Artesia N.M. Banker To Be Honored Saturday

Roy A. Richardson of Artesia, N. M. has been selected Ex-Student of the Year to be honored at the Santa Anna Homecoming October 6 and 7. He will be introduced at the Friday night football game and presented at the Saturday morning program at the school auditorium.

A graduate of Santa Anna High School in 1928, he attended Southwestern University at Georgetown and graduated from the Anderson School of Operations and Engineering in Los Angeles, Calif. He is also a graduate of the Royal Air Force School, Salisbury, Wiltshire, England.

While attending high school Roy started his banking career as a part time employee at Santa Anna National Bank. After college he was appointed Assistant Cashier and held that position until he joined the Air Force in 1943. He served three years in Europe in the 9th Air Force Finance Department.

Prior to the invasion of the Continent, and throughout the campaign for the liberation of Europe, Roy was in England, Normandy, Northern France and Luxemburg, and later assigned to the Army of Occupation in Germany. He was discharged January 1, 1946.

Richardson returned to Santa Anna National Bank as Vice President, holding that position until he joined Peoples State Bank in Artesia, New Mexico in 1950.

He has served as Executive Vice President, cashier and director of Peoples State Bank and has recently retired from the position.

Mr. Richardson is still connected with Peoples State Bank, serving as secretary of the Board of Directors and a part time employee.

Former Trickham Merchant Buried There On Friday

Funeral services were held at Trickham Union Church Friday, September 29, for Leston Cozart, 82, who died Wednesday, September 27, in the Veterans Administration Nursing Home in Houston after a long illness.

Rev. Howell Martin of Trickham officiated at the services with burial in the Trickham Cemetery. Henderson Funeral Home was in charge of the services.

Mr. Cozart was born in Mississippi March 7, 1896, the son of the late Robert Lee and Ada (Patterson) Cozart. He had lived most of his life at Trickham where he owned and operated the Leston Cozart Grocery and Station for 48 years, retiring from the business in 1977.

He had made his home in Houston in recent months while in failing health.

Mr. Cozart married Carrie Mae Ford in Santa Anna July 23, 1933. She died in 1973. He was a veteran of World War I.

Survivors are a daughter, Doris N. Watson of Houston; a son, Willie Calcote of Huntsville, Ala.; two sisters, Ruby Holland of

Guy Allen Is Winner Of Two Trophy Saddles

Guy Allen has had two profitable weekends recently, winning a trophy saddle at each roping on two consecutive weekends.

September 23 - 24 Guy was in Happy, Texas for a jackpot roping where he was first in the average in the 33-roper steer tripping event, winning the Wesley Sims Memorial Roping and taking fourth in the average of the calf roping event.

At Post at the OS Ranch roping, Sunday Guy was winner of that

contest over 34 other ropers. He placed fourth and third in two go-arounds and was first in the average with 76.14 seconds on the four steers.

Kelly Corbin of Oklahoma was second; Sonny Davis of Kenna, N. M. was third; and Olin Young of Portales, N. M. was fourth.

The Post roping was a benefit event for West Texas Boys Ranch.

Guy, the 1977 World Champion PRCA Steer Roper, did not win in the 1978 championship roping, but went to Pendleton, Ore. where he placed seventh in the average and won one go-around to earn a fourth place standing in the PRCA 1979 race. He roped the fastest steer in the Pendleton contest that had 138 steer ropers vying for the large purse.

Guy's dad, James Allen, also competed at Pendleton and earned a tenth place standing in the PRCA race.

The recent ropings have been jackpot events and do not count on the championship totals. There will be no more PRCA ropings until next summer, but the Allens will be taking part in area events for several months.

In the second half of play Blanket scored two more touchdowns, one being a sparkling 84-yard run by David Reid.

The Tigers also scored a safety against the locals when the snap sailed over punter Jerry Culpepper's head in the fourth quarter.

