### Received In Area

Santa Anna and the surrounding area received a good rain Monday night, adding to the August total.

The official gauge in Santa Anna showed 1.55 inches from the rain. Only a light shower fell south of town, but the Rockwood area had up to two inches, according to reports.

The heaviest rainfall to be reported was in the Buffalo community where 2.5 inches was reported.

The Monday night moisture brings a total of 5.85 inches for Santa Anna for the month of August.

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## Grass Fires In Area; VFD Suspects Arson

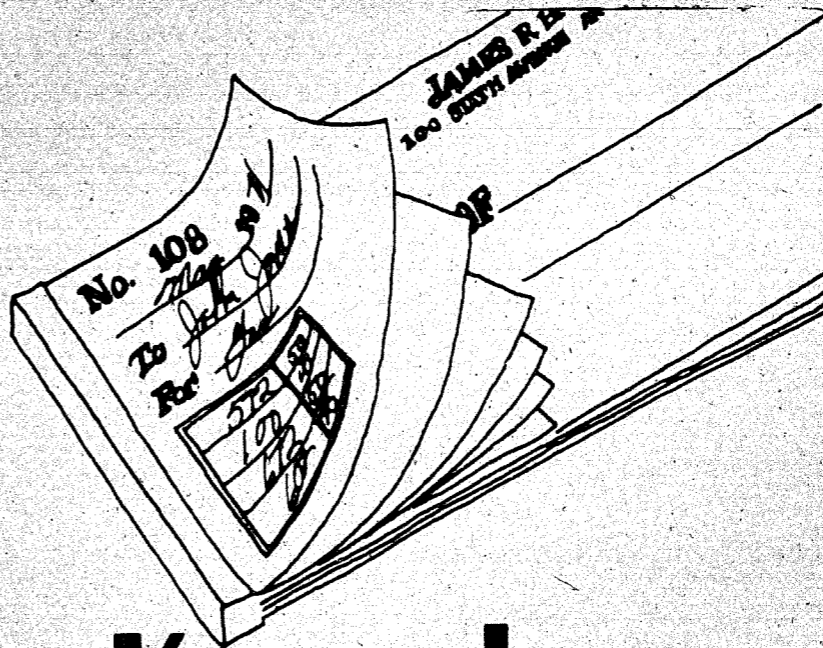
The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department had calls to two fires Friday, both in the same general vicinity along the same county road where grass and pastureland burned. The fires were apparently set by vandals or pranksters, according to VFD spokesmen.

One fire was on the Casey Herring place where five or six acres of a coastal Bermuda field burned along the roadway. The other fire was on the C. E. Kingsbery place on the road that runs east and west from the Trickham Farm Road. Eight to 10

acres of pastureland burned on the Kingsbery place.

The grass fires along the county roads are becoming more frequent, and VFD members have asked that landowners watch for suspected arsonists and report any suspicious vehicles or individuals. So far there has been very little damage from the fires, but it is a great effort and expense to fight even the smallest fires.

Another fire during the past week was at the railroad right-of-way in the Liberty Community where some cross ties burned along the tracks.

