## Centennial Event At Trickham Trickham Baptist Congregation Notes 100th Anniversary Sunday

Former members, pastors and friends of Trickham Baptist Church are invited to attend the 100th anniversary celebration of the group Sunday, October 1, at Trickham. Rev. Lewis Stuckey will deliver the anniversary message and several other former pastors are expected to be present.

The anniversary celebration will begin at 10 a.m. and include special music by the family of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene James. A basket lunch will be served at the Community Center at noon, and a gospel singing during the afternoon will conclude the observance.

The Trickham Baptist Church was organized as the Mukewater Baptist Church in 1878 by the late Rev. N. T. Byars. The site of the original church was at the Mukewater Schoolhouse, a one-room log structure located about three miles north of Trickham on the east side of Mukewater Creek.

This was about one mile north of John Chisum's first store.

There were eight charter members, M. M. Calloway, John L. Bryant, J. L. Tindle, Bytha Bryant, Susan Tindle, M. C. Sawyer, M. Lou Calloway and Virginia Frances.

A few years later the congregation moved to Trickham. Here they held services in the ground floor of the two-story Trickham schoolhouse. The church minutes mention it as the 'usual place of worship.'

In 1891 the church roll was updated and under the leadership of the Rev. C. H. Featherston the following names were recorded as members:

Although most records were lost from 1878 to 1890, there are a few listings of members who joined during that time.

The first pastor on record after Rev. N. T. Byars was Rev. C. H. Featherston. He served as pastor until November 1894.

Rev. J. R. McCorkle was pastor from 1902 to 1908 and again from 1930 - 1935. These faithful pastors were effective in keeping the young church alive and growing.

In 1908 the name of the church was changed to Trickham Baptist Church. Soon after this time the names of other well-known families were added to the church

Down 6 - 0 to the Goldthwaite Eagles with barely three minutes gone in last Friday night's Mountain game the men from the Mountain came storming back.

Early in the second quarter Mountaineer linebacker Bruce Pape recovered an Eagle fumble on the Goldthwaite 35-yard line.

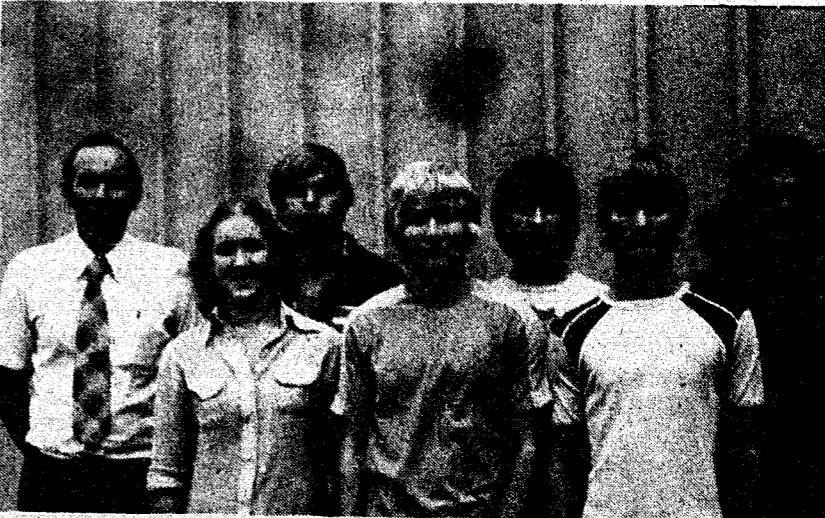
On the first Mountaineer play sophomore halfback Dwayne Warnock, following the power blocking of Mike Ballard, Robbie Young, Phil Johnson, Mike Warnock and Jerry Culpepper,

romped 35 yards for the first Santa Anna score of the night. PAT failed.

Minutes later the stout Mountaineer defense forced the visitors to punt. Recovering from a five-yard penalty on the first play, the 'Neers turned Dwayne Warnock loose on a 54-yard scoring run on the next play.

Again the PAT failed. On the Mountaineers' next possession, the locals took the ball 51 yards in eight plays, including a fine pass play of 19

Jerry Culpepper kicked the PAT, moving the score to 25 for Santa Anna, six for Goldthwaite. On the ensuing kickoff, the ball ricocheted off an Eagle receiver and P. Y. Salazar, along with Mike Salazar, fell on the ball, claiming it for the Mountaineers once again. This time on the Goldthwaite 49 yard line.

The scoring drive, culminated by a two-yard drive by Mike Warnock, featured an 18-yard romp by Fullback Wallace Collins. The two-point conversion was successful as QB Tommy Harris hit P. Y.

Along with the running of the

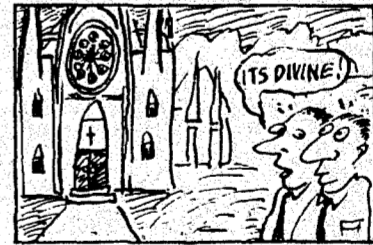