The stout Blanket defense limited the Mountaineers to only 42 offensive plays during the night. The Tiger defense, led by noseguard Minica, held the 'Neers leading rusher for the season, Dwayne Warnock, to only 19 yards rushing. Wallace Collins playing offensive halfback for the first time, led the Mounties offense with 35 yards.

Defensive end Robby Young and Mike Salazar, who split time at

outside linebacker and defensive halfback, were the two brightest spots on the Mountaineer defense.

The Junior Varsity team will be playing at Miles October 12 and the JHS team will be idle that date.


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

**Vaccinations Prevent
Many Virus Diseases**

Unless they have been immunized against it, virtually all children will at some time develop measles, a disease which can involve serious complications.

Live virus measles vaccine is safe and effective, and should be administered routinely to all children, says a pamphlet from the American Medical Association. Measles immunization is especially important for children with chronic illnesses such as heart disease, cystic fibrosis and tuberculosis, and for those who are malnourished or are institutionalized.

German measles is often so mild it is overlooked or misdiagnosed. But if acquired by a

woman in early pregnancy, this disease poses a direct threat to the fetus. Live rubella virus vaccine is recommended for children between one year of age and puberty, with priority for those in kindergarten and first grade.

Live mumps vaccine may be given at any age from 12 months. It is of particular value in children approaching puberty, adolescents and adults, especially men, who have not had the disease.

Flu vaccine is generally advised for anyone with chronic heart disease, lung or kidney disease, diabetes, for people over 65, and for those in health, public safety and general service occupations. It is not recommended for healthy children and adults, or for people allergic to eggs. The vaccine is grown on egg cultures.

Vaccines protect us against many of the great killer diseases of the past. Smallpox has been gone for years in the United States, and may well be eliminated in the entire world. But the vaccines against those remaining infectious diseases do not protect those who neglect to get vaccinated.



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CONSERVATION CONVERSATION

Aztec Maximilian sunflower, a native forb relished by livestock and wildlife, has been released by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service. A forb is a herbaceous plant that is not a grass, sedge or rush.

Livestock producers in Texas would like to include seed of a native plant used by livestock and wildlife -- especially deer and game birds-- in range seeding mixtures. Seed for such plants are simply not available. But Aztec Maximilian sunflower will change that.

We anticipate a heavy demand for the seed as soon as it is available. Commercial seed growers will be planting Aztec in 1979. A small amount of seed should be available for use in range seeding mixtures in 1979

and 1980. Maximilian sunflower is native to most of the grasslands of the Southwest, but the plant is so relished by livestock and wildlife that it has been killed out on most rangeland. Seed for the plant has never been grown commercially.

Green Thumb Employs Folks In Santa Anna

Six Santa Anna people are enrolled in the Green Thumb program in the community, providing services for the community and giving jobs to the senior citizens. Green Thumb is a program funded by the Labor Department to employ older rural Americans in jobs no one else will do. It's run by the National Farmers Union as one of a group of Labor Department-funded programs for the elderly.

Organized in 1965, the program now employs nearly 15,000 persons in 41 states, Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia. More than half are women. Average age of Green Thumbs is 70. Most get the minimum wage -- \$2.65 an hour -- with crew chiefs and safety monitors drawing 10 to 15 percent above the minimum. The jobs vary widely. Green Thumb workers build parks in towns like Columbia, Tenn. They repair and weatherstrip schools. They chauffeur poor people to market, help provide meals for them, coach high school students and build playgrounds. They answer sheriff's phones and rebuild falling-down homes.

