## Water Restrictions Imposed Again

### Jim Ned Creek Depleted; Well Production Dropping

The City of Santa Anna is back to a critical state with a dwindling water supply, and Mayor Glen Copeland announced last weekend that water restrictions have gone back into effect. There is to be no outside watering and strict conservation is urged for all water use.

Local people were restricted in water usage until the rain in June added a few feet of water to the pump station location on Jim Ned Creek above Lake Brownwood, and water wells were drilled in the area to give additional water for the town.

The creek supply has dried up during the hot weather and

at the present time everyone is asked to restrict water use as much as possible.

Due to typographical errors in the new rate chart listed last week in the NEWS, the new rates are published again. The new water rate will go into effect next month and be reflected on the September bills.

## New Van Available For Senior Citizens' Program

A new 12-passenger Dodge van will be delivered within two weeks to the City of Santa Anna for use in the Area Aging Service program in the community. The new vehicle will be used for transportation of those involved in the program, including transportation for medical treatment, for recreational and other purposes.

Funds for the new vehicle came from a grant through the Central West Texas Council of Governments and the City of Santa Anna.

John Gordon is chairman of the community committee. Other members are Gale Brock, Pierre Rowe, Earl Simmons and Mary Lou Jones.

In the quarterly session of the group last week, a review of the 1978-79 budget was made showing \$3,320 to be available for personnel, travel expenses, office expenses and supplies. The funds include an additional amount over the previous year to take care of expenses of the new vehicle.

The program for the Santa Anna community currently

includes supervision of the 'Meals on Wheels' program, referral services, blood pressure clinics, senior citizens assistance, etc. The committee is making plans to expand the program to include other services and activities for senior citizens in the area.

## Beauty Shop To Open Here

## Rep. Nabers Co-sponsors Tax Reduction Proposal

State Representatives Lynn Nabers of Brownwood and Jim Nugent of Kerrville are co-sponsors of a tax reduction proposal that is expected to be considered during the current special session of the Legislature. Governor Dolph Briscoe has expressed interest in proposals that would effectively reduce property taxes levied by Texas school districts, and the Nugent-Nabers proposal would dedicate one-fourth of the revenue from the State's general sales and use tax to reduce school ad valorem taxes throughout the state.

Nugent and Nabers have expressed hope for a hearing this week on their proposal.

Under their proposal, to be able to receive additional state funds, school districts must reduce the ad valorem taxes it levies for maintenance and operation purposes by \$200 for each \$220 it will receive. The maximum amount by which a school district would have to reduce its taxes would be 50

percent. The additional state money, according to the proposal, would be distributed to school districts on a per Average Daily Attendance basis with the 1978 share being \$220 per ADA.

'The existence of the surplus in the State Treasury and the projected surplus has to mean that the State is taking too much money from the pockets of Texas taxpayers. In our opinion it is time to return part of that money to the taxpayers and we think our approach is most equitable,' Nugent and Nabers said.

Preliminary statistics show that that the proposal would reduce property tax 39 percent in the Santa Anna School District and bring in an additional \$7,638. Coleman ISD would have a 50 percent reduction and an additional \$68,981. Other county schools would have reduction in property taxes from 13 - 35 percent.

