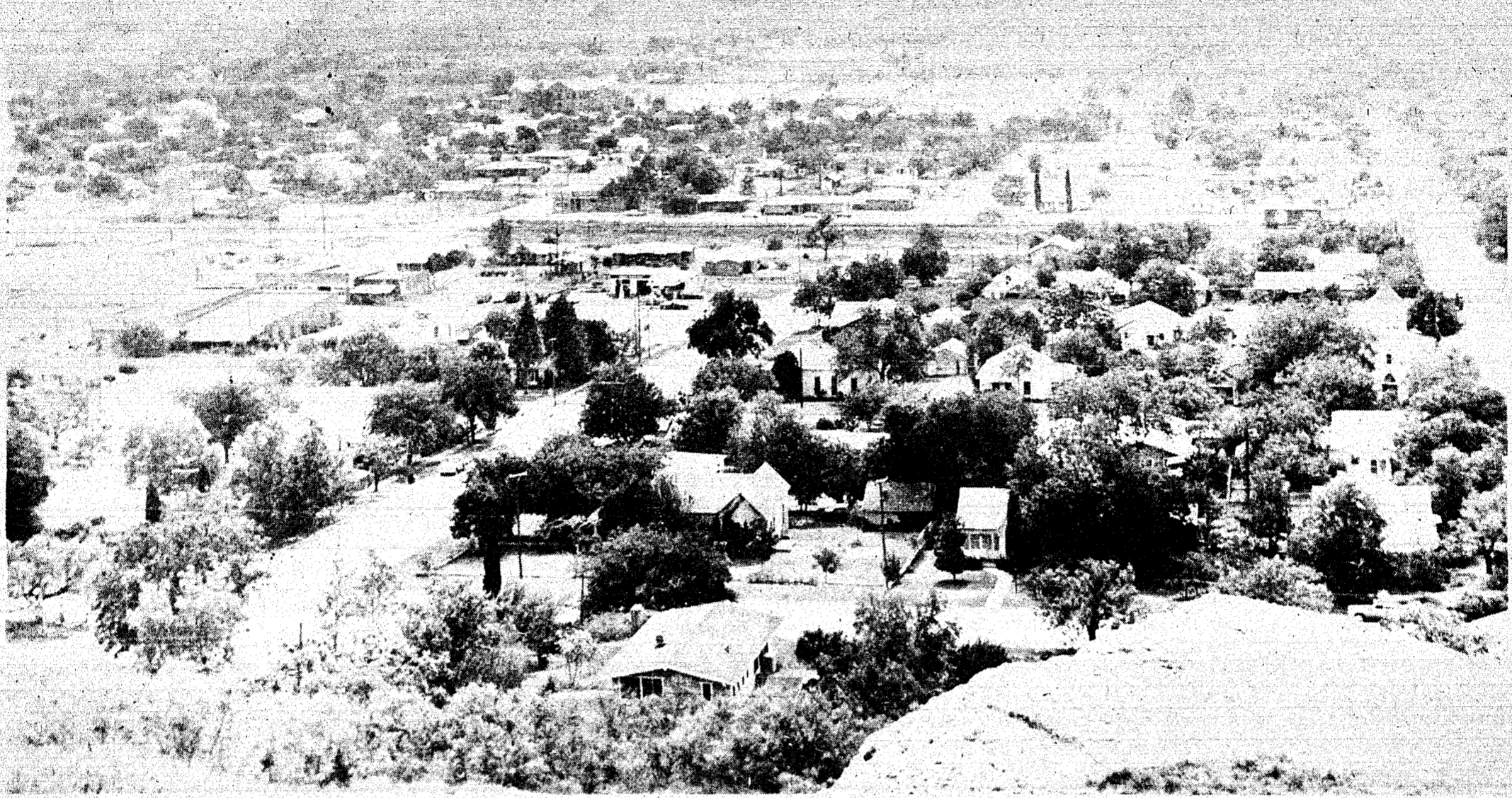

Adventists Give Offering For Blind Ministry

Christian Record Braille Foundation provides spiritual and secular material to blind persons in the United States and 124 foreign nations. The Adventist churches in North America received an offering last Saturday to help furnish materials for these projects.

This foundation prints in braille four recorded magazines as well as the braille magazines -- raised letter printings. It also prints braille books, talking books and full-vision literature, as well as regular type for blind parents of normally sighted children.

Christian Record Braille Foundation employs over 100 district representatives in the United States and Canada, who visit approximately 50,000 blind people each year. They not only serve an important social function but help with individual problems and act as a referral service.

This foundation also conducted 34 blind camps last year. Now in its 11th year, the blind camp program provides young blind people ages 9 to 19 with activities like 'beeper ball', a form of baseball where the ball emits a sound. In archery, the bull's eye has a balloon to pop; they also lead out in 'touch and feel' trails of

nature study. These camps are all free to all blind children, regardless of race or creed.

Any blind person of the ages listed above may attend one of these camps each year conducted by this organization that was formed in 1899.

New Insulation Standards Will Go Into Effect

New insulation standards for housing in rural areas financed by the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will be put into effect, Harold D. Kennedy, County Supervisor, announced today.

Implementation of the standards, first scheduled for March 15, had been held up during federal court consideration of a suit by the National Association of Home Builders challenging the

new code. After FmHA prepared additional environmental material and a further hearing on the case was held, U.S. District Judge George L. Hart, Jr., dissolved a preliminary injunction. While certain aspects of the lawsuit remain to be resolved, the new insulation standards can now be implemented.

The new thermal standards are designed to provide for heavier insulation and other measures to make FmHA-financed housing less costly to heat or cool, and to conserve energy. They will apply to newly-built homes and apartments financed by FmHA, and, insofar as is economically feasible, to existing housing purchased or repaired with FmHA loans. Better weatherizing through more effective insulation, storm doors and windows and other techniques will

help families to reduce high fuel and energy expenses that jeopardize their ability to afford adequate housing.

Details of the standards, which vary by climatic zones, are available from the Brown County FmHA Office located at 510 E. Lee.

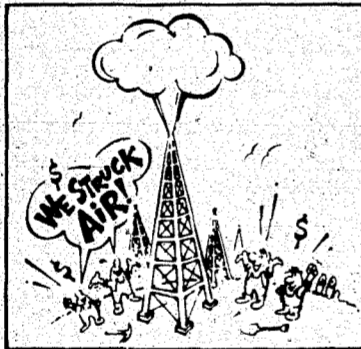
Housing loans administered by FmHA, a U.S. Department of Agriculture agency, serve all rural areas including towns of up to 10,000, and designated towns of 10,000 to 20,000 that are not in Standard Metropolitan Statistical (SMSA) Areas and have a shortage of mortgage credit for families of low and moderate income.



STORING POWER UNDERGROUND AS COMPRESSED AIR

During those hours of the day when consumers aren't using all the electricity a power company can generate, why can't the company store the extra energy for use later?

Sounds like a simple question, but the answer is far more complicated. The whole subject is being studied by Middle South Services and United Engineers and Constructors for possible use on the Middle South power system.



The project involves the design of what may be the nation's first power plant capable of storing energy below the ground in the form of compressed air, and retrieving it later to power large electricity-producing turbine generators.

The compressed air energy storage procedure uses electrical generating capacity available during a utility's "off-peak" hours to drive large air compressors that pump the air underground. The air would be stored in part of the many salt domes that underlie the Middle South system throughout Louisiana and Mississippi.

Then during "peak periods" of high consumer demand the compressed air would be brought to the surface, mixed with fuel oil and ignited. The resulting hot gases would flow through a turbine that drives an electrical generator.
