

The Santa Anna community received the best rainfall of many months last week when 4.20 inches was measured officially in town. The first four inches of rain fell Wednesday and Thursday, August 2 and 3, and an additional quarter inch or so was measured Saturday, August 5.

Rainfall up to six to eight inches was measured in some of the surrounding areas, and at least three or more inches of rain fell in the entire area. Those with large amounts of rain had tanks and lakes filled during the weekend; where rainfall was lighter there was very little run-

Large rains in the north part of Coleman County and the Brownwood Lake watershed almost filled Lake Brownwood. The lake had risen to within a few feet of the spillway level this week. The good rains brought vast amounts of water down Jim Ned Creek and filled the area from

which Santa Anna gets city water. Santa Anna officials feel the city water shortage is solved for many months, and water restrictions in Santa Anna have been lifted. Very little water was impounded at the city lakes, however, and Mayor Glen Copeland estimated about one foot of water was added.

The past week's rainfall brings the total in Santa Anna for 1978 to 13.92 inches.

He married Nancy Willard Stephenson in Santa Anna May 7, 1921.



Parents and friends of the county group were also in Waco for the game Tuesday afternoon.


Santa Anna boys on the team are Ike Garza, Maurice Costillo, Paul Vasquez and James Simmons, an alternate.







Oil Industry **Boosts Economy** In Coleman Co.

The multi-billion dollar boost that oil and gas industry operations gave to Texas economy in 1977 was shared by the citizens of Coleman County.

The marketed value of petroleum production in the county has been calculated at \$14 million in an economic activity profile of the state's leading producing counties prepared by the Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Coleman was one of 201 counties last which produced petroleum with a marketed value of \$100,000 or more. The county ranked 139th in the estimated total value of petroleum produced. The Association has computed that some \$7.5 million came from the production of 828,500 barrels crude with approximately \$6.5 million attributed to an output of 7.2 million MCF of natural gas. Payments last year to owners of royalty in the county were calculated at \$1.7 million.

While paying local, county and state property taxes, producers in the county also helped support state government through production tax payments estimated at \$831,700. This included \$344,500 from crude oil output, \$487,200 from natural

According to the Texas Employment Commission, during 1977 some 135 employees worked for the industry in the county.

The search for more petroleum continued in Coleman County last year. Oil and gas developers spent an estimated \$16.8 million in the drilling of 249 wells, including 26 classified as wildcats. Some of that was lost in 78 dry holes. The 171 strikes included 127 oil wells and 44 gas

Processing also contributed to the county's petroleum-related economy through the operation of one natural gasoline processing plant with a daily capacity of 1.5 million cubic feet.