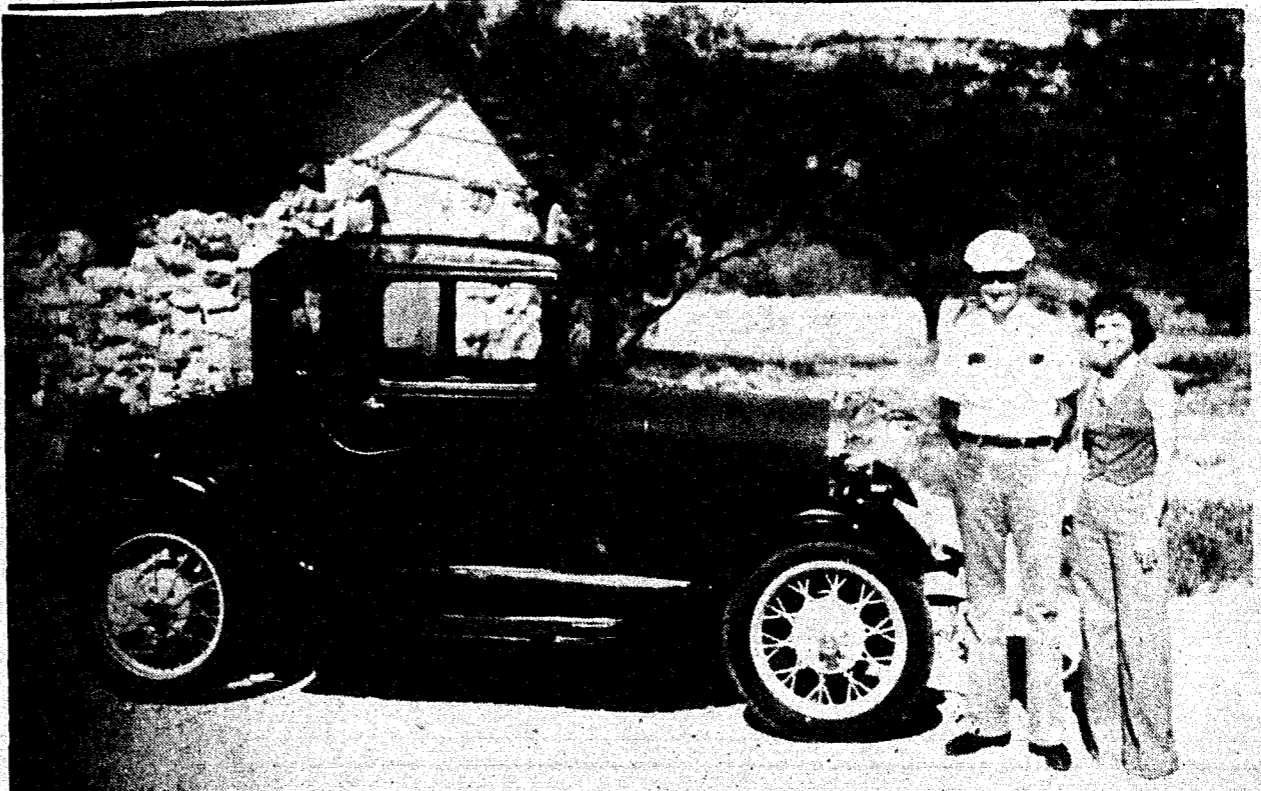
## AARP Tour Group Leaving Tomorrow

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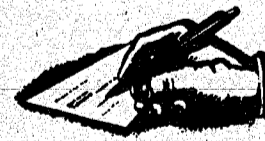

### Information Sought For Museum at Flying H Acres

(From a report of the recent Cowboy Camp Meeting)

In regard to some early day preachers in Coleman County: In about the year 1859, a preacher here in Coleman County (whether a resident or just passing through we do not know) Parson Robertson, and another man were at Robinson Peak (northwest of Coleman) and the Parson had a marriage ceremony he was to perform that night at Buffalo Gap. So the two men started for Buffalo Gap on horseback. On arriving there they found there had been an Indian raid, and the bride-to-be was missing and her family home in shambles. The men exchanged for fresh horses, and were on their way to catch up with the Indians. They did overtake them and found the young woman unharmed. They returned to Buffalo Gap with her and the wedding took place that afternoon late. The Parson was offered an extra dollar for his services, but refused as he considered it just part of his duty.

Rev. Hugh M. Childress was also among the early day pioneer preachers in Coleman County. He settled in the vicinity of 'Old Camp Colorado'. He was a native Texan and served in the War of the Republic and Mexico. He had a son accidentally killed by one of the guards at the Alamo just before the seige.

Many interesting incidents have been related by the descendants of early day preachers in Coleman County in the late 1880's and first quarter of this century. One was a preacher who (if he could not catch a ride) would walk to or from his

appointment; always hoping to at least get a ride one way, the distance of about 15 miles. Another was a missionary for four counties, Coleman being one of them, who had a salary of \$25 a month, and this meant being away from his family for a good part of the month. But God was with these men and blessed their efforts and the people of the Church and community would have an 'old fashioned pounding' which in the testimony of some of the descendants, kept the family from going hungry even the next day.

Last but not least, is the museum at the 'Flying H.' This is something that is being added to a little each year. A number of old things are there, including some old plow tools, saddles, harness, along with a spinning wheel and a number of covered wagons, a buggy and surreys around the grounds.

A major emphasis is being placed on securing a photo or some small personal belonging of some of these early day preachers. At present there are several photos of these pioneer preachers, along with a brief sketch of their life and ministry in the museum. It is hoped that eventually a number of the descendants of some of these men can have a photo or some small personal belonging of the ancestor along with as complete a story of the life and ministry as they know, to contribute to the museum for the enjoyment of all who might pass that way.

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## Man Known Here Elected To Head National Group

## Screwworms Still Reported

Additional pressure was put on Texas livestock producers and on the U. S. Department of Agriculture Screwworm Eradication Program for the first 11 days of July, says Dr. James Wommack.

In that interval six counties recorded their first 1978 screwworm cases and the Texas count climbed from 121 to 173 cases. Wommack, Southwest Regional Director of Veterinary Services of USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, says forty-one Texas counties have tallied screwworm cases this year.


Counties recording their first cases in early July were Coké, Floyd, Medina, Nolan, Reagan and Real. El Paso County has the most recorded cases with 20; Live Oak follows with 16; while Irion and Borden are tied with ten each. Coleman County has had about three cases recorded thus far.

Arizona has tallied 1,518 cases so far this year; the New Mexico count stands at 338; and California has 31.

