Local Woman At Workshop In Oklahoma

Mrs. JoB. Horne of Santa Anna recently attended a three-day seminar on how to seek employment as an older worker. Mrs. Horne joined 50 Green Thumb workers from Oklahoma and 50 Green Thumb workers from Texas.

The seminar was conducted by staff of Southeastern Oklahoma State University and held at Camp Savage located on Lake Texoma in Oklahoma. It was designed to prepare older workers to effectively seek and obtain meaningful employment.

Green Thumb is funded by the Older Americans Act and provides part-time community service employment for limited income rural elderly persons. One goal of Green Thumb is to find, develop and place Green Thumb workers in unsubsidized employment.

Bulldogs Maul Mounties; SAHS To Miles Friday

The Eden Bulldogs brought their own version of the Blitzkrieg to the local football stadium last Friday night. Their craft was piloted by Mike McIntosh who completed 8 of 15 passes for 183 yards and three touchdowns. Flying support for McIntosh were Tommy Ham, who ran the ball 18 times for 191 yards and two TDs.

Alex Rogers, who ran the ball 12 times for 119 yards and one touchdown, and giant stormtrooper Frank Medders, the tightend who gathered in five passes for 117 yards and two TDs.

The Mountaineers, who trailed 27-0 after only 13:20 of the game had lapsed, drove the ball 68 yards on seven plays to score the first of the night when Dwayne Warnock, behind the blocking of Dick Smith, Curtis Fellers, Mike Ballard and Rusty Buzzard, galloped 12 yards untouched into

the end zone. Dwayne, on a halfback pass, connected with Bruce Pape for the two extra point play. Score was Eden 27 - Santa Anna 8.

Eden scored on a 23-yard field goal with 1:10 left in the first half, however the Mountaineers came back on a two-yard scoring pass from Tommy Harris to Rusty Buzzard and a two-point conversion by Warnock to make the half time score 38-16.

Eden scored in the third quarter but the extra point was blocked by Bruce Pape - his second block of the night.

With 4:25 remaining in the third quarter Tommy Harris climaxed a 66-yard drive by diving into the Motherland for the last Santa Anna TD of the night. Mike Warnock, the Mountaineer leading rusher for the night with 92 yards, dashed into the end zone for the two final points of the (See FOOTBALL, Page 5)

Trickham Church Observes Centennial Anniversary

The Centennial Celebration of Trickham Baptist Church Sunday, October 1 was an epoch-making event. The program was a tribute to the faithful workers of the past, and an inspiration to those of the present day. It was well attended by many friends and former members, and about 170 were present for the program and lunch.

Clayborn James directed the music, and Rev. Louis Stuckey gave the message. Rev. Travis Gibson, a former pastor, gave the welcome and directed the program. Rev. J. H. Martin of Trickham told of the organization and growth of the church.

The early years of the church were recalled by Mrs. Moya Cole of Brownwood, Roy McCorkle of Coleman and Miss Lou Featherston of Brownwood. Each told of a grandfather who was a pioneer in the church.

Benjamin Columbus Hardin, grandfather of Mrs. Cole, came to this area in 1882. He was the first recorded church clerk, serving until 1891. He taught school at Trickham and worked as county surveyor and treasurer. A Civil War veteran, he later served his country as a protector of frontier homesteads against Indian raids and lawlessness. B. C. Hardin was the father of the late Mrs. Clara Haynes and was truly one of the "Old School" pioneers.

Rev. Charles Henry Featherston, grandfather of Lou Featherston and of Robert See of Coleman, came here in 1880. He was the second pastor of the church, serving from 1891 to 1894. He was a pioneer, preacher, teacher, merchant and a soldier of two wars, the Mexican War and Civil War. He served as Trickham Postmaster and operated a store while serving as minister of the church. C. H. Featherston preached his first sermon in 1880 from the text Romans 12:1.

Rev. J. R. McCorkle,

grandfather of Roy McCorkle of Coleman, served the Trickham church from 1902 - 1908 and again in 1930 - 1935. Rev. McCorkle came to Trickham from Kaufman, Texas. He served this area as Baptist Missionary for 30 years. During this time he served 12 churches, organized more than a dozen churches, married over 800 couples, and baptized more than 1500 converts. He made his rounds in a buggy. In 1921 the area churches gave him a car. He had five children, Ray, Edd, Lena, Mary and Lee. Two are still living, Lena and Mary. All of these early pioneers came to Trickham in covered wagons.

Another early-day pioneer "pillar of the church" was Mr. T. J. Lancaster. The Lancaster family have been workers in the Trickham Baptist Church since their first members, Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Lancaster, joined in 1890. Thomas J. Lancaster was church clerk from 1891 to 1903. He was faithful in recording the activities of the church. The minutes are still legible and easy to read. They tell the story of a group of Christian people dedicated to their church, its beliefs and work.

Lige Lancaster, son of Thomas, following the traditions of his father, was a loyal worker, serving as deacon for many years. On this centennial day the Lige Lancaster family gave to the Trickham Baptist Church a gift in the amount of \$500. This was accepted as a memorial to the Lancaster family and their devotion to all the causes of their church. Others making special gifts to the church were Robert See, Lou Featherston, Keetie Haynes and Stevens Funeral Home of Coleman.

When we recall the names of the men and women whose lives were the foundation stones of this church, we can understand why Trickham Baptist Church has stood the test of time and is continuing the work which they began 100 years ago.