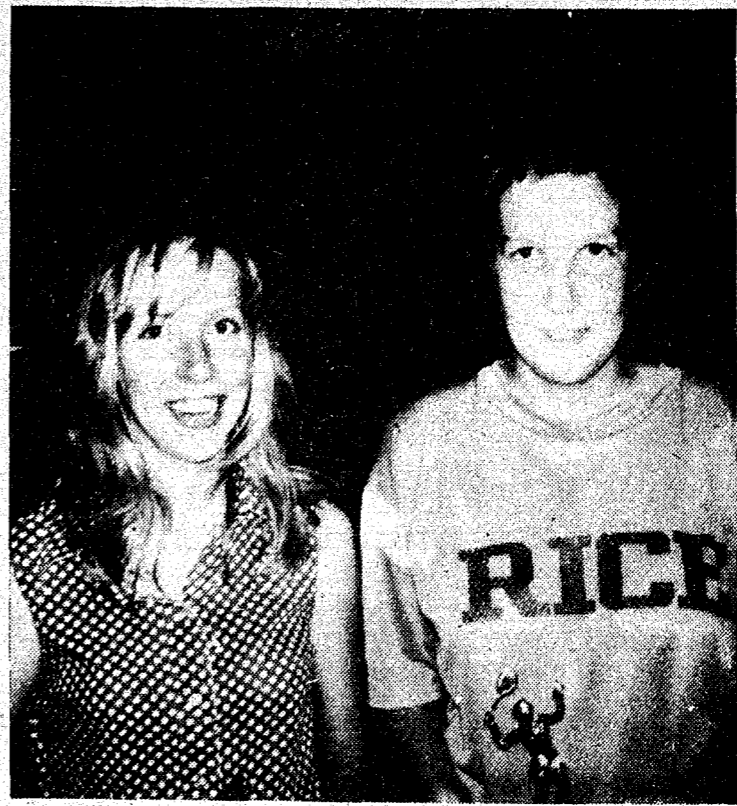

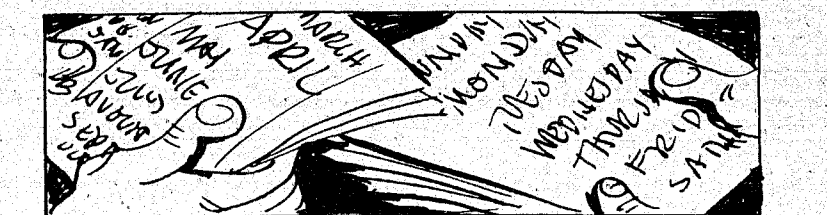

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**Q. Why are some yield signs red and others yellow? Should they be treated the same way?**  
—L. G., Seminole

A. Both signs require you to yield to traffic at an intersecting street; however, the yellow is gradually being replaced by the red. Texas and other states are participating in a new system of traffic signs in which visual cues substitute for word messages. The new red color distinguishes the yield sign from the yellow cautionary signs and as with the red stop sign, indicates that there is a specific procedure you must observe.

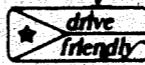
**Q. Our children enjoy riding in our house trailer on long vacation trips. Although they keep themselves amused this way and can't bother my husband when he drives, I wonder if it is safe.**—P. J., Cuero

A. No. In fact, it is against the law. Any abrupt movement of the trailer could toss them against a dangerous object or cause something to fall on them and injure them. Instead, keep your children buckled up and occupied in the back seat of your car with games, books and puzzles.

**Q. Living on the Gulf Coast, I'm no stranger to rain. I know hydroplaning tires are dangerous. At what speed does hydroplaning begin, and what can I do to avoid it?**—B. N., Friendswood

A. Hydroplaning—losing traction on a wet road surface—can begin at speeds as low as 30 mph. At 55 mph or more, the tire can lose complete contact with the pavement, causing you to lose control of your steering and braking. Extra-wide tires and tires with thin threads will hydroplane at lower speeds. During a storm or when there is standing water on the road, slow down. And avoid driving with badly worn tires.

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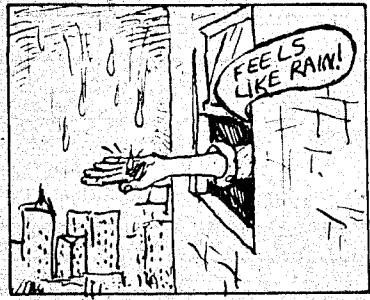
# 4-H Event Set Sept. 11

## County Women Attend Hearing On Textbooks

Anna Kennedy and Marie Coursey of Coleman and Betty Grant of Abilene, members of the Association of the W's attended the State Textbook Committee hearings in Austin Monday, August 21.

The committee was divided and simultaneous hearings were held in two different buildings. Many individuals and groups testified during the hearing. The local people heard testimony given by Mrs. R. C. Bearden Jr. of San Angelo, State Textbook Chairman, Texas Society of Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). Objections are based on the Texas Textbook Proclamation which says what the books for Texas schoolchildren can or cannot have in them. She had bills against 28 books, citing selections which she believes are anti-American, anti-Free Enterprise System and pro-socialism.

Also testifying Monday were various individuals opposing selections which "lead the students to question moral absolutes, which promote racial strife, or which show America in a bad light or promote one-world government and disarmament."

The committee will be voting on these books and making a proposed list of books for adoption. If there are books put on the list that are objectionable,

Texans can appeal to the Commissioner of Education, who can remove a book, or they can appeal to the State Board of Education before final adoption in November. The list will then go to local school districts for adoption in the spring. Books that are adopted locally will be in use in the schools beginning next school year.

## Vandalism Hurts Hunters' Image

"A principal factor in the minds of everybody in the saving of hunting as a form of recreation is the performance of the hunter," said John Gottschalk, executive vice president of the International Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies in a recent speech.

He stressed if someone vandalizes a farm or insults a citizen, he has tarnished the image of all hunters.

Texans can see this pattern every day as they drive the state's highways. Currently, gun vandals do more than \$750,000 worth of damage to highway facilities each year. Road signs and rest areas are special targets, Gottschalk said.

