While most people are despairing about the prolonged drought, one Coleman County woman has found it has its compensations.

Almost apologetically she admitted that with the extended dry weather she has had a really good summer. Her reasoning was: 1. No yard work to do (she has had to mow her yard only once all year); 2. No canning or preserving of fruits and vegetables (no garden or orchard to tend); and 3. An absence of the usual summer visitors (who have heard about the heat and dry weather in the country).

Our friend admitted that there has been time for reading and relaxing -- unusual in the summertime.

Some towns have "Yard of the Month" awards to encourage residents to beautify their property and make their homes more attractive. In Santa Anna the field of competition would be narrowed to those who have their own water systems -- the rest of the folks are hampered by the water restrictions.

The latest report from city officials is the water supply is about the same -- just holding up to restricted household use.

As one optimist stated, "We're one day closer to that good rain!"

'Meals On Wheels' Provides Service For Local Folks

The 'Meals on Wheels' program, created by the Aging Service and sponsored by the Community Ministerial Service, has announced a change in the program.

Due to inflation in grocery prices and the increased cost for the preparation of the meals, prices for the meals will be increased from \$1.25 to \$1.40 per day. This is the price the service pays for the preparation of the food at a local restaurant.

People of lower incomes will pay 80 cents a day instead of 60 cents. The price increase is effective September 1.

The purpose of the program is to help persons who do not eat well for many reasons. The program is mostly for persons aged 60 or above or those disabled, or those who cannot afford to prepare their meals that are nourishing and well balanced, or who do not have the incentive to prepare their own food.

'Meals on Wheels' are delivered in Santa Anna by volunteers from the five participating churches, five days a week. This service helps the older disabled, isolated persons to better health through proper nutrition, and helps them remain self-sufficient as long as possible.

The meals are served at noon each weekday, following a 'bland' diet, without drink, bread or dessert.

Pedestrian Accident July 27 Kills Bangladesch Woman

A visitor from Bangladesh (Pakistan) was killed instantly Thursday in Santa Anna when she stepped in front of a passing automobile in the west part of town. Mrs. Kushum K. Dewri, 66, was pronounced dead at the scene. The accident occurred at 9:05 p.m. in front of the Melvin Justin home at 1205 Wallis Avenue where she was visiting.

According to reports, Mrs. Dewri, her husband and her daughter and family, Elder and Mrs. Melvin Justin and children, were walking from the home of friends where they had been dinner guests. Mrs. Dewri apparently did not see the east bound auto and stepped into its path.

Kenneth Herring of Odessa was driver of the auto, and his son was a passenger in the vehicle. No charges were filed in the mishap that occurred just at dusk.

Funeral services for Mrs.

Dewri will be held Thursday (today) at the Seventh-day Adventist Church at 4 p.m. with Henderson Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Burial will be in the Santa Anna Cemetery.

Born in Barisal, Bangladesh January 14, 1912, Mrs. Dewri was a member of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Survivors are her husband, Satish Ch. Dewri of Barisal; a daughter, Mrs. Nihar Justin of Santa Anna; three sons, Nimal Ch. Dewri of Washington, Rangil Kr. Dewri of India and Alfred Dewri of Dacca, Bangladesh; two sisters and three brothers and 13 grandchildren.

The Dewris were making their first visit to the United States and had not seen their daughter in 14 years or met either of the two grandchildren. Elder Justin is chaplain at the Ranger Park Medical Center and Mrs. Justin is a registered nurse.

Grass Fire Causes Damage Near Railroad Right-of-Way

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department had a busy day Thursday when grass and pastureland along two miles of railroad right-of-way burned. The area stretched from the city dump ground to the city limits.

The fire was ignited all along the way by a 'hotbox' on a railroad car, starting numerous fires along both sides of the track. The greatest damage was to an estimated 1,000 new cross ties that were placed along the right-of-way prior to re-building the railroad track.

Several miles of fences were said to be destroyed or damaged, and pasture at the Corky Chapman place and the Milford Harris place were burned.

The VFD took four trucks to the fire and were able to control the blaze at houses and buildings adjoining the railroad track. The Bangs Fire Department came to the aid of the Santa Anna VFD, as well as a number of local volunteers who assisted with the fire.

Later that day the VFD was called to the Curtis Collins place south of Santa Anna where a small grass fire burned a few acres of grassland near an oil tank battery on the Pautsky and Hudson Oil Lease. There was no damage to the tanks or equipment at the site that is on a county road east of the Whon Farm Road.

The only other fire call during the past week was Tuesday, July 25, when a pick-up truck belonging to a Coleman man burned. The mishap, of undetermined origin, occurred on a county road in the Liberty Community. The 1976 Chevrolet pickup was said to be a total loss in the fire.