Workers in Santa Anna include Velda Mills and Jo Horne, city librarians; Ruby Strickland and Jessie Lewis, aides at school and in the lunchroom; E. B. Drake, City of Santa Anna employee; and Omie Slate, health services. To qualify you have to be 55 years of age or older and have an

Recent Ruling Threatens Bus Service In Area

A recent ruling by the Interstate Commerce Commission telling the intercity bus industry that the frequency of bus schedules should be reduced would have an adverse affect on Santa Anna, according to H. A. (Sy) Burden, local agent for Continental Trailways Inc., at Burden Mobil Station. "On August 4 the ICC handed down a decision which said that bus companies should decrease the level of service through such actions as less frequent scheduling and the offering of fewer amenities," said Burden. "Just what amenities the Commission was referring to, I don't know. Perhaps the ICC would like to remove the restrooms and seats from the annual income below the federal 'poverty line', and have poor employment prospects. Green Thumb does for rural folks what the National Council of Senior Citizens, the National Retired Teachers Association and the AARP do for city and suburban dwellers. It also provides services for small towns such as Santa Anna. Local senior citizens interested in part-time employment are invited to inquire at City Hall about jobs that may be available through the program.

buses and haul people like cattle." More serious than the question of 'amenities' however, is the matter of a reduced bus schedule. If there are cut-backs on schedules, those cut-backs would be made on less profitable routes. Generally the least profitable routes are those which serve small communities like Santa Anna. Continental Trailways has four buses per day arriving and departing from here, Burden explained. There are approximately five to nine passengers per week served by the company. Kerrville Bus Co. also operates four buses a day through Santa Anna, using Henderson Texaco Station as terminal. Besides the passenger service, the buses provide a frequently-used parcel service. Many rural towns are totally dependent on the bus travel between towns. The only travel alternative is private automobile. With the federal government telling people to limit use of cars to conserve energy, the Interstate Commerce Commission seems intent on doing away with the intercity bus -- one of the most fuel efficient forms of transportation. Last year more than 340 million passengers traveled by bus. Those 340 million passengers were taxpayers, and yet the federal government takes tax dollars to subsidize Amtrak and the airlines, while the intercity bus service operates without a dime of federal assistance. People in Santa Anna should let Congress know how they feel about the matter and seek rejection of the ICC ruling.

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Special Award Is Given To California Man

A Seventh-day Adventist was recently awarded the "Righteous Gentile" medal by an Israeli organization for saving the lives of more than 700 Jews from the Nazi holocaust in World War II, according to Mrs. John Hart, communication secretary for the local Adventist Church.

John Henry Weidner, 65, now owns a chain of health food stores in Pasadena, California. Born of Dutch parentage, he was the son of a Seventh-day Adventist minister. While running a textile business in Lyons, France, he established the "Dutch-Paris underground, which helped more than 700 Jews escape to Switzerland.

On receiving the medal from Yad Vashem, an Israeli organization, Weidner told his audience, "At that time we never thought of any reward or decoration. We fought for a world of love, justice and understanding."

The Nazi Gestapo placed a reward of 5 million francs on Weidner's head at the height of his work in 1944. He was arrested and escaped several times, and was nearly drowned by French police when they tortured him in a bathtub.

In making the award to Weidner the Chairman of the Yad Vashem Gideon Hauser told him, "You were a soldier of humanity in the world's darkest years."

Class of '38 Makes Plans For Weekend

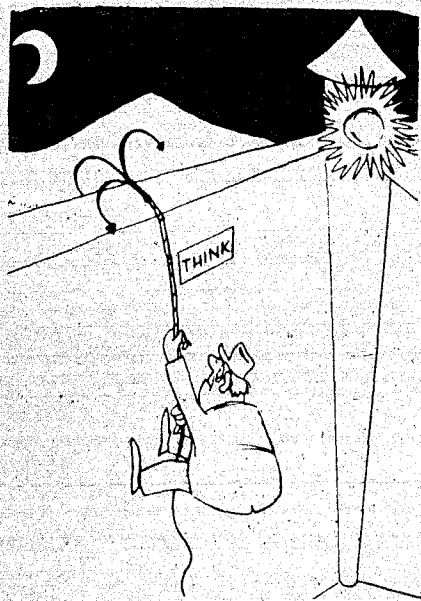

DPS Expresses Concern For Traffic Deaths

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today expressed "serious concern" over the state's rising traffic death toll and increasing rate of violent crime.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir said these trends are "symptomatic of the rapid population growth experienced in Texas during the last few years."