Dr. Wommack says all known Texas screwworm cases are receiving 'special 'hotspot' treatment of sterile flies in addition to the regular grid treatment. Both Texas Animal Health Commission and APHIS livestock inspectors are doing some spraying of livestock in areas of known screwworm infestation.

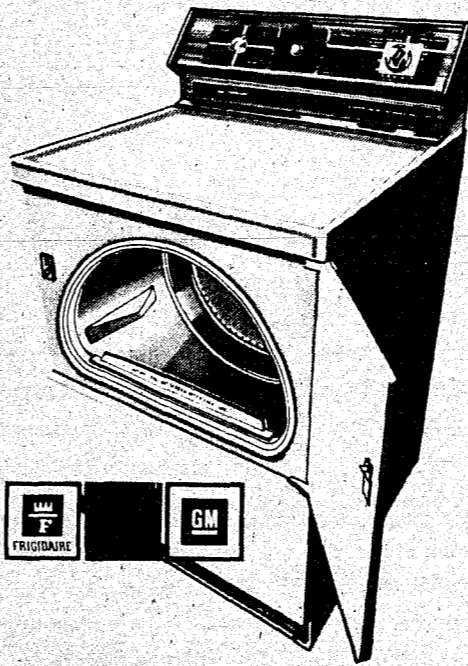

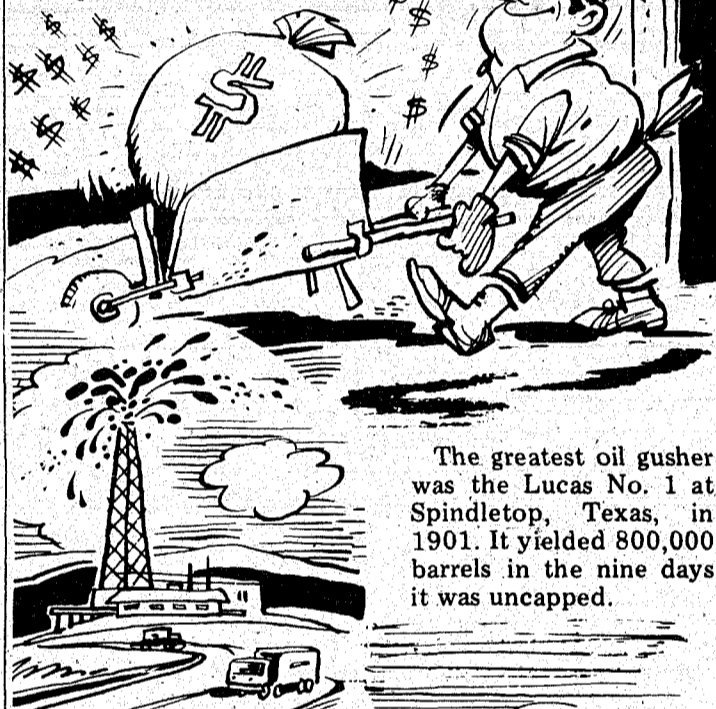

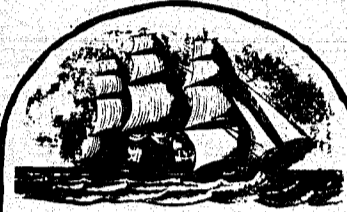

### Full-color map

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — Packed into a new full-color land resources map from the Bureau of Economic Geology at The University of Texas is a variety of data that will be helpful in evaluating economic and environmental aspects of resource use throughout Texas.

The "Land Resources of Texas" map, with a companion text, is the first map of its kind in the U.S.

Measuring six and one-half feet by eight feet (with one inch equalling about eight miles), the UT map identifies 70 land resources which are grouped in eight categories that range from estuary-lagoon-open gulf features to geomorphic units such as mountain terrain, salt domes and faults.

## Brownwood W's To Hold Meeting

The Brownwood Chapter of the Association of the W's (Women Who Want to be Women) will have a meeting on Thursday, July 20, in the Blue Flame Room of the Lone Star Gas Company at 7:30 p.m. The W's is a pro-family organization of men and women concerned with informing the public on vital issues and legislation affecting the family.

One item to be discussed will be the current bill asking for extension of the ratification deadline for the Equal Rights Amendment. The original seven year deadline will be up March 22, 1979. Three-fourths of the states (38) are needed to ratify the amendment within that time limit before it can be added to the Constitution. Only 35 states have ratified so far. Of these, four have indicated they would like to revise their ratification, but it is unclear whether they will be allowed to do so. Proponents of the ERA are now pushing to have the deadline for ratification extended another seven years; yet at the same time, they do not want to allow states that have ratified to be able to rescind. Many proponents of the extension have said that the Equal Rights Amendment makes no mention of a seven year deadline for ratification. The amendment itself does not; however, the bill introducing the Amendment to Congress in 1972 does specify a seven year time limit. This is why ERA opponents and many proponents do agree on one thing—that it would be not only unfair but also unethical to grant an extension to the original seven year deadline. It would be a case of changing the rules in the middle of ball game.