Change Set In Blood Pressure Testing Program

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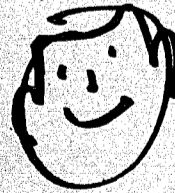

Coal Mining Application Recommended For Approval

Chesley N. Blevins, legal examiner for the Railroad Commission of Texas, who conducted the hearing at Rockwood on an application to surface mine coal in that area, has completed his report and proposal for decision.

The report will be submitted to the Commission September 11 at 9 a.m. and Blevins' recommendation is that the findings of fact and conclusions of law be adopted and that the permit be granted, subject to permit provisions, also cited in his report.

It is understood that copies of the examiner's report were mailed to all persons who registered at the Rockwood hearing.

If the Railroad Commission grants approval of the coal mining permit September 11, work is expected to start within a few weeks at the mining area that is located southwest of the town of

Rockwood. That is the opinion of David Williams, attorney for Amistad Fuel Company (Little Bull Creek Project).

According to a story in the August 1 issue of Coleman Democrat Voice, more complete plans for placing the project into operation will be made at a meeting later this month in California. Williams is of the opinion that with approval of the permit the company will act quickly to get into operation.

An easy-to-make cake that can reign beautifully at bridal showers and other festive occasions is a dream of a frozen Orange-Cream.

It needs no baking and can be prepared days ahead. It has layers of cookies, a delicate orange flavor and bits of cherries and nuts to create a counterpoint of pretty color and satisfying, crunchy texture.

FROZEN ORANGE CAKE

- 2 bags (6-3/4 ounces each) Pepperidge Farm Bordeaux Cookies
 - 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
 - 1 can (6 ounces) frozen concentrated orange juice, thawed and undiluted
 - 2 cups (1 pint) heavy cream, whipped
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped pecans
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped maraschino cherries
 - Garnish—whipped cream and strawberries
- Line a 9x9x2-inch pan with foil, allowing excess to hang over sides. Use enough cookies to line sides and bottom of pan. In saucepan mix gelatin and orange juice. Stir over low heat until gelatin is dissolved. Chill until mixture is cold but not thickened. Fold in cream, pecans and cherries. Spoon half of cream mixture into pan. Top with remaining cookies. Freeze until hard. Remove cake from pan using excess foil to pull out cake. Cut into serving-size pieces while still frozen. Garnish with whipped cream and strawberries, let stand 20 minutes before serving. Makes one 9-inch-square cake.

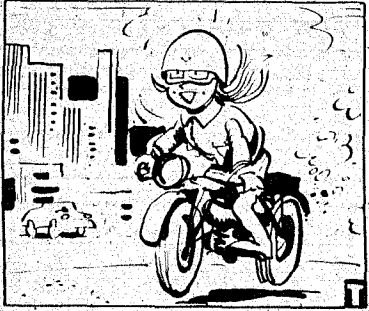
HOME FROM VACATION

Drownings Increase At Corps Lakes

Concern was expressed last week by Corps of Engineers officials about the rapid increase of drownings during the month of July. Col. John F. Wall, district engineer, Fort Worth District, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, has announced.

The Fort Worth District, which operates 17 lakes throughout Texas, had a good record for the first half of the year -- through June -- said Col. Wall. But the month of July had a marked increase in drownings with 22 people having drowned so far, compared to 16 for the first six months of this year.

Last year the Corps registered more than 36 million visitors at their lakes in Texas with a total of 40 drownings.

This year to date more than 19 million visitors have visited Corps. Lakes and the number of

fatalities from drownings stand at 38.

Col. Wall pointed out that simple observance of fundamental rules of water safety would have prevented most of these drownings. He also stated that the drought has caused the lake levels to drop drastically and changed the once familiar shoreline to one with more hazards for swimmers and boaters.

Included in the lakes is Hords Creek Lake near Coleman.

