The State of Texas is divided into ten ecological areas, some of which we are all familiar -- Piney Woods, High Plains, Blackland Prairies, etc.

It is interesting to note that three of the areas extend into Coleman County, with the county being almost equally divided north to south by the Rolling Plains on the east and Edwards Plateau on the west. Taking a tiny corner along the southeast county line is the Cross Timbers and Prairies area.

Other ecological areas assigned by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department are Gulf Prairies and Marshes; Post Oak Savannah; South Texas Plains; and Trans-Pecos, Mountains and Basins.

New Water Source Tapped; More Water Sought For S. A.

Santa Anna's water shortage has not been resolved, but city officials completed a project last week that is giving some relief to the situation and at the present time keeping up with the demand of the town.

A large open pit has been dug near the pump station site at Jim Ned Creek and the water seeping into the excavation is being utilized for the town. An estimate of 100,000 gallons per day is being pumped from the 25-foot-deep trench that was dug in the same formation from which the wells are pumping.

Mayor Glen Cope and said Tuesday that the new source, the wells and the water from the north lake are providing approximately 200,000 gallons per day for the town. This is just enough to keep up with usual household needs for the town, so no outside watering of any kind is permitted. Strict conservation of water is urged so that enforced rationing will not be necessary.

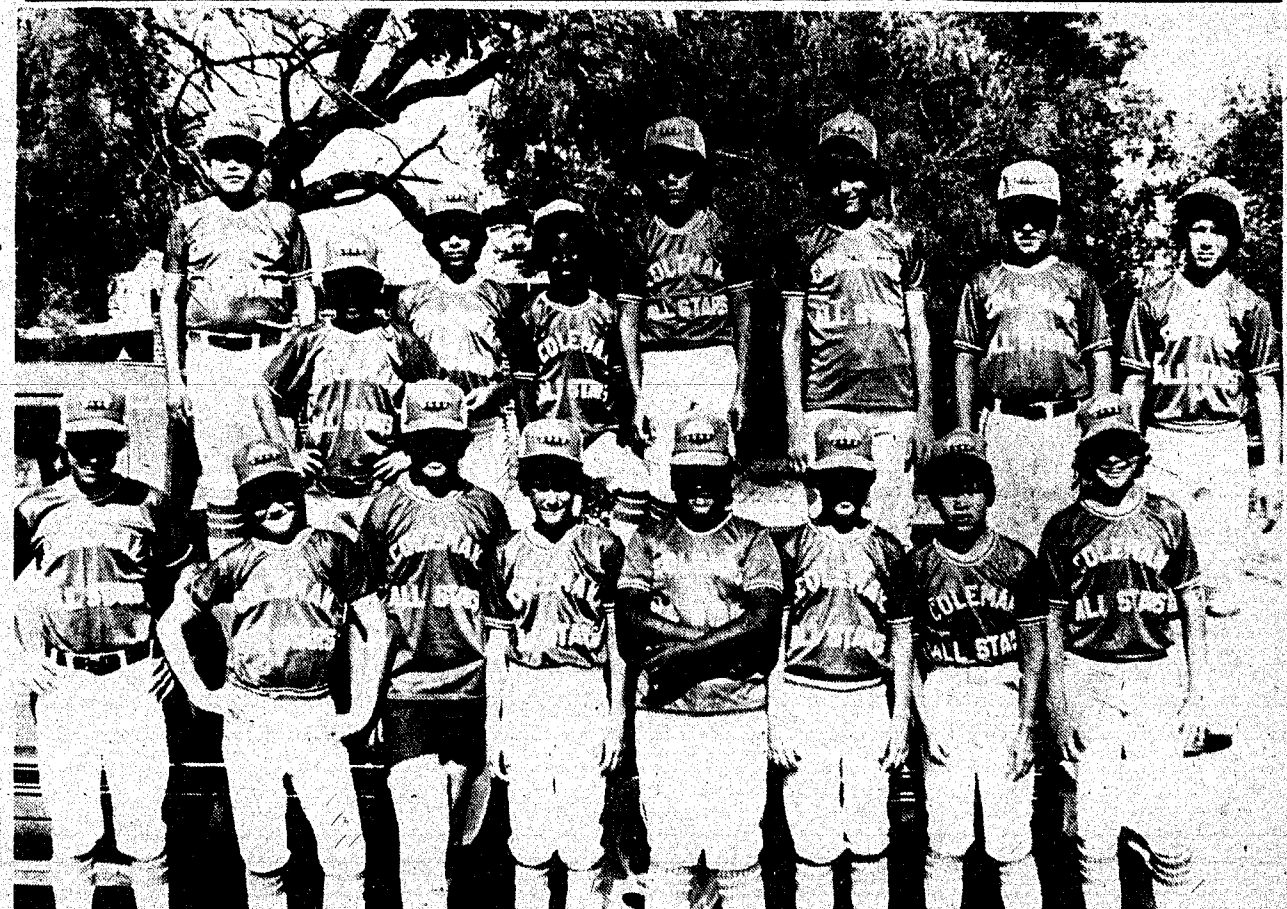

Local Couple Employed At Sanderson

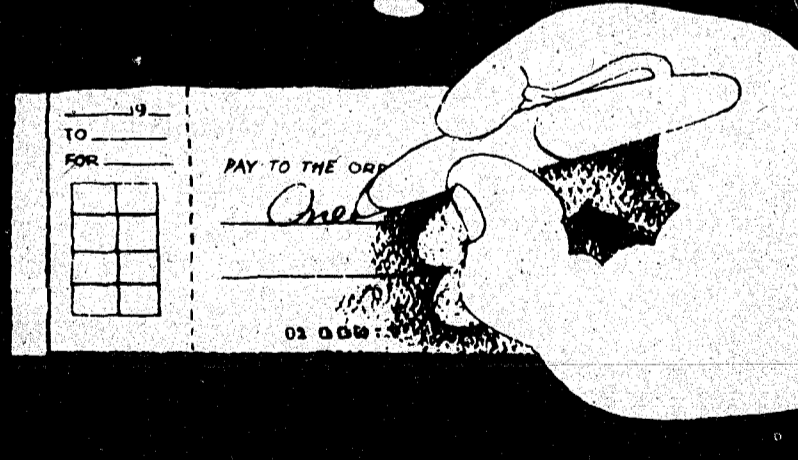
Mr. and Mrs. Jim Eubank have moved to Sanderson where they will be making their home and teaching and coaching in the schools.

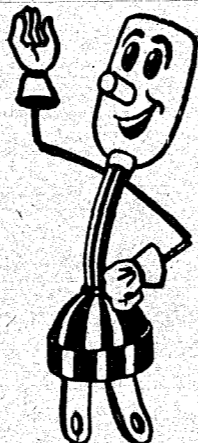

ASU President A Director For WT Utilities

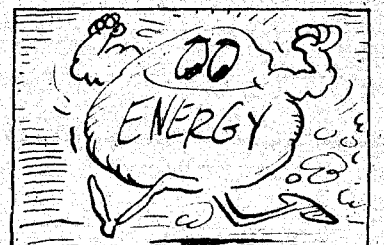
Dr. Lloyd D. Vincent, president of Angelo State University, has been named to the Board of Directors of West Texas Utilities Co.