The DPS director observed that traffic deaths on the streets and highways of Texas are 11 per cent higher than at the same time in 1977.

"If this trend continues, we will for the first time kill over 40,000 people in Texas traffic in a single year," he said.

The all-time traffic death record was 3,698 killed in 1977. Deaths previously peaked at 3,692 in 1973—the last year of the 70 mile speed limit, but had been lower in the 1974-76 period.

Regarding crime, the DPS director noted that while the overall crime rate per 100,000 population was down by one per cent for the first six months of 1978, actual numbers of major crimes rose.

There were an estimated 336,302 major offenses in Texas during the first half of 1978, compared to 330,169 such crimes in the same months of 1977.

Looking specifically at violent crimes, Speir said reports submitted to DPS indicate these offenses soared during the first six months. The murder rate rose 14.7 per cent, rapes were up 15.2 per cent, and the rate for aggravated assaults climbed 6.2 per cent.

"Part of the problem," said Speir, "is that growth in law enforcement just has not kept pace with the state's growing and increasingly mobile population.

Speir observed that while the crime rate per 100,000 population has risen 32 per cent since 1973, the department's authorized criminal law enforcement strength has risen by only 10 per cent.

Regarding traffic enforcement, he said that California, Florida, Illinois, Michigan and Pennsylvania—states with populations, vehicle registrations and licensed drivers comparable to Texas—have an average of 2,043 Highway Patrol troopers per state while Texas has but 1,350.

"The DPS urgently needs additional personnel, and we need salary adjustments which are sufficient to permit retention of trained and productive employees," Speir added. "This is essential if we are to provide the proper response to these growing problems."

The DPS director noted that the problem is further compounded by inadequate pay levels for law enforcement officers and essential support personnel.

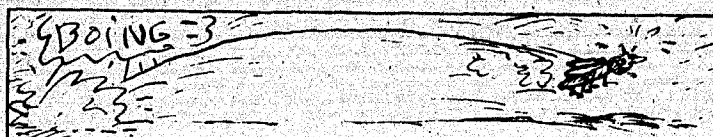
"We have a department-wide annual turnover of 15 per cent, and our turnover in enforcement personnel is nearly 50 per cent more than just two years ago," he said.

SAN ANGELO... Bowhunters get first crack at the Texas deer populations during the special archery seasons which opened one-half hour before sunrise October 1 in most counties throughout the state. Bowhunting season on white-tailed deer is scheduled through October 31.

Archers have the option of taking deer of either sex during these special seasons and no special antlerless permit is needed in Coleman County.

Hunters are urged to check the Parks and Wildlife Department's hunting and fishing guide for maximum harvest limits since these can vary from county to county.

Bowhunters also must meet certain other state requirements: The bow must be capable of shooting a hunting arrow equipped with a broadhead point a distance of 130 yards; The broadhead point must be at least seven-eighths of an inch in width but not over one and one-half inches; Arrows must be indelibly marked with the name and address of the user; No poison drug or explosive arrows are

allowed; Crossbows are illegal in taking game; and bowhunters must purchase a \$3.25 archery stamp in addition to the other hunting license requirements.

Antlerless doe permits will be issued to landowners or their designated agents during the latter part of October and the first of November. Landowners are urged to watch for an announcement in the local media for the specific date and place of issuance for their county.

The first segment of the mourning dove season in the North Zone ends October 21, but will re-open for the late-winter segment January 6 - 14. The season in the South will end November 5 and re-open for the second part January 6 - 14.

Private pond and lake owners have until November 1 to submit applications to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for any bass, catfish or sunfish they may want for stocking purposes.