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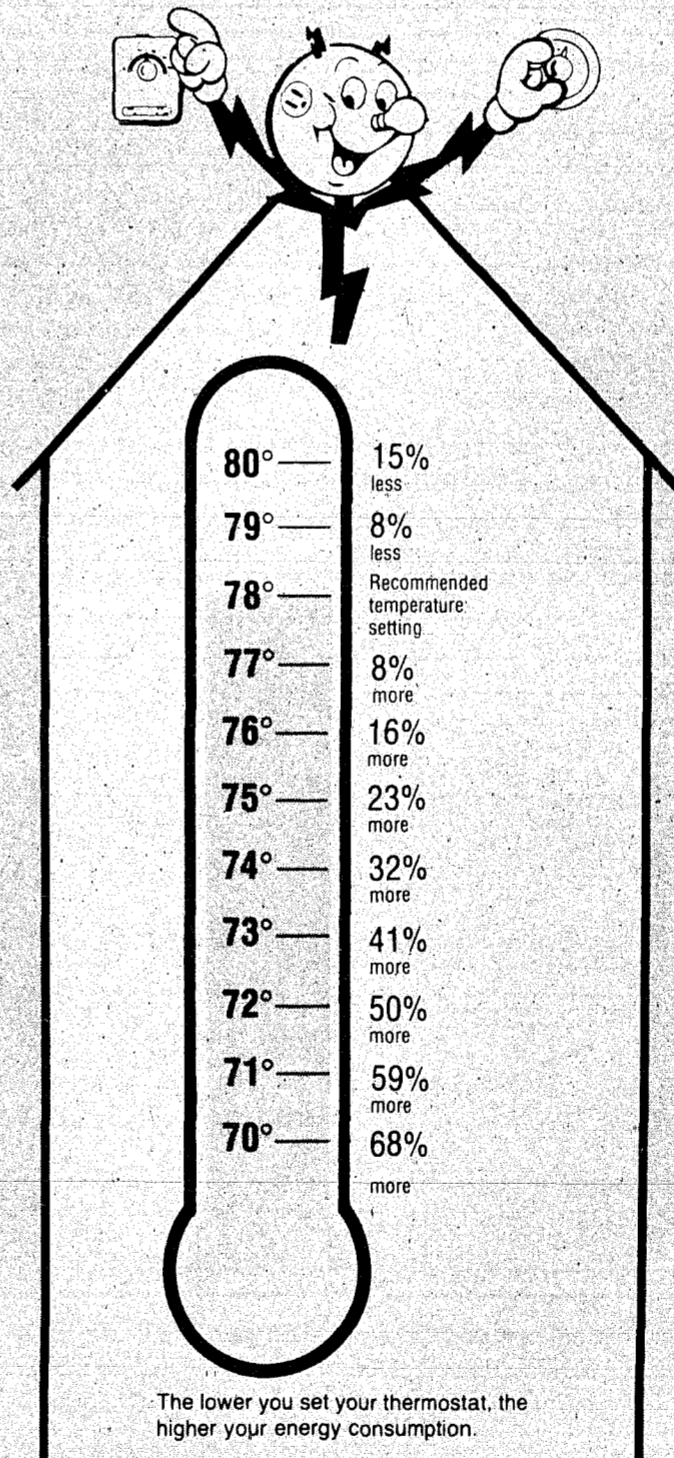



Manmade Wounds Cause Many Screwworm Cases

Man continued to be his own worst enemy during June in the seemingly endless war against screwworms.

If he had a rival at all in this unenviable category it was, ironically, 'man's best friend' -- the dog -- which is attracting screwworms in unprecedented numbers this year.

During June cattle accounted for 71 per cent of the 1130 screwworm cases submitted to the Mission Lab for identification from five states, Arizona, California, New Mexico, Arkansas and Texas.

This is pretty much normal and bothers very few of those concerned with the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program. What does bug them, though, is that 17 years after the program began nearly half of those cases -- 45 per cent -- were discovered in manmade wounds -- dehorning, castrating and branding.

Of 807 cases identified in cattle in June, 368 were attributed to manmade wounds.

Dogs are another matter. Seldom subjected to screwworm attracting wounds, they nevertheless accounted for 214 cases in June, 19 per cent of the month's total, and second only to cattle in frequency. Most canine cases have turned up in fighting wounds and skin ailments of one sort or another, although screwworm larvae took advantage of such diverse habitats as bullet holes and snakebites.

'It just doesn't take much of a

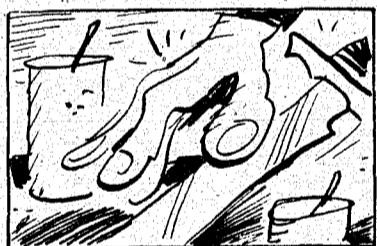
wound for screwworms', a spokesman said. 'Any dog with the mange who scratches himself is a candidate for screwworm attention if they're around. All it takes is a trace of blood for one of them to begin laying an egg mass.'

Only three dog cases could be attributed to surgery in a detailed breakdown of the June screwworm report.

As far as wound-induced infestations are concerned sheep and goat producers have been just as careless as cattle ranchers, although the extent of the problem is nowhere as severe. There were only 25 positive cases submitted from these quadrupeds during June but an almost identical proportion, 42 per cent, were the result of docking, castrating and clipping wounds.

