Emergency Loans Available Through Farmers Home

A new Economic Emergency loan service for farmers and ranchers who have financial problems caused by credit shortage or cost-price squeeze is now in effect through the U.S. Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

Thomas E. Hill, the agency's County Supervisor for Coleman County, reports that the FmHA is prepared to take' applications at the office in Coleman.

Economic Emergency loans are authorized under the will be at an interest rate Agricultural Credit Act of 1978 equivalent to the cost of money signed by President Carter secured by the government August 4. They offer special help through sale of its securities to to farmers who are hard-pressed the public, plus an administrative by recent shortage of credit from add-on of up to one percent. The their regular lenders, or by debts rate initially will be 81/2 per cent. accumulated during the recent period of low farm prices.

Hill said the Economic Emergency loan program was providing the lender up to a 90 enacted by Congress, with Administration support, in recognition of the fact that 'economic conditions, as well as weather, are often beyond farmers' control."

FmHA emergency credit has previously been confined to loans for recovery from natural disaster, or the guarantee of private lenders' loans to livestock producers affected by economic conditions.

Loans made directly by FmHA Guaranteed loans will be made at rates negotiated between borrower and lender, with FmHA percent guarantee against loss.

Loans for operating purposes will be made for terms of up to seven years, with loan considerations and rescheduling for another seven years permitted, and 20-year payment authorized under special conditions. Real estate loans may be made for up to 40 years. Loans for annually-recurring expenses will be repayable annually.

Inquiries about the loans can be made through a commercial agricultural lender or at the county FmHA office. The Act calls for decision by FHA on individual applications within 30 days.

SHOOTING HOURS:

Mourning doves: 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset.

White-winged doves and mourning doves during the Sept. 2, 3, 9 and 10 season: noon to sunset.

SPECIAL NOTES:

- No person shall possess more than one daily bag limit of freshly killed migratory game birds while in the field.
- Any freshly killed migratory birds given to another person, except at the residence of either the person giving or receiving the birds, must have a tag attached signed by the hunter who took the birds stating his address, total number of birds of each species and the date birds were taken.
- No hunting permitted in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves or from public roads or road rights of way.
- No hunting is permitted in closed sanctuaries (see reverse side) during white-winged dove season.
- •The retention of one fully-feathered wing on dressed doves is required / in those counties having a white-winged dove season when both mourning and white-winged doves may be taken and in the South Zone at all times. This requirement also applies when doves are imported from Mexico or any foreign country. Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than 10-gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.
- A White-winged Dove Stamp for a \$3.00 fee is required of all persons who hunt white-winged doves. This stamp is required in addition to the valid hunting license.
- A valid importation permit (fee \$1:00) is required for the importation of wild game birds (or animals) from the Republic of Mexico, Each permit is valid for a maximum of 30 days, from the date of issue, Permits are available from all Parks and Wildlife Department district offices and wherever hunting and fishing licenses are sold in the Rio Grande Valley Area.