"Such actions are a disgrace to decent sportsmen and responsible gun owners. It doesn't take much shooting skill to destroy a yield sign or flashing light with a firearm at close range," he said.

Gottschalk pointed out that this wanton vandalism is paid for by the taxpayer. Even the smallest highway sign costs about \$10 to replace, not counting labor.

But the monetary cost is only one side of a more serious story. Vandalism can cost human lives. The obliteration of signs and flashing lights can affect driving safety.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department joins Gottschalk and concerned sportsmen in asking that Texans help stop this destruction by reporting such acts to their nearest law enforcement officer or office.

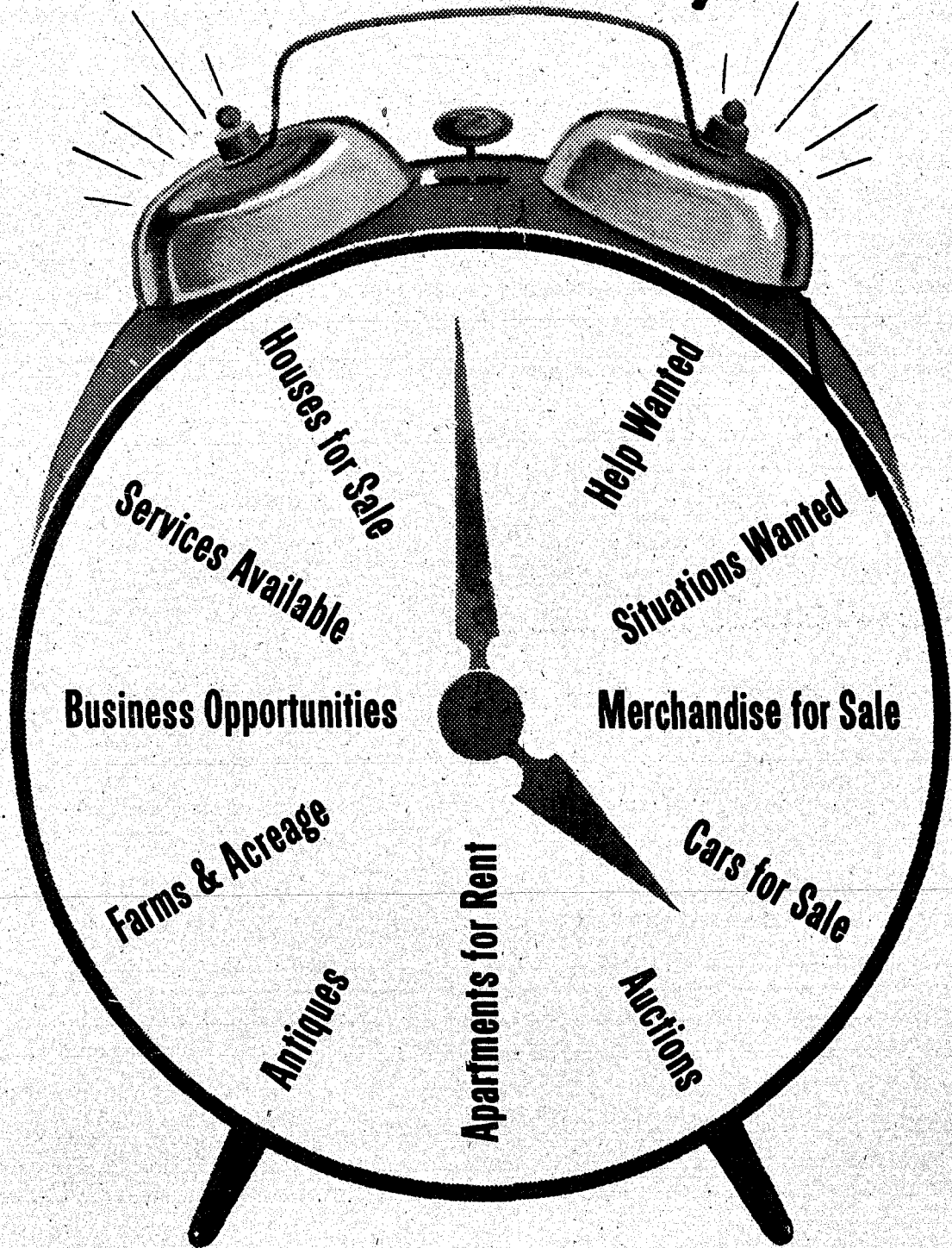
AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — Child's play is serious business for Dr. Joe L. Frost, a University of Texas professor of curriculum and instruction.