Horses accounted for six per cent of the June cases, 71, but only two were for reasons of surgery. One case was discovered in a mule.

Swine accounted for nine cases to round out the June total of 'positives'. Two of those resulted from surgery.

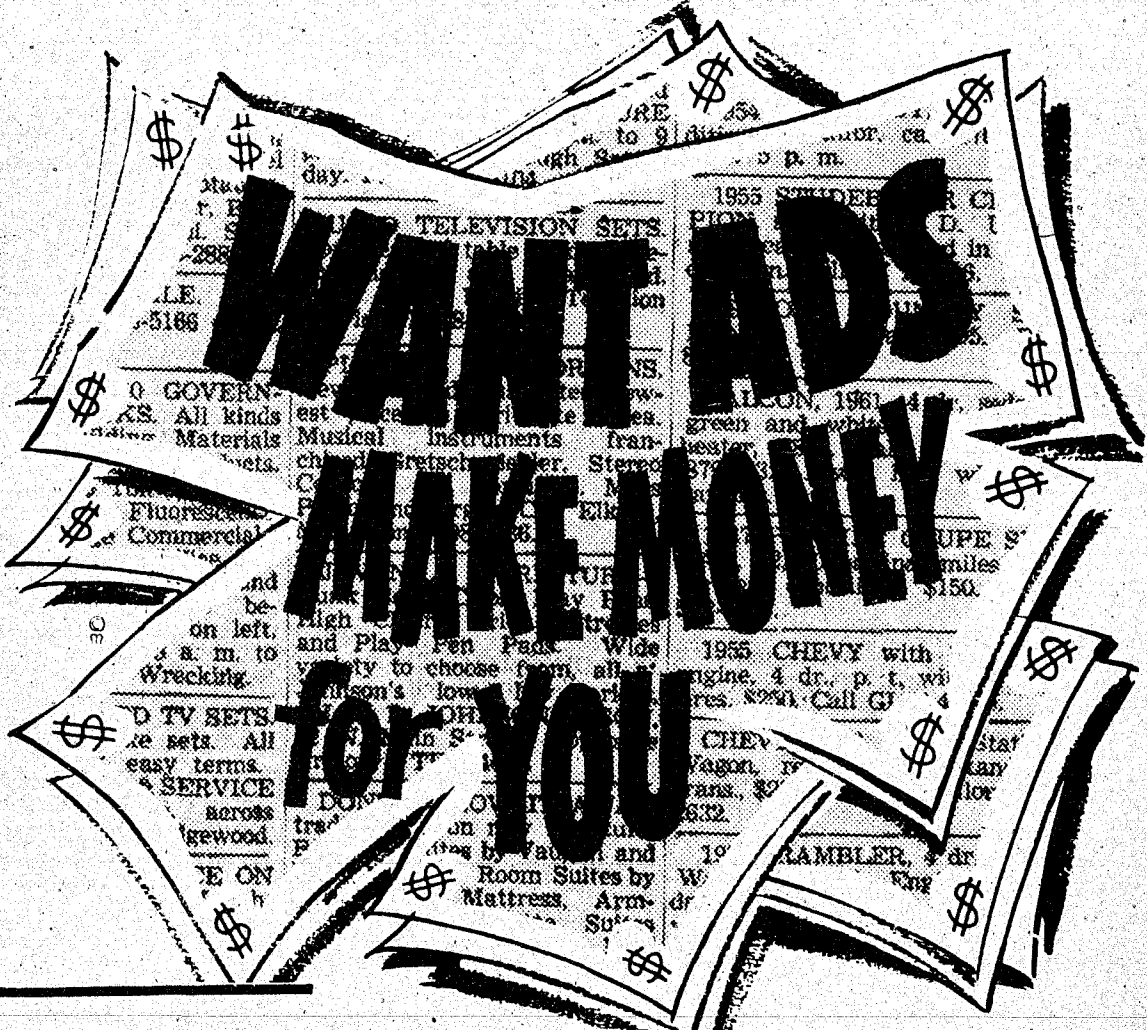

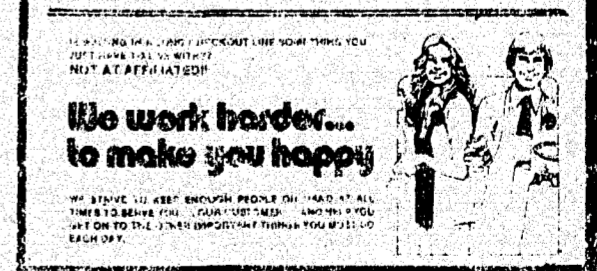
